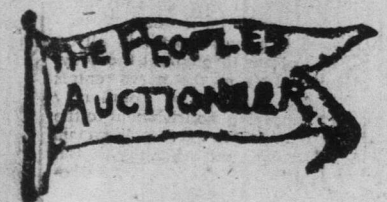

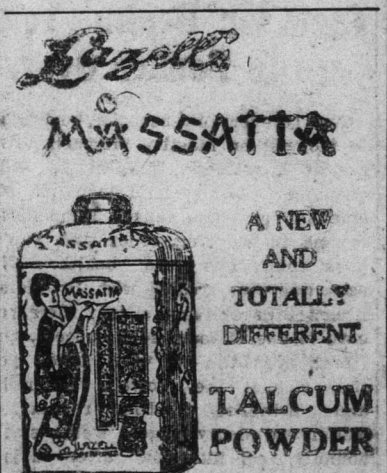

Must Have Peace This Year.

Declare Nation Cannot Fight After August Without Ruin.

London, Jan. 25.—The Daily Telegraph has the following from Leonard Spray, its correspondent at Rotterdam:

"Important news reaches me from a reliable source. Recently a meeting of the directors of the Deutsche Reichsbank, the Schaffhausen Bankverein and other great banking institutions in Germany discussed the financial situation and came to the conclusion that it was impossible for Germany to remain at war after the end of next August without being faced by economic ruin."

"This does not mean that by that time the Germans will be at the end of their resources for continuing the war. But the bankers made it clear to the Government that if hostilities keep up after that date, there will not be left a sufficient margin of money for the Empire to be able to resume its economic life after peace is declared."

"The great representatives of German finance are bringing tremendous pressure to bear upon the Government to conclude peace before it becomes necessary to entrench upon this monetary margin, which must be kept intact if Germany is to resume its commercial and industrial existence after the war."

"And if such terms are refused, then, all financial considerations will be disregarded, the militarists will have their way, the war will be continued on a paper basis and Germany will continue to fight, hellish of everything."

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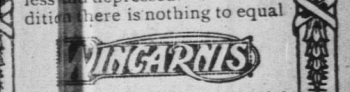

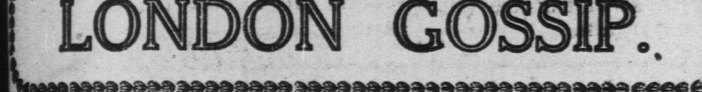

LONDON GOSSIP.

HONORS FOR BRITISH BUSINESS LEADERS.

The feature of the New Year's Honours List is the number of business men decorated by titles for war services. Among the baronets are Sir George Bulloch, of the well known engineering firm; A. A. Booth, chairman of the Cunard Company, who won a larger fame as Lloyd George's "push and go" man; Richard Hartridge, of Harrod's Stores; and A. T. Tarrow, the shipbuilder, once of Harlow, now of the Clyde. The only war honor for active service in the honours list is the baronetcy given to Vice Admiral Sir Frederic Sturdee, whose name is translated from the Admiralty back to the fleet and his victory over the Spanish fleet at the Falkland Islands is one of the major events of our naval war. There is some surprise that there are not more naval honours. Lord Charles Beresford's name excites much Parliamentary comment. Lord Charles's "offensive" to speak had a way of being very much so, and his advent in the House of Lords is awaited with curiosity. The names of letters figure in the list, except, of course, Dr. George Adam Smith, who, apart from his more important works, has written a Scots romance in his life of Henry Drummond. But music is acknowledged through the knighthood to Thomas Chubb, a Journalist, is honored, through the proprietary side, through the name of William Waldorf Astor, the proprietor of the "Observer," and Sir Alexander Henderson, the chief promoter of the "Standard." But the honours were doubtless given on other grounds. The most interesting honours, however, are the Privy Counsellorships given to Will Crooks and George N. Barnes. There are now six men who have been workmen and members of Parliament

PARLIAMENTARY MEMBERS OF MILITARY AGE.

