HEARS RUNS SO CLOSELY HE MAY UPSET ADVERSE VOTE

REPUBLICAN IN DOUBT

With Majority of 3000 For McClellan, Municipal Ownership Party Claim Proof of 50,000 Fraudulent Votes Cast by Tammany—Hearst Pledges Himself to Fight the Issue Out.

JEROME'S MAJORITY IS 8000 "GOOD GOVERNMENT" TRIUMPHS

New York, Nov. 7.—Returns to midnight indicate that George B. McClellan, Democrat, is re-elected mayor of New York by between 3000 and 4000 plurality over W. R. Hearst, municipal ownership, and that Wm. T. Jerome, Independent, is re-elected district attorney by about 8000 over James W. Osborne, Democrat.

At midnight Mr. Hearst declined to admit his defeat, and declared his intention to contest the election. At that time the returns from 184 election districts had not been received. McClellan had 295,588, Hearst 293,570, and Wm. 190,228 votes.

The following statement was issued at midnight by Mr. Hearst:

"WE HAVE WON THE ELECTION. ALL TAMMANY'S FRAUDS, ALL TAMMANY'S CORRUPTION, ALL TAMMANY'S INTIMIDATION AND VIOLENCE, ALL TAMMANY'S FALSE REGISTRATION, ALL TAMMANY'S ILLEGAL VOTING AND DISORDERLY CONDUCT HAVE BEEN OVERCOME BY A GREAT POPULAR MAJORITY. THE RETURN WILL SHOW THAT WE HAVE WON THE ELECTION BY MANY THOUSANDS OF VOTES. I SHALL FIGHT THIS BATTLE TO THE END, IN BEHALF OF THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE CAST THEIR VOTES FOR ME, AND WHO SHALL NOT BE DISFRANCHISED BY ANY EFFORT OF CRIMINAL BOSSES."

"WILLIAM RANDOLPH HEARST,"

In New York County, the Municipal Ownership League endorsed a number of the Republican candidates for the state assembly, and late returns indicated that the Democrats had lost 12 assemblies from this county.

Max Ihmsen of the Municipal League said to-night that the league had evidence of 50,000 illegal votes having been discovered in all five boroughs, and that the law committee of the league is gathering all the evidence. Mr. Ihmsen also announced that all the candidates in all boroughs on the Municipal ticket had been asked to assemble at Mr. G. Hearst's office in the Hoffman House for an all night conference on Nov. 8.

An Unprecedented Fight.

So close was the contest that up to 11 o'clock the results were not known. At that time indications were that McClellan had been re-elected for a four year term, and that Jerome, Independent, had been re-elected district attorney. The extent to which the Tammany organization was being re-elected had not been ascertained, but that Jerome, running as a candidate for no party and with his record in office, would be re-elected was becoming the former prestige of the Democrat organization, and Hearst's stand as a candidate for the Municipal Ownership League, a new factor in the New York politics, came within a few thousand votes of being elected.

Bird S. Coler was elected borough president of the Municipal Ownership League, and Hearst carried that borough by a plurality of 5425.

Hearst's large vote shows that the Municipal Ownership League must be reckoned with in all future municipal politics. Coler's election as president of the borough of Brooklyn gives the league representation on the board of estimate and apportionment, which has control of the city's expenditures. It is estimated that this board will direct the outlay of \$390,000,000 during the next four years.

Whirlwind Campaign.

Less than a month ago when Hearst accepted the nomination of the Municipal Ownership League, McClellan's re-election was regarded as a certainty. The Democratic vote in the election was already won and McClellan himself declared that he intended to make only a few speeches.

With a sudden outburst of remarkable enthusiasm support for Hearst, however, the situation changed abruptly. It was that the Democratic leaders were startled from the repose of their quiet confidence.

The weather to-day was ideal, and the polling of the city was in progress. There was little disorder, and, although many arrests were made they were not due to any disturbance of order or clerical errors and only a few men were held for trial. More splits.

LANDSLIDE FOR REFORM

Majority of Weaver's City Party Over Republican "Ring" Placed at 65,000.

Philadelphia, Nov. 7.—Philadelphia has been swept by the reform movement, the city party winning by a surprisingly large majority.

The victory of the city party carries with it the election of William H. Berry, the Democratic reform candidate for state treasurer, J. Lee Plummer, the Republican candidate for that office, was badly cut throughout the city and state, and he has lost his own county, which is usually Republican.

Contrary to general expectations, there were no very serious disturbances in the city to-day. The police department was at all times master of the situation, and wherever trouble was started it was quickly stopped.

