PRESTON VS. HAGGART.

Mr. Preston met Hon. John Haggart at Kingston Wednesday evening at the last public meeting in connection with the bye-election in that city. He repeated the charges preferred in the House of Commons against Hon. Mr. Haggart, that he had a beneficiary interest in section B of the C. P. R., and said that an inquiry was moved for in the House of Commons on a resolution proposed by Mr. J. F. Lister, and that the resolution was voted down. All the fraudulent transactions that have ever been discovered in connection with the Government fade into insignificance in the face of the stealing in connection with section B. Hundreds of thousands dollars were paid to corrupt the electors in 1883 and in 1887. Forty thousand dollars were subscribed for the purpose of defeating the Mowat Government, and brought into Toronto by one Stimson.

Mr. Haggart made a general denial of the charges and said he would sue the yaper for libel that would formulate and publish the charges against him. He declared that he was an innocent man.

Missionaries Massacred!

Sanguinary Scenes on the Congo River.

Five Missionaries and Seven Converts Meet a Terrible Fate.

All the Mission Buildings, Schools and Granaries Burned.

PAUL LONADO, Africa, Dec. 15.—Advices from Bema, in the Congo Free State, bring news that the American mission, established on the Congo River in the neighborhood of the Pallaballa Station, has been made the scene of a terrible tragedy, in which five American missionaries, three men and two women, and seven native converts and servants lost their lives at the

converts and servants lost their lives at the hands of murderers.

All of the buildings, schools, residences and granaries were burned and the cultivated fields laid waste.

No evidence has been discovered which would conclusively show who the perpetrators were, but suspicion points to a number of half-civilized Portuguese natives.

IT WAS HILL'S BODY.

No Dummy in the Coffin at the Defaulter's Funeral.

New York, Jan. 28.—The story to the effect that T. Wilton Hill, the defaulting cashier of the bank at Jamesburg, N. J., was not dead, and that a dummy had been placed in the coffin which was supposed to contain Hill's body is denied. Mr. Hill's death occurred more than a month ago, and was followed by the discovery of a defalcation on his part, amounting as is now was followed by the discovery of a defal-cation on his part, amounting as is now known, to more than \$54,000. This sum was the entire capital of the bank. Just previous to his death he had been insured for \$20,000, and the insurance companies became suspicious as to his sudden demise. The story of the dummy in the coffin is dis-credited by the testimony of several promi-nent residents of Jamesburg. Mr. J. C. Magee, a director of the broken bank, Mr. F. H. Pownall and Mr. C. E. Westervelt are ready to swear that they saw Mr. Hill's dead body in the coffin and followed it to the grave. The body will probably not be exhumed.

The French Government has selected M. Patenotre as its diplomatic representative at Washington. The Paris Republique Illustree, speaking of the promotion of M. Patenotre as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States, says he is one of the most prominent and best-known diplomatists of the French foreign service. As Minister Plenipotentiary, he signed the Tonkin treaty of Hue in 1884, and the treaty of Tien-Tsin in 1885, which put an end to the hostilities between France and China. He has served in succession as secretary or as Minister to Greece, Persia, Argentine Republic, Sweden and Morocco. From 1888 up to the date of his transfer to Washington he occupied the legation of Tangiers, which has a very great importance for France on account of the proximity of Algeria. M. Patenotre is about 45 years of age, a bachelor, and a gentleman of distinguished and commanding appearance.

THE DEHORNING CASE. Evidence for the Defense Continued-Nearing Its End. J. D. O'Neil, V.S., of this city, one of the veterinaries of the Humane Society, had advised that no action be taken, as de-horning was often necessary. He had

had advised that no action be taken, as de-horning was often necessary. He had witnessed Mr. Elliot, one of the defendants, perform the operation twice, and he con-sidered that it was done as well or better than the ordinary veterinary surgeon would do it. Both horns were sawed off a cow in 9 seconds. Her pulse had increased two beats during the operation. The discharge of pus was a natural mode of healing, and its presence was not a sign of pain or un-healthiness. He thought that there was no pain after the first two or three strokes of the saw. The operation was not a cruel one.

the saw. The operation was not a cruel one.

