Chinese Leaders Disinclined to Submit to execution.

London, Nov. 9 .- Li Hung Chang tele London, Nov. 9.—Li Hung Chang tele-graphs, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily express, that he despairs of a settlement, and that it is useless to expect the Chinese court to consent to the execu-tion of Yu-Hsien or Tang-Fu-Hsiang. He declares that it is equally vain to attempt to induce the powers to moderate their demands, and that, therefore, the court is preparing for further flight to the province of Sze-Cnuan, with an imperial army of, 14,000.

The Berlin papers continue to print letters from German soldiers in China showing the terrible atrocities committed by Gerwan troops. A letter printed to-day describes the character of a certain village: "Bayonets were fixed, and our lieutenant was commanded to shoot down or hayonet everybody in sight. During the night many Chinese were killed, including a woman and a child."

A British column under Gen. Richardson left Pan Ting Fu Oct. 27, marching in the direction of Pekin. At Tung My Ling the troops tried three Boxer chiefs, destroyers of a chapel and killers of native Christians. The British shot the chiefs.

Count Von Waldersee approved the sentence of death passed upon the five leading officials at Pao Ting Fu whom the commission of inquiry found responsible for the murder of American and English missionaries

A COMING INVESTIGATION.

The exact size of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's majority is not a matter of importance, considering the developments that are to come. Investigat tions into political crookedness made by committees and commissions appointed by the Laurier and Ross Governments have been the veriest fakes. The object in every case appears to have principally been to conceal the truth and shield the criminals. Whatever was done both the Provincial and Dominion Governments could count on partizan majorities seeing through.

But when the party undertook the sale of senatorships it struck dangerous ground. The Senate has a right to protect the inviolability of its own honor. If senatorships have been sold the Senate has the power to investigate in its own behalf, Sir Mackenzie Bowell declares that such an insestigation will take place. He has the majority behind him to make that investigation thorough and searching, and if it transpires that members of the Laurier Ministry have been trafficking in Senate franchises the only thing that will remain for Sir Wilfrid to do will to place the resignal tions of himself and his colleagues in the hands of the Governot General Who knows but what we may see another general election within a year.

M'KINLEY IS NO TAIL TWISTER.

The general run of Canadians are pleased because of the election of McKimley over Bryan, and the reason of it is not far to seek. As a rule Presidential candidates in the United States have vied with each other in trying to please the prejudices of the anti-British element in the Republic. In past campaigns the British lion's tail has been diligently twisted, and in this election Mr Bryan has spoken in bitter terms of British policy, especially in connection with the Transvaal war. Mr. Mc-Kinley not only refrains from making the customary appeals to the England-haters among his countrymen, but has actually ventured to speak in complimentary terms of Great Britain as the power which, in the last analysis, must always prove to be the natural ally and best friend of the

United States That he had the courage, with campaign approaching, to speak out his opinion and invite the disapproving clamor of the classes of people who are always seeking to embroit the two great English-speaking nations in strife, won for him the good-will of men throughout the world who think there should be cordiality instead of distrust between two nations so similar in character and aim.

As for Bryan, he has demon strated convincingly that he is one of the greatest men of his day. His letter accepting the nomination will probably go into history as the most important document ever drawn up by a candidate for the presidency. It is a declaration of faith that few of his countrymen will fail to admire when the heat of the campaign has cooled down.

It may be considered fortunate that Mr. Bryan is a man of serious charac ter and admitted honesty, or it might be feared that, supported by a great following that has been baffled in its purposes through the medium of the ballot box, he would become the leader in a movement that would resort to force. But he will probably find his way into the Senate, where his great gifts of thought and speech will make him an important

Ontario did nobly.

The people of Quebec are evidently the dominant race in this country.

The result in Ontario would have been even more disastrous to Laurier only a lot of old-time Liberals stood by their party for the purpose of giving them another chance to fulfil their promises.

THE VIRTUES OF RHUBARB. These are many and varied, and

These are many and varied, and moreover, are not as well known as they ought to be, says an English exchange. It is very wholesome, and even those who do not like it should take it medicinally in the spring, for it purifies the blood, keeping it cool and healthy. One great virtue rhubarb possesses, and which is not generally known is that mixed with erally known, is that, mixed with other things it takes all flavors, while giving none in return, and is, there-fore of the greatest use in adding to a tart or pudding when the fruit us a tart or pudding when the truit user has run short or is expensive. For instance, if raspberry tart is required, and there, is not enough of the fruit to fill the dish, take some rhubarb, wash it well, mince it up, then stir in sugar, and bake till it is quite soft; when cold mix the raspberries in with it was the tart and place it in the oven just long enough to cook the paste; the presence of rhubarb will never be discovered, and the cost only half the price it would have done if made solely of fruit.

AN ISLAND OF WIDOWS.

Every Husband Residing Upon It Was Drowned by the Staking of a Boat.

Off the coast of Norway is a small sland called Aarlud which boasts the unique distinction of being peopled exclusively by widows. The circum stances under which this state of affairs was brought about are no less curious than distressing.

