

# CONSTITUTION.

1. This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

2. The object o the Convention shall be to maintain Acadia College and other Educational Interests of the body; as also its Foreign Missionary operations; and to advance the general interests of the Denomination.

8. The Convention shall be composed as follows :--!st. Each of the Baptist Associations within the limits of the Convention shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention five of its own Members as Delegates to represent therein. 2nd. Every Church connected with either of the abovenamed Associations, and contributing toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its Members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional Delegate for every twenty dollars so contributed, provided that no Church be at liberty to send more than five Delegates. 3rd. Every ordained Baptist Minister connected with one of the above Churches shall be a Member. 4th. Any Member of one of these Churches, who shall contribute five dollars annually, or fifty dollars at one time, towards the objects of the Convention, shall be a Member.

4. The Officers of the Convention shall be chosen annually from its Members, and shall consist of a President, two or more Vice Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary residing in the Province in which the Convention is at the time in session, and an Assistant Secretary, chosen from one of the other Provinces.

5. The Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 19th of August annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, when, in addition to the election of officers and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the body in accordance with Art. 2 of this Constitution. a Board of Foreign Missions shall be chosen, consisting of fifteen members of the Convention; also, a Ministerial Education B ard or Boards, of seven Members each. One third of the Members of each of these Boards shall form a quorum. The Convention shall also fill any vacancies that may have occurred in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and shall, once in three years, appoint six new members of the Roard in place of six who will then go out in rotation, in accordance with the Resolution passed by this Convention in September 1859, and in accordance with the Act 14 Vic., of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, chap. 37. R

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6. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Convention, by a vote of two-thirds of the Members present.

# RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Persons invited to a seat may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.

3. No Member shall absent himself without leave of the body.

4. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion unless by permission of the body.

5. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes except so ordered at the time.

6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

# YARMOUTH, Saturday, August 19th, 1871.

#### Afternoon Session, Aug. 19th.

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Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. E. Hickson. Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

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The Committee appointed last year to revise the Constitution reported suggesting various changes. Report received. After a lengthy discussion the revision prepared by the Committee was slightly amended and adopted clause by clause. (See page 3)

Resolved, That Revds I E. Bill, Senr., T. H. Porter, J. Davis, W. G. Parker and Dr. Cramp, be a Committee to revise the list of ordained ministers and report to the Secretaries before the Convention closes.

The Committee to Nominate Governors reported recommending Judge McCully, Mark Curry and W. Faulkner, Esqs., for N. S. and A. W. Masters, Esq., I avid V. Roberts, Esq., and Rev. T. H. Porter for N. B.

Revds. J. E. Balcom, D. Freeman, Jas. Parker, Ed. Hickson and G. E. Day, M. D., were nominated by different members of the body in amendment to those recommended by the Committee.

*Resolved*, That ministering brethren be requested to come to the Convention in future as representatives of the churches over which they preside.

Adjourned. Prayer by Rev. J. Rowe.

Monday Morning Session, Aug. 21st.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. Jas. Spencer.

Resolved, That Rev. Dr. Crawley preach the sermon next year, and that Rev. Dr. Cramp be his alternate,

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be tendered to the managers of Railways, Steamboats, etc., for the a commodation afforded in passing delegates at a reduced fare.

Resolved, That Revds. J. E. Hopper, W. B. Boggs, J. B. McDonald, M.D., and Brother S. Selden, be a committee to make application to the proper authorities for the usual reduction of fare by Railway, Steamboats, and Stage Coaches, to those attending the Convention to be held in St. Stephens N. B., next year.

At 10'clock, the Annual Sermon was preached by Rev. H. G. Weston, D. D., from Exodus xiv. 15.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of Acadia College were read and laid on the table for discussion in the afternoon.

Adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. F. Kempton.

#### Afternoon Session, August 21st.

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. J. Blakeney.

After some discussion it was resolved to proceed to the election of Governors of Acadia College, by ballot. The ballot being taken issued in the election of Hon. Judge McCully, Wm. Faulkner, Esq., and Rev. James E. Balcom, for Nova Scotia; and A. W. Masters, Esq., J. H. Harding, Esq., and Rev. T. H. Porter, for New Brunswick.

Revds. J. C. Blakeney, E. C. Corey, W. A. Corey, J. Williams, Dr. Crawley, J. F. Masters, E. Hickson, and J. H. Harding, were allowed leave of absence.

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Resolved, That the Committee on Obituaries have leave to prepare their report after the adjournment of the Convention, and to print it in the Minutes.

The report of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Governors of Acadia College were taken up and discussed. Speeches were made by Rev. D. M. Welton, J. H. Harding, Esq., Rev. J. Davis, W. Faulkner, Esq, Revds. G M. W. Carey, E. M. Saunders, J. McDonald, M. D., after which the reports were adopted. (See Appendix.)

The following resolutions were moved by Rev. J. Davis, seconded by Rev. Dr. Cramp, and passed :

Resolved,-1. That this Convention heartily rejoices in the cessation of the temporal power of the Bishop of Rome, regarding that event as the precursor of desirable changes in the ecclesiastical affairs of the European commonwealt., involving the separation of Church and State in all countries, and the complete establishment of that kingdom which is not of this world.

2 That the success of evangelic efforts in Italy and Spain, and other parts of Europe is greatly encouraging, and invites the benevolent co-operation of the friends of truth and spiritual worship in all protestant communities.

3. That the prospect of the restoration of harmony between Great Britain and the United States cannot but be hailed by all christians with unmingled satisfaction.

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The Committee on the State of the Denomination reported.

*Resolv d*, That the Report be adopted with the understanding that the Statistics of the Western Associations of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for the present year, shall be incorporated in it. (See Appendix.)

Resolved, That this Convention recommend the churches to set apart the 1st Thursday in December, as a Day of Humiliation and Prayer.

Closed with prayer by Brother A. W. Masters.

Evening Session, Aug. 21st.

Rev. G. M. W. Carey, Vice-President, in the chair.

Meeting opened at  $7\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock, with singing, and prayer by Rev. Dr. Tupper.

An able and interesting paper on Female Education was read by Dr. Hovey, after which speeches on the general subject of Education were made by Rev. Dr. Sawyer, T. H. Rand, Esq., Revds. John Davis, Thomas Burditt, and George Armstrong.

