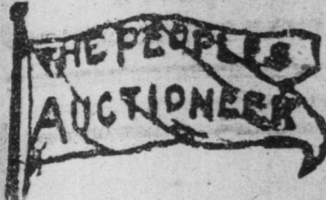

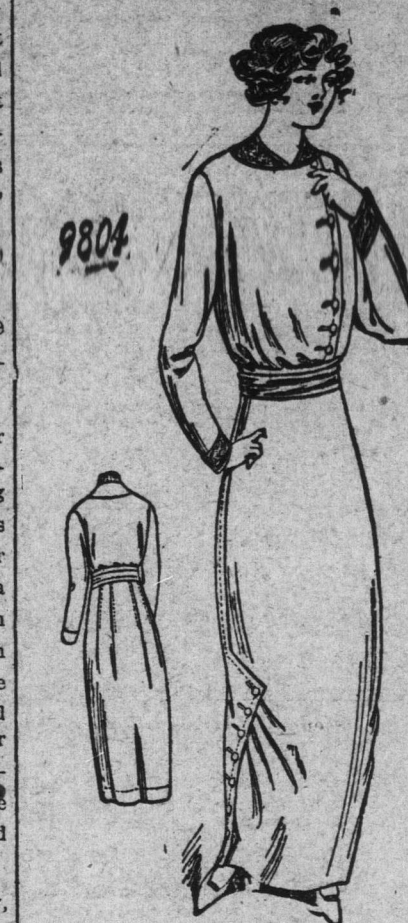

ESTATE OF STRATHCONA.

New York, Jan. 24.—James H. Smith, of Brookline, Mass., said here today that he was not a son of Lord Strathcona, the late High Commissioner of Canada, that he was only a step-son and that he had not claimed any interest in his stepfather's estate. Despatches from Boston last night reported that Mr. Smith would not seek to obtain recognition as Lord Strathcona's son and legal heir. Mr. Smith said he was a son of Lady Strathcona by her former marriage. Lord Strathcona, he explained, was married to Lady Strathcona in 1883 at North West Bay, Hamilton Inlet, in the province of Labrador, within the jurisdiction of Newfoundland. Insane Man Kills Parents

And Then Commits Suicide.

Hillsburg, Ont., January 28.—Edgar Simpson, 27 years old, son of Hugh Simpson, a farmer, residing on the tenth concession of Garafransa, yesterday shot and killed his father and mother and later, a little later, barricading himself in the house and defying a posse of the neighbours who surrounded the residence, and the rifle with which he had committed the double murder on himself, the bullet piercing his heart. So close was the weapon held to the breast of the murderer-suicide that his clothing was ignited and partially burned.

The crime was committed during a temporary fit of insanity. Young Simpson had been ill for some time, and it is supposed that his mind became affected.

Police Force an Entrance.

From time to time watchers around the house could see the murderer peering through the drawn blinds. At one time he shot and killed a passing dog.

Constables arrived about four o'clock, and after reconnoitering for a few moments, determined to force the rear entrance. A fusillade was made on the front of the house, while, with revolvers drawn, the police pressed the rear door. They had not gone far before they found that the murderer had taken his own life.

When it was seen that the last chapter of the tragedy was closed, a jury was empanelled, and, after viewing the remains an inquest was formally opened on the body of Mrs. Simpson.

