ACTION IN GREECE
Roumanians Make
ALLIES' DEMANDS REJECTED
FORCES TO LAND IN GREECE

Garrison of Athens Withdraws Inland, Taking Arms, Munitions and Stores, and City is in a State of Feverish Anxiety—French, British and Italian Detachments to be Landed at All Points Necessary.

London, Dec. 1.—The Greek Government has sent a reply to Vice-Admiral DuFournet, definitely refusing his demands, according to a Reuter despatch from Athens.

Special despatches from Athens dated Thursday, say there is a growing state of anxiety in the city. The Greek garrison seems to have withdrawn inland, taking arms, munitions and stores. Two regiments left during the night with artillery.

The despatches add that there was alarm in the streets Thursday morning due to the appearance of bands of revolutionists, but that later it was ascertained they had been called for service. The authorities seemed to be doing their utmost to preserve order.

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### SAYS LATE S. MAY CHILDISH AT DEATH

#### Cousin Alleges He Was Influenced in Disposing of Large Estate.

### RELEASED FROM JAIL

#### Justice Sutherland Finds Sandwich Farmer Not Properly Committed.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday an attempt to set aside legacies under the will of the late Samuel May and for the removal of W. G. Thurston, K.C., and Charles F. Wheaton as executors came before Mr. Justice Clute on an application by Albert D. May for an injunction to restrain the executors disposing of the estate or voting upon its shares in the Dodge Manufacturing Company. The application was adjourned for a week and L. P. Hellmuth, for the defendants, undertook that in the meantime there should be no disposition of the estate and no voting on the stock. J. Gray appeared for the plaintiff.

The plaintiff states that he and his three sisters were cousins and next of kin of the late Samuel May. He had entered the employ of the testator shortly after the foundation of the billiard table business, some forty years ago. Considering these and other circumstances he expected that the late Mr. May would fully provide for himself and his wife in their old age. Plaintiff alleged that his cousin was easily influenced and of a trusting disposition. He further declared that at the time of his death he had approached second childhood.

Dr. Andrew Eadie, who attended Samuel May since May 6, 1911, said that the disease with which he was affected had a great influence on the brain and thoughts and rendered him susceptible to be influenced by the will of another.

### Released From Prison.

Mr. Justice Sutherland yesterday delivered judgment ordering the release of Harry Knight, a farmer, from the jail at Sandwich, where he was confined for the alleged, unlawful and wilful neglect of his two children. On Feb. 2, 1914, Knight was charged before H. Smart, police magistrate for the Town of Kingsville, Essex County, with neglect of his children, Lulu and Delbert Dodge, by reason of drunkenness and disorderly habits. On the back of the information the magistrate endorsed a memorandum of the alleged conviction to the effect that the accused would be sent to Central Prison for one year with hard labor, the sentence to take effect in thirty days unless Knight disposed of his property and moved from the neighborhood. Below this were added the words, "Sentence suspended," written probably at a later date. No formal conviction had ever been drawn up under the hand and seal of the magistrate.

On Sept. 28, 1916, Magistrate Smart issued a warrant for the commitment of Knight to the Central Prison for one year, adding that sentence had been suspended until the above date. Knight was arrested and was confined in the jail at Sandwich. He applied for and obtained a writ of habeas corpus on Oct. 31, 1916, and on this motion for discharge the accused attempted to show by affidavits that he was wrongfully held.

Mr. Justice Sutherland, in returning judgment, said: "I am of the opinion that the evidence was sufficient to warrant a conviction. I am unable to find any conviction on which the warrant of commitment could be properly laid on this ground alone. If suspension of sentence can be considered as having been made under section 1081 of the Criminal Code then the magistrate had not called upon accused to appear and receive judgment."

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### ANOTHER HEAVY MAIL.

The vast bulk of the Christmas parcel mail for overseas troops is on its way, according to the local postal authorities, who state that the parcel mail that closed in Toronto on Wednesday night does not exceed 30,000 parcels. This mail is a large one, however, and will require about 2,000 sacks to transport it. Two weeks ago, when the heaviest parcel mail closed, there were almost 45,000 parcels and 3,000 bags were required.

