New deposits of abestoes and coal oil are being discovered in Gaspe County, Que.

Tue inland revenue at Victoria, B.C., during October, was \$41,461, compared with \$9,788 in October, 1883.

LANGDON, the chief promoter of the Almonte, Ont., Gas Works, is reported to have absconded, leaving liabilities of \$2,000.

THE Brockville & Westport Railway is beginning the erection of a new passenger and freight depot in the west end of Brockville, Ont.

THE date on several thousand address labels on the papers of country subscribers is becoming a source of anxiety to the business

THE Doty Manufacturing Company will locate at Collingwood, Ont., the town having agreed to pay a bonus of 6 per cent. per annum for ten years on the output.

A COMPANY, of which the principal members are three Hamilton capitalists, has been organized, with \$50,000 capital, to establish a rolling mill at Belleville, Ont.

RAT PORTAGE, Man, put up \$103,000 worth of buildings this year. Winnipeg contemplates building a tramway from Main street to Silver Heights, five miles west of the city.

A PROMINENT hostelry in this city is again contemplating a change of management. Some of the lithographic printers have certainly nothing to complain of on the score of patronage.



HAMILTON, Ont., will have a new electric light plant at the end of this month, and the city will then be illuminated by 250 arc lights and 35 incandescent lamps, which will be lighted all night.

GEORGE BELL, builder and contractor, Toronto, has assigned. At a meeting of creditors, the statement presented showed liabilities of \$1,591, with assets of \$1,032, principally in mortgaged real estate.

FROM letters received by the St. John, N. B, Board of Trade from Messrs. Anderson & Co., relative to the state of the harbor, it is reported the proposed fast steamship line has not yet been altogether abandoned.

A. J. Populations has been conducting a carriage factory in a limited way at Woodham, Ont., for some time, but latterly the wheels have not been turning in the right direction. He has assigned with liabilities small.

The revenue of the Dominion continues of a gratifying unward character, with a low expenditure, the surplus for the first four months of 1889 being \$4,707,000, an increase of \$1,100,000 over the same period last year.

Belleville customs returns for October compared with those of the same month of last year are: Duty collected, \$6,128.14, decrease, \$2,590.30; value of imports, \$31,724, decrease, \$15,155; value of exports, \$182,331, increase, \$86,255.

A WELL-KNOWN firm of importers and dealers in fancy goods at Toronto, says the Empire, is in trouble with the customs. Suspecting that something was wrong in the way the entries were being made, the department ordered an examination of the firm's books, with the result that the discovery was made that undervaluation had being

going on for some months past. The duty paid value of the goods in question is about \$1,500, and unless the firm can clear itself it is likely that the penalties will be pretty severe.

Some fishermen of Petit de Grat, Little Anse and Rocky Bay, C.B., caught about 500 brls. of mackerel in one week recently, compensating them in a degree for the short catch of fat herring and the total failure of the spring mackerel.

THE Bell Telephone Company proposes to build a line from Quebec to Montreal if the former city will reduce the tax imposed upon the telephone business. The building of the line is estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$22,000.

WHITELY, the county clerk of Manchester county, Man, after embezzling an unknown sum, has crossed to the American side.—Petitions are being circulated in Winnipeg to ask the Dominion Government to restrict Lake Winnipeg's fisheries.

MR E. F. R. ZOELLNER, of Mount Forest, the large furniture manufacturer, reports a great demand for bedroom sets. His factory is at work night and day on these and other work, and has been obliged to put in electric lights for the purpose, being, in this repect, probably, the first in the Dominion.

Work on the Owen Sound harbor is being pushed forward rapidly. The firm of Rixon & Co., of Tobermoray, has purchased a large tract of land south of the Polson Works, and are to remove their mill to Owen Sound and run it on a much larger scale. They expect this to be the largest mill on the Georgian Bay.

THE New Brunswick crop report for 1889 has been issued and gives the following percentages of a full crop: Hay 83, oats 71, wheat 85, barley 91, buckwheat 91, corn 88, potatoes 77, apples 46. While this is but a moderately fair yield, it is offset in part by the good prices prevailing and also by the excellent quality of the products.

A MEETING of the creditors of Wm. and James Feeney, lumber dealers, Madco, Ont, was held on the 9th inst. The liabilities are said to be in the neighborhood of \$20,000, one-half of which is held in a mortgage by the Traders' Bank. The manager of the Traders' evidently still maintains his penchant for large lumber accounts.

The Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has received during the first nine months of this year the sum of \$73,000 as fees from the public for the granting of patents, copyrights, trade marks and industrial designs, an increase of \$11,406. In 1877 the fees from the same sources for the whole year amounted to \$35,386, and in 1867 to \$8,110.

A WEALTHY syndicate is reported to have acquired the property known as Kakabeka Falls, in the Port Arthur district, and intend establishing flouring mills similar to those of Minneapolis, as well as other manufacturing enterprises, the water power from the falls to be utilized for the purpose. The river there is 350 feet wide, with a fall of over 100 feet, and can be developed to furnish 200,000 horse power.

COL. OBA P. PATTON has been nominated for the position of President of the Commercial Travellers' Association for the coming year. The Colonel is an excellent extempore speaker like most of his countrymen, and from his upwards of 30 years' residence in Canada is in a position to act, as well as speak, well on the practical subjects that may come before him in the position to which he has been nominated.

THE customs returns for the port of Woodstock, Ont., for the month of October were: Value of imports, \$48,477; duty collected, \$9,672.-29; value of exports, \$245,320. The amount of duty collected for the corresponding month of last year was \$8,411,96. For the quarter ending 30th September, together with the month of October of this year, the amount of duty collected was \$37,164, an average of \$9,291 per month.

RIVER navigation has been much retarded by the fog, which has obscured the view of the proper channel for the last few days. The Quebee boat had to lay over all Monday night at Batiscan. Several other boats have been delayed and the steamship "European," which

left this city on Tuesday morning, went aground at Longue Pointe, but is not supposed to have sustained any injury. So far November is the mildest on record.

LOGGING operations are said to be in full swing in the New Brunswick woods, and the outlook for a heavy cut is good. It is estimated that there will be an increase of 20 per cent in the quantity of logs taken out the approaching winter in New Brunswick, as compared with last year. The absence of snow renders the collection of the scattered timber much easier than it would be in the dead of winter, and lumbermen are taking advantage of it.

H. A. NELSON & Sons have sold their baby carriage factory to Mr. Rennie, of Toronto. A mischievous rumor got affoat in consequence of this disposal to the effect that they had sold out their branch in Toronto and were retiring from business. It is needless to say that they continue their wholesale trade in Toronto as well as in Montreal with their usual vigor, and that the business is attaining a magnitude and extent scarcely contemplated during the lifetime of the late H. A. Nelson himself.

