Only I don't think it ought to have to be a legal method.

It seems to me that the men of this country ought to have sense enough to know that nothing will train their wives to the best economy, the wisest spending and saving, as much as having a fixed income with fixed purposes.

Even if the husband who gives his wife money at odd times when he happens to feel like it does, on the whole, give more generously than the man who allows her regularly a fixed portion of his salary, he isn't treating her as kindly or as wisely as the other man.

For, as everyone who has ever lived on an irregular income knows, it is much harder to live within \$1,500 when it comes in unexpected lumps and at odd times than within \$1,000 a year paid regularly.

Of course, some women are foolish about money—just like some men—and not fit to be trusted with anything more than a car fare—just like some men—but it seems to me that the average wife and the average income cannot do better than to give her a fixed proportion of his salary ever week on which to run the house.

It stands to reason that no man with any absorbing business interests can possibly have the energy or time to make the running of his home a second business.

That's properly his wife's affair. And the wise man turns it over to her completely.

He not only expects her to do the planning and buying, but also the paying.

He doesn't say, "Make the bills as small as you can," and groan or rage and get into debt, when she, with the meagre knowledge of money which most women who never handle it naturally have, lets them get too large.

Instead he gives her each week a sum of money which he and she have agreed is the right proportion of his salary, to go for home expenses, and expects her to keep within it.

And when a wife knows that her husband has trust and confidence in her to that extent, I've noticed that she usually manages to deserve it.

And then, too, it is very much easier to be economical with actual money in your bureau drawer—money that you see growing painfully less with each purchase, than with charge accounts, no matter how much you dread your husband's wrath if you make them too large.

And again, the possession by the wife of a fixed sum of actual money makes it possible for her to make cash purchases, and as every housekeeper knows, that means Economy with a large E.

And then there's the plain justice of it.

If two men were partners in a business concern and one happened to be the receiver of the money, he wouldn't feel at liberty because of that fact to say to his partner, "I'll pay all the firm bills and when you want any money for yourself, come to me, and if I think best I'll give it to you, but I certainly shan't give you any fixed sum."

No partner would stand for that for a moment.

And isn't a wife who runs a man's home and, as the majority of middle-class women do, acts as general housework girl, nurserymaid, seamstress, housekeeper and homemaker rolled into one— isn't she doing her share in their partnership in the business of living, and ought she not to be treated as well as a partner in any other business?

Why not, please?

10,000 Fish Caught in a Dock.

A great catch of grey mullet was made in the Great Western Railway Company's docks at Millbay, Plymouth on March 21st.

When the officials discovered the shoal it was decided to offer the prospective catch at the local fish market, and a transaction was soon completed with one of the merchants.

The next step was to empty the dock, and after four hours of steady pumping this was done. The fish were caught in nets, placed in baskets, and taken to the fish quay, where they were packed for despatch to the French markets.

The haul weighed four and a half tons, representing some 10,000 fish, averaging about a pound each.

Off Chibura and Ibaragi prefectures the wave wrecked the greatest havoc and at least 84 vessels are reported missing from Choshi.

Official Confirmation.

We notice that the Postmaster General in his annual report makes reference to the landing of the Commercial Company's cables at Cuckhold's Cove. He reports:—

"Hitherto the long and dangerous land route to our cable connection at Port aux Basques and the risk of the cable being fouled by ships' anchors in the Straits or at Port aux Basques were a constant menace to our service. The landing of the Commercial cable at Cuckhold's Cove, which is connected by a land line with our head office (about two miles) ensures continuous operation of our cable connection."

This is an official confirmation of the remarks we have made in the past in endorsing the action of the administration of Sir Robert Bond in inducing the Commercial Cable Company to come to Newfoundland with some of their trans-Atlantic cables. The Postmaster's General's report is dated February 1st, 1910.

