Sir Donald has all along asserted that his mission to Winnipeg was purely personal and assured Mr. Greenway so when here. Sir Chas. Tupper made the same statements for publication, but now Sir Charles parades Sir Donald as an agent of the Federal Government and produces a private telegram to Sir Donald as though it were sent to the Government. Mr. Greenway and his colleagues are indignant at the noble knight's action towards them, but, of course, they will not allow this feeling to interfere with any negotiations the Federal Government may open for the settlement of the school difficulty. Sir Charles Tupper's announcement in the Commons cannot be regarded as an official invitation to a conference and as yet there is no other intimation to that effect.





"United Brethren in Christ" are in various parts of Canada and the United States. In 1889, at a general conference held at York, Pa., 15 of the 125 delegates present objected to the admission of Freemasons as members, and to certain other changes in the constitution, and seceded. Yesterday, however, the Court of Appeal reversed the judgment, and John Itter, John Hyde and Archibald Pollock, the new liberal trustees, were given possession of the building. This case was practically a test action regarding the ownership of all property in the province belonging to this body.


