## Current trade conditions.

 ontario.DUllonfss is the leading characteristic of the matket this week. Pine men state, however, that there has been more inquiry for their goods, but whether it means an imniediate forward movement it is hard to tell. They trust, however, that it signifies good sales in the near fnture, and a partial clearing out of stocks, which are so large as to fill up piling ground to an unusual extent. Prices, however, do not show any sign of advancing. In hardwood there is no movement and quotations are nominal.

QUEREC ANI NRW BRUNSWICK.
The outlook for spruce is mole favorable, and there is a prospect of a good demand for United States consumption this fall. The droupht has seriously cripHed the Maine mills, and there is littl: danker of spiuce men in the lower provirces having to send forward consignments for sale, the actual requirements of dealers being such as to take about all they will be able to supply. One of the best mill men in Neva Scotia has a choice lot of two inch spruce plank, sawed specially for the Boston market, which he expects to close out at $\$ 1_{13}$ a thousand. That figure is about the ruling price for Boston random. Choice good widths and long lengths will bring $\$ 16.50$ delivered in New York. From all appearances there is going to be an unusually large cut of spruce logs in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia the coming winter. Mill men have been giving closer study to the castern market, and will cut lumber next season better adapted for that trade, and will therefore compete more vigorously with the New England mills. Wages are probably lower in the provinces, and there being no duty, the lumber can be produced cheaperin Canada. The United States men appear to be afraid of the competition, and if Canadian lumbernen take adrantage of conditions, they can probably work up a good trade. At present prices have not advanced, in fact there is a good deal of cutting.
reitisil convarbia.
Trade is decidedly loohing up, the boom in South Africa having given an impetus to shipments. Puset Sound has, perhaps, reaped the greater part of the benefit so far, and it is well for the 13.C. lumbermen to be careful, for the general impression is that the boom will not last long, and someborly stands to lose heavily when the present rush is over. The mills are busy. The Moodyville mill has again started,
and the Hastings mill has been cuting full time all season. Wholesale dealers report that fairly large orders are being received from the interior, and as this was not looked for it is encouraging. A number of prominent members of the Vancouver board of trade have left for Kootenay, in an attempt to capture some of the trade. As the Canadian Pacific Railvay have given the same rate from Victoria to the interior as from Vancouver, the chances of trade are equal between the two cities. Hopefulsess is seen on all hands and the prospect is encouraging.

## united states.

The reports from the great lumber centres vary considerably in tone this week. October trade shows a sensible improvement over September, which latter was certainly disappointing. Chicago shows the greatest ddvance, due to activity in building operations. The figures for building in that city for the first nine months of the year show an increase of ten per cent. over the corresponding period of 1894 , and it looks as if the improvement had come to stay. In the Northwestern States the improvement is not so marked. At Buffalo and Tonawanda there is a sensible increase in demand. In New Yolk buyers are cautious, and are willing 10 rick leaving in first hands till wanted. At Saginaw and Bay City buyers are inquiring more freely, the result doubtless of high freight rates from Lake Superior, but they look upon Michigan prices as too high, and are buying littie. In the west low prices for grain retards business. In the south cotton has advanced in price and the lumber business must be favorably affected. While there is a depression then in some districts, there is a decided gain in others, and the nutlook on the whole is cheering. White pine in the Lake Superior region is lower than last year, due to a variety of causes, one of them being the competition from Canadian lumber in the east. The demand for yellow pine in the west seems to have fallen off at present. Hemiock at Buffato and in Penusylvania shows considcrable strength. Spiuce is almost the same as last week. A large increase in shipments of Douglas fir from Puget Sound ports is. reported. In hardwood, september was behind expectations, not only in volume of business, but as :o prices. October so far shows some miprovement. Wholesalers are, however, buying cautiously. Oak sell ficely, for other woods the demand is only farr. In Bnffalo there was an increase of sales in September, but prices are 100 low. There is a scar-
city of cars on the Pactific coast, and red cedar shingles, which are wanted in the east, camot be got forward.