A question which will arouse searches of heart in very few quarters is to be put to the Prime Minister on January 11th as to whether, by virtue of his election to the House of Commons, a man of military age can claim to be exempt from liability to military service; and, if not, whether, in the event of the present measure of compulsion becoming law, such members will be enrolled automatically in their respective groups. The reply will show that, while members of Parliament, as such, are not included in the list of exemptions, very few among them of military age have failed to respond to their country's call. For the small remainder the answer will be necessary, but one has not yet been seen given. A Parliamentary member, though it would create a decided sensation if worn for example, on the Treasury Bench.

A KITCHENER STORY.

An amusing story which does not seem to have got into print yet is being told about Lord Kitchener. It concerns a famous recruiting poster, issued some time ago, with an appeal in his handwriting for more men and yet more men. He had of course to write the original appeal from which the facsimile on the poster was made, and he did so, and it went to the Department concerned with such things. His writing was found to be too small for poster size reproduction, so the sheet was sent back to him with a cautious explanation in this sense, and the request would be written. small, and he wrote it a third time, and with that third draft sent that grimly humorous message—"Don't ask me to write this again, for rather than do it I'll have conscription!"

THE CZAR'S BATON.

Although the Czar, appointed as a New Year honor to be a Field Marshal of the British Army, is the only foreign monarch possessing the traditional baton, His Imperial Majesty has a brother Continental Sovereign holding high rank in the service. This is the King of Spain, who is a British General as well as Colonel-in-Chief of the 16th Lancers, just as the Emperor of Russia is the titular head of the Royal Scots Greys. Since the beginning of the war King Alfonso has been the only foreigner holding honorary rank in our Army. There are three honorary officers in the senior Service, the Czar being an Admiral of the Fleet, and the Kings of Norway and Sweden being Admirals, our Ally in the East being thus associated from the beginning of 1916 with the two Services which are fighting the cause for which his own Navy and Army are battling.

TRENCH JOURNALISM.

Many sidelights on the sentiments of the men who are fighting our battles are to be obtained in the regimental periodical sheets in which the literary talent of the ranks expresses itself. The British Museum authorities, I understand, are buying themselves to obtain a complete collection of these publications as possible, and, indeed, they may prove of more value to the future historian intent upon an accurate presentation of the psychology of our times than documents of more pretentious purpose. Some of the regimental publications are in print, others are in typewritten manuscript, but the prevailing tone amongst them is cheerful, sometimes maintained under difficult circumstances. Many of them have vivid picturesque names such as "The Strafe," the "Searchlight," the "Billie Doan," and the "Listening Post." The French soldier, as well as the British, has his passion for camp journalism. One group of literary young Frenchmen, amidst the excitement and perils of the trenches on the Western front, some time ago through one of their number solicited a contribution from that greatest of living French stylists, M. Anatole France. The Academician not only wrote to them, but he thought so much of the incident that he commemorated it in a book which he has published.

WAR AND LITIGATION.

On the whole the British Law Courts are opening the new year with their work, pretty well up to date. I am told that one of the circumstances which is now affecting the course of legal proceedings is the growing tendency of litigants to settle their dispute out of court just as the action would come on for hearing. At that stage they are beginning to learn something of the case which the other side has, and as the costs of the unsuccessful party are a more serious item in these times of financial stress than they formerly were the stubbornness of litigious pride more readily bends itself to a compromise. This tends to ease the case list. Another factor in the same direction is the absence of essential witnesses on military service. So great a hindrance did this cause in the prosecution of criminal proceedings that special legislation has been passed to deal with the taking of evidence. But in civil actions the Judges are showing a tendency to favor the postponement of the hearing. On the other hand the war has been directly responsible for an increase of litigation in certain directions. Shipping may be mentioned as one of those branches, but certain matters connected with enemy trading and with probate are also responsible for an increased flow of work.

A GOOD TIME FOR DRAPERS.