Nova Scotta fishermen are making immense hauls of mackerel of a large size and very superior quality, which have struck well in-shore all along the coast in immense swarms, and at Arichat, B.C., 1,000 brls, were taken during the week ending last Friday. The steamer Carroll carried 600 brls. of fresh and 550 brls. of pickled mackerel from Halifax to the Boston market last Saturday. This is a great boon to the fishermen, who were becoming discouraged at the results of their efforts for some time past.

Construction work on the Montreal & Occidental Railway will begin at once from St. Jerome to Ste. Agathe, and it is expected the road will cost about \$15,000 a mile. The Canadian Pacific Railway is giving a guarantee of \$4,000 a mile, provided they have the option of purchasing the line five years after completion for \$6,000 a mile. In the meantime they will supply the new road with rolling stock as soon as the first sections are finished. Premier Mercier has promised

He was formerly a school teacher, but abandoned teaching the "young ideas how to shoot" for the training of the shoots vegetarian, with the disastrous ending recorded. The trouble is not confined to himself; his brother in the old country having lent him \$4,000, and his father \$600; both some time ago forgiven. His liabilities are chiefly local. It is not expected the estate will pay more than 50 cents in the dollar. A meeting of creditors takes place on the 20th.

Advices from Ottawa state that the failure of the Labrador fishery and the destitution of the fishermen is attributed principally to the inroads of American and French fishermen, who used to trap nets and other engines for the wholesale destruction of the fish. It has been stated that during the past season vessels from Gloucester swept these shores, getting full cargoes and absolutely treating the three-mile limit with contempt. Inquiry has been made at the Fisheries Department here, where it was stated that the Government were inquiring into the matter, it having been brought to their notice by the Quebec Board of Trade. No information could be given until the report of the investigation had been made to the Department.

The lumbermen are complaining very bitterly, says the Globe, of the lack of cars for haudling lumber. One company, it is said, has 2,000,000 feet of lumber which it cannot move, and the whole lumber. business is described as at a standstill. 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

ANNEXATION AND FEDERATION.

To all appearances the politicians of this Province are tired of the old lines of warfare and are casting about for some new battle cry on which to divide public opinion. La Canadien, the chief French Conservative organ in Quebcc city, recently declared that the policy of Mr. Mercier was gravely threatening the stability of confederation and drifting Canada towards annexation. It even went further than this and declared that our "little premier" was the heart and soul of an organization with annexation for its ultimate object.

To combat this, it argues that the advantages of a closer union with Great Britain should be fully explained and discussed, and Imperial Confederation receive more serious attention than has yet been the case. As yet there has been no specific reason for making such strong charges against the leader of the local government, but it is evident that the subject has received some attention, and that the minor lights of the party are in favor of mixing powerful medicine, of one kind or another, in their political programme. During his recent visit to Baltimore, Mr. Mercier is reported to have said: "There is a great deal of sentiment in favor of annexation, especially among the French Canadians: This idea prevails also to a certain extent among the British Canadians, but it is not nearly so widespread." If the premier is correctly reported, and this be so, there has been a great change in public opinion since the days when Sir George Cartier was cheered to the echo by his compatriots for declaring that the last musket shot in favor of British connection would be fired by a French Canadian.

It is a pity that the politicians cannot let well enough alone. The United States do not want Canadian wheat, flour, cheese,

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butter and our other chief products, but are glad to sell their own where we sell ours, in Great Britain. If the States desire our lumber, fish, mineral products, etc. they are in demand also by the United Kingdom, and nothing that we wish to sell need go a-begging. Annexation would deprive us of important advantages which we enjoy in the British markets, and Federation might confine our energies and tax our resources in other directions. Under existing circumstances we are almost as independent as it is possible to be. Canadian history since Confederation has not been without other examples of the tail attempting to wag the dog.

ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES.


This may certainly be termed the age of electricity. Electrical phenomena which would have astonished, if not startled, our fathers, are no vimpressed into the service of our households until they have become so familiar and indispensable that we find ourselves wondering how people got along before this wonderful force was finally subordinated to our domestic needs. Not only this, but nearly every industry or art is either dependent upon or influenced by this mysterious agent. Our streets and many of our houses are illuminated by its means, and every day it is being brought more and more into domestic use until it bids fair in the future to be the universal factor in our households.

But this increasing practical knowledge of the use of electricity has not been accompanied in many instances by the proper theoretical knowledge. The average man knows how to use a telephone, and how turning a brass tap or pressing a button will furnish him with light or summon assistance, but he is ignorant as to the method by which this is rendered possible or the amount of electricity required to perform his service. The measurements of electricity, and even the simpler terms applied to its various forms, convey no meaning to his mind, and though he may speak of a volt or an ohm, in nine cases out of ten his idea of the amount of electricity covered by these terms is vague in the extreme.

ELECTRICAL MEASUREMENTS.

Under these circumstances, perhaps it might be well to explain the method of computing electricity, and the terms used in its computation, before proceeding to discuss more fully its application to our domestic and industrial needs. The real standard unit of the electrical scale is the intensity of the horizontal component of the earth's magnetism; that is, the velocity it would impart to a free magnetic pole weighing one gramme. The term "horizontal" is used because the direction of the earth's magnetic force is oblique to the horizon; while the unit of measurement used in electricity is the amount of force it can exert horizontally. This unit on this continent is about 0.18 centimetre, or in other words, the velocity along the magnetic meridian which a free magnetic pole weighing one gram would acquire in one second is about 0.18 centimetre. The corresponding velocity which any body would acquire under the action of gravitation is about nine hundred and eighty centimetres, or about five thousand four hundred and forty-four times greater. This is usually termed the electro-magnetic unit; but in calculation another unit, called the ampere, is used, which is one-tenth of the unit we have just given. The electro-magnetic units of electromotive force and resistance are too small for practical use. The practical unit of electro-motive force is therefore taken 100,000,000 times greater, and is called the Volt. The unit of resistance is taken 1,000,000,000 times greater and is called the Ohm.

The power, or, in other words, the rate at which work is done when one ampere of current suffers a loss of power equal to one volt is called a Watt. It is 10,000,000 ergs per second, or about



one seven-hundred-and-forty-sixth part of a horse-power. An example will illustrate the practical use which may be made of these measures. It requires about ten amperes of current to operate an arc-lamp such as is employed in street-lighting. The current suffers a loss of about fifty volts at each lamp. If there be fifty lamps in the series the entire loss will be 2,500 volts. This number, multiplied by 10 and divided by 746, gives between thirty-three and thirty-four horse-power, which is the amount that will be required to operate all the lamps.

