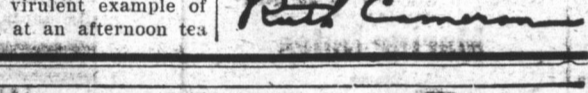
The second time she came away from the phone she announced with a sweet simper, "Isn't he funny? He says he can't wait to see me. He says he's hungry."

He is Out to Succeed.

The Scot Finds His Way to the High Places—Writer in Ottawa Free Press Discusses the Method by Which the Canopy Products of the Northern Race Manage to Get In to the Good Jobs—The Failures are Kept Out of Sight.

An amusing article, said to be "by an Englishman," appears in The Ottawa Free Press. We quote these interesting extracts:

Not so very long ago I accepted the legend that the Scots were a superior race, with constitutions like iron, the product of standard porridge, and with brains made keen by an educational system unparalleled in the world.

I laugh at myself now. I could count upon the fingers of one hand the Scotchmen I know who take porridge in the morning—though the Scots are at the present day doing a roaring trade in selling porridge-making stuff to their neighbors.

As to their educational system, what success it has appears to be due to their greed. No one in Scotland will pay for the education of his children if he can get it off the rates. This is the true reason why the "Provynt's loon" and the scavenger's "loom" sit side by side in the rate-supported schools, catch the measles from each other, and imbibe the Scotchman's axiom of life that it is man's first duty to get the better of some one else.

Let us briefly examine the result of all this. We see Lord Strathcona and Lord Mount Stephen, both eminent counsils, starting life as cow-boys and ending by appropriating Canada. Sir John Houston Reid, the son of a Scottish parson, dropped down in Australia, became the Prime Minister, and is now its High Commissioner.

There is no Englishman, however, who has captured a Scottish constituency. His predecessor, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, was a Scotsman; and Mr. Balfour, who was Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's predecessor, is a Scotsman. So is Lord Rosebery, another ex-Prime Minister. So, by descent, was Mr. Gladstone. The Lord Chancellor is a Scotsman, and so is his probable successor, Mr. Haldane, now Secretary of War. Mr. John Burns is a Scotsman. The Chief Liberal Whip is a Scotsman.

Sir Edward Hamilton, Permanent Secretary to the Treasury, is Scotch. Sir Robert Hamilton Lang has for years controlled the finances of Turkey, while Mr. John Lavery, the artist, has got himself into almost every painter's society on the continent. Sir Alex. Mackenzie, another tramp of the Caledonian road, is principal of the Royal College of Music, while Sir William McGregor, after annexing New Guinea to Great Britain, earned many other guineas as governor of various colonies. Sir Henry Balfour, Secretary to the Post Office, is, of course, a Scotman, as is also Mr. Robert Henderson, Secretary of the Board of Customs.

McManigal May Not Survive Trial.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 12.—John J. and James B. McNamara, alleged dynamite plotters, answered "not guilty" yesterday to nineteen charges of murder against them when, after they had spent ten weeks in the county jail, Judge Walter Bordwell had overruled every point advanced by the defence for the quashing of the indictments alleging their connection with the destruction of the plant of the Los Angeles Times, on October 1, 1910.

John McNamara was the first to be asked how he wished to plead. He answered "Not guilty."

Hardly a minute later James B. McNamara made a similar response to the same charge. Afterwards they replied at the same time to the accusations growing out of the Times explosion had been answered, John J. McNamara stood alone and answered "Not guilty" to the charge of complicity in an explosion at the Llewellyn Iron Works in this city.

The defence asked that the date of the trial be not fixed until Joseph Scott, one of the McNamara attorneys, could return from San Francisco.

The prosecution objected, but Judge Bordwell ordered a continuance until Friday morning, when the trial date will be settled.

McManigal Reported on Verge of Collapses.

Mrs. Orle McManigal and her uncle, George Behm, of Portage, Wis., shared the public's interest with the McNamara brothers. Mrs. McManigal and her uncle came to Court directly from the jail, where the two made another effort. It is asserted, however, that the visit of McManigal's wife and uncle to his cell yesterday followed a similar call on Tuesday. Behm, who arrived here several days ago, reared McManigal from boyhood, and is said to have urged his nephew to do as his wife wished and remain true to his fellow-prisoners.

