

When Dr. Frederick A. Cook cabled to The New York Herald from Lerwick, in the Shetland Islands, on Wednesday, Sept. 1, the pulsestirring announcement that, after a prolonged fight against famine and frost, he had succeeded in reaching the North Pole, the public read with avidity every detail of his wonderful narrative of suffering, endured that mankind might learn from it, and that literature be enriched by the annals of his successful flight to the top of the world.

Readers marvelled when told of sunburns and frostbites on the same day, shivered as they read how dog ate dog, that the fittest might survive, and accompanied him in fancy to the region beyond where no life is, where he felt the maddening influnce of the desert of ice, and, after incredible efforts, reached the goal and placed his flag in a tin tube on the shifting ice of the ninetieth parallel-to use his own words—"amid an endless field of purple snows, where there was neither life nor land," where he and his two Eskimos were the only two

It is worthy of note that Commander Peary's impressions of the pole are, like those of Dr. Cook, disappointing. There was nothing striking to be seen, nothing to stimulate enthusiasm; but they had pierced the boreal centre.

When Dr. Cook's story was made public, the world, thrilled by the narration, hailed him as a discoverer. But a few newspapers and partisans of the other Arctic enterprise denied its truth, altho they accept without question the equally marvellous story furnished later by Commander Robert E. Peary.

These critics said no man could make fifteen miles a day beyond the eightieth parallel. But Commander Peary has done more than

They scoffed at dancing horizons and mirages that turned things topsy-turvy. But Commander Peary makes corroborating allusion to the same curious atmospheric effects created in higher latitudes by the diffused light, which seemed to come from all directions at once.

Other critics have declared that Dr. Cook was unprepared, whereas facts furnished by his backer and friend, John R. Bradley, in July, 1908, show that the expedition was carefully planned and thoroly equipped with dogs, sleds, pemmican and other necessities of polar explora

"THE CONQUEST OF THE POLE."

(By Dr. Frederick A. Cook.) FIRST INSTALMENT.

The expedition was equipped at Gloucester, Mass. All was ready on the evening of July 3, 1907. Ashore, boys were testing their fireworks for the morrow of celebration, but aboard, as our vessel, the John R. Bradley, withdrew from the pier, all was quiet. There were no visiting crowds of curiosity-seekers; no tooting whistles signalled our de-

An Arctic expedition had been born without the usual public bombast. There was ,indeed, no excuse for clamor. Neither the help of the government nor the contributions of a private individual had been sought. The prioect was quietly given life, and its expenses were paid by John R. Bradley. Its destiny was shaped by the writer. Mr. Bradley was interested in game animals of the north. I was interested in the game of the polar question. For the time being, the business concerned us only. If the venture proved successful, there would be time enough to raise the banner of victory. If it failed, none had the privi-lege of heaping upon us the unmerited abuse which usually comes to the

As we headed for the boreal wilds and plowed with satisfying force toward the northern waters, there was time to re-examine the equipment and review prospective contingencies of the campaign. In a brief month, all had been prepared for the peculiar mission. We had purchased a strong Gloucester fishing schooner fitted with a motor, covered for ice and loaded down with suitable supplies for a prolonged

One morning the bold cliffs of Cape York were dimly outlined in the gray mist which screened the land. A storm had carried so much ice against the coast that a near approach was impossible, and continued winds kept us at sea and made it equally difficult to land on the ice.



WEDNESDAY MORNING

rising water. Darting thru the air were countless guillemots, gulls, little auks, and eider ducks. We were in the ice-free north waters, where creatures of the sea find a marine oasis in the midst of a polar

The coast was about two thousand feet high, evidently the remains of an old table-land which extends a considerable distance northward. Here and there were short glaciers which had cut down the cliffs in their effort to push to the sea level. Beyond the long, straight line of red cliffs a conical rock, the navigator's sign-post, rose from the deep. Soon the long ice wall of Petowik glacier rose, and beyond, to the eastward, were perceived the waving white of the overland sea of ice, which

submerges the interior of all Greenland.

This kind of coast extends poleward to the land's end. It is the abundant sea life which makes human habitation just possible here, tho land animals are also important.

The people of the farthest north are crowded into a natural reservation by the Arctic ice-wall of Melville Bay in the south, and the stupendous line of cliffs of Humboldt Glacier in the north. This coast

extends over but three degrees of latitude, but with its many bays and the great fords of Wolsterholme Sounds and Inglefield Gulf, the sea line drawn out to about four thousand miles.

HOME OF THE ESKIMOS. Widely scattered in small villages, the northermost Eskimo finds here a good living. A narrow band of rocky land between the land ice and sea offers grasses, upon which feed ptarmigan, hare and carlbou. Numerous cliffs and islands afford a resting-place in summer for myrlads of marine birds that seek the small life of the icy waters. Blue and white fox wander everywhere. Seal, walrus, narwhal and white whale sport in the summer sun, while the bear-king of the polar wilds —roam over the sea at all times seeking abundant game. This little tribe of most primitive man does not feel his hopeless isolation.

The yacht dodged the icebergs and dangerous rocks in the fog

about Cape Athol, then turned eastward to cross Wolstenholme Sound. As we neared the mountain which guards North Star Bay, many natives came out in kayaks to meet us. Some were recognized as old friends. There was Myah, he of many wives, and Ooblobah, who had executed Angodgibsah, styled the villay by Gibson, at Redcliffe House, and Pincott, husband of the queen, in whose family are to be found the only high-bred children of the tribe. Later Knud Rasmussen, a Danish writer living as a native among the people, came aboard. With him we got

better acquainted during the week.