Closed with Doxology, and Benediction by Rev. Dr. Tupper.

Tuesday Morning, Aug. 22nd.

Opened with prayer by Rev. S. March.

Hon Dr. Parker presented his report as Treasurer of the Nova Scotia Ministerial Education Board. Report adopted. (See Ap.)

The Report of the Board of Foreign Mission was read by the Secretary Rev. Dr Tupper, and ordered to lie on the table.

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The Report of the Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions was also read and received.

Dr. Parker requested to be relieved of the charge of certain Dominion debentures belonging to the Foreign Mission Board, that had been placed in his hands for safe keeping.

Resolved. That Brother S. Selden be requested to take charge of said debentures.

The Committee appointed last year to enquire into the feasibility of establishing an independent Foreign Missions, and to consider the propriety of transferring the Board to some more central location reported. The report was received and ordered to lie on the table.

After some discussion of a general character, it was voted to take up the report of the Committee. Remarks were made by Revds. W. H. Porter, Dr. Tupper, Dr. Hovey, J. Davis, and George Armstrong and A. W. Masters, Esq.

The following re-olution was moved by Rev. W. H. Porter, and seconded by Rev. Dr. Tupper,

Whereas in the opinion of this Convention the time is come for the establishment of an Independent Foreign Mission

Therefore Resolved, That we do now proceed to take such steps as may be necessary for the inauguration of the same.

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Adjourned with prayer by Rev. T. Harley.

#### Afternoon Session, Aug. 22nd.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Cramp. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. The resolution respecting an Independent Foreign Mission was taken up, and after a lengthy discussion in which W. Faulkner, Esq., Rev. J. Davis, T. H. Rand, Esq., Revds. C. Tupper, J. B. McDonald, M. D., W. E. Hall, James Parker, E. M. Saunders, Dr. Cramp, J Chase, I. E. Bill, Senr., J.H. Hughes, and T.H. Porter, and A. W. Masters, Esq., took part, the resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That the Board be instructed to obtain additional information respecting the Toungoo District and the Kingdom of Siam, and that they take into serious consideration the alterations which it will be desirable to make in our present arrangements in order to establish an independent Mission. Reports on these points to be presented at the next session of this Convention.

Resolved, That the Foreign Mission Board be located in St. John, N. B.

Revds. I. E. Bill, Senr., and T. Harley, were added to the Committee on Nomination, in place of two members who had been obliged to leave.

The Report of the Committee appointed to enquire into the feasibility of establishing an independent Foreign Mission, etc., was then adopted as a whole, and ordered to be printed in the Minutes. (See Appendix.)

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*Resolved*, That the thanks of the Convention be given to the said committee for their excellent report.

Resolved, That Messrs. A. C. Robbins and J. R. Kinney be a Committee to wait upon the merchants of Yarmouth to solicit aid towards liquidating the debt of Acadia College due to the Professors.

The Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Mission were then taken up and adopted.

The Committee of Nomination reported, nominating persons to form the Foreign Mission Board, and the Officers of the same. Report adopted. (See page 4.)

*Resolved*, That the best thanks of this Convention be given to the retiring Foreign Missionary Board, and especially to the Rev. C. Tupper, D. D., and A. T. Baker, Esq., for their indefatigable service which they have rendered the Society for many years.

The Committee of Nomination reported again, nominating a Ministerial Education Board for Nova Scotia. Report adopted. (See p.4.)

*Resolved*, That the sum of \$800 be paid to the American Baptist Missionary Union-salary of Rev. W. George, Missionary in Burmah, for the ensuing year.

Adjourned with Benediction by the Vice President.

Evening Session, Aug. 22nd.

Convention met at 7.30 o'clock. Rev. G. M. W. Carey, Vice President in the chair.

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Hymn 854th was sung, and the 72nd Psalm read. Prayer by Rev. J. Davis.

A collection was take for Foreign Missions. The subject of Foreign Missions was taken up, and addresses were delivered by Revds. I. E Bill, Senr., Dr. Hovey, Dr. Cramp, T. Harley, Dr. Sawyer, J. Davis, and D. W. Crandall, and Bro. W. F. Armstrong.

*Resolved.* That the thanks of this Convention be given to the brethren and triends in Yarmouth and vicinity for their hospitality and kindness in entertaining the members of the Convention during the present session.

*Resolved*, That a meeting of the Board of Governors of Acadia College be held at St. Stephens next year on the day preceding the opening of the Convention.

Minutes of this meeting read and approved.

Resolved, That we do now adjourn to meet at St. Stephen, N. B., at 10 o'clock, A. M., on the first Saturday after the 19th of August, 1872.

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### **REPORT ON INDEPENDENT MISSION.**

At the last meeting of the Convention the following resolution was passed :----

"Resolved, That a Committee be appointed by this Convention, to enquire into the feasibility of establishing an Independent Foreign Mission; to collect all needed information respecting a field of operations; and to ascertain whether an individual competent to lead such an enterprise is available; and to give their serious consideration to the que tion whether it can be right to withraw support from Missionaries, native or otherwise, already in the field, in order to commence such mission:—and also that the Committee be further instructed to take into special consideration the propriety of transferring the Foreign Mission Board to some more central location: to report on these propositions at the next Anniversary of the Convention."

It was further resolved, "That the Revds. J. M. Cramp, D. D., D. A. S eele, A. M., John Davis, A. M., W. S. Mackenzie, A. M., and I E. Bill constitute the Committee."

The resolution of the Convention spreads itself out into five branches, each of which requires seperate consideration.

I. THE FEASIBILITY OF ESTABLISHING AN INDEPENDENT FOREIGN MISSION.

This topic is d visible into two parts.

1. Is an Independent Mission desirable.

There are various ways in which the work of Missions may be carried on.

We may remit funds for the support of labourers in the foreign field, who may either be sent out by ourselves, or adopted by us from among brethren already employed, Americans or natives. The funds may be entrusted to the American Baptist Missionary Union, and expended by that society for the support of our Missionaries. The Missionaries will report their proceedings to the Missionary Union, while they may individually correspond with their friends in these Provinces, and thus communicate information from time to time, adapted to stimulate and encourage more liberal efforts.

