What Will Happen?

Special to Evening Telegram LONDON, To-Day.

The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize. All the threats of the extremist lords to throw out of the extremist fords to throw out the bill at this stage and precipitate a crisis, proved a bluff. One peer, Baron Stanmore, raised his voice to demand a vote, but found no support-er. The future of this Parliamentary Bill may be predicted with a reason-

able degree of certainty. Premier Asquith in the House of Commons on Monday will move the rejection of the amendments of the House of Lords on bloc. This being done, he will aunounce that if the House of Lords persists in inserting the amendments. there will be no course open to him but to tender the King certain advice which will ensure the passage of the bill. It would not be in accordance with constitutional etiquette for him to specify the nature of the advice. But every one understands this would mean the creation of Liberal peers.
