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

In torpedoing hospital ships combatants are not attacked, but defenceless, persons, wounded, who have been mutliated and paralyzed by shell fire, women who have been devoting themselves to works of mercy and charity, men whose only weapons are such as do not take the enemy's life, but help to preserve it and to alleviate his sufferings.