This plan has been substantially adopted by our brethren, in Ontario. They find men and money, and the brethren of the Union find stations and management; for it is their's to control, allot, locate, and govern. The Missionaries are in fact their Missionaries, and have received their appointments from them.

This, oo, is our own plan with respect to brother George and his wife. At the Anniversary of the Covention in 1869 it was resolved: "That brother George be sent out as our Foreign Missionary,

under the auspices of the American Baptist Missionary Union, for the present." In order to carry out this arrangement, Brother George was appointed to the Burman Mission by the American Board.

A special advantage connected with this plan is its economy. Salaries and neccessary expenses only, in addition to outfit and pa-sage, have to be provided. Lands and buildings are furnished by the Union, and are its property.

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There is an anomalous state of things, however, in our existing arrangements, which will require to be rectified in some way, whether we establish an Independent Mission or not.

For several years past a number of Native Preachers have been supported by us in Burmah; some, by our general missionary fund, some by churches, some by individuals. Their labours are superintended by brother Crawley and other Missionaries, by whom they were selected for the purpose. Those Missionaries are thus provided with Assistants, without cost to the Union, while the Assistants themselves are neither under the control or direction of this Convention, nor of the Union, but are superintended by the Missionaries. on their own account, and are responsible to them.

The po-ition of sisters DeWolf and Norris is also peculiar. They were sent out by us and are sustained by our contributions; but whatever labour they perform is applied to the benefit of the missionary stations where they reside, and is at their own disposal. A fresh adjustment appears to be desirable. It may not be practicable to effect such an adjustment otherwise than by the establishment of an Independent Mission, by which the resources of these provinces may be concentrated upon one object, and employed under our own management. There is much to be said, it is true, in favour of the mode of operation preferred by our brethren of Ontario; but the current of feeling in these provinces, it is believed, runs strongly in favour of separate and independent action, and it may be safely taken for granted that the desirableness of such action is admitted on all hands.

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2. We now proceed to inquire, Whether we are able to support an Independent Mission.

It will not be wise to make provision for less than three families; two being intended for direct missionary work, and one for education. The expense of outfit and passage will be at least a thousand dollars for each family, and the annual expenditure for each family, including salary, travelling, and incidental charges will be from a thousand to twelve hundred dollars more.

In addition, mission premises must be bought, which will probably involve an outlay of two or three thousand dollars. This will have to be incurred within two or three years after the arrival of the Missionaries in the country. And the po-session of premises will necessitate an annual expenditure for repairs.

It follows, that the establishment of a Mission on a respectable and efficient scale will require, in the first place, the sum of three

thousand dollars for outfit and passage; the further sum of two thousand dollars, at least, for premises; and an annual income of three thousand dollars, or thereabouts. Part of the above outlay, however may be saved if any portion of the missionary staff can be engaged in Burmah.

The question then is, on what amount of funds we may safely reckon?

Last year, the sum of 4032 dollars was contributed by the Churches forming this Convention. But of this sum, 1663 dollars consisted of special contributions by churches or individuals for native preachers, leaving 2369 dollars to the credit of the general fund, and that sum, subject to the deduction of 635 dollars—the proceeds of legacies, which always form a precarious source of income. These deductions being made, the net balance remaining is, 1734 dollars, to meet an annual expenditure of at least three thousand.

The Committee observe, that in settling this question much will depend on the action that may be taken respecting the native preachers. If an Independent Mission be established, it will probably be concluded that our energies must be concentrated on that Mission; and as it is not likely that it will be located in the districts in which the native preachers who are now employed, reside, the continuance of their employment will have to be decided Should the churches or individuals, whose liberality sustains on. them be willing to transfer to the general fund, the sums which they have contributed for this object, the support of the Mission may be reckoned on without any reason for misgiving or fear; but if they should be unwilling to take that step, it will be necessary to appeal to the Churches for enlarged contributions, without which, under such circum tances, independent action will be impossible. If, therefore, it shall satisfactorily appear to this Convention that the sum of three thousand dollars can be annually raised for the support of an Independent Mission (expenditure for outfit and passage of Mis-ionaries, and for the purchase of premises, being separately provided for,) steps should be taken at once towards such establishment, by selecting the country or district, and commencing the collection of funds to meet the first demands. If, on the other hand, there should be reason to think that such separate action would be too burdensome, it may be wiser and safer for this Convention to assume the support of some Missionary Station, by special arrangement with the Missionary Union, remitting to the Treasurer of the Union, from time to time, the necessary funds, and corresponding. through the Secretary of our Missionary Board, with the Missionaries in charge of that Station. But, whether the decision shall be to establish an Independent Mission, or to undertake the support of a Station, it will be desirable that the money required shall be raised in due proportion by the Churches comprised in the Convention, and that no Province shall be responsible for a larger amount than shall be allotted to it. Assuming that three thousand dollars (or probably a larger sum)

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will be called for yearly, the Committee suggest that two-thirds of the amount shall be raised in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, conjointly, and one-third in New Brunswick.

Reviewing the whole case, the Committee record their deliberate judgment, that the establishment of an Independent Mission is feasible and practicable that the resources of our denomination in these Lower Provinces are abundantly adequate to its support; that the example of our Presbyterian brethren, who have for some years sustained a mission in the South Seas, should instruct and encourage us; and that if the Churches act in the spirit of Carey's worldrenowned motto—" Attempt great things for God, and expect great things from God"—they may look for blessing and success. Still, it must be borne in mind, that it is an enterprise which will require vigorous, and united, and persistent effort.

II. The Committee were directed to "COLLECT ALL NEEDED INFORMATION RESPECTING A FIELD OF OPERATIONS."

The attention of the Foreign Missionary Board having been particularly directed to the Sgau Karens, the Committee deemed it advisable to restrict their inquiries to that people, although, in their judgment, the Burman field of labour presents greater necessity, and ought not to be neglected on account of the comparative unproductiveness of the soil.