## foreign.

Farnworth \& Jardine's circular dated ist Oct., hives the arrivals from Brtush Nonth America for the month as $3 f$ vessels, 31,198 tons, as 1 gainst 27 vessels, $25,52 \mathrm{~S}$ tons last year. This shows a gratifying increase. There has been a vetter tone in business, and more inquiry, but values have not improved. Imports have been liberal and consumption satisfactory, but stocks are sufficient. Importations of wancy timber from Canada have been moderate, chiclly on contract and for inmediate consumption, with prices unchanged. Of square pine the import has been light, but sales are slow. Of red pine, stocks are light. First-class oak is asked for at slightly better prices, second class is hard to sell. Ash shows smallumports, poor demand and lower prices. In elm, prices are firm with only a moderate stock. There has been a falling off in itnports of pine deals, still stciks are 100 heavy, and values difficult to maintain. There has been a considerible increase in inports of spruce deals from the lower provinces. Prices are firmer. There were no importations of British Columbia fir. From other countries the arrivals have been moderate. Othei foreign makets indicate little change from last week.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

The Savanne Lumber Co. are looking for 75 men to goto the woods.
The Canada Lumber Co.'s millat Carleton Place has shut down for the season.
The Premier has arrived at Quebec from the Saguenay with a cargo of pulpwood.
Mr. W. C. Purves will begin mmediately the rebuilding of his mill at Carleton, N. B.
Russell, McDougall \& C.o.'s mill, at Black Brook, N. B., has shut down for the scason.
Mr. Guy Dyer, of Bristol, New Brunswick, is building a nill on the site of the one burned last spring.
The barges Huron and Bay City were at Parry Sound for lumber, but received orders to go to Cheboygan.
N. G. \& J. McKechnic, of Durham, Ont., have sold their stock of 200,000 fect of soft elm, to F. G. Rumble, London.
Baillie Bio.'s saw mill at Aylmer, P. Q., is nearing completion. It will give employment to about 60 men.
A Tilsbury firm have shipped the largest eim raft that ever crossed Lake St. Clair, there being 3,253 logs containing 700,000 lect.
Messrs. Larochr and Tremblay have a contract for 25,000 dealsfornext spring, and are erecting a saw mill on the north shore at Mille Vaches, Quebec.
Messis. J. O. Gilbert \& Son, of Bishop's Crossing, P. O., have closed a contract for sawing one millio:a feet of lumber for an American fim, to be cut this winter.

Lumber shippers at Ottawa are complaining of the scarcity of cars, which is said to be due to the heavy shipment of grain from Manitoba.
The liquidators of the St. Lawrence Lumber Co., Ltd., of Bathurst, N. B., are offering the estate for sale by tender. Be-
sides stocks of goods, mill supplies, rafting material, vessels, etc., there is the license to cut $105^{1,4}$ sq. miles of limuts on the Caraquet river and tributaries.
The Bank of Montreal has made extenswe repairs to its mill property at Loggieville, N. S. A new wharf has been built to facilitate shopments.
A Winnipeg despatch states that the lumber industry on Lake Winniper, as well as other lines of business, is preparing for increased business this season.
Fraser \& Co.'s timber report for August gives the arrivals of cargoes at Melbourne as ten in number for the inonth. Cedar and white pine figure largely in the list.
Mason \& Co. announce sales of imported woods at New York on Oct. 17th and 3ist. The catalogue for the former is almost entircly mahogany and cedar.

Mr. Jas. McGillan, of Appleton, Wis., has purchased $140,000,000$ feet of timber on the stump in Canada, for a considerasion of $\$ 14,000$. It covers 14,000 acres.

There has been an unusually large proportion of hardwood in lake receipts at Buffalo. Several dealers have been bringing it from Lake Huron and Georgian Bay ports.
The Chatham Mfg. Co. are offering for sale by public auction upwards of 50,000 fect of lumber. The sale will take place at North Chatham saw mills, on the 23rd inst.

