Ottawa, Aug. 5—Louis Simpson, inventor and promoter, of Ottawa, has submitted to the government a scheme which he believes will solve the gasoline problem.

He asks encouragement for the development of oil bearing shales in New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, Alberta and in parts of British Columbia. From these deposits he believes cheap motor fuel may easily result, while their exploitation would give employment to large numbers of returned soldiers and others. The increasing demand for gasoline and the resultant high prices will cause the proposition to be looked into the government.

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