3 Balloonists Lost Their Lives in Baltic Sea.

STETTIN, Germany, April 3.—The German balloon Pommeru, which made an ascent here this afternoon, met with a series of accidents which ended in a disaster under most tragic circumstances in the Baltic Sea. Three men lost their lives, including the radical member of the Reichstag, Hugo Del Bes Del Brueok, Herr Del Bueock and another member of the party were drowned, a third occupant of the car was picked up and died, while the fourth was rescued in a serious condition. The Pommeru, carrying Del Brueok, who was acting as pilot, a banker Herr Semmelhardt, an architect, Herr Benduhn, and a man named Hein, ascended early in the afternoon at the gas works.

A Chapter of Accidents.
The wind at the time was blowing a hurricane. A chapter of accidents began immediately. The balloon collided with telegraph wires, almost overturning the basket. It then dashed into the roof of a neighbouring factory, destroying the smokestack. With the basket swaying wildly and half of its ropes gone the balloon soared to a greater altitude and disappeared in the clouds at a terrific speed. The crowds of onlookers, including a detachment of military which had assisted in the ascent, ran along the roads, expecting the basket to break away. The balloon, however, was not seen again until it reached Swine Mindle, 66 miles northwest of Stetty, over which it passed at a height of 6,000 feet, in the direction of the sea.

Rescue Work Difficult.
Tugs followed in its track, and one of them, which had outdistanced the others, was almost directly under it when suddenly the balloon fell into the sea. The tug steamed to the spot quickly, but the rescue work was difficult. Hein died soon after being taken on the tug, and De Brueok's body was washed ashore this evening. The Pommeru, with the aeronaut Oscar Erblosh in command, won the international race at St. Louis in 1907.

\$600 for Business Desk

Keen Bidding for a Unique Relic.
The old mahogany bureau desk used by Robert Burns at Ellisland and Dumfries and at which the poet wrote "Tam o' Shanter," "Auld Lang Syne," and many of his other famous lyrics, realised £600 at Messrs. Sotheby's rooms yesterday.

Of unimpeachable pedigree, this relic aroused keen interest, the bidding opening with an offer of fifty guineas. From £100 the bidding was almost exclusively confined, to Mr. Quaritch and the auctioneer's clerk, who apparently had a private commission, but at £200 Mr. Quaritch was left victor, having secured at by no means an exorbitant figure one of the most intimate mementoes of the great poet in existence.

The desks of other famous writers attained far more modest figures, however. One used by Dickens at Tavistock House went for no more than £13; a four-legged stool used by the same writer made ten guineas; while Daniel O'Connell's black oak writing desk made only one guinea.

The Recital — An Appreciation.

I should like to express an appreciation of the recital held in the St. John's Church last evening. This is, therefore, not a criticism in the strict sense of that term. First, an appreciation of the magnificent organ so full and yet mellow in its tones, and which must be a source of pleasure and inspiration to the congregation worshipping at that church, as well as of satisfaction to the generous donor. Each time I attend the church new beauties of tone in this instrument are revealed. Next, the choir, who appear to me to be a splendid body of good voices, well balanced and musical, singing in good tune and well interpreting the words set to the music. They appear to enter into the spirit of what they sing, and last night gave very sympathetic renditions of the three anthems on the programme. The first anthem, called "A Meditation" appealed strongly to me, though it would not perhaps be so popular as the last anthem. The setting of the words, however, varied with light and shade, required very careful treatment in the rendition, which was very excellently given. The last anthem was also well sung, the choir entering fully into the glad spirit of Easter, and making the church resound with Alleluia. The soloists in this anthem deserve more than passing notice. Miss Vincent, in a sweet, true, pure voice took the Soprano solo, which, I should imagine, a difficult part. She sang it with expression and a clearness of enunciation that was enjoyed by all, and her reputation as a singer was certainly enhanced by her work last evening. Miss Herder was the contralto soloist, and I never heard her to better advantage. The words she had to sing described the sufferings of our Lord, and the feeling and expression of Miss Herder in the rendition of this music made it very impressive. A little further on in the anthem she had another solo in which the choir accompanied her, singing softly; and taking it altogether this was perhaps to me the most pleasing part of the whole anthem. Miss Herder's full sympathetic voice lends itself to music of this character, and her renditions last night were perfect. Dr. Macpherson was the soloist, and he sang most effectively Grenier's "Hosannah." The doctor has a full, deep voice, and last evening entered fully into the spirit of the music. This made a most pleasing number in the programme. Of the organist it is not necessary to say anything, for his abilities are well-known. There were two points which I particularly noticed, first, the annotations regarding the organ solos. These greatly helped the congregation to appreciate what was played, and were not so technical as to be beyond their appreciation. Second, the pieces were varied in character. We had the massive and dignified "War March" by Mendelssohn, the melodious "Salute of Love" by Elgar, the sympathetic "Idyll" by Richards, (I much liked this), and the brilliant and varied "Offertoire" by Batiste. These compositions certainly displayed the capabilities of the organ, and at the same time appealed to the varied dispositions of the auditors. Lastly, an appreciation of the congregation. I was glad to see a large number present, and also delighted that all classes seemed to be represented. The poorest and the richest alike seemed to enjoy the recital, and I for one am glad that such a splendid gift is used so generously for the benefit of those who love good music.—Com.