Despite the repeated appeals for economy the women folk do not appear to have abated their desire to be well dressed. Generally speaking the drapers with the exception of the high-class firms, have had a good year, and now that they have had an opportunity of comparing the results of the Christmas and New Year trade with those for previous years it is admitted that business with most of them during December has been quite as good as in former times. Many firms even acknowledge that trade has been of record dimensions. While the retailers of women's wear are benefitting by the greater spending ability of women and the inexorable demands of fashion, the men's wear dealers have different tales to tell. With an Army approaching four million men it is obvious that their business must be quiet. Fortunately the decreased turnover in men's wear goods has to some extent been counterbalanced by a greatly increased demand for boys' and youths' clothing. The main trouble with both drapers and clothiers at the present time is to get the desired supplies in

good time. The odd farthing at London drapery shops is an old established institution, and customers have become so used to being asked to accept a small packet of pins in lieu of the change that the latest farthing's worth may come as a surprise. Instead of the coin or the pins, a printed envelope, containing three highly colored picture postcards, further supplies of which are offered at a penny a packet, is now being preferred by certain drapers. It is extremely unlikely, however, that many customers will wish to purchase those further supplies, but will instead insist on their change in coin of the realm in future, for the cards all bear the old familiar words, "Printed in Germany." It might have been thought that by this time the stock of German postcards in this country had become exhausted, but evidently such is not the case, and drapers are endeavoring to dispose of them in the method indicated.

NEW PEERS AND THE REGALLA.

It will be interesting to see whether in these days of war economy any of the newly created Peers will go to the expense of purchasing the full regalia of their ranks in the Peerage. The principal item in the bill is of course the coronet, which the owner may not have a single opportunity of wearing during the rest of his life. The market price of a coronet of 18-carat gold, together with a jewelled cushion, is about 450 guineas, and this, if of first quality, would last not only one but a dozen lifetimes. In the case of the Viscountess of Lord Mersey and Sir John French the coronet is surrounded by 15 small pearls, whereas those of the new Barons—the lowest rank in the Peerage—are set with six large ones. Another expensive item in the new Peers' equipment is the robe of scarlet and ermine, the cost of which varies from £40 to £50. This is a necessary investment, seeing that it has to be worn when the recently elevated commoner makes his debut in the Upper Chamber. The particular rank in the Peerage is denoted by the number of bars of ermine which traverse the robe from back to front, and it is a curious fact that these strips of ermine, which appear to divide the mantle, are supposed to indicate that it has been torn whilst the wearer was engaged in mortal combat on the field of battle. Another 50 guineas or more has also to be forthcoming in order to satisfy the fees required by the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the Crown for the patent of nobility and for the preparation of crests and other armorial bearings.

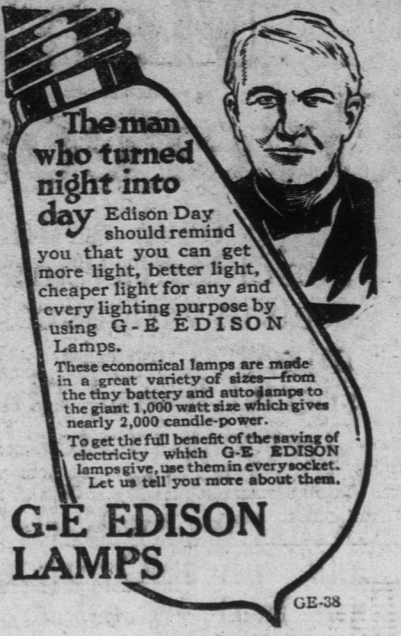

Our New Standard Two Battalions.

The Government has authorized the raising of two battalions of the Newfoundland Regiment with the necessary recruits. For some time we have urged on the Government the desirability of taking this step, and we glad to see that the Government is the only body that could authorize the taking of such a step, and it will be now up to the young men of the country to respond to the call. The standard set is high as regards what we have done in the other Dominions. In proportion to population that standard has already been reached and passed in Canada, and Australia has now set before herself the task of doing as well as we have done in New Zealand. This is about four times the standard of enlistment which our Government has authorized. It is clear then that the standard is quite moderate when compared with that of the other Dominions, and it is particularly so as compared with the 4,000,000 standard which is set up by Parliament for Great Britain. It is attempted to measure up to that standard, we should be placing before ourselves the task of raising three times as many men as it is proposed shall be the Newfoundland land force strength. It must be apparent then that the standard is moderate, but moderate as it is, it will require great effort to attain it by the end of the present year. Roughly speaking it means getting as many men together during that time as have joined the colors since the war commenced. That will be no mean task. But it is a task which must be faced and carried out, if Newfoundland is to hold up her head and carry herself with proper pride and patriotism among our kin across the seas.