THE TELEPHONE

After this brief explanation of the terms used in measuring and computing electricity we may pass at once to the practical and commercial uses of this mysterious agent, and, as the telephone is the most sensitive and delicate electrical contrivance now in general use, it is perhaps most interesting to discuss first the means and methods by which the vibrations of the human voice can be transmitted over miles of wire and reproduced at the ear of the listener. The popular impression is, of course, that the actual sound is in some way conveyed over the wire-This we need hardly say is incorrect. The telephone is really a beautiful example of the convertibility of forces from one form to To transmit the sound we have first the initial vibratory mechanical motion of the air which is imparted to the speaking disk, then its conversion into electricity and its transmission to the receiver, where the vibration of the armature is again imparted to the air and once more becomes a sound wave like the original.

There are in this city two telephone companies—the Bell and the Federal. Both companies use a telephone almost identical in its character, and differing only in minor details. The difference between the two lies simply in the system of operating; the Bell using the Magneto system while the Federal operate the Law system.

DIFFERENT SYSTEMS.

The principal difference consists in the method of calling or signalling the Central Office and connecting subscribers together. In the former a single wire connects the subscriber's instrument to a system of annunciators or indicators, so that when he rings his bell, he at the same time causes an annunciator to fall and indicate his number. The operator then connects herself with his line, and enquires for the number wanted. She then rings the desired subscriber, and by means of a switching device connects the two lines. Early in the use of the telephone it was noticed that when two wires were parallel and contiguous for even short distances, they mutually influenced each other so much that a conversation on a line would be heard on the lines immediately contiguous to it, and now that the business has attained such proportions this induction and cross talk has become so serious as to interfere very much indeed with the use of the instrument. Indeed, we are informed that some subscribers refuse to give quotations or carry on conversations of a strictly confidential character over such lines. In the Law system there are four distinct wires connecting the instrument with the Central Office Two of these are used as a common call wire and terminate in the operator's telephone which is secured to her ear so that she is always available to the subscriber. The other two wires are called the private line, and are used only to connect subscribers together, and are so arranged that the most confidential matter may be discussed over the lines with perfect safety since not even the operator can overhear a conversation;

DISTRIBUTION.

The system of distribution adopted by the Federal is unique and claimed to be the most perfect on this continent. Starting from the Central Office are a large number of cables which terminate at various distributing points all over the city. Each of these cables contain one hundred and two copper wires insulated from each other and twisted in pairs; all enclosed in a lead pipe which is sgain protected by a stout hose or webbing. The advantages claimed for this method of distribution are manifold. The wires being twisted in pairs and connecting each subscriber with the Central through a cable almost the entire length of the circuit, he enjoys complete immunity from inductive action and "cross talk," besides which the danger of line interruptions from storms, &c, are reduced to a minimum.

THE CENTRAL OFFICE.

At the Central Office the cables terminate in cast iron boxes. where they are opened and connected by a short wire to the lightning arresters. These cast iron boxes are filled with an insulating compound and so sealed as to prevent moisture from working into the cable. The lightning arresters are so constructed that should a current of electricity, stronger than that necessary for the purposes of the exchange-such as lightning or an electric light current-charge the line, it will disrupt a small wire in the arrester, whose capacity is only equal to the requirements of the telephone service, and thus throw open the line-Consequently it is impossible for lightning or electric light currents to get into any office through the telephone. The wires after passing the lightning arresters terminate in the upper cross board where, by means of short wires, termed jumpers, they are connected to the Tower cross board, and thence by permanent wires to the Central Office switch board.

The Central Office is, of course, the most interesting to a spectator. The brass and mahogany switch board surrounded by the fair operators naturally rivets his attention and excites his curiosity. The chief operator's desk and the "trouble" desk, where all complaints are heard, and tests made, are all novel to the spectator. It is here that one first realizes the enormous volume of business done over the telephone, and the constant care and skill necessary to keep these delicate necessities in thorough working order.

ART TELEPHONES.

Through the courtesy of Mr. J. A. Wright, a reporter of the JOURNAL was also permitted to thoroughly inspect the manufacture of the telephone itself. The factory on College street is fully equipped with all the latest machinery and appliances for the manufacture of every description of telephonic apparatus; but our readers will be particularly interested in some instruments of special design, intended to supply a demand for something more ornate than the standard instruments. In a handsomely furnished apartment there is a decided aversion to securing to a decorated wall a great box entirely out of keeping with the appointments of the room, and therefore a class of beautifully ornamented instruments are now being constructed to satisfy this demand for a telephone that shall be also a work of art. One, designed to stand in a hall, has the transmitter bell and battery boxes made of ebony, beautifully inlaid and secured to a brass stand, embessed and decorated with scroll work. Another, designed for a ladies bouldoir, is really a chaste and elegant work of art. The stand of silver is most graceful, and is elaborately engraved, and the wood work is of Spanish mahogany, beautifully carved and decorated. There is also a library set finished in nickel and old oak. These instruments are so designed as to stand on the floor, and resemble, in appearance, the fashionable piano lamp, being so constructed that the wires are invisible. These are novelties that our wealthier citizens will appreciate at their full value. The telephone is an absolute necessity. To convert it also into an ornament to the handsomest drawingroom is a combination of art and utility very rarely met with.

THE PAN-AMERICAN CONGRESS.

Since the visit of the South American delegates to the United States, a vast deal of information has been diffused through the press with regard to subsidies and tariffs and foreign trade in general, but it is becoming more and more apparent that under the present high tariff and high wages, the United States will be unable to extend its trade to any great extent. Some of the delegates have already stated that it is free and unrestricted trade they want and anything else will be considered one-sided and unsatisfactory.

It is extremely doubtful that the Congress will realize the expectations of its promoters, and the practical results are likely to be insignificant in comparison with the fuss and commotion

that has been made, especially by the Blaine party. The delegates have been treated in regal style, and have enjoyed every opportunity of studying the country and people, and the problems connected with a closer commercial alliance. They are shrewd men and are not to be caught napping. If anything they may have seen too much. It is quite within the bounds of possibilities that the Congress will be a total or partial failure and hurtful to the present administration.