The Missionaries labouring in Burmah state, in an Address recently issued by them, that there is a large district, "South and West of Toungoo," thickly inhabited by Karens, in which there is no Missionary station. A settlement there would be advantageous in this respect, that our brethren would be within reach of the Missionaries of the Union, and would doubtless enjoy the benefit of their advice and co-operation. Siam adjoins Burmah on the East, and contains a numerous population of Karens. Should that country be fixed on as the scene of our missionary effort, there are various districts which would be eligible for the purpose. Dr. Dean says,--" A station might be established at Kanburee, three days West of Bangkok, or at Moung Ootar, six days North of Bangkok, each near the Karens. These towns are each places of trade, on the river banks, and of easy access. the former is two days East of Tavoy, and might be reached from that station. The latter is in the direction, and one-fourth of the distance to Chiang Mai, where our Presbyterian friends have started a mission among the Laos people. "Mr. Carpenter of Bassein thinks that there is" no better field for us "than the Karen field of Siam, and in addition to the places mentioned by Dr. Dean he suggests Raking, as a more central place than either, and "only a week's journey over the mountains East from Maulmain."

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III. The third point of enquiry is, "WHETHER AN INDIVIDUAL COMPETENT TO LEAD SUCH AN ENTERPRISE IS AVAILABLE?"

This question may be soon answered. We have no such individual.



In the early periods of Missions there was little or no choice of agents. God himself raised up men for the work to which he had called them, and the Churches were bound to accept and employ the instrumentality which was placed in their hands. The first Missionaries had to pioneer their way as they best could, without examples, without experience. learning wisdom by mistakes, and conquering success by failures. The history of fifty years and upwards is on record for our instruction. With that history before us, we are not likely to commit the blunder of entrusting a new mission to an untried man. The leader in such an enterprise must be as distinguished for wisdom as for force of character, and be well prepared to grapple with the difficulties which will be sure to spring up in a heathen and partially civilized country. It is confessed that we have not such a man among us. But he will not be wanted for some time to come. According to the united judgment of Missionaries now in the field, the Missionaries whom we may send should be directed to spend two or three years at Tavoy or Maulmain, in order to learn the language, and be initiated into the methods of operation which have been found best adapted to the state of society in that part of the world. From either of the places just named occasional excursions may be made into the Siamese territory, and thus the proposed field of labour (should Siam be selected for our Mission) may be surveyed beforehand. Then, when the time is come to enter the country, s me brother, it is hoped, will be found, whose qualifications fit him for leadership, and who may be placed at the head of the Mi-sionary band. It will be an additional advantage if the Karen Churches in Burmah should supply a number of preachers from among themselves, to join the party, as Mr. Carpenter encourages us to believe the Church at Bassien will be prepared to do, at its own expense.

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IV. The Committee are directed "TO GIVE THEIR SERIOUS CON-SIDERATION TO THE QUESTION, WHETHER IT CAN BE RIGHT TO WITHDRAW SUPPORT FROM MISSIONARIES, NATIVE OR OTHERWISE, ALREADY IN THE FIELD, IN ORDER TO COMMENCE SUCH MISSION."

The Committee are not aware that there is any "right" or "wrong" involved in this di-cussion, unless, in any case, a specific contract has been made, binding the parties to time and place, which contract, if made, must of course be fulfilled. But generally, all arrangements are terminable, depending for their continuance on the course of events, or the indications of providential leading.

The native preachers employed at the expense of the Board are partly connected with Burmese, partly with Karen churches. Brother George is connected with the Burmese Mission.

If it shall be decided to establish an Independent Mission among the Karens, either in the Toungoo district or in Siam, the Karen preachers now under employment, or some of them, may possibly accompany the Missionaries to the new Station, if they should be found suitable.

With regard to brother George and the Burmese preachers, it will

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be for the Convention to consider whether we are strong enough, as a denomination, to support an Independent Mission, and at the same time to continue to sustain those brethren. It may perhaps be deemed necessary to given or whole strength to our own Mission. If so, brother George is already in the service of the Union, and the department of labour in which he and the Burmese preachers are engaged is one with which we shall not propose to interfere. There can be no difficulty, therefore, in modifying the arrangements accordingly, unless the individuals or churches by whom the preachers are supported wish to continue their connection with them, in which case their funds may be remitted, through our Treasurer, to the Missionaries by whom the labours of those preachers are superintended. But it is important to observe, that there will be no need of any alteration, in either of the cases now referred to, for several years to come, as a large amount of preparatory work must be first performed. And if the churches shall rise to the level of Apostolic liberality-every man giving "as God hath prospered him"--- it may not be necessary to make any change whatever, but only to add the care of an Independent Mission to our other engagements, retaining the whole till such adjustments are made as may be agreeable to all concerned.

V. In the last place, the Committee are directed to "TAKE INTO SPECIAL CONSIDERATION THE PROPRIETY OF TRANSFERRING THE FOREIGN MISSION BOARD TO SOME MORE CENTRAL LOCATION."

The Committee have learned that the desirableness of a transfer of the Foreign Missionary Board to a more central location is very generally admitted. Connected withth is is the impression on the minds of many brethren that a more equal division of the management of our denominational efforts would be proper and fair, and tend to the fuller development of benevolent energy. The objects of this Convention are especially two, viz., Acadia College and Foreign Missions. Acadia College is necessarily managed in Nova Scotia. Would it not be a suitable arrangement, to transfer the Foreign Mission Board to New Brunswick, and to locate it at St. John? There are abundant materials in that city for the formation of a judicious and active Board, and the change, it is believed, would be beneficial to the interests of the Mission. The Committee recommend, therefore, that this change be made. If their recommendation should be adopted, they are prepared to submit to the Convention a plan for the construction of the Board, by which its members may be fairly drawn from the Associations comprised in this Convention.

Reviewing the whole, the Committee beg to submit the following observations :---

1. It is desirable that the question of an Independent Mission be decided at this meeting; and that if the decision be in the affirmative, the country or district be now chosen, in order that there may

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be a proper understanding betwen this Convention and the American Baptist Missionary Union, in regard to the location of the Mission.

2. As no change will be required at present, existing operations may continue to be carried on without interruption; but it may be advisable to take immediate steps towards raising a fund for the outfit and passage of Missionaries.

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3. It is earnestly recommended that the Missionaries sent out by this Convention receive the best culture, general and theological, which can be furnished, that they may be fully prepared, "by sound doctrine, both to exhort and convince the gainsayers."

4. In addition to ministerial education, strictly so called, the Committee suggest that the Missionaries sent by this Convention, or one of them at least, be thoroughly indoctrinated in sound modern science, and practically versed in scientific manipulations.