Yesterday morning His Excellency accompanied by Miss Dean, Mr. Fitzherbert, Private Secretary, and Lieut. Gale, A.D.C., paid a visit to Littledale.

The Vice-Royal party was met by His Grace Archbishop Howley, Rev. Dean Born, Rev. Fr. Power, of the West Coast, and the Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan.

After the interior beauties of Littledale had been seen, the bright and clever pupils of the Academy attached to Littledale provided His Excellency and the distinguished visitors with a rare, beautiful and finished exhibition of graceful acting, accompanied by very high class singing and magnificent elocution, in the rendering of the operetta, "St. Elizabeth's Roses."

Certainly the young ladies reflected the highest credit on the Academy and the training—painstaking and thorough—given them by the Sisters.

For one so young—she is but fifteen years old—Miss Jackson sings magnificently, and apparently without effort she uses her full, rich voice to the very best advantage. Miss Morris, as Prince Ludwig, Miss O'Donnell, as Queen of the Roses, and Miss Mansfield also performed in a finished manner, and indeed quite above the average amateur; whilst all who took part gave an excellent account of themselves and looked very neat and pretty in their snow-white dresses.

At the conclusion of the operetta, His Excellency paid a graceful and high compliment to the young ladies, also to Mr. Hutton and the good Sisters of the Academy. In the course of his remarks he alluded to the many entertainments he had had the pleasure to be present at in different convent schools and academies in many parts of the world, and spoke at some length upon the excellent teaching and training given by the superiors of convents; a training that fitted their young charges thoroughly to take their places in life as respectable members of society, and loyal subjects of the Empire. Sentiments such as these, and expressed by an able and experienced gentleman, such as His Excellency, are very convincing, and certainly furnish a cogent proof that education—such as is to be obtained in all convent schools, and, indeed, in all schools of a similar nature—is not only complete when it takes in not only secular subjects, but also spiritual or religious training. Assuredly it is gratifying in these days and in this age wherein there would appear to be rising up on all sides advocates of Godless education, to find such utterances or sentiments being expressed by persons of culture, of character, of experience and of very high standing. Certainly the compliments paid so gracefully, so eloquently and so beautifully by His Excellency are very gratifying; and the Superiors at Littledale ought indeed to feel justly proud. They do not spare themselves, and as they receive no material remuneration, it cannot be said of them or of any convent that gain is their object. Not their object is a much nobler and higher one—the perfect training of those given to their care as well in the great and sublime truths of religion as in the various branches of secular education that will enable them to step forth into the world equipped with a training, morally, intellectually and physically that will carry them successfully over all obstacles and temptations—a training without which nothing but disaster to the individual, to the community and to the nation can result.

