





up the question of better fire protection along the waterfront," said a wellknown marine man on Saturday. "At present there is no felling where a fire could be stopped if it once got in around the shipyards at the foot of Bathurst street, and in that locality generally. Not that the fault would be with the fire department, but it would be hard to get sufficient water. Toronto has an extended waterfront that is building up rapidly. There are docks, steamers and vessels, big coal yards, shipyards, factories, warehouses, and the like, scattered all along the Esplanade and the bay front. In case of fire, there is only the water service from the city mains, and a fire can only be fought from the one side. Take the the city mains, and a fire can only be fought from the one side. Take the lake cities of importance across the line, and a fire tug is one of the valuable parts of the equipment of the fire department. Buffalo, for instance, has three for the protection of her valuable marine interests. The last valuable marine interests. The last one was put into commission quite recently, and it is just such a tug that Toronto ought to have. The Grattan, as it is called, is one of the largest and most powerful fire boats in the world, and cost about \$100,000. Of course, Toronto could get along with a less expensive one, but the Grattan is remarkable because of her capacity for winter work. markable because of her capacity for winter work. As an ice-breaker the tug has no superior on the Great Lakes, and 20 inches of solid ice is no more a bar to her than a crust of scum. Built of steel, with an armor 11-2 inches thick, and propelled by two 20-22 high pressure engines, with an aggregate of 800 horse power, she cuts thru the of 800 horse power, she cuts thru the frozen channels, leaving a mass of frozen channels, leaving a mass of crushed and broken ice which would be little obstacle to the smallest craft. She is 118 feet over all, with 106 feet 9 inches on the water line. 