The difficulties in a diplomatic sense are many, but into these we will not enter. C mmercially they are numerous also and we have only to reproduce some correspondence from the American Minister to Columbia in illustration. These remarks apply with more or less force to the conditions in other South American States:-He writes: " Practically, all commercial relations have always been with England and France. The British and French merchants occupied the field in the beginning. These connections being of long standing are not to be broken off instantly, nor for sentimental reasons. The Colombian may admire the institutions of the Great Republic, as he calls it, but he is not for that reason willing to pay a friend, however dear to him, 4 cents for a yard of cotton cloth which he can buy of some one else for 2½ cents. It will require something more than sentiment to change the volume of trade. These European connecnections are formidable and intricate, are hard to change, and can only be broken by offering superior advantages. The merchants of the United States have never studied this market. Their method, as a rule, has been to advertise to a limited extent in a few papers of the country and in Spanish-American papers printed in the States, and to send to the American consuls and ministers catalogues, price-lists and letters of inquiry. All this is well, but does not tend to furnish much information as to what this people require. To illustrate: I recently received a long price-list of white cottons, coupled with a request that I would pass it to some importing merchant. Now, there is not a merchant in Bogota who has any idea of the quality or class of any cotton from the names given upon that list. He sees that the lowest quoted price is 4 cents per yard, while he can buy an English cotton for 23 cents per yard, and very justly concludes not to order what he knows nothing of for 4 cents, when he can have for 21 cents something that he knows ali about. The idea which seems to prevail, that the Colombian does not know what he wants, is erroneous and fatal. No brighter men live than Colombians. They are fully alive to the value of a dollar-know how to make it and how to keep it, and if our merchants want to sell them goods they must 'study the market.' The English, the French and the Germans, instead of sending price-lists in an unknown tongue to consuls and ministers, send live men and maintain them here at great expense. These agents live here, learn the language, study the habits and needs of the people, open store, display large lines of samples and endeavor in every way to cater to the trade. A bright young man came from England in the last year to Medellin, a city of 30,000 inhabitants, and in three months sold calicoes and cottons to the amount of \$120,000. In that same city is a German house, a representative of a French house, and two English houses. All of them have complete lines of samples. In Bogota and Barrauquilla all these interests are similarly represented, while not an agency for the display and sale of American goods can be found. If the American merchant wishes to trade here he must at least take as much pains to introduce his goods to these people as he does to sell to country merchants at home. The United States merchant must adapt his goods and his methods to the peculiarities of the people with whom he would trade. I once asked a Modellin merchant if he would not prefer to buy American goods. He said he would, but that their merchants rendered such a thing impossible. He once gave a large order to a New York house, with particular directions as to packing. These directions were entirely diregarded. This rendered the transaction unprofitable and the importer extremely irritated, especially as he had sent full and explicit directions as to how the packing should be done. He has never ordered American goods since. This is not an isolated case-I have heard many similar complaints. The point is vital, and merchants can never sell these people until they learn how to pack for these custom houses and for mule transportation. The English; French and Germans have learned how to pack, and do pack according to the requirements of the country.

Again, these people demand cloths of a certain length and width. It is the universal complaint that manufacturers refuse to conform to these requirements. The English,

French and Germans, on the other hand, ask the Colombian what he wants, and then give it to him. The prevailing system of long credits must be considered. This has always been a barrier to the development of trade here. The English French and Germans give at least six months' interest-bearing credit from the date of the invoice, while the 'three 6's' (six, twelve and eighteen months) credits are not unknown. While it may be possible to sell upon somewhat less credits, yet it is probably true that the system which prevails in the United States would be introduced here with great difficulty. The large importers of Bogota are men of integrity and 'ability, and I think it is very rarely that payments are considered : doubtful by the seller. Colombians say that nearly every thing can be purchased cheaper in other countries than in the United States: an idea that is never left to perish from the thought by the energetic European. If this be true, then indeed the merchant of the United States is about to enter upon an unequal race. The only way to ascertain is to come down and see. No one unacquainted with the mysteries of trade can give any reliable information. It would be a pleasure to see representatives of American houses in this capital studying the many questions which must be understood before success can be hoped for. Time will be required. These men must learn the language. The quicker they come the better.

The contention made by American subsidy hunters that Great Britains' supremacy on the seas and in commerce with foreign countries is due to subsidies is quite erroneous. Subsidies in the general sense of the term are not granted by the British government to any steamship company and no payment other than for the conveyance of mails is specially made for maintaining communication between Great Britain and Central and South America and the West Indies. The actual amount paid for post office services in 1888-9 was \$3,184,400, and this is not excessive when the vast distances and heavy proportions of the British mail are taken into consideration: It is also significant that this amount has been diminishing yearly, while the amount of mail matter is on the increase. In 1878-79 the mail contract totalled \$3,891,200 and in 1868-69, \$5,454,530. The British authorities endeavor to get the service performed as reasonably as possible and German lines have been known to underbid English companies and deprive them of contracts. As to payments made in compensation for adapting steamers for use in naval warfare, these are also moderate. In 1888, £22,300 was paid out and this year the estimate is £39,410.

The expensive modifications in construction called for by the Admiralty specifications and the obligations entered into by the owners make the sums mentioned appear very small indeed. In spite of these facts there is no doubt that the United States wi'l be urged to extend its trade by artificial means, but it is a good sign of the times that the standard commercial press is stoutly opposed to such abortive and ruinous methods which are intended to benefit a few at the expense of the mass of the people.

BAD DEBTS AND THEIR COLLECTION.

The subject of this article will be recognized as appropriate, as several so called agencies have reached the end of their tether in this city, and the west, within a comparatively short space of time. Bad debts may be classed as a business hazard which every wholesale and retail house must be prepared to encounter more or less. Prudence in crediting and a strict attention to detail will reduce losses under this head, but nearly every concern can turn up a number in their books without much research.

The debtor may be an honest man who has got into unexpected difficulties through lack of sufficient capital, poor ability, slight experience, keen competition, etc., or he may be a person with little honesty of purpose who, from the outset intended to cheat his creditors if the opportunity offered. However, it is not so much the manner of contracting debts, as the way in which it is sought to recover them that we wish to speak. As a rule the city wholesale houses avail themselves of well established and standard agencies or place bad accounts from the first in the hands of attorneys who have their professional reputation at stake. There are exceptions, however, as recent experience shows. New schemes for the collection of over-due debts have usually attracted retailers and the smaller manufacturing and wholesale traders. The slow methods of some of the established collectors have caused a ready ear to be turned to strangers in the city with nothing whatever to back them ex-

cept a plausible tongue and a stylish suit of clothes. In some instances have faced cheek has been poorly supplemented by the tailor's art, and yet these men seem to have found little difficulty in getting long lists of accounts to collect from men well known in the city. It has often been remarked how ready Montrealers are to listen to the pretensions of foreigners either from the United States or Europe, to the neglect of their own people of probably greater merit, and almost as frequently they have every reason to regret their experiments.