McManigal is said to have wavered but to have refused finally to desert the prosecution.

"I cannot do it," he is quoted as saying. "They will hang me if I do."

Portia's Fishery News.

By the Portia we learn that the fishery along the E. W. coast is a failure, and from Burin up to Cape Ray very poor work has been done, with a most gloomy future outlook. There has been some good fishing on the western side of Placentia Bay, but the catch is not as large as reports would indicate. It is a miserable failure on the east side, and the same applies to Trepassay Bay, where the traps average no more than 10 qts. St. Mary's and the Southern Shore have done well to date.

News From Whalers.

The whaler Cabot, Capt. Bull, which is operating at Balena, has 30 fish to date. These include 23 sulphurs, 3 humps and 4 fins, and the ship is yet holding her position as high liner of the fleet. Messrs. Heare & Co. had a letter from Manager Collins Wednesday stating that the Cachelot up to the time of writing had no fish. She made ten separate trips but saw no whales and stormy weather greatly impeded her in her work. Fish, however, he stated, were seen near Hawk's Harbor at the time of writing, and he believes that the ship will make a fair voyage before the season concludes.

A Master of The Violin

GIVES CITY CLUB A TREAT.

A violin recital was given last night at the City Club by Mr. Louis Mollenhauer, of the New York Conservatory of Music, assisted by Mr. Hutton, organist of the R. C. Cathedral, and Mr. F. J. 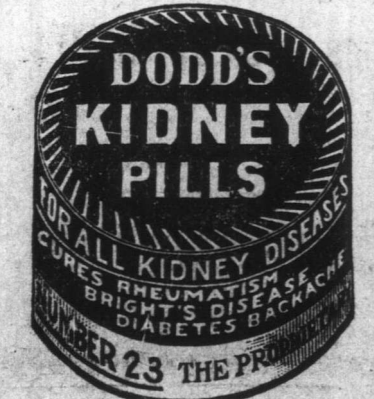
AND NOW

It is to be hoped that the Parliamentary crisis is now over. The amendments which are now in dispute between the two Houses of Parliament would not justify the resort to desperate measures on the part of the peers, and it would only add absurdity to the attitude of the peers should an adverse majority have to be checked by the creation of a block of peers. We believe that no political party would knowingly drag the King into a political controversy, and that the party leaders and followers of all the recognized parties would join, as it is intimated, Lord Lansdowne may do, in preventing the embolment of the King in party politics, and forestalling any such injudicious action on the part of hard-crusted Tory lords, who are not all of the backwoods type, but include hard shell Tories like the aged ex-Chancellor, Earl Halsbury, and the old type of Colony Governor, like Baron Stanmore.

A Worthy Step.

We learn that the intended donors of the \$50,000, announced by the Hon. Edgar Bowring at the Centenary Celebration on Tuesday, include in addition to that gentleman the other principals of the firm whose branches are to be found in several parts of England and the States as well as Newfoundland. The purpose of this benefaction has not yet been determined, but it has been decided that the object shall be of a lasting nature and one also which will benefit many. Among the purposes under consideration are the founding of a Technical College or the laying out of a central park. Both objects are worthy of consideration. A Technical School is a want which has been dwelt upon in the press of late and was a subject of deliberation at the recent Teachers' Conference. There are other purposes which could be thought of which would fall within the intent of establishing a permanent memorial of benefit to many. But whatever the charitable purpose may be which is finally determined, and these two are striking charitable purposes, the Bowring benefaction is a most commendable step in the history of mercantile generosity in Newfoundland.

SMALL POX OUTBREAK.—Yesterday forenoon Dr. Behm had a message from St. Lawrence stating that the sch. M. Parks owned by Mr. Hann, was there from Sydney, coal laden, with a case of smallpox on board, one of her crew being affected. The vessel has been quarantined by Magistrate Benning and Dr. Smith is looking after the sick man.



What Will Happen?