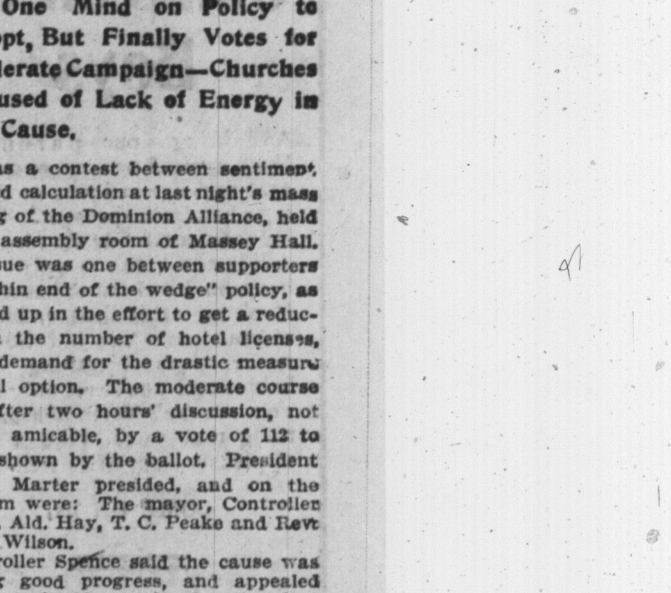

Continued from Page 1. Ring of tickets was done probably than before, yet the voting was unusually rapid. An incident of the day was the report of several hundred of Mr. Hearst's poll watchers, who went over to the opposition.

An analysis of the vote for mayor shows that Hearst polled a little more than 50,000 votes, and that the vote was drawn almost equally from the Democratic and Republican parties.

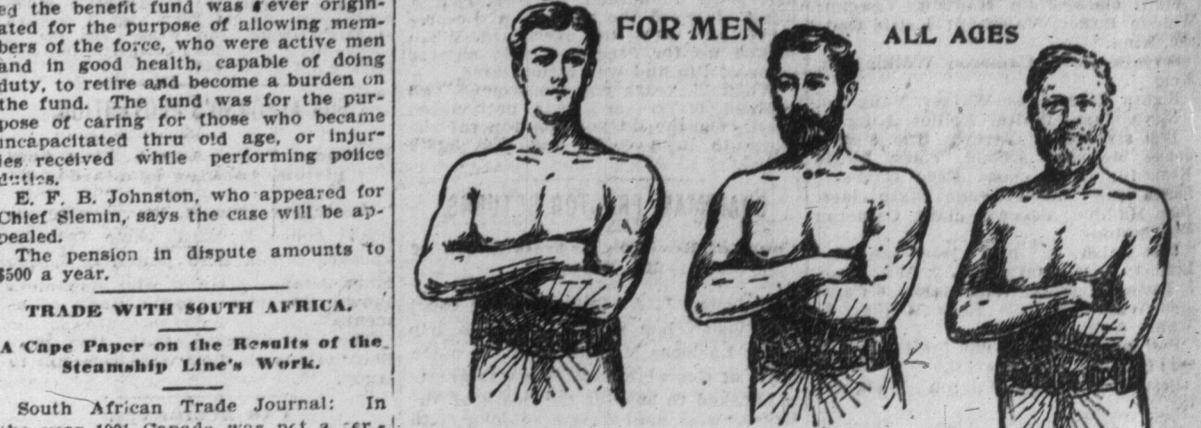

CASE TAKEN FROM JURY. PULLMAN DID NOT MURDER. Man Was Accused of Causing Death of Thomas Mahoney, But Proof is Forthcoming.

"George Pullman, you stand indicted on the charge of manslaughter, that you did slay and kill Thomas Mahoney on March 11 last," read Clerk Nichol to the man in the dock. "Not guilty," declared Pullman. After hearing the evidence on both sides, Justice Clute took the case from the jury, declared the prisoner "not guilty," and discharged him.

It will be remembered that Thomas Mahoney was found lying in a lane off Lewis-street, last March. Two hucksters who knew him came along, and, thinking him drunk, put him in their wagon and took him home, where he died a few hours later. There were some bruises on him, which gave rise to the suspicion that Pullman had met with foul play. At the inquest it was ascertained he had spent a part of the day and night in the city, and had partaken of some liquor.

Some weeks later three small boys started a story that they had seen George Pullman assaulting and jumping on Mahoney, in Michael O'Brien's house, in the city. Pullman's name was on the list of names of those who had been in the city on the night of the murder.

Chief Coroner Johnson, who made the post-mortem, described the bruises on the body of the deceased. "What caused the death of Mahoney?" asked Mr. DuVernel. "I think death was probably caused by the bruises," replied Dr. Johnson. "You say probably, doctor," said Mr. Robbette, commencing the cross-examination.

"The witness said yes and did not think there was much doubt about it," said a professional witness for the crown; a paid witness," continued Mr. Robbette. "This closed the crown's case. Mr. Robbette submitted there was not sufficient evidence to let the case go to the jury. His lordship thought it would be better to hear the evidence of the defence, as it might clear up the points, how Mahoney received his injuries."