And the Outharborman

We hear a lot of talk and read a great deal in some of the papers about the hardships inflicted on the outharborman, but when you take a good square look at things you find that these trials and hardships are greatly overdrawn. It isn't square to be all ways preaching this doctrine, for it makes the outharborman think that every one in St. John's is trying to fleece him. In election times it is a first rate cry to start this appeal to the outharborman, for it may have the effect of inducing them to work a vote for your side; but to keep it up day after day is to offer an insult to their intelligence. Outharborman men are like every other men, and they know when people are trying to "oil them down." It is a nonsensical practice and not likely to better their condition, but on the contrary to cause bad feeling and mistrust between the outharborman and his brothers in the city. What we want is unity and the only way to bring this about is by all hands working together. Life is one great struggle, which might be compared to a boat race, and it is no use having four men in a boat pulling together if two of the crew back water. Every man in the country must keep in stroke, by the outharborman or city man. We should all pull together, and in the end we will accomplish more than by finding fault with each other. Our papers are doing good work now and it is a pity that this splitting straws between sections of our country should appear to mar its progress. Let us hear no more of this appealing to the outharborman for, as I said before, it is only an insult to their intelligence, for the outharborman of to-day is not "too green to burn," and has sufficient pluck to demand his rights if those rights are not coming his way.

Taylor gave an interesting and descriptive address dealing chiefly with the work done by the W. M. S. in various parts of China and Japan, and also in North Western Canada. The President is a hard and enthusiastic worker which fact was plainly shown by the manner in which the children acquitted themselves. It is the sincere wish of all interested that the success which has hitherto attended "the Band" will continue.

A great many copies of the Daily News containing the address of Mr. R. A. Squires have been received and read by the people of Shoal Harbor with conflicting emotions. The style and language are certainly good—almost too good. We are not good politicians therefore we shall not be so audacious as to criticize the address generally but shall content ourselves with making a remark or two concerning that portion of it referring directly to the people of Shoal Harbor. Our people perhaps are as intelligent as the average people of the Bay, and possibly patriotic, but we scarcely think their intelligence, education and patriotism would lead them to "offer" their land for railway extension in the spirit spoken of in the address. We think the part referring to the "Bede Roll of Fame" is rather overdrawn and our people are immensely flattered to be spoken of in so complimentary a way without in the least deserving it. Our people as a whole, sir, did not offer their land, and it was only the knowledge of the futility of resistance that ultimately led them to the sacrifice of their old and prized homesteads. The "bill" will not go down and our sturdy people are rather disappointed that their representative should give utterance to such misleading words.

The winter is about over with our lumbermen and despite the fact that the winter has been very un satisfactory, they have nevertheless secured good cuts and are now eagerly awaiting the "opening up" to begin sawing.

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The Roosevelt Incident

ROME, April 7. Some of the prominent ecclesiastics who were received by the Pope to-day managed to introduce the subject of the Roosevelt incident. To these the Pontiff expressed the deepest regret that he had been prevented from meeting and speaking with the former President, but he gave utterance to no opinion regarding the negotiations of the deadlock that followed. The incident continues to be a live topic of discussion, and is emphasized by what the Liberal press calls the new mistake of Cardinal Merry Del Val.

Arabs attack Whites.

CAIRO, April 7. The Egyptian Gazette reports a savage attack by Arab boatmen on an English priest and four American students while they were being taken to a steamer at Haffa, on the Palestine coast, Sunday. The victims were beaten and badly injured, and their pockets rifled because they had refused to pay exorbitant charges. The British and American Consuls are making an investigation.

Explosion on Steamer, Scandalous Scenes.