Three or four collectors are now absent from the city who enjoyed the confidence and afterwards had the pleasure of spending the money of their too confiding patrons. The American concern, which recently collapsed, had the bare faced impudence to solicit subscribers to a so-called protective association at \$10 each, and quite a number joined and deservedly lost their subscription and sums of money collected on accounts as well. Such dead-beat agencies are quite numerous in Chicago and other American cities. In some instances threats are made of publishing the names of debtors in a book and the post office is freely used for the transmission of dunning letters and postal cards. The courts have been appealed to with success against several practices resorted to, the persecuted thus turning the tables on their persecutors. Every now and then something new in this line turns up in Canada and enjoys a brief existence. At first, a few accounts are handed over and a prompt return of moneys being made, suspicions are dispelled, and a larger list is made out. Sooner or later the collector seeks his native soil, leaving only a table and chair in his office. We are not giving an isolated example, as some who doubtless will read these lines know to their cost. Those who have been duped have only themselves to blame and deserve no sympathy. Why give business to strangers, English or American, when deserving Canadians are struggling for a living? And again, why experiment with new-langled dead-beat methods when the law of the country provides a proper remedy and has recently passed a summary procedure act which has abolished the old delays?

Despite all precautions, bad debts must arise and the wise merchant will attempt their collection through the legitimate channels. Experience is a dear teacher and we would advise our readers to profit by the recent disclosures and not run unnecessary risks in placing their bad and doubtful debts out for collection.

A valued contemporary, the Halifax Chronicle, recently had an interesting article on this subject, in the course of which it said :- "Mention is made in several contemporaries of bogus mercantile agencies, so-called, who have been operating in different parts of the Dominion, and it would seem desirable that merchants and others should be put on their guard against the smooth-tongued individuals who claim to represent them. An enterprising individual sets out to make money, and, to that end, he assumes some high-sounding name, such as "The American Merchants' and Manufacturers' Protection association," or "The Continental Collection company," and invests a few dollars in printers' ink for circulars and such, in which it is set forth that his association or company has correspondents and attorneys all over the world, or all over America, or all over the Dominion, as the case may require: and hence that his association or company has complete and ample facilities to ferret out emigrating debtors and bring foreign delinquents to pay their dues. The rates for collection are quite reasonable, merely a percentage, and no charge if no collections; and the open sesame to this bureau of world-wide information, this cosmopolitan repository of protective and prosecuting power, is merely the "membership fee" of \$10, "only to be paid once, and afterwards no charge except on cash collected." The shop-keeper to whom this fine scheme is offered thinks of Tom who went off owing him \$20, Dick \$30 and Harry \$40, and is soon persuaded to pay his \$10 for "membership" in this promising concern, the "agent" (for himself) prospers and proceeds; and the reader can imagine the rest. Such an "agent" recently operated in Montreal in grand style, taking a big office, and taking in the merchants, big and small, into his association and into the bargain. A short time ago we were informed of an operator, very suspiciously of this class, being in Halifax. The inevitable \$10 "membership fee" was in his scheme, and he claimed a continent full of correspondents and detectives that could hunt up and catch a runaway debtor as easily as a consumptive could catch a cold. And having caught the renegade, this fellow had a plan to kill him as sure as cholera. The first letter to the debtor from this association would be of ordinary size, but there would follow

in quick succession others of daily increasing dimensions, with the collecting association's name in letters of blood and fire on the outside, and a great black border suggesting the debtor's fate. Such missives would go remorselessly to the unfortunate's place of business till he was driven out of his situation, paid up, or committed suicide. The inventor of this fiendish scheme got a good many \$10 bills, but it is likely the "membership" will worry more than their debtors"

A DEFEAT CONVERTED INTO A VICTORY—ANOTHER TRIUMPH FOR THE N.P.

The contest waged with so much energy and success by the legal representatives of the Ayer patent medicine company against the Customs authorities a year or two since, has not resulted as might have been supposed in a continuation of the methods theretofore employed in preparing their different kinds of physic for the Canadian market. Indeed, the Department and its aspersed chiefs may congratulate themselves on the final results of that celebrated case. "Another such victory," said a celebrated general after one of his great battles, on receiving the congratulations of his friends-" Another such victory, and we should be done for," or words to that effect. So far from persevering in their former course—although successful in defending it—the Ayers have for some time past been prepar. ing to manufacture their proprietory medicines in Canada, and for this purpose concluded some months ago an arrangement with the glass factory in our eastern suburbs to add a wing to their already large premises, wherein the mixing and compounding could be carried on adjacent to the supply of vials which constitute so important a factor in the expense. The ingredients will, therefore, for the future be imported direct to Montreal instead of to Lowell, and our wholesale druggists are not unlikely to realize some benefit from the greater consumption of ipecacuanha and other roots common in pharmaceutics, probably second only to that of the manufacturers of the spirits and the bottles. Thus employment is afforded to a considerable number of hands, and another triumph added to the record of the National Policy. Besides all this, paper makers and printers derive some benefit from the large number of almanacs and wrappers issued every year by the proprietors, by means of which the goods and their virtues are made known to the farmer and his family, who cannot for a moment question the genuineness of the various certificates therein contained, or withhold from these catholicons that faith which contributes so much to the success of all proprietory and other medicines. A contemporary, whose columns are not open to advertisements of stimulants, is evidently not aware that one of the preparations of the Ayers contains, as per analysis, about thirty per cent. of alcohol. But, then, as the late Anthony Trollope said, "the rose by any other name would not smell as sweet."

RETAIL FURS.

In spite of the fine weather we have enjoyed this month there are many premonitory symptoms that the time is not far distant when the frost king will grasp us with his icy fingers. The stove dealer and the coal merchant are in the height of their glory, while the iceman hides his diminished head. The Christmas periodicals, in all the attractiveness that chromo-lithography can afford, are commencing to blossom in the stationers windows; and last, but by no means least, the furriers' windows are filled with a wealth of rich glossy fur garments that make them almost as splendid to the eye as a joweller's.