A short time since a man arrived

on the island from Haugesund, on the mainland, with his wife and family, to participate in the spring egg gathering. While testing his ropes on a cliff preparatory to commencing his search he happened to make a false step forward over the cliff. He was instantly killed. As there had not been a death on the island since 11 years before, when a boy was killed by a bowlder from the same cliff falling on him, the occur-rence naturally cast a gloom over the small community established there. This consisted of some 30 fishermen with their families. As a mark of sympathy and respect all the men de termined to attend the funeral of the unfortunate, which was to take place at the cemetery at Haugesund, on the mainland. But during the proceedings at the burial ground a tremendous gale arose. When the men returned to their smack the storm was at its

After carefully considering the situation the 30 fishermen determined to sail for Aarlud, and having taken advantage of the opportunity to replenish their household supplies the boat was rather heavily laden. Their progress through the angry sea was most anxiously watched by the people on the mainland, who, when the boat had gone the distance of about a mile and half from the coast, saw that the vessel was in great distress. Efforts were at once made to go to its assistance, but the heavy sea beat back every boat that was launched. A few moments afterward the unfortunate smack plunged forward into the trough of the foaming waves and forever disappeared from mortal view. Every one of it. 30 occupants was drowned, and on the

following morning their bodies were News of the disaster was as speedily as possible conveyed to the island. Every wife in the place had, by the dreadful event, been made a widow, and out of 30 as many as 28 were left without any means of support. These women are now receiving assistance from the Norwegian government, which is credited with the intention of settling a number of single men on the island as soon as arrangements can be made. Until that is done, however, all its women must of necessity remain widows.

And it may be accepted by all persons in normal health that moderate exercise, sufficient to induce a liberal moistening of the skin, is the best spe cific that can be prescribed for their daily use in hot weather. None suffer more torture on a sultry day than those who make it their special effort to avoid perspiring .-

London's New Drink. Half a dozen London clubs of impor tance have complained bitterly that their bar receipts are falling off discouragingly since their members came to accept as the proper beverage for summer what is now the popular London drink. This is made of barley water, properly mixed with lemon, sugar and ice, and it originated in the guards' clubhouse. Its fame spread from that headquarters, and other clubs were not slow iz borrowing the recipe. The barley water combination gained favor wherever it was introduced, and this is not believed to be wholly due to the fact that it is distributed gratuitously. None of the clubs which offer their members this refreshment charges anything for it. The consequence is that Scotch and soda, brandy with the same combination and all similar heating alcoholic and more expensive drinks have cease to be called for .- Argonaut.

Protecting New England Beaches The protection of beaches along the New England coast is being successfully accomplished by the "groyne system." These "groyurs consist of a series of posts planted truly in the sand, with close planks extending from post to post. The "groyne" is constructed at right angles to the beach, and its ition prevents the waves acting on it injuriously. Sand is intercepted by the planking, rapidly forming a new beach and preventing erosion.





Measuring a Lightning Flash.

# ABOUT SCOUTING.

Mejor Burnham Tells Londoners (f Wild Western Methods.

Wt c'i He Employed in South Africa-The Day of the Scout not Part.

London News.

"I am just getting used to being interviewed," said Major Burnham, in reply to the apologies of a press representative, "and I confess I prefer your methods over here to those of our reporters at home. It is not necessary for them to see you at all; they can do just as well without, and it gives some scope to their imagination. On one occasion a reporter wrote several columns about my landing in New York, and described me as a man six feet two in height, with London News. as a man six feet two in height, with long hair!" Major Burnham is rather below the medium height, and wears his hair closely cropped. "As a matter of fact, I did not land in New York at that time, but in Boston." "Yes, I am an American," replied

Major Burnham, to an inquiry on the vexed question of his nationality; "I was born in Minnesota and raised in California. My parents were Americans of British descent, and the old home of the family is by the river, not far from Burnham Beeches. I know it has been stated that I am a Canadian, but that is probably due to the fact that I wore the same kind of hat in South Africa, as that worn by the

Canadian contingent.
"When did I begin scouting? Almost since I can remember. When I was a boy I had an experience in frontier wars. America has learned a great deal from the red Indians. We have had to fight for every inch of our have had to fight for every inch of our territory, and learn to beat the red Indian at his own game; when the In-dians were not fighting us on their own account, ther were employed against us, in Colonial days, by the French. You must remember that every time there was war between England and France our ancesters took up the cudgels on behalf of the old country on the other side of the Atlantic. Many of our great generals have been scouts and gained their first experience in Indian warfare. I look upon Kit Carson as the greatest scout who ever lived, but George Washington was a great scout also; with the aid of forty picked men he once saved deneral Braddock from disaster, be cause they knew how to scout, and accounted for a man with every shot instead of wasting their powder in volleying into the woods at random, ere the Indians lay concealed. Many prophesied when I left ho that, with modern tactics and long range weapons, the day of the scout was over. But I think so long as war

was over. But I think so long as war remains there will always be work for the scout to do. And I do not see much likelihood of universal peace yet," he added.