Special Evening Telegram. DOVER, April 7. A terrific explosion occurred early this morning on the British steamer Cairnrona, of Dungeness, which wrecked the women's quarters, killing one child and injuring a number of women and children. The steamer caught fire and a panic ensued in which men fought for the possession of the boats, and had to be beaten back by the crew to allow the women to be taken first. A large number of passengers were landed here this evening, many of them in an exhausted condition. In all 20 were seriously injured, and no less than 50 were slightly injured by the explosion and in the panic that followed. The Cairnrona sailed yesterday from London for Portland, Me. She carried 500 passengers, most emigrants and a general cargo. By great luck the steamers Upland and Kanawha, were close at hand when the Cairnrona caught fire. They stood by and took off several hundred passengers and landed them here. Several of the first class passengers and American gentlemen give thrilling details of the accident. A number of women with children in their arms were sitting on a hatch when suddenly a violent explosion hurled them to all parts of the deck. The hatch was blown to fragments. Some of them were shockingly injured, and one child was killed outright. Rushing up and down screaming and wringing their hands, their terror was increased by the volumes of smoke which poured from the burning hold. The captain and officers made ineffectual efforts to calm them, and the signals of distress were sent up. Another explosion occurred in the engine room, and injured several of the engineers. The Kanawha and Upland steamed quickly up and the captain decided to transfer all the passengers. This was accomplished quickly but was accompanied by scandalous scenes. Scores of men tried to rush the boats, and many of them fought with the women, tearing and dragging them aside, and trampling them underfoot. The crew battled against the panic-stricken emigrants, using fists, and feet and anything they could find. Not a few of the frantic mob of men were felled to the deck before the fainting women and children could be got into the boats.

Kitchener in San Francisco.

Special to Evening Telegram. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 7. Lord Kitchener, Commander of the British Forces in the Department of the Mediterranean which also includes the Far East, arrived last night on the steamer Mariposa from Tahiti. He has been making a tour inspection in Australia and is on his way to England. In a communication to the British Consul, Gen. Lord Kitchener expressed the desire to be received here as a private citizen, and that no public reception be accorded him. The Customs officials will pass his baggage to-morrow without examination upon orders from Washington that every courtesy be extended to the distinguished British General.

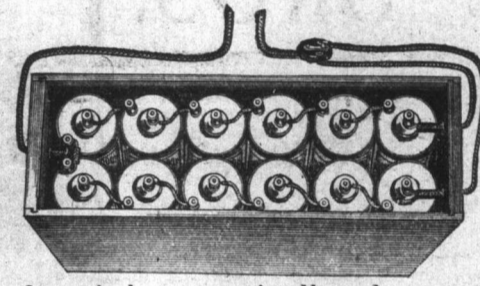

THE LABRADOR MISSION.

(The New Freeman.)
Practically a border line between Canada and Newfoundland, the Labrador has an international interest, and historically a very Catholic interest. Priests from Harbor Grace Diocese attend it. Also other Catholic missionaries have worked in that field. Among the missionary priests in Northern Newfoundland we might mention Father Sheehan. His point of seafaring perils his voyages might be called Apostolic. His contests with the ice and storm in discharge of his sacred ministry have become a part of the Church history of the north. Especially on sick calls or in holding Stations, in the widely separated districts of his mission, Father Sheehan had frequently to encounter the dangers of the deep. Often in crossing by sail-boat from one side of a point to the other, Father Sheehan had to land on wave-covered shores. Here tide and reef added to the peril. To meet his parishioners in spring or autumn, or in the urgencies of sick calls, he would set forth on his sacred mission despite sleet, snow, ice or waves. Such a work was indeed weighty, and would be more so but for the hearty cheer and genial humor of the energetic, dauntless, lion-hearted missionary. Besides he was able and well seconded on the mission for souls by the free co-operation of his parishioners. They gladly confronted voyages by land and sea to forward him on his missions. In fact now that we read of the new missions in Western Canada and the urgent need there for hundreds of Apostolic Catholic missionaries, we may admit that in the quality of sacerdotal zeal the new missionaries of Catholicity in the West will deserve the best possible inspiration from those ambassadors of the Christian Gospel who have worked for the Church from Labrador to the coast of Massachusetts. The new West will have to learn from the old West in that matter.