Special to Evening Telegram
LONDON, To-Day.
The revolt of the insurgent peers failed to materialize. All the threats of the extremist lords to throw out the bill at this stage and precipitate a crisis, proved a bluff. One peer, Baron Stanmore, raised his voice to demand a vote, but found no support. The future of this Parliamentary Bill may be predicted with a reasonable degree of certainty. Premier Asquith in the House of Commons on Monday will move the rejection of the amendments of the House of Lords en bloc. This being done, he will announce that the House of Lords persists in inserting the amendments, there will be no course open to him, but to under the King certain advice which will ensure the passage of the bill. It would not be in accordance with constitutional etiquette for him to specify the nature of the advice. But every one understands this would mean the creation of Liberal peers. When the House of Lords meets on Wednesday or Thursday, Lord Lansdowne will announce in the acceptance of the bill, predicting its repeal, as soon as the Unionists return to office. If the Extremist rally routs Lord Halsbury, the Lord Chancellor in the last Tory administration, and if he moves the rejection of the bill, Lord Lansdowne is expected to summon his followers to vote for it. It is anticipated that Lord Halsbury will find not more than fifty and perhaps not more than a score of supporters. The King will return to London this evening from Scotland and the Prime Minister will probably have an audience with His Majesty on Saturday. Interest centres on whether the Unionists at their caucus to-day will succeed in preventing extreme action on the part of Lord Halsbury. The Liberal morning papers express satisfaction now that the bill has passed its third reading, and that no action by the House of Lords will bring the session of Parliament to an end. They hope the Unionists will suggest the Dublin incident to the King into the struggle.

Royal Residence in Ireland.

A royal residence in Ireland is suggested in the highest quarters, says the Dublin correspondent of the Times, and the idea has been accepted.

To Choose a Gas Cooker.

If possible, choose a stove that has the oven lined with enameled iron, as well as crown plates of the same material to fit on the top of the stove underneath the burners. Not only do these things and crown plates look well, but their glazed, light surface reflects heat and only needs keeping clean with hot soda and water. A thoroughly good stove should be chosen, the space between being packed with non-heat conducting material. This prevents waste of heat and thereby discomfort in the kitchen. It should be so constructed as to afford every facility for boiling, baking and grilling and toasting, and while all parts possible should be removable, so that it can be easily taken to pieces for cleaning purposes.

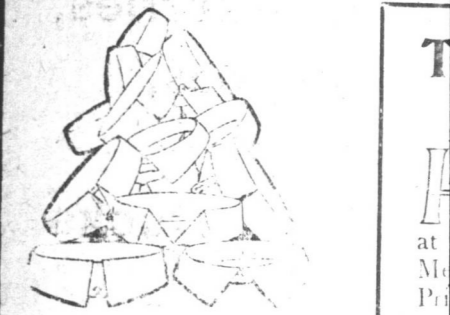

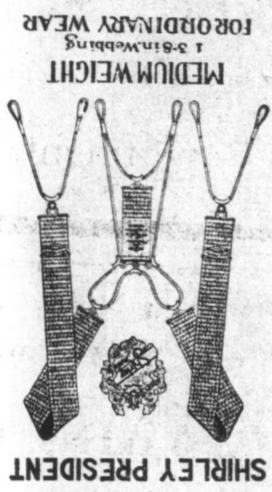

All other arrangements have been completed for the Regatta. Mr. W. J. Higgins announced that His Honor Mayor W. J. Ellis will give prizes similar to those donated last year to the men comprising the winning crew in the Tradesmen's Race.

After other routine business had been finalized the meeting adjourned till Friday night next in the Armoury at the T. A. Hall.

On next Friday night the Regatta Committee will meet in the Armoury of the T. A. Hall for the purpose of entering the crews competing in the various races on Regatta Day. The Committee are very desirous that all the men rowing should come forward early that evening and enter. Yearly many of the crews absent themselves from this meeting and do not enter until Monday night preceding the Regatta. This gives the Committee much trouble and entails on the Secretary a deal of unnecessary work. There may be one or two crews who through force of circumstances cannot be present at Friday's meeting, but most of them can, and the Committee would deem it a favour if all would come forward so that the work of entering could be put out of hand and save the labor of making many entries on the Monday before Regatta.

Special Evening Telegram.

BISLEY, July 20.
The Mother Country team won the Kolapore cup in the competition today, although the Canadian team led at both the 1,000 and 500-yard ranges. The scores were as follows: 1,000 yards—Canada, 252; England, 248; India, 233; Guernsey, 242; South Africa, 237; New Zealand, 244. Canada's lead was 4 points. In the 500 yards range—Canada, 261; England, 255; India, 247; Guernsey, 252; South Africa, 256; New Zealand, 251. Canada's lead was 9 points, or 13 points for both. Canada and England tied for the cup with an aggregate for the three ranges of 759, but the Mother Country won, having the biggest score at the 500 yards range.