Engines were disabled by a loose universal joint, so we lowerd a launch and two dories to tow the yacht to a safe anchorage. At high tide the vessel was grounded, a propeller, which had been bent, was straight-ened, and the universal joint put to rights. In the meantime the launch was kept rushing to and fro, with Mr. Bradley and the writer as passengers. On shore the harpoon gun was tried, and around the bay waters we bagged a number of elder duck.

Late at night a visit was made to the Town of Oomanooi. There were seven triangular sealskin tents, conveniently placed on picturesque rocks. Gathered about these in large numbers were men, women and children, shivering in the midnight chill. They were oddlooking specimens of humanity. In height, the men averaged but five feet two inches, and the women four feet ten inches. All had broad, fat faces, heavy trunks and well rounded limbs. Their skin was slightly bronzed. Men and women had coal black hair and brown eyes. The nose was short and the hands and feet were short but thick. A genial woman was found at every tent opening, ready to receive the visitors in due form.

NOT ENOUGH WIVES.
We entered and had a short chat with each family. There was not much news to exchange. After we had gone over the list of marriages and deaths, the luck of the chase be came the topic of conversation. It was a period of monogamy. Myah had exchanged a purality of wives for a larger team of dogs, and there was but one other man in the tribe with

Women were rather scarce. Several marriageable men were forced to fore-go the advantages of married life because there were not enough wives for all. By mutual agreement several men had exchanged wives; in other cases women had chosen other partners and the changes were made seemingly to the advantage of all, for no regrets

were expressed. With no law, no literature and no fixed custom to fasten the matrimonial bond, these simple but intelligent peo-ple control their destinies with remarkable skill. There was an average of three fat "clever children for each"

a seat, and on each side were placed stone lamps in which blubber was burned with moss as a wick. Over this POLE AND RETURN. WITH DATES MARKING was a drying rack, and there was other furniture. The dress of furs gave the Eskimos a look o of savage fierceness which their kindly faces and easy temperament did not warrant.

On board the yacht there had been busy days of barter. Furs and ivery had been gathered in heaps in exchange for guns, knives and needles. Every seaman, from cabin boy to capeain, had suddenly got rich in the gamble of trade for prized blue fox skins and narwhal tusks.

The Eskimos were equally elated with their big bargain. For a beautiful fox skin, of less use to a native than a dog pelt, one had secured a pocket knife that would serve him half a lifetime. A woman had exchanged her fur pants, worth a hundred dollars, for a red pocket handkerchief, with which she would decorate her head and igloo for years to come.

Another had given her bearskin mitts for needles and conveyed the idea that she had the long end of the trade. A fat youth with only a smile displayed with glee two bright tin cups, one for himself and one for his pros-

All of this glitter had been received in exchange for an ordinary ivory orn, worth about \$90.

Be Opened Next Monday. At a meeting of the provincial cabinet yesterday definite steps were taken to rush the reconstruction on the por-

to rush the reconstruction on the portion of the paritament buildings damaged by the recent nrs. A sub-committee of council was appointed, composed of Hon. J. O. Reaums, minister of public works; Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands, forests and mines, and Hon. J. S. Hendrie, who will act as chairman, to have full charge of the work.

As far as practicable the west wing, when completed will be fireproof. The floors will be laid with tile and concrete, the roof will be of fireproof material, and steel girders will replace the mass of wood between the floors, which time had dried like tinder. 

A vigorous vindication of Japanese commercial morality and an equally vigorous assault on present missionary methods in that country were striking features of the lecture of W. T. R. Preston, Dominion commissioner to Japan, on the social, economic and religious problems of the Flowery Kingdom, delivered in the Parkdale Presbyterian Church last night.

Lieutenant-Governor Gibson occupied the chair and introduced the lecturer.

"The Japanese," said Mr. Preston, "have been called a nation of llars, a nation of thieves; but as a class they are just as honest as we are. Ninety-five per cent. of the foreigners in the east are anti-Japanese. Now the foreigner is not there for his health. He has set himself for personal reasons to break down the commercial reputation, not of a firm, not of a community, but of a whole nation."

Inegarding the assertion that Japanese, hanks had to have Chinese "overseers" to handle the money, he said the unity banks in the empire employing Chinese were two foreign institutions in Yokohama and Kobe.

It may be summed up as follows: The act of incorporation of the Ontario Power Company is a Dotthe Company is a Dotthe Ontario Power Company is a Dotthe Company is minion act, passed in 1887, whereby the company was given power to take the waters of the Welland or Niagara Rivers and develop power; in the case of the Niagara River, at certain points on the Canadian side. No charge was made by the Dominion Government for the water, because the operations of the company were said to be "for the sencompany were said to be "for the gen-eral advantage of Canada." This act provided that no water development should be installed in the Niagara Falls Park, without the consent of the lieu-tenant-governor of Ontario in council and of the Niagara Falls Park Com-

Power Company's Agreement.

The Ontario Power Company with the park comnissioners for their consent, and an agreement was entered into on April 11, 1900, which gave the power company a license for fifty years with privilege of renewal to instal its plant in the park, and the rental to be paid for this license was computed upon a sliding scale. The rental was made up of a fixed annual charge of \$15,000 and a certain rate "for each electrical horse-power generated." This agreemen makes it clear that no claim-proprie-tory or otherwise-was ever made by the province to the waters of the Niagara River; the Dominion had con ceded the free use of the water for power purposes to the company; the province received its rental for the use of the site.

Mr. Lobb thought if the province was sitting over a volcano, this was the first intimation of it, for the Ontario Power Company had been doing business for years. He further pointed out that the most careful scrutiny was given to the rights of the power company before the hydro-electric contract was executed, as this involved a possible expenditure of \$40,000,000 for power and no chance was taken. Under it the company is compelled to deliver power, o matter what the cost may be to self.
