









TERRIBLE TRAGEDY.

A Gaoler Killed and a Turnkey Badly Wounded by Escaping Prisoners.

A Desperate Bed on Sunday Morning—Sandwich Goal the Scene—Two Thieves the Guilty Parties—One of Them Arrested—A Fleeing Turnkey.

DETROIT, March 16.—The towns of Sandwiche and Windsor opposite here in Canada, were thrown into the wildest excitement by the news that on the 15th of the most terrible tragedies that have ever happened in that neighborhood. About a month ago Wm. Callaghan and Matthew Kennedy, two crooks from Detroit, broke into the postoffice at Harrow, Ont., and were caught. They have since been confined in Sandwiche goal awaiting trial.

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sounded a warning. At the same time under the stairway was a heavy bottle in which oil was kept. Seizing this, Kennedy dealt Davis

A MURDEROUS BLOW over the head, stretching him unconscious upon the floor. The two prisoners then unlocked the door of the corridor leading to the main hallway, a short flight of stairs intervening. The noise made in the desperate struggle below had aroused the attention of a crazy woman in the flat above, and she, stepping to the speaking tube, notified Mrs. Palmer, matron of the jail, that there was a row going on in the basement.

A HORSE AND BUGGY from the Catholic Church. Several farmers' conveyances were pressed into service, and houses in the neighborhood were ransacked for firearms. In fifteen minutes the roads leading to Windsor, in which direction the murderers had fled, were swarming with armed men. The pursuit became hot. The men fled towards Windsor on the inland road. E. S. Nesbitt (a young man who had assisted about the jail), on horseback galloped over the river road and reached Windsor before them and notified Chief Barnes and other officers and men stationed at the ferry slips to stop the fugitives should they attempt to cross, while large numbers scoured the surrounding country without avail.

THE ARREST OF KENNEDY, About ten o'clock a well-dressed, smooth faced and innocent appearing gentleman boarded the ferry at Walkerville. As he was closely scanned he appeared a trifle uneasy. His description answering that of Kennedy, Capt. Shanks delayed the boat, leaving a trip. Nesbitt, who had been out with an exploring party, heard of Kennedy being held for identification, and hastened to the boat at once and recognized Kennedy, who made no resistance. He was immediately arrested and taken to Windsor lock-up. When it became known about the wharf that one of Leech's murderers had been arrested there was a rush to see him. A crowd gathered about and became wild with excitement.

CRISIS OF "LYNCH HIM!" "Lynch him!" was heard on every side, and for a time it was a question whether another tragedy would be enacted. But excitement died away. Kennedy was cool and dignified when first arrested, and refused to have anything to say, but when the crowd gathered about and threats of lynching him became general, he shook like an aspen leaf and clung to the officers for protection. At the lockup he became more calm. Kennedy claims Callaghan was severely wounded during the shooting in the jail, that when they escaped to the Catholic Church he was too weak to walk further. He asserts Callaghan was so badly injured that he would die from his wounds if not captured; but the officers take no stock in what he says, as they believe he is trying to shape matters in such a way as to give him accomplice time to escape. A BOLT HAD BEEN CUT IN THE WINDOW with a diamond, and it is concluded a confederate scaled the prison walls Saturday night, or early Sunday morning, and placed a revolver on the inside sill of the window through the aperture. It is said several suspicious characters have been seen hanging about Sandwiche Jail several days past. The other prisoners in the jail did not seek to escape. Davis was out of his head at last accounts, but the doctor think he will eventually recover. Sheriff Iler has offered a reward of \$500 for the capture of Callaghan, and volunteer patrolmen have been placed on guard along the river, to see he does not escape to the other side.

DAVIS' FISTOL. The pistol which assistant-turnkey Davis tried to use in his struggle with Callaghan and could not make so off in the hand of the police, who were experimenting with it this morning. It was found rusty and in bad working order. After some time being devoted industriously in attempting to discharge it, they gave it up, not a single cartridge having been exploded. Had this pistol been in good working order, it is probable the result would have ended differently, and fatally to Callaghan. The inquest upon the murdered Sandwiche jailer, Leech, began in the court house at Sandwiche at two o'clock this afternoon before Coroner Lambert. Justice Bayly was present, also Crown Attorney Macdonnell, and Kennedy. The latter was permitted to ask such questions as he desired. The question asked by him of each witness was as to whether they had seen him strike either Leech or Davis. To this there could be but one reply, as no one present saw the affair. The inquest will likely continue several days.

No reliable clue has been found to Callaghan's whereabouts. Several Detroit officers are working with the Windsor police. One rumor, which comes from a source that might be expected to be authoritative, is that Callaghan crossed to Detroit under the very noses of the officers, disguised as a woman. His small figure and feminine cast of features would make such an attempt possible.
