None, although several have shown talents of high rank, equals in a peculiar combination of gifts and experiences the remarkable man who, from the lowly state of the slave, lived through the long period of agitation and emancipation, and in spite of hardships and opposition reached the unusual age of 78 with perfect faculties, in the enjoyment of a splendid fame. He died seemingly in excellent health not many miles distant from the county on the eastern shore of Maryland, where he was born a slave in February, 1817. 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BELL'S PHOTOPHONE. HOW TELEPHONING MAY BE DONE WITHOUT A WIRE.

A New Wrinkle in Material Science The is Very Much in the Line of the Occult-How the Feat is Performed Over a Ray

of Light. In the last few years, in connection with Mr. Preceo's experiments in Eng-land and otherwise, we have heard a good deal about telegraphing without wires. It has also been found practicable to tele-phone without wires. In the former oper-ation, induction is the means employed; in the latter, apparatus invented by Prof. Bell, the author of the telephone, and calledfthe "photophone." Nelson W. Perry describes it in a recent number of Elec-tricity. Light emanating from any source. L is passed through a lens, A, in ordier to render its rays parallel, before they fall upon the mirror, B, whence they are reflected to a parabolic mirror, D, in whose focus is placed a piece of selen-tur, E, The selenlum forms part of the circuit of the telephone, T, operated by a battery, F. of Light.



BELL'S PROTOPHONE. sheet of glass or mica, silvered on its face, and mounted so as to vibrate like a tele-phone diaphragm when a person speaks into the mouthpiece, C, behind it. Now, when the tones of the voice cause the diaphragm to bulge forward, the rays re-flected toward D will diverge slightly in-stead of being parallel, and less light will be concentrated upon E; but when, at the other stage of any vibrations, the plate is rendered concave, the rays will con-verge, and more light will be thrown up-on the selenium. As the electrical con-ductivity of this remarkable substance varies in proportion to the amount of light to which it is subjected, the intensity of the telephone current will be modified thereby, and the telephone itself will dis-tinctly reproduce the vords uttered in the monthpiece C. It is not stated at how great a distance this apparatus will work; but it will be seen that therein a beam of light takes the place of the ordinary metallic connections between the two in-struments. 



Douglass was undoubtedly a great factor in hastening the progress of public opinion in the United States toward emancipation. Mastering the English language until he Mastering the English language drive he possessed an almost phenomenal elo-quence, in which the impetuosity of one strain of descent commingled with the lock of the other, few orators of the age surpassed him in persuasive power over a roomlar audiance.

surpassed him in persuasive power over a popular audience. He probably more resembled O'Connell in scope than any other harranguer of the century, except that he had none of the great Celt's humor. Douglas was bitter where O'Connell was jocular. The de-pressed social state of the race to which the Celt belonged never affected its con-stitutional gayery, which enabled its vic-tims to smile at their miseries where they could find no other alleviation for them. Douglass was deficient in this resource as an orator, although he was a good story teller off the platform.

teller off the platform. Douglass' appearance on the rostrum before the emancipation question was set-tled in the federal haw was always the most significant incident of an evening. Black enough to proclaim his mother's classification, he possessed the strong -body, the well-poised head, the domina-tion self-control, that command attention

classification, he possessed the strong body, the well-poised head, the domina ting self-control that command attention, and his torrent of invective, his over-whelming story of personal damagers, of bloodhounds, sale of women and children, barter of womahood to bestiality among masters, enforced degradation of even house servants who happened to be black, together with an alternative talent of en-treaty and inspiration, made him easily one of the foremost personages in the movement he powerfully led. Grateful as were his own people to Douglass for his services in their behalf, they never forgave his second marriage. His first wife, mother of his children, was one of his race, a free woman. His second he sought among the whites, an offense which the present public opinion among Afro-Americans resents as an imputation on the black, a disloyalty to its hopes and an aspersion on its character. His great ambition was the unification of the Central American republics into a powerful confederation, with himself as stator. In the pursuit of this scheme he sulted the thin-skinned government officials of Salvador, thereby precipitating a war which ended in his death. His young and immensely wealthy widow, went to New York after the dictator's fall, and

New York after the dictator's fall, and nas ever since been one of the society lead-ers of that city. It has been said that Ruf-ino Barrios was killed by officers of his own army at the battle of Cachuhalta in 1885, but this charge has never been prov-en. It is an indisputable fact, however, that while acting as president and dicta-tor he sent millions of dollars out of Gua-temala. His trusted lieutenants knew that their chief was feathering his own nest at the expense of the people he prenest at the expense of the people he pre-tended to love; but instead of calling him to account followed his example. After the battle of Cachuhualta the Guatemalan

cretary of the interior went directly to the capital and stole \$600,000, the entire cash balance left in the national treasury. Ever since the country has been in finan-cial difficulties,

It is possible, therefore, that young Bar-rios was in earnest when he defied Mexico. A war might have won for him the sup-A war hight have won for him the sup-port of the tax-paying population of Gua-temala, and thus insured his continuation in office. Being an able diplomat he might also have succeeded in inducing the other Central American republics to espouse his cause. Such an alliance would have made theather would an alliance would have made

cause. Such an alliance would have made the threatened war a more equal struggle, although even then Mexico would have had the advantage of numbers. The republic of Guatemala is divided into twenty-two departments, has an area of 46,800 square miles, and, in 1890, had a population of 1,460,007, including Indians and half-breeds. The capital is Santiago de Guatemala, sometimes called New Gua-tenala, a city-founded in 1775, two years after the destruction of Old Guatemala by
