





In the second place there is as at the Crystal Palace, a break in the path which the bicycle leaps by virtue of its own momentum and that of its rider. Unlike the break in the track at the Crystal Palace, however, the break in path does not take place during the downward path of the cycle or even at the point where it begins to rush upwards. The break, on the contrary, is made at the point where the bicycle on its path upwards round the spiral loop has reached its highest point, so that the cyclist actually flies

Prosperous Conditions. Montreal, Aug. 9 .- The reports of the supreme officers presented at today's session of the Sons of England were of a growth and progress for the society.

An elaborate array of statistics, showing the progress made during the bien-nial term, was given by Mr. J. W. Carson, f Toronto, when the supreme lodge met a Montreal today. The membership of the society was 16,844 at the end of the term, and more than 17,000 at the present moment. The receipts during the two years of the subordinate lodges had been \$208,203 36, and there had been paid for sick benefits \$53,625 78, and for medical attendance \$37,095 37. The total amount so paid out since 1881 being \$349,993 for sick benefits, and \$237,006 for medical attend-ance. The present surplus funds in the hands of the subordinate lodges over and above all liabilities was \$97,766 24. Two hundred and sixteen members. 142 members' wives and 78 children had died dur-ing the biennial term, for which \$29,247 50 had been paid out in funeral benefits. had been paid out in funeral benefits.

During the term 662 new beneficiary certificates and 53 claims had been paid, amounting to \$63,000. The new membership admitted numbered 5,004, the number admitted in 1903 being 1,150 in excess of the previous year. Eight new lodges have been instituted.
