#### AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE STANDARDIZATION OF CODFISH!

WHEREAS it is essential in the interests of the Colony that the methods of preparing and experting codfish which are at present in use should be regulated and improved;

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council and House Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:-1. There shall be a Commission to be appointed by His Exency the Governor-in-Council, which shall be known as the Codfish Standardization Commission.

2. The said Commission shall consist of not less than five or more than eleven persons, of whom the Minister of Marine and Fisheries shall be one, ex officio, and shall be the Chairman.

3. It shall be the duty of the said Commission to prepare and draft rules and results for the said Commission to prepare and draft rules and regulations for the improvement of the manner in which salt codish (hereinafter called 1sh) is prepared for sale and transported, and in particular governing the following matters, that is to say:

(1) The manner of catching, splitting, cleaning, salking, drying, curing, pickling and preparing fish for sale and export; and generally, all and singular the operations involved in the preparation of salt codfish, from the catching of the fish to the production of the finished article.

(2) The culling, selecting, assorting, standardizing, and determination of the different types or varieties of fish, with a view to the establishment of grades thereof in the local and foreign markets and to the ensuring, so far as pos sible, of suitability for the several markets.

sible, of suitability for the several markets.

(3) The stowage, storage, packing, inspection, and weighing of fish and marketing of packages.

(4) The lading, stowage, protection, dunnageing covering, and all other matters connected with the carriage and conveyance of fish whether within this Colony or from this Colony to other countries, and whether in ships, venicles, or any other modes of conveyance.

(5) The establishments of standards of the standards of (5) The establishments of standards of size, type, condition, grade and quality of fish, and the means of determining

and enforcing the same. (6) The fixing of differences between the prices of different sizes, types, conditions, grades, and qualities in the local markets, and the provision of methods for accurately de-termining such sizes, types, conditions, grades and qualities.
(7) The fixing of panalties for the breach of any of the rules

and regulations to be made as aforesaid. Specific penal-ties shall be fixed for breach of each particular rule and regulation.

4. All such rules and regulations shall be laid before His Excellency the Governor-in-Council for approval, and if when so approved and published in the Royal Gazette shall at the expiration of 15 days from the date of the Proclamation have the force and

effect of Law if incorporated in this Act.

5. This Act may be cited for all purposes as "The Fish Standardization Act, 1920."

In old engravings the bat is represented as crooked, and as the Saxon word for a crooked stick was "cricce" we may fairly assume that the game got its namé in this way. This crooked weapon of defence was probably borrowed from a game known as "bandy," when wickets were introduced in place of a block-hole (1 ft. in diameter, 7 in. deep), which could be guarded with a club.

A Chaplain's Diary.

Coming to a much later period, very definite and in some instances interesting references to cricket by its modern name are to be observed. One of the earliest is from the "Diary of Henry Teonge," chaplain on board His Majesty Charles II.'s ships Assistance, Bristol, and Royal Oak, A.D. 1675-1679:-

This morning early (6th May 1676), as is the custom all the summer long, at least 40 of the English, with his Worship the Consul, rode out of the city (Antioch) about four miles, to a fine valley by a river side, to recreate themselves. There a princely tent was pitched, and we had several pastimes and sports, as duck-hunting, fishing, shooting, hand-ball, and cricket, and then a noble dinner brought thither, with great plenty of all sorts of wines, punch and lemon-ade; and at 6 we all returned home in good order, but soundly tired and

There is a reference to cricket in a remarkable book written by a nephew of John Milton in 1685. The title of the book is remarkable, at least: 'Mysteries of Love and Eloquence, or he Art of Wooing and Compliment Sports, Drolls, the Witchcrafts of fore I saw thee"



#### If True, Why Make Others Pay?

(Western Star.)

The Telegram on the 19th inst., editorally states that a West Coast erchant refused to pa/ the extra charges demanded by the Food Control Board on a quantity of sugar he had imported from Canada. That "a "deadlock ensued for some little time, which, however, was broken by "threats of certain legal proceedings, "and ultimately the sugar was le-"leased, and the consumers saved the

"extra cost." The public would like to some further information on this matter. In the first place who was the merchant, and "are the consumers saved the additional cost?" If one sugar importer was permitted

to obtain his shipment of sugar without having to pay the extra charges, why should others be compelled to pay from two to three cents a pound extra, thus setting up unfair competition or giving one merchant an opportunity to make a big rakeoff? We do not condemn the importer who put up the strong fight and won out, providing he is giving ihs customers the full benefit of the result; but rather we would congratulate him for the interest he has manifested in the behalf of those he is endeavoring to serve. But we do demand that if privileges have been extended to one, they shall likewise be extended to all, and the trade owes it to those upon whom they depend to purchase their me, handise to see to it that their customers are not victimised.

(The Telegram can vouch for the truth of its statement, as quoted above, and begs to inform its Western contemporary that the consumers were saved the additional cost on the shipment of sugar referred to. The matter is now public property and it should not be difficult for the Western Star to discover the identity of the Port aux Basques importer who kicked against the decree of the Food Control Board and won out. #### Port aux Basques.

TO BE PORT OF ENTRY FOR MAIL PARCELS.

(Western Star.)

The Railway Commission, accompanied by Hons. H. J. Brownrigg, G. Shea and W. W. Halfyard, went west by special train on Wednesday evening and returned east again on Saturday morning. While west they visited the coal areas of the Reid Nfld. Co. at South Branch, and those of the St. George's Coal Fields at Robinson's, looked over the location for a railway from the latter property, and visited Port aux Basques for the purpose of selecting a site for the proposed new freight sheds at that place. In conversation at Port aux Basques on Friday morning, we were told the new sheds would extend from the present old one to the railway office. That new quarters would be provided or the Customs and for the handling of express and baggage. And that provision is to be made for the examining and assessing of parcels by post for the West and South Coasts at Port aux Basques, instead of, as at present, being conveyed to St. John's for examination and assessment. This last announcement will be hailed with delight by the people of the West and South Coasts, who in the past have often been placed to much inconvenience through the long delay in the transit of mail parcels from Canada. It was in the year 1900 that the present manager of the Western Star first took up the matter with the then Postmaster General. Since then we have repeatedly advocated this reform, and the late Postmaster General, Dr. Robinson, gave the project considerable support. We also took the matter up with the Customs Dept. and were assured the support of that Department, whenever the Executive Government choose to give the matter consideration. It has always appeared as needless expense and delay to transport mail parcels intended for this section of the country all the way across country and back agan, incurring extra carriage of a thousand miles, besides the delay in going and coming, as well as that often caused by the congestion of the examining end, while ex press packages confe in and are delivered wherever there is an express office. And not only the South and West Coasts will benefit by the proposed innovation, for by putting it into operation will relieve the tax on space and officials at St. John's, and thus enable the handling of mail parcels with greater facility. We would also suggest that similar arrangements be made for mail parcels from this country to Canada. We fail to see any logical reason why these should be subjected to the delay of transmission