More Patriotic Events Contemplated.

Encouraged by the success that attended their efforts in the patriotic hockey matches on Thursday night last, we understand that the promoters are contemplating the holding of another event for the benefit of the W. P. A. Fund before the season draws to a close. In all probability the programme will consist of a series of races; a hockey match between a picked team of the "has-beens" and seven of the best present League players, and lastly but by no means least, a lady's concert.

Carter, Fox, Herder, Hunt, Baine, and Steele have been promoted to the rank of Lieutenants, dating from Oct. 15th, 1915. Mr. W. H. Greene has been appointed to the temporary rank of Captain of the Second Battalion of our Regiment.

Recognizing One's Self.

A friend of mine who has slightly sub-normal sight, but much more than the normal sense of humor, delights to tell this story on herself. As she approached a doorway in a department store one day, another woman approached from the opposite direction. Miss H. (my friend) stepped to the right, the woman did the same. Miss H. then stepped to the left, her vis-a-vis was seized with the same inspiration at the same moment. After repeating this dodging twice, my friend thought it was time to put an end to the misunderstanding, so she stood perfectly still and said with rather chilly politeness:

"Madame, if you will stay on one side or the other perhaps we can manage to pass each other."

Whereupon the floorwalker bore down upon her and explained that she was standing in front of a mirror. She ought to know what she looks like by this time.

Miss H. is a woman of fifty. In spite of her near-sightedness, which is by no means extreme, it does seem as if she ought to know her own appearance well enough to recognize herself by this time, doesn't it?

And yet, when you stop to think of it, is her inability to recognize her physical self any more remarkable than the common inability to recognize one's character self? Think how many, many people there are who live with themselves for a lifetime without seeming to have the slightest ac-

quaintance with that inner self. Everyone but himself expects Him to be late.

For instance, I know a man who is always late. He never will bestir himself until the last moment when hurry will not save him; he never will allow quite enough time to reach a place. Other people recognize this falling, and count upon it in making appointments with him. If it is necessary to have him at any place at a particular time they specify a time a half hour earlier, knowing that is the only way to be sure. One would think that he, having had more experience with himself than anyone else, would realize that he is always late and expect it of himself. On the contrary, he is perennially surprised when he fails to get anywhere on time. He arrives breathless from his last-minute hurrying and assures you that he fully expected to be there in plenty of time, but that some unforeseeable accident kept him.

She Doesn't Know That She Is Super-Cautious.

Again, take the case of a certain woman who is abnormally cautious. Over and over again circumstances have proved her caution unnecessary, and yet she never learns to discount her fears. Indeed she has never been persuaded to admit that she is unusually cautious. I doubt if she realizes it. If she could see herself in a character mirror she would never recognize herself.

When we think how constantly we have to be with ourselves, how, in fact, day in, day out, through all the long years, we cannot get away from ourselves for a minute except when we are asleep (small wonder that people who suffer excessively from insomnia sometimes go insane), it certainly does seem as if we ought to get better ac-

aid of a horse-clipper into a very fair imitation of a lion. For all his vast size and strength, the mastiff is kindly in disposition and will not fight, unless it is absolutely necessary. Owing to his long wheel base and heavy body, he is no match for the bulldog or the collie, but like many another big bluff, his size keeps him from being imposed upon to any great extent.

