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

ELECTRICITY FROM PEAT.

European engineers are engaged at present in investigation of methods of utilizing peat as fuel in electric stations. Southern Bavaria, for instance, has vast peat fields which would serve to run electric plants of large size and this would give a great reserve power. The peat bogs He mainly in the region of the Danube. and are estimated to cover an area of 500 square miles. Supposing the peat layer to be only 3 feet in thickness and the cubic foot of peat to afford but 3 pounds of fuel, this will mean a supply of 50 million tons. With the operation of extracting the peat regularly carried on during the year for 300 days, this can afford 700,000 horse-power in the space of 50 years. The fuel can be burned under boilers or it can be used in special producers secure a supply of gas for industrial purposes.

Ty Cobb Favors Boston to Win First Game Today

Still, Boston baseball critics have compiled an interesting set of figures to illustrate the remarkable effectiveness of the Red Sox pitchers this year, upon which they base the confident belief that the coming world's series will be captured by the American League champions. The Boston figures include the games played by the Red Sox up to the last week.

Ray Collins, the crack southpaw, won it games and lost 5, coming to the rescue of O'Brien, Hall and Pape, and being withdrawn eight times. His percentage of victories was 737, with thirty-four passes, two hit batsmen and seventy-seven strike-outs.

Charley Hall, Boston's best relief pitcher, won 17 and lost 9, with two ties. He relieved other boxmen in twelve instances and was taken out of thirteen games. His winning percentage was .654 for thirty-four games, in which he handed out seventy-one free tickets, hit four and fanned eighty-two.

Hugh Bedient, who is finishing his first year in major league company, won 16 and lost 9, with a percentage of .640 for thirty-five games, having been used as a relief pitcher eleven times, and being taken out of the box in eleven games. He gave fifty-three passes, hit two men, fanned 114, made a wild pitch and a balk.

Buck O'Brien, the noted spitbail artist, won 17 and lost 18, with a percentage of .567 in thirty-five games. He relieved three and was knocked out nine times. He passed eighty-mine, hit ten, fanned 107, and was credited with seven wild pitches.



Far different is the situation of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and by a far different title is the property of that company held. It is not the property of the stockholders. It is true the legal title thereto has been vested by parliament in the company, but primarily for the public benefit.

The railway, be it remembered, was way. Some seven hundred miles of it tractors proposed to finish the line under a new contract, by the terms of which they should operate the entire line, when completed, not primarily for their own profit or benefit, but as agents for the government. The government of Canada was bound, by the terms of the union between the Dominion and British Columbia, not only to construct a railway across the prairies and mountains to the Pacific coast, but to efficiently maintain and operate it forever. At that time it was thought advisable to have the road completed, and, when completed, to have it operated, not by a commission, but by a corporation to be created by parliament for that purpose, under the name and style of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. It was a national enterprise, for which the nation was to furnish, and for which it did furnish, the money and credit. But the work of construction and the work of operation was committed to an agent or partner, who was to get a share of the profits for services rendered. That the public benefit was the primary object in creating the Canadian Pacific Railway which reads as follows:

"Whereas by the terms and conditions of the admission of British Columbia into the union wth the Dominion of Canada, the governent of the Dominion has assumed he obligation of causing a railway to be constructed connecting the seaboard of British Columbia with the ralway system of Canada;

"And whereas the parliament of Canada has repeatedly declared a preference for the construction and operation of such railway by means of an incorporated company, aided by grants of money and laud, rather than by the government, and certain statutes have been passed to enable that course to be followed, but the enactments therein contained have not been effectual for that purpose;

"And whereas certain sections of the said railway have been constructed by the government, and others are in course of construction, but the greater portion of the main line thereof has not yet been commenced or placed under contract, and it is necessary for the velopment of the Northwest Terri-'tory, and for the preservation of the good faith of the government, in the performance of its obligations, that mmediate steps should be taken to complete and operate the whole of

With regard to the latter, Mayor Geary suggested the immediate laying of a track, double or single, on Annette street from Keele street to the western limits. He also thought that notice should be served to the Toronto Street Railway to extend their Bloor street line westward.

No Worse

He assured the citizens that their condition with regard to transportation was no werse than in many other parts of the city and drew attention to the only remedy, namely, civic lines. His address was largely pacific and he assured Ward Seven that their interests were being well looked after.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader hay live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
