### **Burglars Feast** in Victim's Home.

Spread Table and Tap Wine Cellar Following Success in Elmhurst

New York, Oct. 19 .- After breaking nto and robbing four other fine residences in the exclusive Broadway section of Elmhurst I. I before daylight yesterday, five men halted their utomobile at that of William Spencer. forced the cellar door, and after gathering jewels and silverware worth \$3,000 from the rooms upstairs, spread a feast on the servants' table in the basement. From the ice box they took roast chicken and beef, opened several cans of sardines and caviar, drew on the bread box and drank a dozen bottles of Mr. Spencer's best wines, which they selected from his wine cellar with a connoisseur's skill.

The feast lasted long, as was indicated by fragments, and by the barren ice-box. They also found several boxes of Mr. Spencer's cigars.

Efforts were made to enter at least a dozen houses in the same neighborhood but in several the robbers were frightened away by dogs. Five were entered and robbed. In each home the burglars went to the bedfind on dressing tables and broke into the silver chests in the dining room. They did not take any plated ware.

From one residence they took valuable fur coat, which had just been taken from storage. In none of the nouses robbed were the burglars eard, and no one knew of their calls until the families arose at the usual

The brush turkey, which is found in Australia, New Guinea, the Solomon Islands, Borneo and many other parts of the globe and which is a distant relative of the grouse and the pheasant, belongs to the moundbuilders or megapodes, and is remarkable in that it anticipated man as the inventor of the incubator by a few hundred thousand years or so.

When the nestling season arrives two or more hens, with the assistance. nerhans, of a cock, build an immense heap of soil, mixed with decaying leaves and twigs. These mounds in New Guinea are sometimes 11 feet high and 25 feet in diameter and some have been found 15 feet in height and 60 feet in circumference. The hens then scrape with their enormously large feet (hence the name megapodes) a hole in the centre of the heap and in it deposit their eggs to the number of a score or more, afterwards covering over the hole. In course of time the heat generated by the decaying vegetation batches the eggs. The chicks, which have been living and fattening on the food yolk, brow and shed their nestling down and develop their first suit of feathers while still within the walls of their ivory "cradles." When at last they out their way out of the shell, they rest for a few hours in the mound; then they wriggle out, the quill-sheats peel off and they cannot only