### WILL MOVE QUARTERS.

The soldiers' aid commission is expected to move its quarters at the end of this week or the beginning of next from its office in the parliament buildings, where it is now, next to the license commission's offices, to the house on College street, formerly occupied by Sir John Gibson when he was lieutenant-governor. 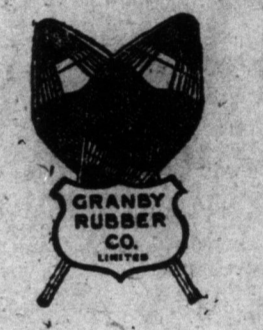
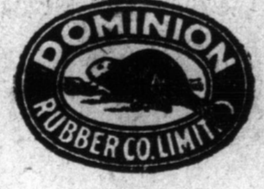

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

BUILT FINE BARN NEGLECTED CROPS

That is What Canada Has Been Doing, Says W. C. Good, B.A. Farmer.

MENACE TO NATION

Decrease of Agricultural Population and Production a Very Serious Problem.

The present condition of agriculture in this country is a menace to its national safety, said W. C. Good, B.A. farmer of Brant County, who addressed the Empire Club in the St. Charles Hotel yesterday.

Canada had for twenty or thirty years been following a mistaken policy of national development, said he. It had been like the farmer who mortgaged his farm to build a splendid barn and neglected the crops to put in it.

The rural problem which faced Canada was a very vital one. It arose from first, curtailment of production. He himself had been forced to reduce his herd. Lands that had produced crops were now used for cattle walks.

Real estate experts agreed that the fill had seriously affected the value of the land.

The Bloor street fill, which is to cost \$40,000, was discussed at the board meeting yesterday. The board recommended to council that \$15,000 be added to go ahead with the work at Eriehill avenue, and they recommended providing the city treasurer reports that he can raise the funds. "Funds don't fall like the dew from heaven," he added.

Controller Thompson is definitely out of the running for next year's board of control. At yesterday's session he declared that in fairness to members of council who might have had aspirations, he should state publicly that military duties would prevent him to run. "I'm in this war game to the finish now," he concluded.

Upon motion of Controller O'Neill the board yesterday to cease work on the construction of the electric car line on Lansdowne avenue north of Davenport road, pending negotiations for the extension in a diagonal line of Lansdowne avenue to connect with Davenport road. Assessment Commissioner Forman is authorized to negotiate with the Royce estate for the purchase of land necessary to straighten out the route.

The board of control recommended to the city council yesterday "that the city measure the winding up of the accounts for the year of civic departments be authorized to apply unrequited balances of appropriations to the credit of overran appropriations in such departments and also to apply extra and unappropriated revenues to meet the requirements of the year of civic departments since the passing of the estimates, reporting all such transfers first to the board and council for approval.

Controller Foster, chairman of the sub-committee of council investigating the financing of various charitable organizations, recommended to the board yesterday that the practice of appropriating fixed sums of money annually to organizations caring for children be discontinued, and that hereafter, in lieu of such appropriation, a per diem allowance of 25 cents per capita be paid. It is also recommended that application be made for legislation to provide that outside municipalities shall be liable for the cost of maintaining in such institutions children belonging to such outside municipalities.

Mayor Church, Controller O'Neill and Secretary McQueen figured in a three-cornered verbal battle at the board meeting yesterday, when the mayor took exception to Mr. McQueen volunteering information to the controller. The question of military grants was up for discussion. "Mr. McQueen is not a member of the board," said the mayor, "and he must not interrupt the discussion."

Controller O'Neill: I asked him for information, and he gave it to me. The Mayor: He did not. He volunteered it. Controller O'Neill: I say he did not, and I'm not going to swallow anything like that from you even if you are mayor of the City of Toronto. If you would listen less to promptings from outside, we would get more business done here.