To the Victors Belong the Spoils


We notice that in the House of Assembly a discussion arose in reference to appointments to the Civil Service. Some members expressed strong dissatisfaction with the principle of political patronage, and especially at the extreme form of it known as the "spoils system." We strongly object to the latter as a mode of making vacancies of appointments to the Civil Service. Some members expressed strong dissatisfaction with the principle of political patronage, and especially at the extreme form of it known as the "spoils system." We strongly object to the latter as a mode of making vacancies of appointments to be filled by political victors. We are not, however, convinced that the competitive examination system could be adopted in Newfoundland with any advantage to the community. At home it is used to some advantage, but its use though extensive is only partial, and is used only for entrance to the lowest step of the ladder of the different departments, whether it be ordinary junior clerkship of the different divisions of department, and even in departments where experts are employed. Promotion depends on experience obtained in the departments and capacity shown for higher work. These examinations are held for entrance appointments given by a Civil Service Commission, so that the system of patronage by the political heads of departments does not obtain to any extent. But it is not wholly absent. Many of the appointments under recent social schemes are outside the scope of the Civil Service Commission. It might be useful to appoint a permanent Civil Service Commission, which should be independent of the Government to make junior appointments, but we are not convinced that there is a sufficient number of such junior vacancies to justify the organization of regular sets of competition examinations, which would of course vary with the needs of different departments. We are not averse to the principle of competitive examination, but we doubt its applicability to our circumstances. With a huge body like the Civil Service of the British Government, which rules directly 45,000,000 people, and more or less indirectly hundreds of millions in dependencies and Crown Colonies, the number of vacancies for junior entrance situation is very large and justifies the organization of different grades of entrance examination, but in those conditions we absent in our case.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, To-day. Correspondence was tabled to-day between the Canadian Government and the Imperial authorities in reference to the question of uniform naturalization. It will form the subject of legislation at the present session and will provide in substance that a five years' residence in the Empire shall qualify for the rights of citizenship. The last year of the five must be in the country where naturalization rights are secured.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The hopes of the Women Suffragettes that the present Democratic administration would see to Federal legislation enfranchising the women of the country, were checked to-day when Representative Underwood put the Democratic Party squarely on record as opposed to Federal action. Underwood declared that the Democratic Party took the position that the question of suffrage was one which should be left to the individual States to settle.

CAPE TOWN, To-day. General Christian Smuts, Minister of Defence, was cheered by all sections, except the Laborites, when he arose in the Assembly and moved the second reading of the Bill to indemnify the Government for its acts under martial law. General Smuts will resume his speech to-morrow. The Minister of Defence argued the Government had to deal with no ordinary strike, but a Syndicalist conspiracy of the worst type. The Trades Federation had attempted to paralyze trade and terrorize and starve the community in order to compel surrender to its demands. To defeat this conspiracy and prevent the country from succumbing to anarchy, it became necessary to mobilize a larger military force than was employed in the Boer republics at the outbreak of the war. He declared that Secretary Bain, of the Trades Federation, one of the men deported, was most prominent in inciting violence. He had known him when he was employed in the secret service of the Government and declared him to be one of the most desperate characters he had ever encountered. Nothing more diabolical, asserted Genl. Smuts, could have been committed by an invading force than what the deported leaders had attempted.

Kitchen Hints

To make cheese straws, roll pastry thin, cover half of it with grated cheese, fold the other half over and cut into long, narrow strips. Bake till brown.

Choose very simple things for informal evening refreshments—cake and grape juice, or chocolate and wafers, or cheese, toasted crackers and cider.

After washing cream setge, put two tablespoonfuls of powdered borax in half a pail of cold water and steep the serge in it for 15 minutes. Then rinse and dry.

Whole wheat cooked overnight in a double boiler is a delicious breakfast cereal, but to be perfect it should have a cupful of rich milk stirred into it before serving.

Everybody doesn't know that the rugs which curl up so annoyingly at the corners may be buttoned down. Fasteners for the purpose are to be had in the shops.

To clean the inside of a silver teapot, let it stand over night, with a paste all over the inner surface, said paste made of soda, vinegar and flour. Wash off in the morning.

Fruit buns are excellent for children's lunches. Make dough as for rusks, then stir in as many currants and seeded raisins as the dough will hold, add a dash of cinnamon and nutmeg, raise and bake.

A Native Abroad

From the accompanying extract of a Canadian paper it will be seen how the West is active in educational interests. Dr. Boyle is son of Dr. Boyle of Carbonar, who has four sons in the Province of Alberta. Two are connected with the Merchants Bank of Canada.

The second lecture in the series of extension lectures arranged by the department of extension of the University of Alberta for Camrose will be given in the School Assembly Hall on Friday evening, January 30th, by Dr. Boyle, Professor of Physics. His subject will be "Electricity, its conduction through gases, and X-rays." This lecture has for its object the tracing out of the more recent developments of electrical physics, and the outlining of the modern scientific ideas on the structure of matter and electrical flow which were brought into play by this new knowledge. The different steps will be traced which led to the discovery of radium and X-rays, and number of experiments will be shown by way of illustration. Dr. Boyle spent some time in research work along the line of the lecture subject and is qualified to speak from first-hand acquaintance of the very interesting topic with which he will deal in his address.