Mr. W. Margach, crown timher agent, Rat Portage, Ont., when in Toronto last week, stated that lumbering operations would be brisk in his locality this winter, many of the dealers having reduced their stocks to small dimensions.

A Winnipeg pasper says that large quantities of lumber are being brought into Manitoba from Minnesota by the Northern Pacific Railway, and as a result of this competition prices are coming down.

The Brunette Saw Mill Co., New Westminster, B. C., have the plans ready for their new mill, which will be built as rapidly as possible. It will not be so laige as the other one, but will have nearly as great capacity, being fitted with all the latest improvements.
The steam barge Africa and her consort, the barge Severn, were lost in a storm on the Georgian Bay last week. The former is supposed to have gone down with all hands. The latter was driven ashore and wrecked. Both were limber laden.
Cheboygan, Mich., firms will put 50,$\infty, 000$ feet of logs in Canadian waters the coming season. The W. \& A. McArthur Co., will operate four plants and are down for $20,000,000$ fect. The Alpena lumbermen will also operate extensively in Canada.
Nova Sco:ia cargoes of lumber have almost stopped arriving at Boston for the present, and quotations are largely nominal, but runs as follows: Spruce plank, $2 \times 8$ and up, $\$ 12$ to $\$ 12.50$; spruce plank, $2 \times 6$ and $2 \times 7$, \$10 to $\$ 10.50$; random cargoes, \$to to \$1t ; boards, 7 inches and up.
wide, $\$ 1$ it to $\$ 12$; floor boards, clears, $\$ 16$ to $\$ 17$; floor boards, second clears, $\$ 14$ to $\$ 15$; floor boards, coarse, $\$ 11$ to $\$ 12$; hemlock boards, roueh, $\$ 9$ to $\$ 0.50$; hemlock boards planed, $\$ 10.50$ to $\$ 11$; laths, $\$ 1.70$ to $\$ 1.80$.
The Conger Lumber Co., of Parry Sound, have recently made some large sales of lumber for shipment between now and the close of navigation. They loaded the schooners Dominion and Sligo, and also the stean barge Africa and the barge Severn, which were wrecked. The schr. Azov was expected in to load.
An English company has bought 140,000 acres of jellow cyprus timber limits at Takush Harbor, British Columbia. They are said to be backed by prominent London capitalists, and will control a capital of $\$ 500,000$. A large mill will be built. Yellow cyprus is an exccedingly valuable wood, used largely in fine cabinet work.

Freights from Nova Scotia ports to Boston usually run from $\$ 2$ to $\$ 2.25$ per thousand, occasionally advancing to $\$ 2.50$ if there is a demand for vessels to carry potatoes and apples. Just now potatoes are so cheap in l3oston that there is little inducement to send them in. Neverthetheless, it is hard to get the righ* kind of vessels for lumber.

## HOW IT IS DONE.

A salesman on the road in the eastern states tells how a Nova Scotia lumberman disposed of a cargo of sprice lumber and how little he got for it. The cargo was consigned 10 a concern in Boston, who had no knowledge of the lumber trade, but who finally succeeded in giving away a pretty good cargo at about $\$ 10$ per thousand merchantable, with twothirds price for refuse, Boston survey. Ffter settling and getting a note from a lesponsible lumber firm, the commission man could not place the note, and finally sold the note to a regular comnission house, less 5 per cent. No doubt ihe Nova Scotia manufacturer finally paid two commissions on his consignment, and if he ever finds out the way he was treated he may liereafter consign his lamber to regular lumber commission merchants. If the latter culd handle all the lumber which goes there from Nova Scotra there would be at least $\$ 1$ a thousand more obtained for it.

A casc of interest and moportance to lumbermen has just been heard at Lind say before judge Dean, and is awaiting judgment. Messrs. Mosson lsoyd \& Co., claim to have the right to impose tolls upon all timber and logs passing throush the Little Bob river. A number of point are raised. Should the decision be in plaintiffs faver, the cose of bringing down logs on those waters will be increased to the lumbermen.
