

#### THE 'FRISCO FIRE RATES

A Flat Settlement on All Loses Not Du to the Earthquake.

Oakland, Cal., June 15.-The Examiner today says: "The two insurance companies who wish to settle losses in suggested a compromise to the other companies who seek to establish 75 per cent basis of settlement.

The proposed compromise is an agreement which will permit a fis settlement on all losses in which it is clearly established that no earthquake damage was sustained by the pro perty before the fire. On all property damaged by earthquake the companies interested are to be permitted to exercise their own discretion as to the basis on which the loss is to be set-

This compromise was proposed by the companies holding out for a fu settlement and was offered in an effort to prevent the other compa from establishing a bureau of their own. The 32 believed that a split in the underwriters adjusting bureau at this time would be disastrous to the insurance situation. But the cut payments companies were no prepared to abandon their claims for a general reduction and asked that a meeting be called in a few days at which the matter shall be finally settled.
