

CONTRACTS ARE UNFAIR PLAINTEERS

They Say They Are Tied Up For a Year Without Knowing What Future Holds.

The executive of the Ontario Teachers' Alliance has raised the standard of rebellion against certain forms of contracts which boards of trustees of high schools compel teachers to sign in engaging their services.

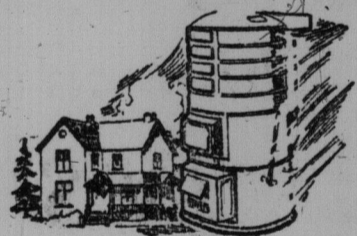
The communication, which is styled "an open letter to high school boards," is as follows: "Gentlemen: Four years ago the teachers of Ontario, part of a mounting example of those engaged in other occupations, formed an organization to safeguard their interests.

"There has recently been brought to the notice of the executive of the alliance an inequitable form of contract which allows trustees to discharge teachers at any time on giving one month's notice, but binds teachers to a year's contract, terminable only on their giving two months' notice before the close of a school year.

Object to Disturbance. The members of the executive are in full sympathy with trustees in their desire to prevent disturbance of classes by changing teachers during a term, or even during a school year, which this form of contract contemplates.

"It seems just, therefore, that boards of trustees that require such a yearly agreement should have regular schedules of salaries, stating both initial and maximum salaries, with rate of annual increase, so that teachers accepting positions with them would know what the prospects are likely to be.

"The executive of the alliance trusts that boards of trustees will recognize the unfairness of both classes of agreement referred to above, and the wisdom of adopting schedules of salaries in order to assure greater permanence, and begs to express the assurance that it will give the alliance much more satisfaction to work in harmony with boards of trustees than to be called

Political Intelligence

The news from Ottawa that Sir Frederick Borden would succeed Lord Strathcona as high commissioner in London, and the consequent reorganization of the Nova Scotia wing of the cabinet, produced quite a flutter in local political circles yesterday.

As far as Nova Scotia is concerned, the action of the government in opening two seats is based upon the effect of the recent provincial election when the Murray administration was sustained by a substantial majority.

As already outlined, a cabinet shuffle affecting the Quebec ministers is likely to take place. Hon. Sydney Fisher has a senatorship up his sleeve, which he will use in the event of the worst happening.

Both Liberals and Conservatives expect gains in Ontario. The former think the rural constituencies will give large government majorities on account of the popularity of reciprocity among the farmers.

Senator Bailey, the chief Democratic opponent of the agreement, was finally forced to make the "lay" by offering his amendment to attach the Farmers' Free List Bill, recently passed by the house, to the reciprocity measure.

Senator Penrose to-night predicted that a vote on the passage of the bill would be taken next week. He is not insistent upon fixing in advance a time for the final vote, which will be taken when the debate is exhausted.

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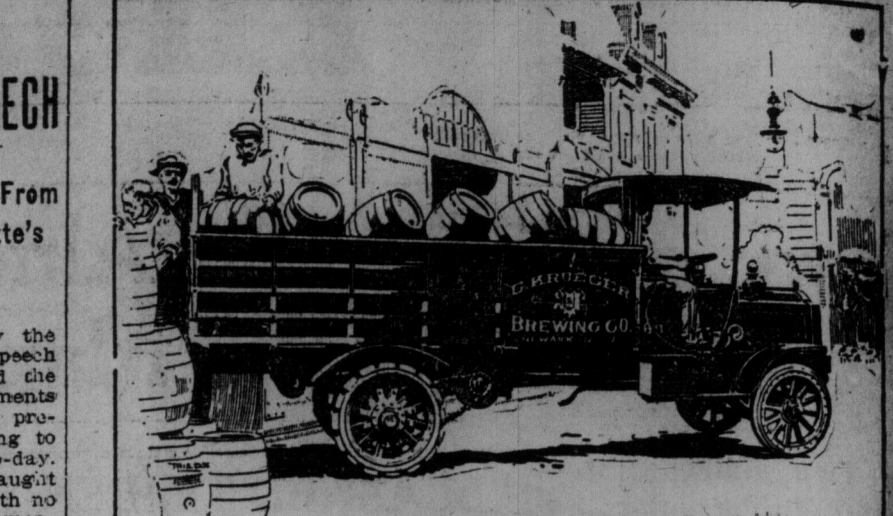