It is, of course, unnecessary to say that furs are dearer than last winter. In fact they are higher than ever before; the advance ranging from 10 per cent. up to as much as 40 per cent. in certain lines. In fact some of what were formerly our cheapest skins, such as the buffalo, can hardly be procured at all for love or money, and it becomes more evident, day by day, that fur will shortly be purely a rich man's luxury, and that the ordinary citizen will come to look upon it in time in the same light that he now does on jewellery. In furs, of course, the fashion is set by London and Paris; but this year we think that there is less likelihood of our following their lead than usual. In both those cities the fashionable fur will be Astrakhan, and those of our upper ten who desire to keep in touch with European styles must bow to their decree; but with the great majority of our citizens, Astrakhan, in spite of its durability and freedom from moth, has of late years been looked upon as a civic employee's fur, and since the coats of the sergeants of the police and other

officials have been trimmed with it but few gentlemen have worn it except when the entire coat or jacket was of Astrakhan. Seal will, of course, he worn as much as ever; but the favorites will be mink and sable, and for fur-lined coats these two furs with musk-rat and genet, will rule exclusively.

Boas are in great demand, and will be worn with muffs to match. The latest expensive novelty in this line is the Mercedes; which may be described as a standing fur collar with two flat boa ends reaching almost to the ground. It is made in Alaska sable or seal, and lined with quilted silk; but its cost will confine its wear to the well-to-do classes. Seal jackets will run short this season, although a fair number of Newmarkets have already been ordered. But the fashionable styles are all very short; the Hussar, a tight-fitting jacket, and the Reefer, which is double-breasted and loose in front, being the two shapes most called for by the votaries of the fickle goddess.

For those ladies who require a large wrap, superbly handsome Russian Cloaks made in plush, satin, silk or cashmere and lined and bordered with fur, will prove most attractive. They are lined with Hudson Bay sable, squirrel and other furs, and at retail cost from \$60 to \$400; one particularly handsome crimson silk plush lined and trimmed with sable costing \$380, while with sea otter at \$310 per skin and silver fox at \$150, one can easily imagine what a cloak lined with either of these furs would come to.

In sleigh robes, musk-ox at from \$50 to \$110, and bear at from \$90 to \$140, are the favorites; and wolf and other skins seem to be no longer in style. For driving coats coon and Australian bear are the principal staple, and both these furs are away up in value. For years past a steady appreciation in fur values has been taking place; but this year it is more marked than ever and fur is really becoming an absolute luxury.

In fur caps no settled fashion is yet reported; but mink and scal wedges bid fair to be as popular as ever. Most of the caps sold as yet have been mink wedges; but possibly styles may alter a little when once the season has fairly opened. Shoulder capes are as much asked for as ever, and in seal and astrakhan have sold well; but the feature of the season is certainly the great popularity of the boa, and this very becoming adjunct to the costume will evidently be worn more this winter than ever before.

A KNOTTY CASE. The case of the Connecticut Fire Insurance Company against Walter Kavanegh, formerly agent of that company in Montreal, was decided yesterday by Judge Wurtele in favor of the defendant. The point involved is somewhat knotty. It appears that on the 8th July last, Mr. Kavanagh, then agent for the Connecticut Insurance Company in addition to the Scottish Union, had placed a risk in the latter on the city property of Warden King & Co., and duly notified the general agent in Hartford. On the 10th he was instructed to cancel the risk. He again wrote, strongly urging its acceptance, but received peremptory orders to cancel. These reached him on the following Saturday, and he immediately left instructions with his clerk to transfer the risk to the Connecticut, which he accordingly did. The risk was written and reported to the Connecticut at Hartford on the same day. The office was closed at 2 o'clock p.m., and the insured premises were on fire at 2.31. The record of the risk reached the office of the Connecticut on Monday, and they wrote, accepting it, saying they had re-insured twothirds of it, and asked for further information. On Monday, as soon as he could ascertain particulars, Mr. Kavanagh wired that the loss was about 40 per cent. On the same day he told, Mr. King that he had transferred the risk, and was informed it was satisfactory. The loss was adjusted by Mr. Chas. Hanson, and duly paid by the company. Some time afterwards, the Connecticut was led to re-consider the matter, and wrote significantly to Kavanagh, the result of which was that he resigned-"kicked the company out doors" as he terms it,and then began the charges and insituations that culminated in the suit just decided. The Connecticut sued Kavanagh to recover the \$3,000 paid on the loss, alleging double dealings and other things. They claimed that no agent of theirs had authority to place any risk without first obtaining the consent of the insured. Such contention will be news to many agents, and is not calculated to smooth the pathway of the company in Canada A number of prominent insurance men were examined before the judge, who, after hearing all the evidence on both sides, promptly and fully acquitted Kavanagh of the charges brought against him. Messrs. Brown and Burt of the Connecticut, who are in town, say they will appeal the case, while Mr. Kavanagh is preparing to issue an action for damages of \$50,000. M. Bennet, jr, the general agent of the Scottish Union at Hartford, is also in the city. It is needless to say that there is no love lost between the companies.

A SUCCESSFUL INSTITUTION .- The Academy of Music has become a highly profitable investment under the management of Mr. Henry Thomas, lessee for several years past. There will be few to deny that on the other hand nothing has been left undone to cater in a rational manner to the better taste of our citizens, and public appreciation is proved by the frequently full houses that greet the players. Nearly all the plays and the lighter operas produced during the season so far, had had highly successful runs upon the best boards of London and New York, and in most cases the parts were rendered by the same actors and artists. Mille, Rhes, in "Much Ado About Nothing," although a good actress, was perhaps the only drawback to the general excellence at the Academy the present season. The smooth, round, vigorous rhythm of the great master is something entirely unsuited to continental, tongues, and it was almost painful to hear the grand old English lisped and chopped in such a manner. In her plays among French scenes and incidents on the other hand, she left little to be desired. While on this subject we must say a word as to the Academy programme, which, for the purpose, is next to useless. The part appertaining to the play is positively illegible, owing to the smallness of type. In fact the only portions of the programme at all discernable are one or two advertisements where large type is used. The dim cathedral light which prevails before the curtain rises is doubtless one cause of the difficulty, but with the consideration for their health therety implied, the audience can find no fault. A large consumption of gas early exhausts the oxygen in the auditorium and renders the air unwholesome Of two evils Mr. Thomas chooses the less. Pure air is preferable to the benefits derived from a perusal of the dramatis persona and incidents, with the rest of the printed matter of the programme, and most frequenters have learnt to do without the latter rather than risk permanent injury to their eyes.

