'Carry Your Lunch' Crusade Hits Cafes and Restaurants in New York

Noticeable Decrease in Number of Diners in Downtown Restaurants. BOSTON SHOWS LEAD

New York, Sept. 24.—(Special)—Office forces of many concerns have turned the tables on high-charging restaurant owners of the city by instituting the "Carry-your-own-lunch" movement. Small, neatly folded packages and paper bags were carried today by many clerks and stenographers when they reported for work, and there was a noticeable decrease of diners in the downtown lunch rooms last year.

Wilson Refuses to Obey Congress and End Treaties

Declares That Section of the Merchant Marine Act Is Irreconcilable With Respect U. S. Has Always Shown for International Engagements—Claims Congress Has Exceeded Authority.

Washington, Sept. 24.—President Wilson has declined to take steps toward terminating certain commercial treaties as directed by congress in the merchant marine act, holding that "such a course would be wholly irreconcilable with the historical respect with the United States has shown for its international engagements."

British Miners Agree to Truce to Meet Owners

Will Endeavor to Formulate Some Scheme of Increased Production. OPPOSITION TO STRIKE

London, Sept. 24.—A truce has been declared in the coal mining dispute to permit the miners representatives and a committee of colliery owners to hold a peace conference at which an endeavor will be made to arrange some scheme of increased production, whereby the miners can get an increase of pay without having to resort to the strike which has been threatened for several weeks past.

Collect New Tax by Stamp System

New Sales and Luxury Tax Regulations Effective After Nov. 1.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—(Special)—After November 1 a change is proposed in the method of collecting the sales and luxury taxes. Dealers have constantly complained of the inconvenience of the present method, so the customs department has decided to inaugurate a system of collection by means of stamps. Dealers will be furnished free with a perforating machine for canceling the stamps.

Request Glover to Demonstrate

Federal Department Asks Him to Tell of His Cancer Treatment.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—(Special)—Dr. Glover, the Toronto physician who has come into prominence in connection with his work with the treatment of cancer, will be asked by the Dominion department of public health to demonstrate his method to the Academy of Medicine at Toronto.

Another Drop in Price of Sugar

One Cent a Pound Reduction in All Grades Coming on Monday.

Montreal, Sept. 24.—(By Canadian Press)—It was learned here today in wholesale sugar circles that all Canadian sugar refiners will on Monday announce substantial reductions in all grades of refined sugar. The drop in prices which is being planned will, it is understood, consist of a reduction of one cent a pound on granulated and all other grades of refined sugar.

Misunderstood, Premier Explains

Did Not Accuse Hydro Commission of Delaying Investigation.

Premier Drury said yesterday that he was misunderstood in his speech at Oakville on Thursday in relation to his remarks regarding the Hydro-Electric Power Commission. "I don't blame them," he explained, "for holding up the work of the radial railway commission of inquiry. There is a great deal of work in connection with the preparation of the data they were asked for, and in all fairness to the commission I must say they have not willfully delayed matters."

Big Break in Wheat Sensation in Chicago

Futures Drop About Twelve Cents, Selling Being Due to Belief That Wheat is Unduly High in Comparison With Other Grains and General Merchandise Values.

Chicago, Sept. 24.—Wheat became the main target today in an attack in high prices. An exciting smash in the market resulted and final quotations were 10 1/2 cents to 12 1/2 cents below last night's closing. General selling of wheat was provoked by the striking contrast between the recent upward trend and the downward course of other grains and of merchandise values. The relative strength of wheat had been ascribed chiefly to urgent buying for export to Europe, but today's selling at \$2.25 to \$2.25 1/2, and a fall in foreign account was noted here.

Official Thanksgiving on Monday, October 18

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—An order-in-council gazetted this week formally names Monday, Oct. 18, as Thanksgiving Day, and urges all Canadians to observe that day as one of special thanksgiving.

Seamen's Strike Over

Port Arthur, Sept. 24.—The striking seamen today accepted the offer of the Canada Steamship Lines of a ten-dollar-a-month increase in wages and no recognition of the Seamen's Union.

Two Desperados Captured in West

Tisdale, Sask., Sept. 24.—Two of the bandits that held up a poker game at Red Deer Lumber Mills at the weekend and then engaged in a gun fight with Constable Ives and a posse on Monday afternoon were captured without a shot being fired at Peesene, a small way station on the C.N.R. line about 50 miles west of Hudson Bay Junction, at noon today. The bandits were engaged eating their dinner, and were taken absolutely unawares.

Big Cutting Drive Under Way

Lumber, Food and Clothing Materials Take Further Slump and Belief Is That Movement Is Only Fairly Begun—General Effect Will Be Wholesome.

New York, Sept. 24.—Reports from various sections of the country today served to confirm the belief that the high peak of prices in general has been passed, and that, while there may be exceptions here and there, the general trend is definitely downward. Price-cutting is extending to numerous lines. A decline in food prices and a gradual reduction in prices charged by restaurants throughout the United States was predicted here today by August Janssen, president of the Society of Restaurateurs.

Goldsbury, 6 Feet 5 Inches Tall, Wanted in Parchment, Miss.

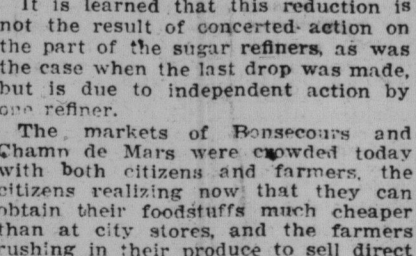

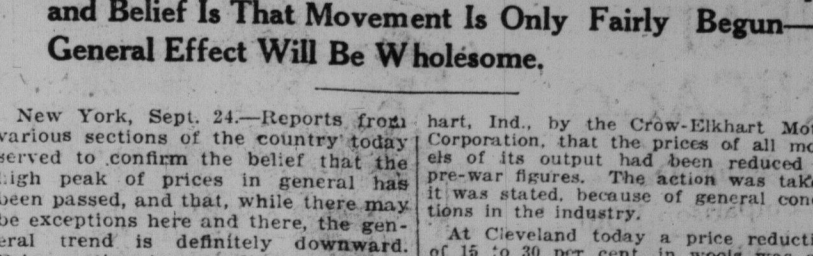

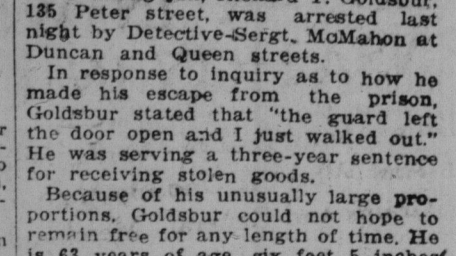