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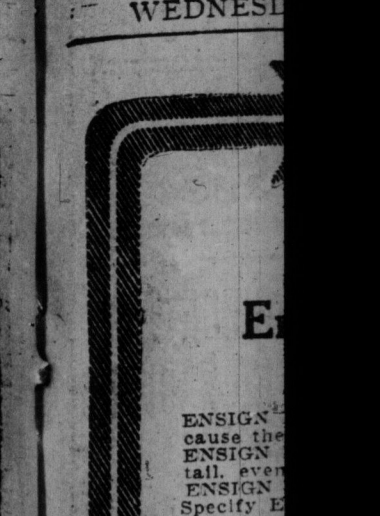

BIG N. TORONTO GROWD BOOSTS ANNEXATION

Mass Meeting Called to Oppose Favors It Almost to a Man—Fine Audience and Good Speaking.

NORTH TORONTO, July 11.—(Special)—If the board of control and the city council are disposed to doubt the finality or conclusiveness of the annexation vote of the Town of North Toronto at the last January municipal election, they would have been disabused of them at last night's mass meeting, called by Mayor Brown. The gathering called by opponents of the measure was turned into a veritable triumph for the friends of annexation. The crowd for this time of the year was a mighty good one, and composed of representative business men and citizens all the way from Davisville to Bedford Park, and the meeting throughout was interesting and withal good-natured.

At 8 o'clock his worship Mayor Brown called the meeting to order, naming over the petitioners at whose request the gathering had been called to discuss the annexation and incidentally the railway situation. The petition set out that in view of the general interest manifested and the interference of the Ontario Railway Board without being asked by the city or the county, the issue took up the question of railways and annexation. Hostility to closer union between the two municipalities was elicited out of all over the document. Singularity enough not one of the petitioners was present in the hall at the hour appointed, but a few of them drifted in later in the evening.

His worship, in a brief, comprehensive speech, outlined the action of the council with respect to the vote of the people on annexation, claiming that taking everything into consideration the annexation had been made. The council were all animated by one desire, to carry out the will of the people as expressed in the vote. He touched the matter of double tracking Yonge street and stood out strongly against any further delay pending the settlement of annexation. The mayor's remarks were timely and his argument cogent.

W. G. Ellis, in a labored address of some length, sought to discredit the vote of January, and declared that another ought to be taken before the next municipal vote. He conjured all sorts of evils in the event of closer union with the city, and worked hard, but ineffectually to change the sentiment of the meeting, which was manifestly strong for annexation.

Councillor Howe said no course was open to the council other than to carry out the will of the people. While he has his own views on annexation, he strongly supported the people's mandate. Robert Armstrong, the one of the petitioners in the final analysis, favored the annexation as did Mr. Logie, who pointed with pride to the splendid record of the North Toronto public schools and declared that they would bring credit in the larger sphere of city life.

To my mind the day has gone past for the discussion of annexation," said H. H. Ball, "that question was settled by an overwhelming vote of the people at the last election. The council have a mandate from the people to go ahead. He charged that as part of the city they would be in a stronger position to combat the wiles of the

new parish house of St. John's Church. The building will cost over \$18,000 instead of \$15,000 as at first thought. Work will be commenced as soon as possible on the building, which is to be built on the eastern side of the church, on the present lawn.