G. Warson of St. James street west, in this city has been carrying on a small drygoods business for some years past, his wite attending to the shop while he travelled about, doing a little peddling in the summer time and a little horse-trading in the winter months. Horse dealers, as a rule, do not belie their general reputation for shrewdness—to call it by no stronger name,—and Mr. Watson is not among the exceptions. A visit to his place on Monday last revealed the unpleasant fact that Mr. Watson was away but some of those who had most confidence in him charitably supposed that he had merely gone on a collecting tour or on a trip with his pace. On further investigation, however, they discovered that the was little or no stock remaining on the premises. They according to one was indebted to them collectively to the extent of about \$10,000. Among the creditors is a prominent wholesale woollen firming a young clothing house, the latter for about \$1,400. Mr A. Jacobs, woollen merchant of St James street, who is also a creditor, loses little or nothing, having made some purchases of goods from Watson several weeks ago.

Thus far only three of the hurdy-gurdy players in Montreal have paid the license of \$50 recently imposed. It is difficult to understand what encouragement can be given to these nuisances on business thoroughfares like St James street. The noise made by some of these organs is almost as disagreeable as that of a boiler shop, without the raison d'eire of the latter. Were all of them as piano as the organ at the corner of St. Bartholomew's church there would be little cause of complaint. Mr. Mariotti, the Italian consul here, has been busily occupied for the last few weeks by such of the organists as cannot pay the license. Mr. Mariotti informs us that a law was recently passed by the Italian government forbidding street music and all other kinds of begging. Visitors to Naples will not be sorry to learn this.

We are pleased to announce that the offer of Messrs. Brown, Balfour & Co., Hamilton, of 33½ cents on the dellar, in three, six, nine and twolve months, secured, was accepted at the recent meeting. As previously mentioned, the cause of failure seems to have bad debts, the books revealing the large amount of \$66,997. The liabilities are \$100,000, and the assets about \$50,000.

ERRATA.—A few errors crept into the last few issues of the Journal which, after a vain endeavor to trace, we must attribute to the intervention of Hallowe'en and Thanksgiving Day, both falling on the days of the week devoted more particularly to proof reading. The printing of 'motions' for "motives" and "produce" for "prudence" last week were among the most noterious.

At the meeting of the Federal Telephone Company, held in this city on Wednesday last, a resolution was passed covering the requirements of the company, as intimated in our last issue. It behooves every one to be on the alert in respect of his interests for some time to come. But of this more anon.

LAFOND FREEES, dry goods dealers, St. Lawrence street, this city, have assigned. They began business in February '87 with but little capital, which proved insufficient to keep them affoat and they accordingly compromised the following year at 70 cents in the dollar. Their present liabilities foot up \$10,000.

RETAIL shoe dealers on Hamilton's fashionable business street are uttering complaints as to the quality of women's shoes supplied them by a wholesale house in Montreal the partners in which ought to know better if only through inherited knowledge.

ONE of the creditors of John Reiplinger is likely to ask some pertinent questions before any general settlement can be agreed upon. It is to be hoped that vouchers duly authenticated will be forthcoming for all of the claims against the estate.

A WHOLESALE business man who wants more than two years' time on a small account of \$50 or \$100, had better abandon further efforts and go to work for somebody who has capital as well as capacity.

The shawl is said to be coming more and more into vogue. Tailor-made suits and mannish costumes generally have been driven to an extreme, and a reaction is noticeable. The shawl is decidedly a lemining garment.

Financial.

MONTREAL, Thursday Evening, November 14th, 1889.

The market during the past week has been featureless so far as general speculation is concerned. The only item of interest has been the large trading and advance in Canadian Pacific, and the "bull" feeling still dominates at the close. In bank stocks we note a steady market, and that is about all that can be said, a small business having transpired. MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS. THURSDAY EVENING, NOVEMBER 14.

The shipping trade has naturally been brisk, as the season for water transport closes this week. So far as new business is concerned, only a moderate number of orders have come to hand, and complaints of positive duliness are heard in some lines. Exchange between Europe and the States has recently been favorable to the latter country. Wheat has not been going out in proportion to accumulation at storage points, but on the other hand there have been heavy purchases of American securities by London investors. American imports and exports during October aggregate \$14,829,751 in excess of September, and \$7,866,250 in excess of October, 1888. The increase over last October is greatest in exports (these accounting for \$4,276,984 of the whole), largely due to the greater exports of cotton and grain this year.

ASHES.—Receipts have been much larger, and sales of first pots have been made at \$3.50@\$3.55; seconds about \$3.20. Pearls at \$4.85@\$4.90 for light tares first sort. The stock of both pots and pearls is too large for the time of the year, and it is impossible almost to find a market for the quantity made, and it is nearly certain that the demand will be still lighter next year. Receipts since 1st January, 2,668 pots, 394 pearls; deliveries, 2,464 pots, 380 pearls; stock in store, 449 pots, 132 pearls.

COAL.—Trade is reported dull this week, and prices are unchanged. Egg coal, \$5.75 per ton of 2,000 lbs.; stove, \$6; chestnut \$6; Scotch grade, \$6; Lower Port grades, \$5.50; blacksmiths', \$6.50; Cumberland, \$6.50; Scotch steam, \$5 per ton of 2,240 lbs,; Pictou, \$4.50.

Daugs and Chemicals.—The firm tone of the market in heavy chemicals, as is usual at this season predominates and prices are accordingly firm at quotations, as per prices current. Late English advices say:—Chemicals—There is a good demand all round, though Caustic Soda is inclined to be easier. Bleaching Powder—Rather more offering. Soda Ash scarce, 1 1-16d@1 df for carbonated, and 1 dm 3-32d for causticated, fo.b. Sulphate of Copper in strong demand, for prompt and forward shipment.

Day Goods.—We have to chronicle a gratifying improvement in remittances. Apparently the farmers are commencing to come in to pay their bills and buy their necessities, for we hear much less complaints on this head than we did last month. Travellers are sending in only small orders. Stocks in the west are but little broken, and owing to the pertinacity of travellers most western shop-keepers are overstocked already. It is difficult for the average storekeeper to resist the blandishments of the small army of travellers that constantly press them to buy goods, and as a consequence most of them have overbought, and consequently have no sorting orders to

Sellers wanted 11c and bids came up to 10½c; no sales reported. It is said that late Augusts are enquired for at 10½c, but there are few to be had. The market is not likely to be brisk until limits are raised, as holders seem prepared to bide their time. Ten mammoth cheese were shipped from this city to London. The total net weight was 8,680 lbs., the largest weighing 1,103 lbs. Butter is as dull at ever, both the export and lower ports demand being nil. There is a fair call for local jobbing lots, chiefly for choice Townships dairy and creamery. Eggs quiet, with supply fair. Ordinary fresh 17c@19c, limed 16c@18c, strictly fresh 22c@24c. Partridge in demand, but not in large supply. Best birds 50c per brace, seconds, 30c@40c. Venison scarce and in demand; saddles 15c per lb, 10c@11c by the carcase. Pork, lard and meats in good supply, but slow in demand. Business therefore confined to small jobbing lots.