Dr. William Brady, V.S., of Tilsonburg, had inspected some hords of cattle that had been dehorned. He thought there was no unusual change in the pulse or temperature after the operation. The condition of the animal remained normal, and the quality of milk was not changed. The pain was only momentary and treatment was not necessary in warm weather unless the cows were kept in a stable where chaft could get into the cavities. After the horns were cut off the cattle were more docile and put on flesh better. The operation was not cruel or unnecessary. Brass tips or a board put across both horns would not prevent a cow from bunting or rupturing another.

J. C. Burk, V.S. of St. Thomas, had in-

J. C. Burk, V.S., of St. Thomas, had in J. C. Burk, V. S., of St. Thomas, had in-spected the dehorning of some cattle around Brownsville. He had taken their tem-perature one day, and five days after the operation and had seen one operation. He did not now think it was painful, and could did not now think it was paint; and could see no symptoms of pain. The operation was entirely justified by the results. Mr. Elliot was very skillful in cutting off the horns. It was impossible for a cow to bleed to death from the artery severed in dehorn.

L. A. Brown, V. S., of Aylmer, had dehorned a large number of cattle and thought that the pain was sharp while the cutting was going on, but not excruciating, as stated. Two months after the operation he had seen the defendant's cattle, and they were in excellent condition.

THURSDAY MORNING.

When court opened at 10 this morning Thomas Rutherford, of Dereham, was called. Last spring he had dehorned thirteen of his cows and eight more just before Christmas. It was a common thing for cows to have their udders bruised. In some cases they lose one-quarter and in others nearly one-half of the bag. Bloody milk was sometimes the result. They were harder to stable and much harder to drive through a lane when they had their horns. Since the cows were dehorned they were quiet and equally as intelligent. Three out of eight of his cows discharged pus, but they were all healed a few days ago. He has not used any covering. His cows milked better now than they did before they were delorned. He considered the benefits derived as more than sufficient reason for the operation. The cows did not moan or bellow from the pain. In his experience of 25 years the usual way taken by cows of showing pain was not by moaning nor bellowing. They would do this under very severe pain. Fastening the cow's head as he bad done for the operation would not prevent her from showing that she was in pain. He dehorned the cow's to protect the weaker members of the herd, as he knew of no way in which he could do it so well. He could not say that at the time he dehorned his cattle any of them were suffering from goring or hooking, but he would say that he thought likely some of them were.

Drives Visitors from English Health Resorts—Great Demand for Mourning Goods.

Resorts—Great Demana to Mourning Goods.

London, Jan. 28.—The official returns of mortality, showing that the grip is spidemic at Brighton as well as in the large cities, have frightened the visitors at the fashionable health resorts, and they are leaving in large numbers. The local papers bewait this movement, which threatens to ruin the season, and declare that the returns are misleading. It is claimed that the majority of the deaths which have occurred have been to invalid who contracted the influenza elsewhere, and came to Brighton in a debilitated state.

Some districts report an abatement of the prevalent malady, but, on the other hand, the disease is spreading to many localities heretofore exempt, so that it cannot be said that the whole of the epidemic is disappearing from England.

LONDON, Jan. 28.—The demand for mourning goods on account of the increased mortality resulting from the epidemic of influenza has given an impetus to the crape manufacturing industry which has been in a state of decay. The numerous tactories in Essex devoted to this branch of production are now busy working on full time, and some are being operated night and day. Thousands of persons are thus furnished with much-needed employment.

Eight colleges and a number of smaller schools have been closed in Saxony with review to prevent the apread of the influenza by means of public assemblages.

A Study for Dairymen.

Cheese makers have known for years that foul water would play sad havec with the milk, causing floating curds and tainted cheese. Yet with all their preaching there were always a host of patrons who either did not care or else were perfectly indifferent as to what water their cows drank. But here is a leason that relates to the life

ent as to what water their cows drank. But here is a lesson that relates to the life of the cattle themselves. It will be a profitable thing to read and remember, for it teaches a very important principle in cow management, viz., the imperative value and necessity of providing pure water for the stock.