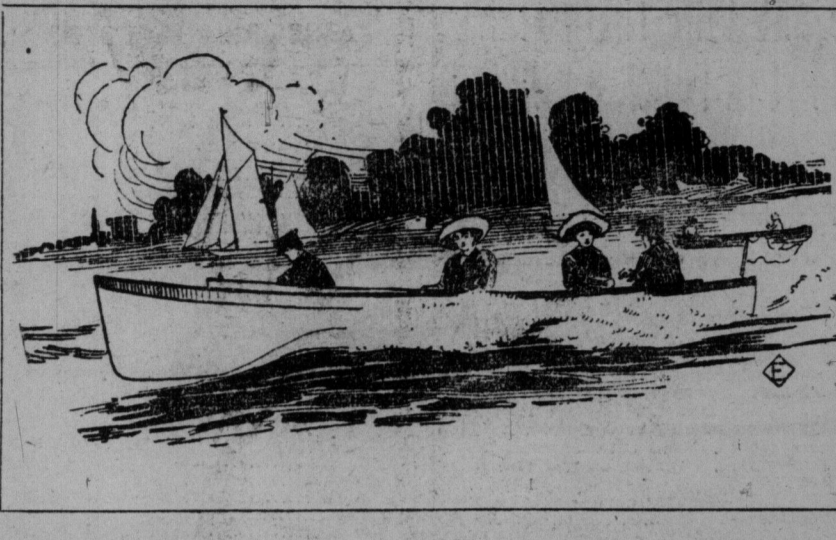

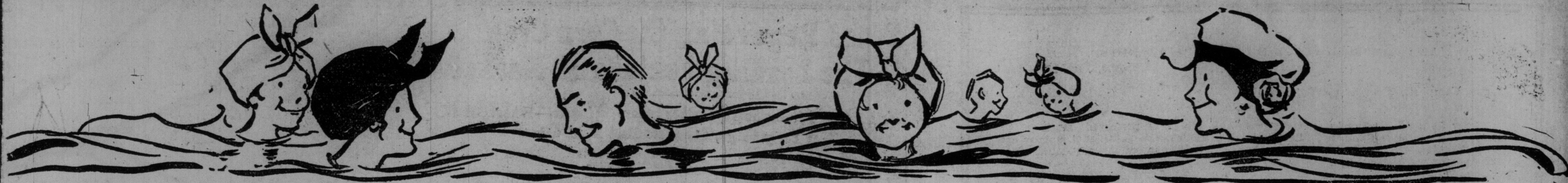

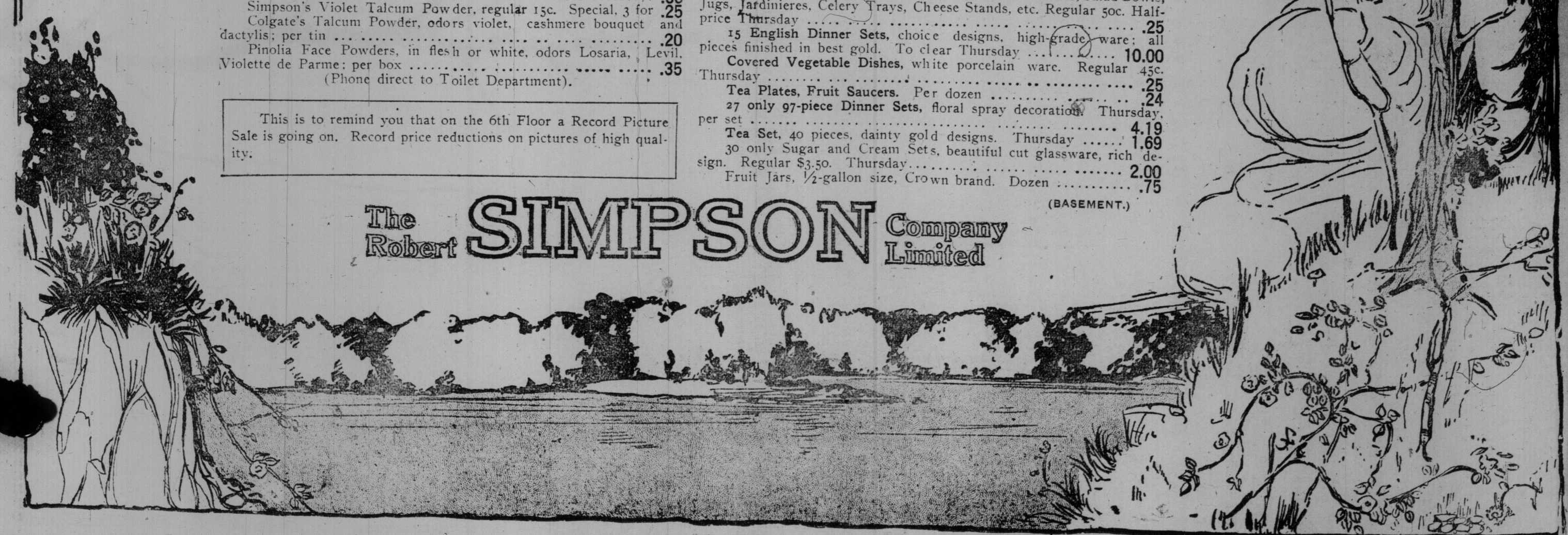