The mastiff is used mainly as a decoration and as a plaything for children, being very durable and not easily broken by careless handling. If a mastiff can be trained to sleep before the staircase, he makes a very valuable protection against burglars, who almost invariably waken the family while trying to climb over him. In Belgium, mastiffs are used as dray horses, thus being placed on the same social plane as Belgian women, and it is most interesting to see the faithful beast and the faithful wife hauling the loving husband home from market in a cart, the dog's feet being carefully protected by small shoes and the women's by their tough skin.

Mastiffs do not cost much when bought and can be boarded for less than the cost of boarding three hired men. Five or six pounds of meat will keep a mastiff contented and happy for several hours.

Irish Paper Will Support Redmond

New York, Jan. 26.—A weekly periodical, Ireland, one of whose professional objects is to champion the cause of John Redmond and his Irish Parliamentary party, has recently been established in New York. The first number appeared a short time after Daniel Boyle of Manchester, England, who represents North Mayo, an Irish constituency, in the British Parliament, had visited here.

On his recent trip, Mr. Boyle conferred with men active in the United Irish League, it is understood, about founding the new paper.

"Ireland will be first of all loyal to the Irish people, whose stand in the present war is exemplified by John Redmond, said J. C. Walsh, secretary of the Ireland publishing company. "Because he is standing by the British Government some of the Irish papers in this country have recently ceased their support of Redmond. The new periodical hopes to help convince Americans that the great body of Irishmen is loyal to Great Britain."

"However, the primary object of Ireland is not political. The home rule bill has been passed and will be in effect in a few years. We want the second and third generations of the Irish in this country to know something of the art, music, literature and history of the country of their fathers. Be assured, we shall not tempt them to waver in their Americanism. Ireland is not a paper for hyphenates."

The initial number of Ireland contained "A New Year's Greeting," from Mr. Redmond. "Your journal," he says, "will fulfill a most valuable and patriotic duty if it reflects in its columns what is really happening here at home on the soil of Ireland."

THE NEW CHARTER.

No, the only court to pass judgment on this New Charter is the Citizenship of St. John's, who are directly affected by its proposals. To that end it is but just and fair that the New Charter should be published, so that the people may obtain some idea of the plans which the Civic Commission recommends for the welfare of the City. If it is not published now, it will be March before it comes up for discussion in the House, and may be "read" through before we know where we are.

Now I am not saying this to embarrass the Civic Commission, nor from any opposition I feel towards their work, which undoubtedly has taken a great deal more time than any former Councilors ever gave to the work. No one knows what the New Charter contains. It may be good, it may be bad, it may be, alas, indifferent. At any rate, it will be of no real value if the citizens of St. John's do not endorse it, and I think the request for its publication is a reasonable one. If the Commission have no authority to publish it, let them ask the Government to do so.

In most cities a referendum is taken on such a vitally important question. How our House of Assembly can fully decide it for the City of St. John's I cannot see. However, let us first have the New Charter published.

CIVIC FINANCES.

Shot Through Ankle.

Writing to his mother from the Canadian Hospital, Cairo, Private John J. Mosler, of the East End, who was wounded when the Gallipoli Peninsula was being evacuated, states that he was shot in the ankle by a sniper. The bullet entered the flesh on one side of the leg and came out at the other. There were no stretchers about at the time and he had to be carried on a stretcher-bearer's back for over a mile. He lost much blood and became very weak. At first it was feared that amputation would be necessary, but by the skilful treatment of the doctors and nurses the leg was saved. Private Mosler speaks in appreciative terms of the many kindnesses extended to him while in hospital. At the time of writing he was improving rapidly. He expected soon to be sent to Ayr, Scotland. 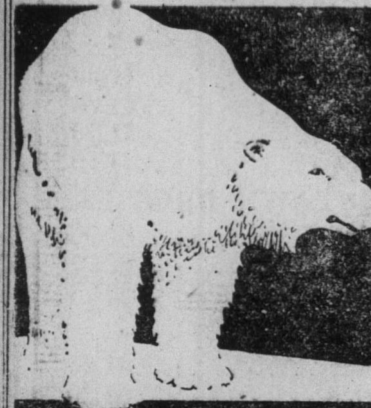


