



### PRINGLE OPPOSES CALL CONFERENCE CASTRO TALKS THE AMENDMENT BEFORE NEXT YEAR

### for Religion in the Schools.

Ottawa, April 11.-Upon the resumption of the debate on the autonomy bill today, Mr. R. A. Pringle took the floor. Mr. Talbot, Strathcona, an authority on the subject, had declared the school system in the Northwest Territories was the best in Canada.

Mr. Pringle read several authorities, Canadian, British, and American, in favor of religious teaching in the separate schools in New Brunswick kept up by Roman Catholics, and asked if it would not be better to have a uniform national system, with half an hour for religious instruction. as obtained in the Northwest.

Dealing with the constitutional question, he believed that section 93 of the B. N. A. act would apply. 





### The Cost of Education.

In criticising civic finances, people are ant to overlook the fact that the city council, which fixes the tax rate each year, is by no means the ruling body, and controls but a small portion of the expenditure, Nearly half of our taxes goes to provide the sinking fund for our debenture debt. Ten mills or the dollar is the amount which for several years past has been applied in this direction. The council cannot make this amount either greater or less; it is fixed by laws which the council cannot control. Another half-mill belongs to the Library Board, and this the council must give whenever the trus tees demand it. The board of education is another uncontrollable body. It estimates what it will need for the year, and the council simply collects the money for it. When we deduct the debenture debt, the estimates for the tion, we find that the council only controls an amount of taxes represented by 5 mills and a fraction each yearactually 2 mills less than the school trustees require. A review of the estimates of the past

ten years, according to the table published a week ago, shows that while the proportion of taxes controlled by the trustees is increasing each year that controlled by the aldermen is de creasing. Twelve years ago 2.80 mills went to the board of education; last the council, chosen to manage the affairs of the city, has less money at its command than the board of education. Manchuria: And if there is criticism of our high tax rate, it hardly seems fair that the aldermen who are spending a smaller proportion of taxes each year, should bear all the blame simply because they act as collectors of money with whose To put it in plain figures, of every \$23 paid in taxes last year, \$10 went to the debenture debt. \$7 18 to the board of education, and 50 cents to the library while the council got \$5 35 to pay for fire protection, police protection, lighting the city, caring for the streets and public buildings, supporting the hospital, providing relief for the poor and running the business of the city generally.

Just exactly what has caused this increase in the cost of our educational affairs it is not easy to ascertain. A large portion, of course, goes in teachers' salaries; at the same time we do not think that salaries are any higher than in other cities-certainly not as high as in some. The city is growing, it is true; more teachers are needed, for the school population is increasing; but then, so is the assessed value of property. In twelve years the population of the city, and its assessment have both increased in round numbers 25 per cent; the school expenditure has increased in the same period 250 per cent. Better salaries are doubtless paid now than in 1893; but there has certainly been no such advance in salaries as would account for the increased ex-

Some of the advance can be accounted for by the more liberal provision of schoolhouses. In this matter the board of education has certainly not been niggardly. We are not prepared to say that it has built more than it thought would be required; but it may have gone farther than was absolutely necessary. We believe the number of pupils to a teacher is supposed to average from 40 to 50; and there are cases when these figures are But, looking at the last report, that for 1903, we find one school, with two teachers and an attendance of 54 children-27 teachers, and an average of about 30 to each teacher; another school has only one room occupied in the whole building, with one teacher, and an average attendance of 32 children. In addition there are fifteen kindergarten schools, with an attendance in none of more than 34, and some as low as 16.

We do not propose to go over the estimates of the board and criticise them item by item. One not a member of that body can hardly judge of the necessity, or the reverse, of the different items. But the fact, standing out clearly, that while this portion of our taxes controlled by the council is decreasing, that controlled by the board of education is increasing at a rate apparently out of proportion to the Alexandria, a day's work, which was

It is true that will cost a couple of thousand dollars; out it would make the board take upon tself the full responsibility for its own expenditure, instead of hiding behind the council. The Paris Gaulois reports a conversation which its representative claims to have had with Queen Alexandra during her recent visit to France. Even if it is not authentic, the sentiments attributed to the Queen are those which would be expected of her. "Your talk, as men, is of war, but we women speak always of peacepeace in every nation, peace between all nations. "The whole world is opposed to the outrageous conflicts that have been brought about in this war. It is shameful to think of the awful slaughter of human beings, and even should the hostile countries show any inclination to continue the fight, it will be but a question of time until other powers will interfere to prevent any further loss of life in such an atrocious fashion as has characterized all the battles in this fight. As a matter of fact, it seems altogether probable that this will prove the last of the big wars. Nearly all of the bigger countries seem to favor the abolition of such hostilities, and it will be only a matter of time until all international difficulties are adjusted in some other way than by going to war.'

#### Chicago's Experiment. The mayoralty election in Chicago last

week had a national interest, the issue

being municipal ownership of the street

railway systems, involving franchises computed to be worth \$200,000,000. The successful candidate and Democratic nominee, Judge Dunne, declared for the immediate acquisition of the traction lines. The Republican nominee professed to favor the principle of municipal ownership, but held that it should be realized by gradual and calculated stages, the city taking over the various franchises as they expire by effluxion of time. A number of these have already expired, but there are several 99-year charters which will have long periods to run. Judge Dunne proposes to open negotiations at once for the purchase of these rights, and system of Glasgow, where municipal ownership has reached its highest development, has been brought to Chicago to advise the mayor and council in formulating the new policy. Its opponents say that Judge Dunne is too confident and precipitate and predict years of litigation before the city can clear the field for the experiment, even if the difficulties are not found to be insuperable. Having acquired all the franchise rights, it remains to be seen whether municipal operation will be a success. In his great work American Commonwealth,' written 20 years ago, Mr. James Bryce pointed out that the government of cities was the chief failure of American democracy. Mr. Bryce has supplemented his book by a series of articles, now running in the New York Outlook, the result of his observations during his recent visit to the United States. He takes an optimistic view of the republic, socially and politically, but notes that municipal government remains the plague spot. Chicago is a typical American city, and the vast enterprise upon which it proposes to embark offers incitements to corruption which will be a strong test of civic virtue. The experiment will be one of absorbing interest, and will furnish lessons for the whole nation. If Chicago can make a success of municipal ownership on so large a scale, there will be something like a revolution.

### UNITARIANS DINE

#### First Function in Connection With the Movement in London.

During the past week a Unitarian church has been organized in this city with Rev. V. J. Gilpin, B.A., as pastor. Last night a supper was given in the honor of Rev. G. M. Badger, Unitarian sccretary of New York, under the auspices of the Liberal Christian Union. This is the first function held in connection with this movement in London, and it was a pronounced sucess. About 40 people were present.
Mr. Fred W. Daly, who acted a chairman, gave an introductory address dealing with the work which was before the society, and then introduced Rev. G. H. Badger, the guest of the evening. The speaker gave a short history of Unitarianism and showed how it had developed during the last century. He dwelt upon the eminent men connected with the movement, naming Daniel Webster, Calhoun, Holmes and Emerson, and said that nine-tenth of the governors of Massachusetts State for the last 50 years had been Unitarians. Mr. W. H. Brick extended greetinge on behalf of the Unitarian Club of

Toronto, which he represented. He spoke on the work of their clubs, and gave it as his firm conviction that the salvation and progress of mankind lay in a reverent search for the truth. Mr. Gilpin, Mr. G. N. Weekes and Mr. J. A. Cottam also gave addresses.