Clementine Here

The barqt. Clementine, which it will be remembered put into Barbadoes some time ago in a damaged condition while on the way here from Brazil, arrived in port at 9:30 a.m. to-day. Capt. Kendrick made the run from Barbadoes in 21 days, and reports very stormy weather on nearing the Newfoundland coast, the vessel being at times badly buffeted. The Clementine came through the storms without any mishap. The captain and crew are all well.

Serious Case.

By the local to-day a little girl named Annie Porter, of Spanlard's Bay, arrived for treatment at the Hospital. The child is only eleven years old and is suffering from a serious eruption of the face which completely disfigures her. She is an orphan and is truly a pitiful sight, and evoked the general sympathy of those who saw her.

The clock has four dials and at the present time, each one records a different time, and all are wrong. Business people are complaining bitterly of the inconvenience caused by this condition of affairs and ask that it be remedied.

Severe Storm in Toronto

Toronto, February 1.—From six o'clock on Saturday night until quarter to two on Sunday morning that part of Toronto which depends upon the hydro-electric, including the street lighting, was dark. The trouble was owing to a break in the transmission line at Vineland. Two wires were broken by the wind, which blew at a ninety mile an hour gait, and the loss cut off the cables short circuited the other wires, putting the whole line out of business. The break affected the entire Niagara system, the service within a radius of 300 miles being rendered useless.

The storm was a God send to the unemployed, 1,200 men being put to work shovelling the snow which accompanied the gale.

Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond who spent yesterday in the city, returned to Whitbourne by last evening's express.

Capt. Randell, of the S. S. Bonaventure, who has been laid up with pneumonia for some time past, is now rapidly improving and he will soon be able to assume command of his ship.

Stormy on Coast.

From the crew of the barqt. Resina, Capt. Sinclair, which arrived yesterday morning after a passage of 24 days from Pernambuco, we learn that very stormy weather was experienced while coming on the Newfoundland coast, and for several days the decks were continually awash. No serious damage resulted however, and the Captain and crew are all well.

At the House

Petitions were presented by Mr. Kennedy from St. Phillips asking for a bonus for clearing land; by Mr. Stone from St. John's Within, for a road; and by Mr. Targett, from Hearts' Desire, regarding timber limits.

The House then went into Committee and the discussion on the estimates resumed.

Mr. Jennings continued his speech. He had heard the members of the Government side talk a lot since the opening of the session upon the "clean" election campaign conducted by them. In legal circles there is such an expression as "an accessory to the crime," which means that a person need not actually commit but is associated with it. Regarding this he produced a dodger which was printed and circulated in Twillingate District the day before the election. This dodger contained libelous statements about Rt. Hon. Sir R. Bond, Mr. Clift and himself and was meant to influence the electorate at the eleventh hour but at the declaration of the polls it was quite evident that the plot had failed. He also showed in a humorous way how road board money was distributed in Twillingate a few days prior to the elections. He (Mr. J.) would not take a scat in the Legislature if he did not get there by honest and honourable means. He then dealt with the estimates. He took objection to the difference in the salaries paid to light house keepers and showed how some of the over-worked keepers were given the smallest salaries; he also showed how couriers and other public servants in the district he represented were underpaid for their work. Besides measures should be adopted to prevent fraud at the light houses. Reference was made to the demoralizing system of allocating special grants to private individuals and of the paying of extra amounts to officials who were already drawing fat salaries. The Minister of Public Works was a friend to some fishermen as he had allocated money for making roads to fishing stages and flakes, this he (Mr. J.) considered a wrongful expenditure.

Mr. Clapp said that for the past five years he had been looking for information concerning the grants and allocations voted for the district of St. Barbe although a representative of the district he was in the dark as to how it was being managed by the Government. He was powerless because he was an Opposition member. Often since the present administration came into power he visited the different Government departments seeking information and was always refused, being told by the clerk in charge that he (the clerk) was not allowed to divulge. He hoped that that matter would be considered and that such improper treatment, as referred to, would continue no longer.