Since Father Sheehan began his mission in that part of northern Newfoundland nearest the Labrador coast, many important changes have taken place in the matter of steam communication. Also he was a pioneer of new educational work in many northern settlements, greatly aiding the Bishop in laying the foundations of schools and churches. In all these matters the parishioners were a strong support to him. He was also a zealous preacher of the Gospel, and each Sunday in some portion of his extensive parish he eloquently set forth Divine Truth. In the celebrated mission district of Tilt Cove, famous for lead, copper and silver, Father Sheehan was regarded by the sturdy miners from all parts of the world as a man of "light and leading," veritably a "guide, philosopher and friend." Also, Father Sheehan encouraged as far as possible industrial developments with a view towards the permanent settlement of many places under his spiritual care. He saw in many places great possibilities as regards farming, mining and lumbering and counselled the people to take up these pursuits and with good effect.

The Labrador territory itself is very much more easy of access now than it was about thirty years ago when Father Sheehan began his northern mission. To-day the missionary may go from place to place by steamers, and in summer time enjoy the picturesque variety of the North—a great advance on pioneer days, when means of locomotion was gradually applied and when the forces of nature were frequently obstacles such as only zeal could combat.

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Cost of Education in Nova Scotia.

Halifax, N. S., April 4.—According to a report in the House of Assembly brought down to-day by Premier Murray public education in Nova Scotia last year cost \$1,229,834. The technical college cost \$116,000 exclusive of equipment.

Mr. Roosevelt Charged by a Lion.

The lion stopped and lay down behind a bush; jumping off I took a shot at him at two hundred yards, but only wounded him slightly in one paw; and after a moment's sullen hesitation he went, lashing his tail. We mounted our horses and went after him: Tarlton lost sight of him, but I marked him lying down behind a low grassy ant hill. Again we dismounted at a distance of two hundred yards; Tarlton telling me that now he was sure to charge. In all East Africa there is no man, not even Cuninghame himself, whom I would rather have by me than Tarlton, in difficulties with a charging lion; on this occasion, however, I am glad to say that his rifle was badly sighted, and shot altogether too low.

Again I knelt and fired; but the mess of hair on the lion made me think he was nearer than he was, and I undershot, inflicting a flesh wound that was neither crippling nor fatal. He was already grunting savagely and tossing his tail erect, with his head held low; and at the shot the great sinewy beast came toward us with the speed of a greyhound. Tarlton then, very properly, fired, for lion hunting is no child's play, and it is not good to run risks. Ordinarily it is a very mean thing to experience joy at a friend's misadventure; but this was not an ordinary case, and I felt keen delight when the bullet from the badly sighted rifle missed, striking the ground many yards short. I was sighting carefully, from my knee, and I knew I had the lion all right; for though he galloped at a great pace, he came a steadily—ears laid back, and uttering terrific coughing grunts—and there was now no question of making allowance for distance, nor, as he was out in the open, for the fact that he had not before been distinctly visible. The head of my foresight was exactly on the centre of his chest as I pressed the trigger, and the bullet went as true as if the place had been plotted with dividers. The blow brought him up all standing, and he fell forward on his head. The soft-nosed Winchester bullet had gone straight through the chest cavity, smashing the lungs and the big blood-vessels of the heart. Painfully he recovered his feet, and tried to come on, his ferocious courage holding out to the last.—From "African Game Trails," by Theodore Roosevelt, in the April Scribner.

Last Night's Recital.

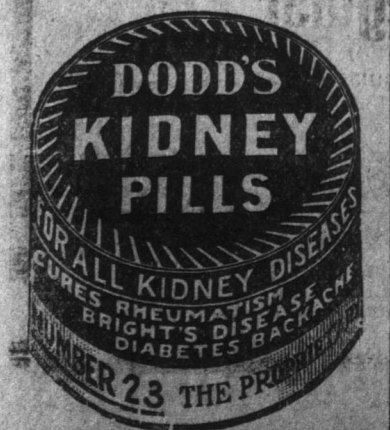