In a recens bulletir of the Iowa Experimental Station, D. M. Stalker, veterinarian of the statior gives the following interesting account of an outbreak of mallignant diseases among live stock:

"During the latter part of the summer of 1890, I had occasion to investigate a severe outbreak of diseases on a farm in one of the counties in Iowa. The animals, including horres, cattle and pigs, were all affected in the same way. The local symptoms were largely confined to the throat. There was a swelling, partial paralysis of the walls of the upper air passages and painful and difficult breathing. The animals attacked uniformly died after an illness of about two days. The disease I could not recognize as belonging to any of the well-defined types with which I was acquainted. Here were horses, cattle and pigs sick and dying with disease, showing the same symptoms in all. There are few, if any, of the specific forms of disease that spread as epizootic from the widely differing species of domestic animals. I could not classify the disease, and at once set about the task of discovering, if possible, some common source of exposure. the widely differing species of domestic animals. I could not classify the disease, and at once set about the task of discovering, if possible, some common source of exposure. The pastures, buildings and water supply were each in turn subjected to careful scrutiny. The buildings were such as are to be found no ordinary lows farms, fairly comfortable and clean. I could find no clue the quantity or quality of feed that promised to lead to assolution of the difficulty. On investigation of the water supply, I found that most of the animals on the farm drank from a small creek that ran a zigzag course through the premises. The stream was in part supplied from a series of springs and in ordinary secsons afforded a fair amount of water which ran at least for a portion of its course, over a gravelly bed. The present dry summer, with several previous ones, showing an choromally light rain-fall, has so reduced the amount of water, that it has ceased to run. On making examination and conducting inquiries, I ascertained that it had been the custom on the farm to throw carcasses of animals down the steep bluffs into the bed of the stream.

Ifurther learned that during the summer chicken cholera had prevailed on the farm and that a large number of chickens had died and been thrown over the bank. I was also informed that the hog cholera has caused the death of a considerable number of swine, the carcasses having been treated in a similar manner. 

Feeding Cows.

Mr. J. F. Hindmarch asks which is the better way, to feed sheaf oats uncut to cows to make milk or butter, or get out the oats and have them crushed? It is hard to tell, as we would do neither, as a rule, but cut the sheaf oats and add some other grain foods—cornmeal or bran, or both. One of our best dairy farmers near the Fort, Mr. S. B. Morrison, unless oats are very abnormally high, in proportion to feeding value as compared with other feed, don't think it pays to thresh and grind oats to feed his cows, but does run them through the straw cutter.

Those who cannot keep the mice out of their sheaf oats may well take counsel of the Germans, who, during the fall and early winter, chaff their oats and pile them in the big bays of their barns. The mice can't make much headway in entering such a pile, for the stuff falls down behind them as they go in, and then it is soon retreat or death for want of breath. Whitewashing Cow Stables.

The condensed milk factories in New York, in their contracts with the farmers tor milk, specify that the stables and sheds for keeping the cows shall be thoroughly ventilated and mostly whitewashed during the first month of such contract. The contracts are made twice a year, on the 12th of September and the 12th of March, thus causing the stables and sheds to be whitewashed twice a year also.

In writing upon this question and the opinions of the farmers concerning this practice, a correspondent of the Country Gentleman states as follows:

"Whitewashing stables is an innovation made by the factory, and it has come to stay. No milk farmer who has tried it would neglect to continue doing so were the obligations stricken from the contract. Stables otherwise dark and dismal are made pleasantly light, oftentimes obviating the necessity of a lantern on dark mornings and evenings. With the whitewashing there is of necessity a cleaning away of dust and cobwebs, and the sweetening and purifying effect of the lime is everywhere apparent. I well remember the first general whitewashing. The cows actually refused to enter the stables when the white walls met their eyes. They seemed to regard them as probably cleaned up for the master's own occupancy, such a whiteness, neatness and sweetness being foreign to the realm of dumb beasts. The factory folks are enthusiats on the subject of whitewash, and I am told went to the extreme at one time of whitewashing a cast-iron negro hitching post. However, the thanks of every milk farmer are due to the factory for its enforcement of a practice that has become recognized as a needful and useful requirement in the milk business."

This is but another pointer in proof of the value of more intelligent practices for the care of our dairy herds.
