Presbytery of Guelph. Galt Revival Case Once More.

Petition for a Third Congregation in Galt Thrown Out.

WEDNESDAY, May 12th.
The Presbytery met this morning at ten oʻlock. The attendance of visitors was small. After the Presbytery had been constituted a petition was presented signed by 79 members and 25 adherents of Knox Church, Galt, praying to be allowed to form themselves into a new congregation, for the reason that for the last five months they had not been satisfied with the teaching of the Rev. Mr. Smith.

The Moderator asked if there was any one present who had anything to say in support of the petition.

Mr. Jas. McMillan urged a few words on its behalf.

Mr. Burnett said there were a good many besides those who had signed the memorial that were not satisfied, but they had refained from appending their names, as they expected the Presbytery at its present meeting would grant them a remedy.

Rev. Mr. Smellie wanted a little additional light from the petitioners; he wished them to explain more fully the grounds of their dissatisfaction.

Rev. Mr. Cameron wanted to know if the names were placed there voluntarily by the parties, or if they had been canvassed.

Mr. Robson answered that it had not; those only had been asked to sign who were known to be dissatisfied.

Rev. Mr. Ball had heard of the petition sometime ago. He had thought the matter over, and was prepared to announce promptly the course he thought best. It was to meet the petitioners in a kindly spitit and to exhaust all kindness upon them to induce them to withdraw the memorial. One charge had been made directly contrary to fact, that was that the pulpit of Knox Church, Galt, had been occupied by Mrs. Neddham. The memorial could not be accepted on the grounds that there was no mention made of an additional congregation being required in Galt, there was no want of accommodation nor any deficiency of the means of grace. He thought there were too few of them to make a congregation; and hoped they would give the matter a second thought. The Rev. gentleman them moved the following resolution: That inasmuch as the memorial contains substantive charges against Mr. Smith, it be not received.

Mr. McMillan said the memorial had been duly considered. The petitioners were willing to incur a heavy burden for the support of a new congregation. Up to the first of last October he had been highly satisfied with Mr. Smith, but since that time he has not been satisfied. Nevertheless he remained until the first meeting of the Presbytery, and until after Mr. Smith in the statement then he (Mr. Mc-Millan) was wrong, and had read his Bible wrong. The memorial had been brought calmly, and if not received this time it would be brought again. No matter about the wording the reasons expressed in it are all right. All the petitioners wanted was to be allowed to step quietly to one side, and he thought they were taking an honourable way of accomplishing their purpose. They can build a church, and don't want anything from anybody.

The following letter has been received from Mr. William Stirton, who removed from the County of Bruce during last autumn to the State of Kansas. Mr. Stirton is a brother of our member, and a native of this town. His description of the country to which he has removed will therefore be perused with interest by many of our readers.

Kansas, April 25th, 1869.

. Kansas, April 25th, 1869. DEAR BROTHER,—Yours of a late date is received. I regret to learn that times are somewhat dull in my native country, and also to learn that the winter is being felt so severely in many sections in regard to the wintering of stock. We are very differently situated in this region. All small grains are already sown, and animals can make a good living on the prairie; in fact a good many have so lived all winter without other sustenance. You wish me to give my views, about this great country, and how I liked it. Of course my stay in it has yet bleen of but short duration, but I will state briefly my experience so far. The winter was considered to be one of the most severe ever experienced. We had very little snow, but one or two severe spells of frost, but they were of only two or three days duration, The wind is very cutting during such spells. A great deal of rain fell which makes it very difficult to move about, the soil being of a tough, sticky character. The coldest day reached 16 below zego—but the Spring commences much earlier than in Canada. The crops are all now looking remarkably well, the fall wheat covering the ground. I don't think that spring wheat and barley will do well in this region, but winter wheat, rye, oats and Indian corn are sure crops. Stock raising and feeding pay very well, and there is a good demand for all kinds of stock a remunerative prices. As for instance a neighbor of mine has just sold \$5000 worth of cattle and swine at seven cents per pound live weight. In my opinion this will be an immense producing region in the course of time. The appearance of the vast prairies is really grand. The belts of timber along the borders of the streams are almost lost to view from their low position, so you can see as far as the eye can reach undulating prairie studded with wild roses and prairie flowers, making the air fragrant with their perfume. But this grand natural panorams will soon have to give way to the cultivated fields and husy hunnts of men, thouse the summer of the produce of the strea

Hogg vs. JEFFREX.

A case was tried at the Simcoe Assizes, before Chief Justice Richards, on Wednesday, which has excited considerable interest in Guelph. The action was brought by Mr. John Hogg, our well-known dry goods merchant, against Mr. Geo. Jeffrey, of the Bradford House, Guelph, to recover \$5,000 damages for breach, by Mr. Jeffrey, of an agreement for the purchase, by Jeffrey & Chance, of the stock of goods belonging to Mr. Hogg. The agreement was made on the 28rd Oct., 1867. It bound Jeffrey & Chance, to purchase all the goods which should be in Mr. Hogg's store on the 5th March, 1868, at cost prices—each to pay \$7,000 in cash to Mr. Hogg, and give notes for the balance with seven percent interest. Jeffrey and Chance were also to take a lease of the premises at \$1,200 per annum. The agreement contained a clause that if either Jeffrey or Chance failed in keeping the agreement, the defaulter should pay \$6,000 to Mr. Hogg, as settled and ascertained damages, and if Mr. Hogg failed on his part, he was to forfeit \$5,000, or \$2,500 to each.

It appeared in evidence that Mr. Hogg and Mr. Chance were ready on 5th March to perform their part of the bargain, but Mr. Jeffrey declined because Mr. Hogg refused to give a written guarantee that he would not start another dry goods business in Guelph in opposition to that which he was selling, for at least five years.

years. Mr. Jeffrey contended that such was the understanding at the time the bargain was made, though owing to the hurried way in which the writings were prepared it was omitted.

Mr. Hogg called Mr. Chance and a number of witnesses to show that he had sustained an actual loss of over \$5000 by Mr. Jeffrey's refusing to carry out the bargain. But this evidence was considerably shaken upon cross examination. Able eddresses were made by counsel, and after a careful charge from the judge the jury returned a verdict for plaintiff for \$500 damages. The parties consented that leave should be reserved to the plaintiff to apply to the full court at Toronto to increase the verdict to \$5,000, being the amount of damages fixed by the agreement, it the court should think that part of the agreement was binding.