LONDON, July 20.
The House of Commons sat until 5 o'clock this morning, detailing the Insurance Bill. Chancellor Lloyd George is in a strong conflict with the Labour Party, which is seeking to amend the Bill in the direction of making the State undertake greater financial responsibility, so that the

workmen may pay smaller contributions. The Chancellor declined, on the ground that he has already conceded too much in this direction. The situation between the Government and the Labourites is very strained.

LISBON, July 20.
When a detachment of the 20th regiment arrived at Guimaraes, where it had been sent as a precautionary measure to prevent an outbreak, the soldiers were greeted with hostility by the people, who jammed the streets and cheered for Church and Monarchy. The army of officers, who tried to harangue the populace, were stoned and forced to seek refuge in the house of Governor Salgado, which was surrounded until reinforcements arrived. The Royalist leaders are reported to be continuing preparations for an invasion of the frontier. Advice from Coimbra reports that street fighting there as a result of counter demonstrations. Many are injured.

Papal Delegate Arrives

His Excellency Monsignor Stagni Accorded Heartly Reception by the People of Saint John's.

In pursuance of the programme adopted by the Citizens' Committee the members of the Roman Catholic Societies in the city marched to the King's Wharf at 6 o'clock this morning to meet the Papal Delegate, His Excellency Monsignor Stagni on the arrival from Montreal of the S. S. Rosalind.

A few minutes after 6 o'clock the tooting of whistles reverberated among the hills that guard the Harbour, and a score of smaller boats and steam launches headed for the Narrows. The decks of the Ingraham and John Green were crowded with people as they steamed away from the pier.

On the former went Mr. E. M. Jackson, President of the Star of the Sea Association, Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan and a firing squad of 20 of the Catholic Cadet Corps in uniform, and officers of the Star of the Sea and other societies. An equal number of Cadets embarked with the latter.

Board of Trade Meeting Yesterday

The President, Hon. W. C. Job, occupied the chair yesterday. The Hon. Secretary, Mr. Egan, read the quarterly report, a synopsis of which follows:

"Oporto, 24th May, 1911. "Owing to its high price, demand for Newfoundland cod is giving preference to Norwegian, Iceland and German cures which, being much cheaper, are more easily disposed of. Our market is now constantly receiving supplies of these qualities, and the fish being well cured, dry and clean, is slowly, but surely, displacing Newfoundland cod in this market. Large quantities of Norwegian are now on passage in this market, and demand being insufficient to keep pace with the supply, stocks will accumulate and prices must inevitably 'come down'."

In view of these facts and the enormous increase in the Norwegian fishery, the Council "cannot impress too strongly upon every merchant and fisherman in Newfoundland the great need of making an extraordinary effort to improve the cure of their fish, and so stand on equal terms with our neighbors and competitors."

Herrings for a number of years have been sent to this market in a disgraceful condition. The inspection instituted by the Board showed that the pack was much worse than had been anticipated.

"Some of the barrels which have arrived here this spring are positively too small to contain the proper quantity of herrings. Many barrels of herring have been faced top and bottom with two or three layers of medium herrings, the middle of the barrel containing the smallest possible kind of fish. Some have arrived dry and badly cleaned, while others again have been packed with a very small quantity of salt, and in some cases none at all."

A circular has been issued dealing with the cure of herring, and a new treaty with Portugal is under consideration, a representation has been made as to the excessive duties levied there on British catches, fish as compared with that from Norway.

The Council has sent Capt. A. Solling a box of "dun" fish, as he has undertaken to have the "dun" investigated scientifically.

Upon the recommendation of the Council, the Department of Marine and Fisheries has placed the salting of salmon under the same rules and regulations as the canning of lobsters.

OUR HISTORY.

Some Disputed Points—The Discovery—The Landfall.

(By D. W. Prowse.) History is not romance of a mere pretty story. The essential element in all real History is truth. We must hold the mirror up to nature and give the very form and pressure of the time. It is only from contemporary documents that the true story of the past can be unfolded. Our own local Histories are veritable "comedies of errors."

