**NEWS PUBLISHERS  
FACE PAPER FAMINE**

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 9.—As a result of a series of meetings of the newspaper publishers of Philadelphia, called to consider the serious situation confronting them caused by what are practically famine conditions in the news print paper market, the following agreement was unanimously reached:

All morning, evening and Sunday newspapers will immediately reduce the size of their issues to the extent of a total in excess of 80 pages weekly.

That, beginning September 1 next, the accepting from wholesale purchasers of unsold copies of all morning, evening and Sunday newspapers will be discontinued. Heretofore this privilege has been granted to newsboys, news agents, newsstands and carriers.

**Gasoline From N. B. Shales In-ventor's Idea**

Ottawa, Aug. 5.—Louis Simpson, inventor and promoter, of Ottawa, has submitted to the government a scheme which he believes will solve the gasoline problem.

He asks encouragement for the development of oil bearing shales in New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, Alberta and in parts of British Columbia. From these deposits he believes cheap motor fuel may easily result, while their exploitation would give employment to large numbers of returned soldiers and others. The increasing demand for gasoline and the resultant high prices will cause the proposition to be looked into by the government.

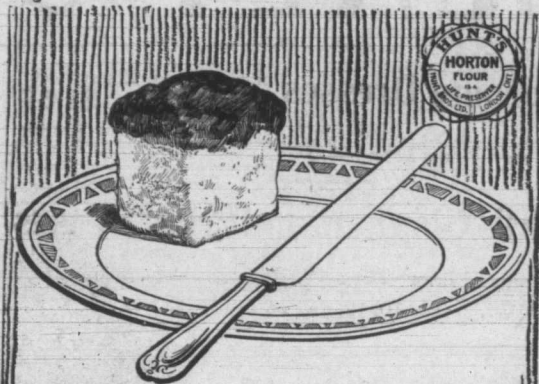

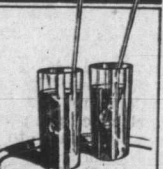

CANADA is a land of trails. Trails over mountains and hills, across prairies and through forests, by the banks of rivers beyond number and across country toward a distant sky line. Trails made by red men, by white men, and by nature.

But the mountain trails are the most alluring of them all, and hitting trails is the rarest of sport in Rockies or Selkirk, all the way from the Kananaskis Pass on the east to the Yale gateway on the west.

The trail traveller feels the charm of the trail as soon as it is hit. It keeps you guessing where it is a hit-or-miss highway, where you require the keenness of an Indian to tell the way by the slightest of signs—a few twigs broken here, the mould of a horse's foot there, a blazed tree yonder, and then there will be a skip

of a few yards that will throw you off the scent, if you don't look out. Sometimes the trail is the way of a mountain stream, but just where you should emerge on the other side is a mystery unless you are in charge of guide or outfitter. A beg, too, will play tricks on you, for it carries few traces of other trail-ers.

Hundreds of miles of excellent trails have been made in the Canadian mountain ranges by the Canadian Pacific Railway and the National Parks department of the Canadian Government. Most of them are made for pony use, and mounted on one of these sure-footed little beasts of the west, you can be an explorer of the wilds and revel in the experience. Every mile of the devious way is a way of varying charm, every turn of the trail reveals new wonders. Many trail trips are now made in

trails, bordering a charming lake or two, the nose of the Vice-President glacier, Summit Lake and then the steep down-hill bit to Emerald Lake and the tree-bordered avenue that will bring you back to Field. Shelter huts or tents make it possible to spend some days on this marvellous trail way, amid alpine region of surpassing beauty.

Lake Louise will also provide delectable trail paths, especially that leading to Paradise Valley and its circle of giant summits, and Sentinel Pass, leading to the valley of the Ten Peaks, while in the Rocky Mountains Park and Banff, the routes are multiplying year by year.

Yes, trail hitting is rare sport, I repeat, and no country in the world affords greater facilities for its enjoyment than our own Canadian mountains.

There is the one from Glacier caves and back by a loop route and over a pass that brings to view some of the sublimest scenery in the Selkirk. The literal ups and downs of this unique scenic route, as the railways would say, add to the interest, now in the best of the valley, closed in by trees and huge plants like the Devil's Club, now climbing a thousand feet from which superb views are had of the Kingly peaks like Sir Donald.

The trail traveller will find another region of infinite variety and attractiveness in the series of trails radiating from Field and leading up the Yale Valley to the Yoho Glacier field at its upper end. One may go northward by the valley route, passing the Takkakaw, the Twin and the Laughing Falls, and return by the upper

**Canadians Away From Ypres Salient**

Have Been Transferred to the Somme District—The Fourth Division Has Gone Over to France

Ottawa, August 15—The Canadian troops have been withdrawn from the Ypres salient after occupying the position for upwards of a year. The salient has not been abandoned, but other British troops have been assigned to the defence of it, while the Canadians have been sent to the Somme district to assist in the general defence there. Canada has now four divisions at the front, the fourth division which for several months has been under going training in England has now gone over to France.

These announcements were conveyed in a cable this morning to the militia department from the minister of militia.

It is fully anticipated that the Canadians will now take part, with British and Australian troops, in the big British offensive in the Somme district. The fourth division is commanded by General David Watson, of Quebec.

**The French Capture 2000 Prisoners From Huns**

Paris, August 14. More than two thousand unarmoured prisoners, and seventy machine guns were captured by the French in their operations north of the Somme from Aug. 6 to Aug. 13, according to a weekly review issued by the war office. The number of prisoners was increased by six hundred who were taken in the Verdun sector.

"We were off New Orleans on Tuesday, the 8th," said the orderly, "when we were wirelessed that the Deutschland had been sent to the bottom by a British patrol ship. The submarine at the time was steaming along on the surface and was preparing to submerge when caught by the British cruiser."

**British Torpedo Boat Sunk off Holland**

London, August 14—The British torpedo boat destroyer Lasso sank Sunday off the Dutch coast, having struck a mine or been torpedoed, according to an official statement issued this afternoon. Six of the crew of the destroyer are missing. Two men on board were injured.