Mr. Coaker.—The estimates showed that an annual grant of \$400 was allowed to Beaverton, Notre Dame Bay, where only 14 voters were living. This he contended was more for political expediency. He cited instances of how freely the public monies were floated around Bonavista Bay in October last; even money was given to individuals to repair their houses. He hoped that in future discretion would be exercised in giving out grants and that large expenditures previous to elections would cease. He referred to the dissatisfaction in connection with stipends of light house keepers and showed the

shortages on the delivery of coal for the light houses. In dealing with the tuberculosis grant he thought that the physician in charge was getting a decent stipend, but he abominated the paying of \$3,000 to a largely paid Government official for a piece of land in Waterford Valley to be used as a site for a sanatorium. He also objected to \$5,500 being paid on account of the S. S. Earl of Devon which was engaged in St. Barbe District during the elections distributing and collecting ballot boxes. The steamer was 55 days at the work, which should have been done in less than half that time, and was paid at the rate of \$100 a day. He again favoured an enquiry into the hospital, advocated an increase for our fire fighters in the city and hoped that free and compulsory education would be introduced.

Mr. Grimes.—He agreed to the increase in the Governor's salary but objected to it being raised \$4,000 to keep up social functions, as in those functions only a very small fraction of the people were interested. The increases in salaries would be better applied if given to the small salaried man. The Government was the largest employer of labour in the country, but paid smaller wages than any private concern. He believed that most of the Government positions were obtained by political pull and that certain officials had a lien on the Government and its members, which accounted for so many increases of salaries. He said that the Government should inaugurate a new system such as competitive examinations whereby a person would have to undergo a test of competency before entering the civil service. The present system had a demoralizing effect and was partly responsible for some of the defalcations that have taken place. He hoped that the Minister of Finance would fix the salaries of sub-collectors more indiscriminately.

Mr. Kent was the next speaker and endorsed the previous speaker in relation to competitive examinations. He was of the opinion that the remarks made by Mr. Grimes deserved more than a passing notice and should be given the most careful consideration of the Government. He believed that Mr. Grimes had laid his finger on the weak spot of the whole system of the civil service. The matter was a most essential one. Government positions were being filled by party supporters and remedial measures should be adopted, as emphasized by the last speaker. The time has come when offices in the public service should be filled by competent and efficient officials and not by irresponsibles and incompetents because of political influence. He suggested that before appointments take place a competitive test should be made as to a man's fitness and qualification. The same should apply to promotions in the civil service and not have men brought in from outside with no experience in the work of a department and thrust in over the heads of men who have been in the service for 20 or 30 years. He cited an instance of this in the Custom House. Defalcations have taken place in the service in connection with appointments and even the Postmaster General himself reports the incompetency of some of the hands under that department. The new system may look difficult at first but if commenced properly and based on the outside civil service it would work out all right.

The Prime Minister said it was impossible to introduce competitive examinations in this country owing to the insurmountable difficulties surrounding it. England, he said, has far surpassed but she has 100 years of education behind her. He was of the opinion that if the system was introduced in this country where we have just begun to get an elementary education, that the majority of our people would be prevented from ever getting a position in a Government office. Compulsory education was another system impossible to enforce, because it would mean the constant sending of our people to jail which would not be tolerated.

Mr. Kent said he agreed with the Prime Minister on compulsory education but did not think there was anything to retard the system of competitive examinations if properly experimented and given a fair test. It is true that the civil service examinations were the most difficult in England, but our examinations and tests could be made to suit our conditions. He believed that by entering upon such a system would give a greater impetus to education all over the country.

Mr. Coaker again expressed himself in favour of compulsory education. He was confident the people in the outports wanted the system. He again referred to the Earl of Devon episode and said that \$5,500 for distributing ballot boxes in one District was altogether too thin.

The Prime Minister in reply said that he at first thought the bill excessive but after getting a sworn statement from the master of the ship and the man in charge of the hall, boxes he felt assured that the steamer was delayed for weeks owing to stress of weather. The committee rose and the House adjourned till this afternoon.

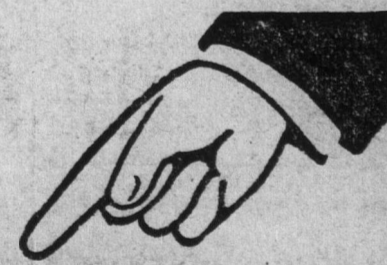

Wonderous Personages.