Harvey and Pedley give all the credit of the famous Expedition of 1497 to Sebastian Cabot. Now the smallest reflection would have shown them that at that period Sebastian and his two brothers whose names are inserted in the grant according to an old custom, in order to prolong its duration, were infants or at least very young men in 1497, as we find Sebastian very active and energetic sixty years later. Now the contemporary evidence first given to the world by Bartolomeo Brown, an English antiquarian, who spent his winters in Venice show clearly the letters written by Soncino and Pasqualigo immediately after John Cabot's arrival in Bristol, 1497 that his only companions were a Burgundian and sixteen English sailors. Sebastian was no more in Newfoundland than the moon, and he had neither hand, act or part either in his father's first or second voyage of discovery. No doubt Sebastian was a very able man and a good navigator but he was likewise, as the Records show, a boundless liar.

The Landfall. On this subject there are a dozen different opinions. Every writer on the Colony seems to take a different view. Simply because they disregard the laws of evidence and the great principles which govern British courts of law and historical "Lis mota" lays down the principle that evidence produced before the commencement of litigation is much more reliable and trustworthy than testimony brought forward afterwards.

Now as regards the landing of Cabot we have the most satisfactory evidence given at a time when men were alive whose fathers had sailed on the famous voyage. Bonavista, first land found by John Cabot is inscribed on the maps in Mason's book and in a contemporary map by a French Geographer. Now Governor John Mason was born in the reign of Elizabeth. He was an Oxford man, a skilled navigator, a captain in the Royal Navy and afterwards Treasurer of the Navy. When, therefore, he gives Bonavista as Cabot's landfall we may place the greatest reliance on his testimony. But there are a number of other facts that strengthen this position and make Bonavista the landfall as surely as any fact in human history can be absolutely proved. Inside Bonavista the first good harbour is King's Cove where Cabot would land, take possession and hoist the Royal Standard. On all the old foreign maps it is marked as the Royal Port. Cabot discovered Newfoundland on the 24th June, St. John the Baptist's Day. On the old maps in this vicinity is a River, Jorborough, where the saint was baptised, and a Bay called after his father, Zacharias. All these coincidences are very strong, but there is one still stronger near the landfall is Keels. Sir Clement Markham, President of the Royal Geographical Society declared that this name was

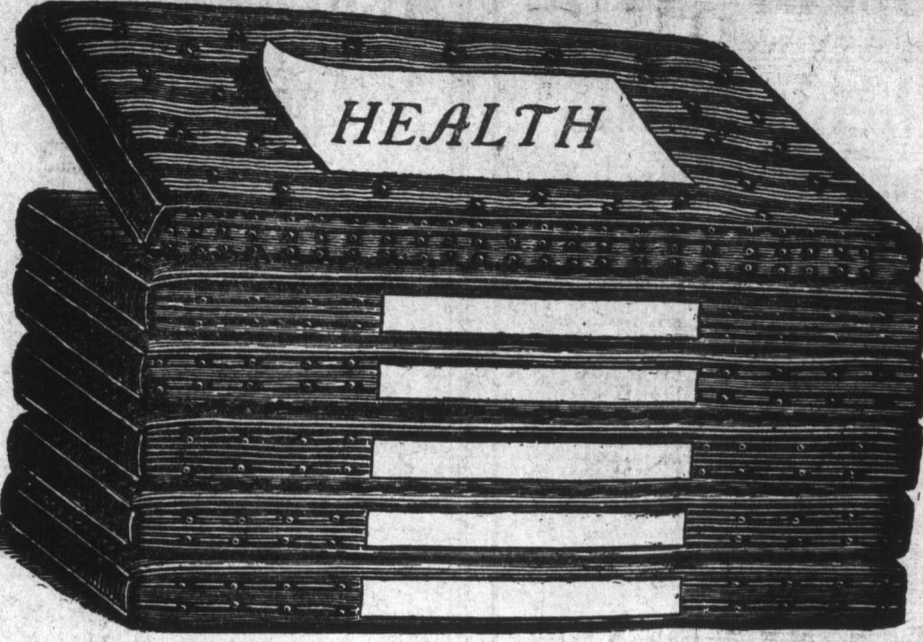

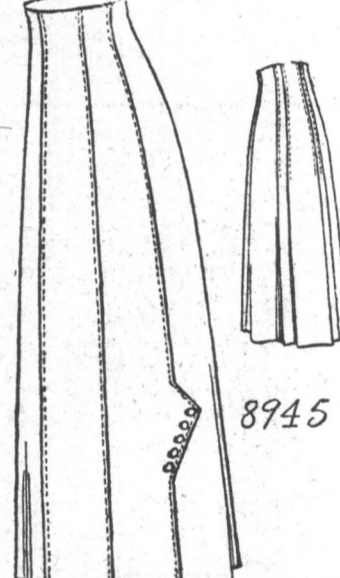

OUR HISTORY.