5. Although it cannot be doubted that the future Board will cherish the most cordial feelings towards the American Baptist Missionary Union, and the Missionaries employed by that Society, the Committee deem it befitting to place on record their special conviction of the necessity and advantages of such good fellowship, and of the duty of cultivating it to the utmost extent. Our American brethren have laboured in the field more than fifty years, and have acquired large experience. Their views and opinions must always be treated with deference, and the most respectful considera-

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tion given to their advice.

6. It is essential that systematic arrangements be made for the development of the resources of the denomination, and the regular diffusion of missionary intelligence: and that collecting agencies be everywhere instituted, and kept in continual employment. If we undertake an Independent Mission, we shall be engaged in a great work. Our plans should present such a happy combination of skill and vigour as to secure that measure of success which God is accustomed to grant to devout and faithful workers. Above all, we must be determined, by God's help, to persevere in unflinching labour, sustained by believing prayer. "Let not the brethren of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island" (the words of an esteemed Missionary are quoted)" leave an unfinished tower in the Karen jungle for the heathen to mock at, saying, "These men began to build, and where not able to finish!"

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# **REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.**

The safe and speedy conveyance of our beloved Sister Norris to the scene of her chosen life-work, has undoubtedly afforded sincere pleasure to her numerous friends, and to the friends of Foreign Missions in general. The favor of Providence in her arduous undertaking may well excite gratitude, and minister encouragement.

Your Board approve the course adopted by her, in accordance with the advice of valued and experienced Brethren in Burmah, to remain in Henthada for the present, and devote her time and attention to the acquisition of a thorough knowledge of the Sgau Karen language. By this means she will be better prepared, if life and health be graciously continued to her, for future usefulness. She is already able to read so as to be distinctly understood by the Karens, and to offer prayer publicly in their language.

It is highly pleasing to your Board to be able to report very favorably respecting our dear sister DeWolfe; who, with extraordina y fortitude and decision of character, went out at first as our only Missionary from these Provinces, and, by Divine assistance, overcame immense obstacles, under which a strong man might have been expected to succumb. Her zealous and faithful labors, at first on the passage to India, and subsequently in schools, and in the jungles, have evidently been highly serviceable.

It is delightful to find these worthy sisters, DeWolfe and Norris, as stated in their letters, going out together into the jungles to visit the Sgau Karen Churches and to instruct the members, especially the females, in the truths and duties of the Christian religion, and to teach poor blinded heathens the way of salvation by Jesus Christ. In this needful and beneficial labor of love the former must, of course, having learned the language, take the lead; but the latter could afford her material assistance, and be, at the same time, acquiring the requisite knowledge of Sgau Karen. The liberality, zeal, and energy evinced by our sisters in these Provinces, in the formation and enlargement of Woman's Missionary Aid Societies, auspiciously commenced by the indefatigable efforts of Sister Norris, are worthy of high commendation; and they afford much encouragement. It has been proposed in different quarters, that these Societies should support both our valued female Missionaries, who are laboring in conjunction. Undoubtedly this might be easily done, and the number of these highly useful laborers be subsequently increased. As this is highly desirable, it is ardently hoped that it may be carried into effect. The benefits resulting from the means thus employed, by the institution and christianizing of heathen females, will be morally certain to be of incalculable value. Those who would otherwise, as mothers imbue the minds of their offspring with "abominable idolatries," to their present and final ruin, will be thus led to transmit to posterity the blessings of Christianity, of infinite worth for time and eternity.

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The encouraging Report of the "Central Board" of Women's Mission Aid Societies for Nova Scotia may be appropriately introduced here.

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### REPORT ON WOMEN'S MISSION AID SOCIETIES FOR NOVA SCOTIA.

The Central Board of the Women's Mission Aid Societies for Nova Scotia, who have acted in this capacity at the request of the "Foreign Mission Board" during the past year, now beg leave to report as follows ;—

The Treasurer has received and forwarded to A. T. Baker, Esq., Treasurer of the Board, the sum of  $\$962,09\frac{1}{2}$  up to June 30th, there is also on hand for the present quarter \$152,11 including \$45,75 credited to Rev. Dr. Tupper, making a total of  $\$1114,20\frac{1}{2}$ up to the present date.

The Secretary has received communications from thirty one Societies during the past year; and all report progress, with unceasing interest in the cause for which they were organized.

In April last, the Central Board, through the columns of the " Christian Messenger," proposed to the Societies the feasibility and propriety of assuming Miss DeWolfe's support in addition to that of Miss Norris; and requested an expression of opinion on the subject from the Societies in Nova Scotia. Up to the present time, but a small proportion of the number have reported at all, but these (with two exceptions) are favorable to the suggestion, provided the funds in hand are sufficient for the purpose, and there be no present prospect of any other sister being sent out to the Mission field. A few of the Societies favour the idea of applying the surplus funds to the use of Schools under the care of Missionaries at present labouring in Burmah. In view of the rapid growth of similar Societies to our own among other Denominations, the Central Board would respectfully request the Ministers of the various churches to place the subject before the sisters in their several localities, so that those already engaged in the work may be encouraged, by learning that Societies are being formed where at present none exist.

8.—Ordained Pastor.....

These thirty native preachers and two Bible women, laboring diligently under the careful supervision of Missionaries able and ready to guide them, are undoubtedly diffusing much light in the dark regions of heathendom. Rev. D. A. W. Smith. speaking in terms of high commendation of several lately added to the list, says of one, Ng-yah. " He has been enduring hardness during the past six months in a new place, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. Away from his wife and family, with only the general promise that he would be looked after by his brethren to sustain him, he has plodded on, intent of winning souls. Nor have his labors been in vain. It was my privilege to assist recently in the examination and baptism of fourteen recent converts-all heads of families-the fruits of his and an associate's labors" Bro Smith justly speaks of the intelligence of money sent from these Provinces for the support of such zealous and successful laborers-" this timely aid"-as " most welcome news."



It is obviously proper that native converts should be trained to contribute for the support of their pastors. Indeed they seem generally disposed to do this to the full extent of their limited ability. But it is perfectly evident, that means are required to be furnished from Christian lands to enable poor men, constrained by the love of Christ, and ardent desire for the salvation of souls, to carry the gospel to the regions as also to aid feeble Churches in supporting pastors beyond, and publish it among the heathen ; the sincerity of numbers of these preachers has been cl arly evinced by their relinquishment of much more lucrative situations, in order that they might devote themselves to the work of winning souls to Christ.

