sonal friends to-day, I have decided to withdraw my name as a can-didate for the office of supreme chief ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, believing same to be for the best interests of the order at this time, in view of legislation with reference to re-adjustment of rates and other matters. I will, however, be a candidate for re-election as supreme treasurer, a position which I have held for the

past thirteen years. "Whatever may be done by supreme court along the line of bet-tering the conditions of the order, so far as a membership is concern-ed, some of my close personal friends, and who are also friends of Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson, feel that he ought at this time to be placed at the head of the order, and after due consideration of the mat-ter to-day I have concluded that the best interests of the order may very likely be conserved by my retiring from the field at this time, in order that the campaign for the supreme chief rangership should not in any wise conflict with whatever may seem necessary to be done regarding the re-adjustment of rates."

3.-Should the corps winning the cup be disbanded at any time, the cup will become the property of the Dominion Rifle Association, to be used by the association as a perpetual annual shooting trophy, under such conditions as the committee may deem proper.

PRESENTATION OF TROPHY.

The trophy will be presented to the commanding officer, or other officer of the corps winning it, at the D.R.A. meeting in Ottawa this year.

DISPUTED POINTS IN CONNECTION WITH VOTING. Our Military Editor will decide any disputed points which may arise

in connection with the voting in the competition.

The returns will be published from time to time, showing the standing of the different units competing. The competition closes at midnight Aug. 31.

was absolutely necessary. I would respectfully recommend that the county council appoint a salaried constable for each of the four ridings of the country, to be under the control of the high constable. These would, in my opinion, be com-petent, with the assistance of the salaried constables now appointed by the towns in the county, to look after the administration of criminal justice in a satisfactory manner. The fees earned by such constables to be paid

into the county treasurer. I would further recommend that the county provide constables with books in which they should be required to enter every case in which they are engaged with full particulars of same, showing what was done and the pay-

ments made by defendants or other-wise for fines and costs, and that tiese books be produced whenever required by auditors.