FRUITS.—Business continues good. The apple market is in pretty good shape just now; the glut that was caused by Michigan stock is over and buyers are only looking for A 1 Cauadian stock. The amount of apples shipped to Europe from Cauadian and American ports to the week ending 9th November, 1859, 261,176, to the corresponding week last year, 553,456, showing a shortage to date of 292,280 barrols. Shipments continue heavy. Prices are the same as last week. Fall apples, \$2.50@\$3.00 per barrel; winter fruit, \$2.76@\$3.25 in car lots; less quanties, \$3.50\display\$4.00. Canadian blue grapes, 5c per lb.; Niagara, 8c; Brighton, 6c; Delaware, 8c per lb. Cranberries, prime dark, \$7.00\display\$8.00 per barrel. Oranges, Jamaica's, in barrels, \$6.00\display\$8.50. Bananas, \$2.15\display\$4.00 per box, 360 size. Almeria grapes, in kegs of about 55 lbs. net, \$4.50\display\$6.00. Sweet potatoes, in barrels, \$3.00\display\$6.00. Onions, red, in barrels, \$2.75; Spanish, in crates, 85c. Coccanuts, \$5.00 per 100. Fameuse apples are selling from \$2.75\display\$3.50. The quantity of apples shipped from Montreal to Great Britain for the week ending 9th November, was 23,680 barrels; from Boston, 14,073; from New York, 7,961; from Halifax, 5,600; from Annapolis, N. S., 12,000.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The dullness in flour has been unbroken during the week; quotations are again down. Grain will be quieier than before as the shipping season is over this week. Manitoba wheat is lower than a week ago, but now steadier again. It is stated that sales of No. 1 hard have been made at 91c@92c. Wheat in sight on this continent and afloat is 44,778,000 bushels, an increase of 1,154,000 with a week ago and a decrease of 14,546,000 with a year ago. The amount of wheat and flour reduced to wheat afloat to Europe shows an increase of 3,000 quarters, or 24,000 bushels, compared with a

week ago, and a decrease of 285,000 quarters, or 2,280,000 bushels, compared with a year ago. Corn shows a decrease of 32,000 quarters as compared with a week ago, and an increase of 472,000 quarters as compared with the same week last year. The preliminary official estimate of the Russian wheat crop is 91,000,000 bushels less than last year, and rye 95,000,000 bushels less. Chicago wheat quiet and steady at 80% December, 80% January, 84% May. Corn, 32c December, 31% January, 33% May. Free deliveries from farmers and wheat raisers continue in the North-west, and wheat raisers continue in the North-west, A 'bull' writer on wheatsays:—It is easy to figure that fully 60,000,000 bushels of the crop in that section is accounted by deliveries to date, and proper allowance for home bread and seed, but it is not so well known how much is left behind on the rather liberal estimate, 90,000,000, bushels; there is not more mate, 90,000,000 bushels; there is not more now to leave first hands than has already gone past. This is not a weak state of things when it is remembered that all winter wheat points except one, and that shows an unimportant increase, are reducing stocks. Renewed assurances come from Europe that the estimate of 200,000,000 bushels deficiency is not an exaggerated one. Of the 14,750,000 bushels wheat and flour affoat for United Kingdom, some 40 per cent. is from the Pacific coast, which will occupy several months in transit and nearly another ten per cent, is from India, also involving long journey, while better crop Australia will not be available in England till well towards mid ummer. The ports of Southern Russia will soon be closed; those of Danubian region have no wheat to spare. It is fair to infer, therefore, that better export enquiry now observable here, and east will soon develop into brisk demand and that lower ocean freight rates promised for January will be the means of extra large shipments from this side warranting decided elevation in prices. FISH, CANNED, ETC.—Green cod continues very scarce and active and prices have advanced about 50 cents per barrel. The market is now almost bare of Labrador salmon which is firm at quotations, and higher prices are looked for. Some sales of British Columbia are reported at about quotations, and stock of same is very light. Labrador are somewhat easier and sales of round lots are under our quotations. Canned fish are commencing to advance and before the new year all will have passed from first hands. Oysters—Owing to fine weather, continue to arrive freely and meet with ready sale, but cool weather is hoped for by the trade as 'tis difficult to keep them in this weather.

GROCERIES .- The general report is that trade has ruled quiet. In a jobbing way there is some movement, but it is only moderate at the best. There has been a good turn-over of low grade sugars which are firm at the improvement previously noted. Yellows have sold from 5½ up. Granulated has been dull and has not sympathized with the cheaper quali-ties. Sales have been made in lots at 7½ at the refineries. Dried fruits and spices have been quiet, and only moderate priced teas continue in demand. There is a disposition to grumble at the state of trade in this line. A New York paper recently remarked:—It is said that M. Licht, instead of estimating an increase of 150,000 tons in beet crop, now estimates 38,000 tons shortage. Such reports are apt to make the public lose all confidence in experts and their statistics. The imports of raisins into the United States during the nine months ending September 30, 1889, were, according to the Bureau of Statistics' returns, 9,780,299 pounds. The total for the corresponding period last year is 13,214,725 pounds. Importations of plums and prunes were 24 429,942 pounds, against 52,775,060 pounds last year. The September imports of raisins, however, were within a small fraction of those however, were within a small fraction of those of the corresponding month last year (3,348,544 pounds), but the quantity of prunes imported during the month is given as only 742,887 pounds, against 1,948,216 last year. For Valencia raisins there is an active market in New York. Country orders were in free receipt, and local dealers were liberal operators. Best fruit sold up to 6½c, and 7½c for off-stalk in layers, respectively, while ordinary goods were taken at 5½c@6c and 6½c@7c; at the close best brands were held up to 6½c at the close best brands were held up to 61 @71c. Fine Malaga raisins also received more attention, and with generally light supplies the market is stronger in tone. A vessel arrived with 30,000 boxes Sultana raisins, but the market is not at all affected thereby, the position of affairs abroad being strong and the outlet for stock satisfactory. Currants have exhibited increased activity. Sales have been made of 600@700 bbls, and up to 4 11-16c paid for best goods. The range of the market at the close was 4\frac{1}{2}c \mathread{M4}\frac{1}{2}c as to Goods to arrive cannot be purchased below the inside figure.

HIDES AND SKINS.—Very little is doing in this line, and quotations are almost nominal Only a few transactions are reported at last week's prices, and the market is dull and lifeless at our quotations.