Your Board, in giving on account of their stewardship, have, indeed, to regret that the success attending their labors has not been greater and more manifest than it has. They have, however, the consolations arising from approving conscience, that they have faithfully endeavored to adopt the best measures in their power for the furtherance of the Foreign Missionary cause; as also from the knowledge that their labor has not been in vain in the Lord.

Their prevalent view has been, as it still is, that in order to call forth more fully the energies of the Baptist Body in these Provinces, it is requisite to have a Foreign Mission of our own. But hinderances beyond their control have hitherto retarded the accomplishment of this desirable object. There have been Brethren who were willing to go forth as our Missionaries ; but some have not appeared to possess the requisite qualifications, and others, who were quite acceptable, have been prevented from going through the want of a suitable physical constitution. While your Board were thus without a Missionary to send from home, at the suggestion, and earnest solicitation, of Rev. A. R. R. Crawley, with the concurrence of the American Baptist Missionary Union, it was resolved, in 1857, and approved by the Convention, to employ and support native preachers in Burmah, whom the Union, for want of funds, could not employ and support. Brother Crawley expressed a readiness to superintend these preachers, with the aid of other Missionaries, in whose fields of labor they might be located. In addition to sums granted from the general Fund, numbers of these faithful and useful laborers have been subsequently supported hy Churches, Sabbath Schools, or Juvenile Societies, and individuals, separately or combined. Various instances have been reported in which the labors of these servants of Christ-commencing with three, and now numbering thirty, besides two Bible women-have been known to be attended with special blessings. Unquestionably an incalculable amount of good has been effected by the means thus employed. At the urgent request of Brother Crawley, and with the approval of the Convention, your Board established, and supported for a number of years, a Female School in Henthada. A considerable proportion of the pupils have professed faith in Christ, and exerted a salutory influence. Let one known instance suffice. The Baptist

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Sabbath School in Windsor-now supporting a native preacherprovided means for sustaining Ma O Za in the School. Early in life she gave decisive evidence of a gracious change, and was baptized. She subsequently became the wife of one of the native preachers-" a help-meet for him." Bro. Crawley gave the Secretary of your Board a very satisfactory account of her perseverance in piety and usefulness.

In a variety of ways, by the Divine blessing much good has evidently been effected.

Your Board, having no male Missionary sent from these Provinces in a foreign field and believing that the Union is not agreeable to our establishing a Mission in any part of Burmah, upon advisement, selected a portion of Siam as the site of a Mission. Two promising young Brethren, Messrs. William F. Armstrong and Rufus Sanford, who appear to have their hearts set upon the work, and to be well adapted to it, have been accepted by the Board; and they are again commended to the approval of the Convention.

In conclusion, your Board, aware of the deplorable condition of the perishing heathen, of the obligation to fulful the Divine command to preach the gospel to every creature, and of the encouragement afforded by the recent successes attending the means employed, affectionately recommend to all the putting forth of strenuous and persevering efforts for the universial diffusion of "the glorious gospel of the blessed God."

Brethren,—


My Report of this year, in some respects, is not so encouraging as that of the last year, owing to the receipts for the general Missions not being as great as during the year previous.

Yet it is a source of encouragement to know that the sisters who compose the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies have done as they generally do that part of Christian labour assigned them with earnestness, zeal, and christian fortitude, having largely increased our funds by their manifest determination to support our sister Norris now in the foreign field.

Over \$1700 has been contributed for that object during the year nearly all of which has been forwarded to me by the Treasurers of the Central Boards of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Considering the infant state of this department of christian labour how much have we to hope for in future.

The greater proportion of money given has been for the support



of native preachers and teachers, as last year, which has been forwarded forthwith to aid those who are devoting their lives to save their fellow-countrymen from a state of heathenism.

Brethren, while God has designed that through the foolishness of preaching men are to be saved, and men connot preach except they be sent, let us not relax our energies until men of God be stationed there who shall be as beacon-lights to conduct the poor degraded heathen to our desired haven.

There have been expended during the year \$4,760.57. Received from the general Mission during the year \$3,420.39. For Miss Norris \$1,738.10½. For Miss DeWolf  $$25.62\frac{1}{2}$ . To support and teach Karen Girls \$64.00. Total receipts dusing the year \$5,248.12. Balance in hand of Treasurer as reported last year \$1,319.96. together making \$6,558.08. Deducting \$4,760.58 expended, leaves a balance in hands of Treasurer of \$1,797.51.

### THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Theological class, continuing various exercises in the College proper, during the year now closing, have at the same time, made satisfactory progress, in the several studies of this department. Besides Exegesis, and the Greek Testament, under the President, and Ecclesiastical History under the Rev. Dr. Cramp, a Hebrew Class numbering eight members under the Principal, have reviewed a part of Genesis previously read, and have advanced as far as the sixth Chapter. They have also read seven Psalms, from the 1st inclusive, and have reviewed a considerable portion of them. These exercises, have been accompanied with careful parsing, and with

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recitations in the Hebrew grammar.

Rudimental instruction, has also from time to time been given, on the mental peculiarities of the Hebrews, as suggested by the text, and on the character of their Theological belief, and the Divine truths thereby revealed in the Old Testament.

# PRESIDENTS REPORT.

The following extracts, from the Report of the President of the College, to your Board in June last should be seriously considered by this Convention.

#### STATISTICS.

"The published list of students, who matriculated before 1869—has 271 names. Of these, 28 came from New Brunswick, and the same number from

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Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. From the Nova Scotia Associations, 243 had matriculated at that time. Of this number 40 had resided in Cornwallis, and 30 in Horton. If we deduct these numbers, (as the attendance from these townships is affected by local causes,) we have left on the list, 173 coming from other parts of the Nova Scotia Associations. 109 of this number came from the East of us, and 64 from the West. But the greater part of the Denomination and of its wealth, lies to the westward. If students had come from that section in proportion to its numbers, it would be represented by 150 names on the list, instead of 64. Why this disproportion in attendance, has existed I cannot explain. But it seems to indicate, that a sense of the importance of advanced education, has not pervaded the mass of our people as it ought. Something should be done, to change this condition of things if possible.

