Chemist Finds Serum That Kills the Diphtheria Germs.





After the performance one of the members of the theater party presented the actor to the young Maryland girl. From that night Mansfield's fate was bound up in that of the gentle girl of whom he spoke henceforth as

the "White Rose." Negotiations followed, and Mr. Martin received \$20,000 in cash for the hotel. Mr. Martin swore at the investigation that he met Messrs. T. J. Jones, a contractor, who claimed to have been a former partner of Chief License Inspector Purvis; Edward Adamson, former chief grain inspector in Toronto, and Frank Brazil, on the street. and told them he had lost nearly \$11,-000 on the hotel deal. They said they could arrange the matter for him, according to Mr. Martin's evidence, and an agreement was made whereby he paid them \$500, and promised \$1,500 more if they were successful. Subsequently Mr. Martin, believing that they had done nothing for him, entered suit for the recovery of the \$500, but afterwards withdrew his action.

Mr. Brazil, in his evidence, said that Mr. Martin explained that if Mr. H. T. Kelly, solicitor in the matter, with the other assistance, realized \$20,000 or over for the hotel the three men in question were to get \$1,500. The commissioner remarked: "That's a strange deal, to give you all the expected increase.

Mr. Brazil claimed that Mr. Martin insisted on their taking the money, whereupon the commissioner asked: "Was he under the impression that he was buying the license commissioners or paying you?" "Paying us," was the

The commissioner's report on the matter reads:

"Then I come to the Martin and Ball transfer, in which Brazil, Jones and Adamson figure. These three men extracted \$500 from Mr. Martin on the flimiest kind of a pretext. Mr. Brazil is a Liberal, while Adamson and Jones are Conservatives. 'Good Conserva-