Kaiser William.
By GEORGE FITCH,

Author of "At Good Old Swash"
William the Second is emperor, Kaiser, business manager, peace-maker, press agent, general in chief, religious adviser and musical director of Germany. He lives in Berlin and elsewhere in 100 castles and several palaces, but, contrary to the general impression, he is never in more than one place at the same time.

He is fifty-three years old and his grandfather, but does not act like a grandfather. He only rests on alternate leap years on February 29th, and grows stouter each year. He assays more energy than any three other kings in Europe and more business energy than all of them put together. He is a combination of proud prelate, captain of industry, trust magnate, chutzvenepresident and inspirational poet. If he lived in America he would either be the head of the steel trust, the leader of the reactionaries, Bishop of the Lutheran church, president of the baseball league or editor of an uplift magazine.

Emperor William was brought up very carefully by his father, Emperor Frederick, who bequeathed him the German people when he died in 1888. At this time William was only 29 years old and Bismark, who had been running the empire for many years, tried to persuade him to keep his hands off the steering wheel. Shortly after this Emperor William placed Bismark in the tonneau, and telling him to hold on to his hat, he threw the country into high speed, where it has remained ever since. William has done all the driving without guide books or advice, and thus far has not run over anything except a few German people who have been so indiscreet as to sneeze in a suggestive and disrespectful manner in the presence of a German army officer.

Like all young men, Emperor William was greatly distrustful when he took over his country, and many people feared that he would assume too much authority. He has allayed this fear by assuming all authority and has not only run his country, but has reconstructed it from the navy down to his ideas on tango dancing. Germany has doubled in population and quadrupled in wealth since he began giving it orders every morning after breakfast.

Emperor William's diversion is hunting, and he is frequently fatal to as many as 500 pheasants in a day. He has a large family and is kind to his folks, but has thus far tried unsuccessfully to run his oldest son. It has been his only failure to date.

Cable News.

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.
Women citizens turned out in full strength yesterday, the first chance to register as voters.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 4.
Woman's Suffrage has been turned down in the Manitoba Legislature by a straight party vote of 23 to 12.

JOHANNISBURG, Feb. 4.
Aviator Brunelanger, yesterday, broke the world's record for endurance flight, remaining in the air 14 hours, 7 minutes, beating the French aviator's record 1912, of 628 miles in 13 hours, 18 minutes.

GLASGOW, Feb. 4.
Destructive fires, attributed to the suffragettes, have broken out in the Perthshire Village of Comrie, famous for its Roman ruins. The first outbreak was in the Aberuchille Castle. Many valuable paintings, with old furniture, were destroyed.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 4.
Conferring with President Huerta, the Minister of Foreign Affairs said that foreigners had nothing to fear; that if the United States lifted the embargo on arms it would not greatly help the rebels; but that what Mexico had most to fear was that the States would extend financial aid to the rebels.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.
Ambassador Spring Rice and Secretary Bryan yesterday discussed the proposed Anglo-American Peace Treaty on the Bryan plan; the principle of which has been approved by Britain. It is improbable that cessation of armaments will be included.

GLASGOW, Feb. 4.
Lloyd George, to avoid the suffragettes, stopped the train at Ruthven, six miles away, and motorcared here last night, to start his Land campaign. Hundreds of women were badly disappointed.

HALIFAX, Feb. 4.
The finding of the Wreck Commission's court as to the Cobeguid disaster, severely censures Capt. Howson, but on account of the very efficient and satisfactory manner in which everything was carried out on board for the safety of the passengers and crew, after the stranding does not deal with his certificate.

LIMA, Feb. 4.
The President, Billinghurst, of Peru, has been taken prisoner by the revolutionist General Varela. The Premier and Minister of War were killed in a sharp fight which ensued. Dr. Durand, former revolutionary leader, has taken possession of the Palace. It is generally believed that he will form a new Government. One civilian was killed. Banks and stores are closed, and private residences barricaded. The President will be expelled.

LONDON, Feb. 4.
Commenting on the President's proclamation removing the embargo on the exportation of arms to Mexico, the Telegraph declares the measure unparalleled in modern history, and equivalent to a recognition of the rebels as belligerents, creating the precedent that the President hoped to avoid. The flight of Americans from Mexico would, perhaps, be wise, says the Telegraph, for a man who fought his way to power over the corpse of his predecessor is not to be trifled with.