#### STUDIES.

It has been thought by some, that a wider sphere of elective studies, in the undergraduate Department, should be afforded. This might be done, if we had professors enough to work so many different Departments at the same time. We propose to modify the Honor Course, so as to allow students who are able to do extra work, to advance continuonsly in some special Department. This is all that at present it is possible to do we think reasonable persons should be satisfied with it.

Modern Languages. As no provision is made by the Board, for instruction in the Modern Languages, some of the students have been allowed to make arrangements with Mr. Frederic Crawley, for instruction in French, and he has met a French Class twice a week, through the year. The arrangement so far as I can judge, has given satisfaction. It probably would be well to encourage a continuance of the plan, as otherwise nothing would be done in that Department.

#### RENTS AND GROUNDS.

A suggestion was made by the Treasurer last year that one half the rents

should be reserved for repairs. It is very happeant that this suggestion be carried into effect. Repairs and changes are constantly needed, and it is very important that there should be some constant source of income, to meet this expense.

By means of a donation made to us, by Mr. Cummings of Truro, with some funds from other friends, a road was opened last summer, on the west side of the College premises. But all our funds and more, were spent on the road fences, and we have not been able to make other changes. The students have set out a large number of trees on the west line, and in a few years a decided improvement will make itself visible.

#### RELIGIOUS PROGRESS.

Within the year, the students have formed a Missionary Society, for the purpose of increasing their knowledge of various mission fields, and their interest in Mission work. The exercises of the Society have been sustained with considerable interest, and I have no doubt we shall see beneficial results from the organization.

The various classes have, for the last half year, met once a week for exercises in the Greek Testament. As attendance at these exercises is optional with the students, it was thought they would not compromise the Institution as unsectarian in its required course, and yet would allow opportunity for distinctively christian teaching.

During the last term, the people in this section have been specially interested in religious concerns. Meetings were held for several weeks nearly every night and it is believed that great good has been accomplished by these efforts. The students were allowed to attend these meetings, as constantly as they pleased. Several of them labored faithfully, and received much benefit. Some who had joined the church years ago, but had of late manifested indifference to such interests, returned and renewed their vows. A majority of the students were church members; of the others only one, so far as I know professed conversion. We feel that the college has been blessed in various ways, and perhaps we ought to made special mention of the fact, that in several instances, lurking unbelief was banished and the power of christian faith became more manifest." The able and comprehensive Report, from which the above extracts have been taken, contains also some references to financial matters, which your Board have taken into grave and serious consideration. Rev. James E. Balcom has been employed in the Agency during the past year. As his services were rendered gratuitously, and some other pressing matters called for his attention, only a portion of his time could be given to the work. The sum of \$4400 chiefly in pledges and available notes, has been added to the Endowment, and material assistance has been rendered in the collection of former pledges.

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The appeals to the Churches, though more successful than in previous years, have not been responded to in the spirit that might have been expected.

Your Board believe that the time has fully come to make a vigorous effort and place our College beyond the fluctuating probabilities of these yearly calls. To do this, we need the sum of at least seventy thousand dollars. Our sister Institutions in the neighboring Republic have set us noble examples in this behalf. Waterville (now Colby) University, Newton Theological Institution, Rochester University, and other Colleges, by the liberality of the Baptist Denomination, have been munificently endowed within the past few years. Your Board are convinced that the Baptists of these Lower Provinces are abundantly able to raise the required sum, and in this confidence would make the appeal.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Incorporation, the Convention will be called upon at its present session to elect six Governors, in place of the like number who retire, subject to re-election or otherwise as the case may be.

One of those, whose period of service thus expired, has been removed from us by death ;—Mayhew Beckwith, Esq., of Cornwallis, departed this life on the 7th day of April, 1871. A public-spirited man, a firm Baptist,

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he was deeply interested in the prosperity of the College. Generally in his place at the meetings of the Board, his shrewd business tact rendered valuable assistance to its deliberations. He was highly esteemed as a Christian and Church member, and his loss will not easily be replaced.

Thus one by one the veterans are falling. While we mourn their loss, we rejoice that the succession remains inviolate, and that while the work multiplies God multiplies the laborers also.

The statistics of last year were not correct, as the Minutes of the Nova Scotia Western Association had not been received. The membership of the Nova Scotia Churches should have been reported as 17.185, and the total membership as 27.905. The statistics of this year are complete, that is, if the records of the churches are correct.

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The baptisms reported in Nova Scotia this year average nearly five to each church:—in New Brunswick, three :—in Prince Edward Island, nearly three and a half :—general average, nearly four. The net increase is 411, being less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

The attention of your Committee has been called to the desirableness of embodying in one document the statistics of the denomination, as represented in this Convention. They beg to suggest that it be recommended to the Associations to forward to the Secretaries the Minutes of their proceedings, in MS. form, in order that arrangements may be made, if possible, at the next meeting, for the publication of a Baptist Manual for the Lower Provinces, at the joint expense of the Associations. esults :---

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Reviewing the history of the Denomination during the year, and contemplating its present state, the Committee beg leave to offer the following remarks :---

1. For any amount of success vouchsafed to our labors, we are bound to render thanks to the Lord, by whose power and blessing the word reaches the hearts of men. He grants us "times of refreshing," notwithstanding our dulness and sloth, which might righteously bring upon us prolonged withdrawment of divine influence. But our usefulness, as appears to your Committee, would be much greater, and much more continuously enjoyed, if we heartily believed God's promises, and expected Him to be faithful. When the Lord restored sight to the blind, and performed other wondrous works, the exercise of his power was conditioned on the faith of the applicant. "The Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save," but it may be that the Church does not enter into her possession, " because of unbelief."

2. God "giveth us all things richly to enjoy." He is always giving. His hand is continually open. He condescends also to receive our gifts. Can it be affirmed of us that we are in this respect "followers of God, as dear children?" Is the Church's bounty proportioned to her means? Are we doing and giving all that we are able to do and to give? Jesus is still sitting over against the treasury. Does he say, as the givers pass along, "They have done what they could?" Is not Christendom able to do vastly more than she has yet attempted? Is it not her slowness that keeps back the millenium?

