for the best line, but that line in their estimation is the broad gauge—the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway -and not the road projected by a few grain dealers in Toronto, who want to make the North-west tributary to that city, so that it may enjoy a monopoly of the trade. We can assure the Globe that it is much more sanguine about the building of the narrow gauge than its promoters who were in Normanby last week, and who left that Township terribly chagrined over their acknowledged defeat.

The Leader is more honest than the Globe when discussing this railway question. Not so deep in the confidence of Laidlaw, Chisholm & Co., it is more outspoken, and does not hesitate even to tell those gentlemen where they have done wrong, and to point out the reason why the narrow guage enterprise has failed. It admits that a great deal of importance was attached to the action of Normandy by the Toronto schemers, and that their failure in that Township, coming so close on the heels of the refusal of Bentinck and Glenelg to submit By-laws to the ratepayers, and the defeat of the Bylaw in Sullivan, has had a very depressing influence on the promoters of the "direct" line. It candidly confesses that the scheme has been badly managed, that the men who have been agitating for it began at the wrong end, that "the bonuses of the Townships ought to have been made subsidiary to the stock-taking of capitalists who by their deeds would have shown their faith in the undertaking. Instead of this natural proceeding, the bonuses were made the basis of the whole enterprise, and the promoters of the road have not been able satisfactorily to show how the money is tojbe obtained with which to build it." Here the Leader has hit the nail on the head. The farmers of the Northwest look upon the whole scheme as a ALBION HOTEL. huge speculation in which the Toronto men are vitally interested, but upon to men are vitally interested, but upon the success of which they are not willing to risk a shilling of their own. They want to bleed the Townships, but when the hat is passed round for their own subscriptions they quietly put it aside. This is the reason why the farmers have, as the Leader says, " regarded these men with suspicion' this is one great reason, we may add, why they failed in Normanby.

But the Leader does not stop here in its plain speaking to these narrow gauge schemers. Another great mistake in the undertaking, it says, was in selecting the insignificant narrow gauge, which would be found unequal to the rapidly growing wants of the rich and prosperous country to the north of us. This is quite true, for you cannot convince the business men and farmers of these townships that the narrow gauge is anything else but a miserable, temporary makeshift, and of little more practical value than a

of little more practical value than a tramway.

The Leader closes the case by stating that another—and we may add the strongest—reason why the narrow gauge enterprise has failed, is that it "has too much borne the appearance of a 'ring." Never were truer words spoken. It was lobbied through the legislature by this "ring," and it has been promoted and advocated all through by this same "ring," who stick at no falsehoods or misrepresentations if they can only carry their purpose. The people north are now beginning to see through the machinations of this precious "ring." They are no longer believed or trusted, even by their former friends. We freely endorse the opinion of the Leader that these men will not be able to recover the mistakes (wilful ones we would say) they have made. We have still to advert to the Telegraph's views on this subject, but we must defer it for a day or two.