"It is the strong who rule the earth; a great nation can only maintain her greatness by her military power. Once she gets enfeebled, stronger nations will wrest her possessions from her. You can see that in thing. The present rising is largely due to Chins. The present rising is largely due to the fact that the Chinese have at last realized that they must fight if they wish to retain their national existence. There would never have been any talk of the partition of China if she had been a great

military power.
"I do not advocate a large increase of your native armies; I think the English man, or, speaking generally, the white man, should make himself capable of fighting his own battles. I do not believe in a thick-headed stolid man as the best fighting maheaded stolid man as the best fighting materials, because they obey orders and do not think. An intelligent man with a good physique, makes the better soldier—but a man with a knowledge of nature as well as of books. The best book written is only the reflection of another man's mind. An intelligent soldier will stand defeat better than a stupid one; he can see further than the present, and his pride will hold him to his orders though death seems certain. The Imperial Yeomanry, when they have got used to the life on the veldt, will be the finest soldiers in the British army. Their very dash and go, which has sometimes landed them in difficulties and cul-de-sacs, will be the greatest value when they have will be the greatest value when they have developed more caution by a 'onger experience of campaigning. Again, the C. I. special training, for the scout of the future will have to know something about engi-

neering and modern science.
"People who sit at home and criticise ou "People who sit at nome and criticise our troops because they move so slowly cannot realize the difficulty of the country or the length of Lord Roberts' line of communication. It is much about the same as if London was dependent on Rome for all her daily supplies. And it is not only feed, drink and clothing for 159,000 soldiers, but for every town on the line of route, including Kimber-ley, Bloemfontein, Johannesburg and Pre-toria; it is forage for horses and fodder for toria; it is forage for horses and fodder for the cattle, besides ammunition for the rifles and shell for the artillery. The wonder is not that the lines of communication have oc-oasionally been cut, but that they have not been cut more often, and in Cape Colony it-self. The Boers have the advantage of be-ing able to obtain stores where the British cannot—and so must take their transport with them—and also employ the native ponies, which are stronger and thrive bette on the local fodder than the imported ones.

When a horse can go six miles in England, it can only go two miles out there, and a thirty-mile gallop would finish off every horse in South Africa.

"When the British public fully realize," concluded Major Burnham, "the tremendous difficulties to be overcome, they will appreciate even better than they do now the splendid work that has been done out there. Many gallant deeds have been performed, and it is almost impossible to estimate the thousands of miles covered by the Cavalry Division under Gen. French, who have usually done their work on quarter rations for horses and half rations for the men."

Letters to Berlin Papers Tel: How Chinese Were Slaughtered.

Berlin, Nov. 9 .- Letters from German soldiers in China continue to find their way into the press. The Hanover Courier, National Liberal, prints a letter from Pekin describing the operations of the battalion to which he writer belongs, and mentioning a case where three hundred to four hundred Chinese were "partly killed and partly

executed later by shooting." The writer adds:

"All Boxers who are caught in Pekin live shot. Each one must dig a hole and kneel behind it, so as to fall directly into it when the

"The city of Liang-Chang-Chung was captured Tuesday. Our company halted before one of the gates, and the Chinese, who were driven from the other side through the gate, per-ished upon our bayonets. It was hor-rible. We have men in our company who have already shot ten China-men."

"Such statements as this make an official explanation regarding the manner of carrying on the war more urgent than ever.

The Freisinnige Zeitung says:

"The persistent silence in official quarters unfortunately justifies the conclusion that such a description of the conduct of the German troops is true. The government will be com-pelled to express itself in the reichs-tag."

Whiteland, Ind., Nov. 9. - When the body of Milton Knapp was found partially devoured by hogs, in the barn lot of the Herbert farm, near here, it was generally thought he was, a victim of heart, disease, But the whole community was shocked to earn through the confession of the murderer that Knapp was killed by his brother-in-law, William Pherson, whose lands join the Herbert farm, of which Knapp is the owner.

Four years ago, he says, he informed that was anonimously informed that Knapp was paying attention to his 14-year-old daughter. The man proved to be Knapp, and his discovery, Pherson claims, was followed by an attack on the latter with a drawn knife! Striking the baller with his heavy cane the felskulker with his heavy cane, the fellow tumbled unconsciously over the fence into the hog lot, while Pherson left the scene without learning the

Without speaking of the trouble esult of the blow. Pherson went to Greenwood, remain ing all night with a married daughter to whom he told the story next day. of whom he told the story next day.

The story is lame is some particulars but circumstances point to a discovery of guilty action on the part of Knapp that may mitigate the crime!

Pherson is under arrest. He is 61 years old, while Knapp was 66. Both are veterans of the civil war.

"The interview over, the Japanese re-

Next day you receive a copy of the so-and-so newspaper containing the interview with 'top' solemnly written on one side of it, so that you may know which is the right way upward."