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3. The giving requires to be more general. Too frequently the duty of this department of Christian effort is discharged by the few. It ought not to be so. No one should be deprived of the privilege. Every member of a church should be applied to for contributions, however small they may be. The widow's mite should not be neglected, nor should the child's offering be refused. These principles are operating fruitfully in many of our churches. When the operation becomes universal, Christianity will be strong and healthy.

4. The insufficiency of the supply of candidates for the ministry is still lamented. Very many churches are destitute of pastors. How is this to be accounted for? If any young men who are gifted for God's service prefer to enter into mercantile life, because the pecuniary prospects are better, they may find out their mistake even before "the Lord cometh and reckoneth with them." But are the churches wholly free from blame? Do they encourage those who appear to possess talents for usefulness? Do they help them in their endeavours to obtain education? Do they "pray the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth labourers into his harvest?" And are they prepared for the effort or the sacrifice which their prayers may involve?



5. A due consideration of the state of the world and of the state of the church will lead thoughtful christians to the conclusion that prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit was never more necessary. Let us all "pray without ceasing," and let us unite, as in former years, in observing one day, as churches, as a Day of Prayer for the highest and best blessing that God can bestow.



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## IN MEMORIAM.

#### REPORT OF THE OBITUARY COMMITTEE.

In reviewing the past year the Committee find that New Brunswick has suffered the loss of many valuable brethren in the ministry. The following statement respecting them is condensed chiefly from particulars that have already appeared in public print :—

The REV. JAMES WALLACE, of Coverdale, the oldest Baptist minister of the Eastern Association of New Brunswick, died last winter; his funeral took place on the 10th of March.

Bro. Wallace was set apart to the ministerial office in 1826, and laboured zealously for a considerable length of time; but in a later period of his life he retired from active labor in the gospel as a minister. This, he afterwards deeply regretted, and again resumed the work of the ministry, and laboured successfully in Hillsborough, Hopewell, Harvey, Butternut Ridge, New Canaan, Caledonia and Coverdale. In 1859, 140 converts were baptized by him in the churches of Butternut Ridge and New Canaan. Three of these converts have since become ordained ministers, and others are said to have the ministry in view. During many years of his life, Bro. Wallace occupied various public stations with credit.

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The REV. J. R. STRANG, died in May of this year, a native of P. E. Island, he was there converted and ordained. He afterwards spent some time in the United States, where he married and subsequently labored in the gospel in various places in New Brunswick, in all which he was highly esteemed, "as a devoted christian, an affectionate pastor, and a successful minister of the Lord Jesus." In his last field of labor, Upper Kingsclear, and Macnaquack, his ministry was signally blessed. The kind-hearted people of these places nobly resolved, when brother Strang was laid aside by sickness, that whether he lived or died, his family should be comfortably provided for. His early death has left a vacancy in the denomination which cannot be easily filled.

REV. WILLIAM PULSIFER, who also died during the current year, was born at Chester, N. S., in 1793, and "experienced and professed" religion when quite young. He was licensed to preach by the church at Cornwallis, and eventually moved to St. Martin's, N. B., where he frequently did the work of the ministry, laboring at other times at his trade, for the support of his family. He was publicly ordained at Upham, King's Co., N. B., and afterwards preached extensively both in New Brunswick and Maine, with great devotedness and zeal.

During 10 years or more he resided in Albert County, N. B., in feeble health, the people administering to his wants and those of his family, as faithfully as to those of their own pastor. His last illness was lingering, and his sufferings often very great, but the gospel abundantly supported him. "He fell" at last, "but felt no fear." He was the instrument of leading many to Christ.

REV. A. D. THOMPSON SO extensively and favorably known in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, "fell asleep in Jesus," Sept. 10th, 1870. He was "born again," while residing at St. Andrew's, when about 25 years of age. He was at this time engaged in teaching a successful school, and was instrumental in the conversion of several of his pupils. The late Rev. Thomas Ansley, baptized Bro. Thompsen during a remarkable work of Grace in Charlotte Co. Ordination he afterwards received at the hands of Rev. T. H. Harding, assisted by several other ministers. He then itinerated largely in Maine, and many sections of these provinces, and was eminently successful in the conversion of souls. Some five hundred persons were, at different times, baptized by him. His ministry partook largely of the missionary spirit, and he was never more in his element than when engaged in pleading for Home and Foreign Missions. He was a friend to Education, and some of the latter years of his life were mainly devoted to the collection of funds for Acadia College, and for the Seminary at Fredericton. Of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, he was a member for many years and until the time of his death.

Brother Thompson's last sermon was preached in the spring of 1868. His closing illness was protracted and severe, but he was blessedly sustained by the promises of the gospel. This lamented minister "ranked among those whom we term the Fathers. He partook largely of their spirit;" "his sermons, exhortations, and prayers are remembered by thousands."

The REV. THOMAS LOCKEY has also been removed from among us. He was a native of Gloucester, England, and was brought up in the English Church, but when brought to feel sensibly the influence of redeeming grace, prayerfully investigated the Word of God for guidance, and obtained a deep conviction that it was his duty to be baptized and join a Baptist Church, which conviction he accordingly obeyed. Having emigrated to this country, he became a member of Germain St. Church in St. John. The church shewed their appreciation of his christian usefulness by electing him one of their deacons. Subsequently he was called to the ministry of the Word, and for about fifteen years he rendered valuable service in gospel labor. He performed successfully the duties of the pastorate at New Jerusalem, Chipman, Scotch Town and Cambridge. "The great passion of his soul was to lead sinners to Christ." Nearly fourscore years passed over him in this world of conflict ere he departed to be with Christ.

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n feeble nily, as ngering, ied him. leading In Nova Scotia, though the year's record bears no notice of the death of any of our ministers, the committee deem it their duty not to close this Report without reference to the loss sustained this year by the death of Mayhew Beckwith, Esq., of Cornwallis. He was for many years a member of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and rarely out his place at their business meetings, where he always shewed a warm interest in the proceedings, and was especially faithful in counselling economy in the use of the funds. Bro. Beckwith was also very constant in attendance on his duties as a church member in the first Cornwallis Church to which he had belonged for many years. He likewise had held various public offices with credit, and was highly respected in the church and in social life. The Church and community where he lived as well as many in other places deeply regret his departure.