Some Disputed Points—The Discovery—The Landfall.

History is not romance or a mere pretty story. The essential element in all real history is truth. We must hold the mirror up to nature and give the very form and pressure of the time. It is only from contemporary documents that the true story of the past can be unfolded. Our own local histories are veritable "comedies of errors."

Harvey and Pedley give all the credit of the famous Expedition of 1497 to Sebastian Cabot. Now the smallest reflection would have shown them that at that period Sebastian and his two brothers whose names are inserted in the grant according to an old custom, in order to prolong its duration, were infants or at least very young men in 1497, as we find Sebastian very active and energetic sixty years later. Now the contemporary evidence first given to the world by Rawdon Brown, an English antiquarian, who spent his winters in Venice show clearly the letters written by Soncino and Pasqualigo immediately after John Cabot's arrival in Bristol, 1497 that his only companions were a Burgundian and sixteen English sailors. Sebastian was no more in Newfoundland than in the moon, and he had neither hand, act or part either in his father's first or second voyage of discovery. No doubt Sebastian was a very able man and a good navigator but he was likewise, as the Records show, a boundless liar.

The Landfall.
On this subject there are a dozen different opinions. Every writer on the Colony seems to take a different view simply because they disregard the laws of evidence and the great principles which govern all enquiries both legal and historical. "Lis mota" lays down the principle that evidence produced before the commencement of litigation is much more reliable and trustworthy than testimony brought forward afterwards.

Now as regards the landfall of Cabot we have the most satisfactory evidence given at a time when men were alive whose fathers had sailed on the famous voyage. Bonavista, first land found by John Cabot is inscribed on the maps in Mason's book and in a contemporary map by a French Geographer. Now Governor John Mason was born in the reign of Elizabeth. He was an Oxford man, a skilled navigator, a captain in the Royal Navy and afterwards Treasurer of the Navy. When, therefore, he gives Bonavista as Cabot's landfall we may place the greatest reliance on his testimony. But there are a number of other facts that strengthen this position and make Bonavista the landfall as surely as any fact in human history can be absolutely proved. His Bonavista the first good harbour is King's Cove where Cabot would land, take possession and hold the Royal Standard. On all the old foreign maps it is marked as the Royal Port. Cabot discovered Newfoundland on the 24th June, St. John the Baptist's Day. On the old maps in this vicinity is a River Jordan where the saint was baptized, and a Bay called after his father, Zacharias. All these coincidences are very strong, but there is one still stronger near the landfall, St. John the Baptist's Bay.

It is a very singular circumstance that all Cabot's successors followed the same course and made Cape Bonavista as their landfall. Verazano, Carter and others, all record the fact on the old maps two of the most distinct names are always Cape Bonavista and Cabo Razo or Cape Race.

The police have information of a plot to assassinate President De la Barra, and are engaged in investigation.

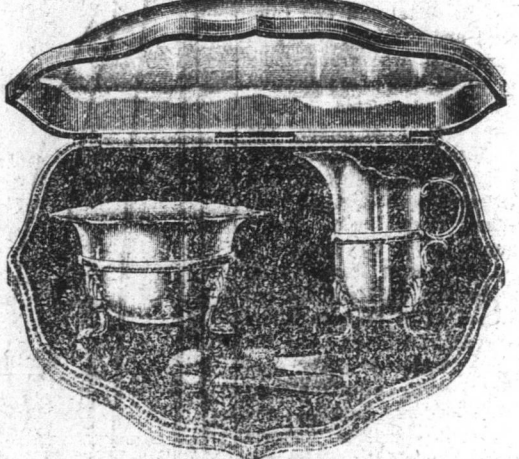
