The Progress of Oddfellowship.
On Monday evening, 11th inst., the weekly meeting of the Grand Encampment, 1. O. O. F., Hamilton, was rendered unusually interesting by the presence of several distinguished visitors, who at the close were ontertained at dinner in the Commercial Hotel by the Hamilton brethren. The Pacific Railway.
