Toronto Junction, Feb. 7.-In conequence of the excessive rates imposed upon telephone users at the Junction by the Bell Telephone Com-pany, several of the leading storeheepers have formulated a scheme whereby the town may rid themselves of the monopoly. At the meeting of the council on Monday next a petition signed by all the leading residents and business men is to be presented ask-ing them to use their influence to see if the Bell Company will reduce rates and give the town the same tariff as the city enjoys. The petitioners say that a telephine service is an abso-lute necessity, and that they cannot conduct their business without it, but they contend that is no reason why they should be called upon to pay mearly fifty per cent. more for the privilege of using it than is paid by users in the city or in East Toronto. To all intents and purposes the Junc-tion is an integral part of the city. and the great bulk of the business of the town is done with the city. 'Yet for some Feasons best known to them-selves the Bell Company treat the Junction as an outside community, whilst East Toronto is included in the city and is given city rates. As an illustration of what this means to Junction subscribers the following facts were shown. A resident in the city desiring a comestile phone can have it at \$30 a year, and has the right of calling up any point in the city without extra charge—or a store-kceper can have a business phones with the same privileges for \$50 a year. 


