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JINGO NEWSPAPERS IN JAPAN CLAMORING FOR CONFLICT WITH CHINA

But High Official in Japanese Service Says Japan Will Not Resort to Force Unless Compelled To.

TOKIO, March 7.—Japanese newspapers continue to urge the government to take strong measures against China. A meeting of the cabinet today will probably decide the government's course. It is understood that the older statesmen, including Ito and Count Inouye, are counselling that there be no precipitation, on the ground that Japan would alienate the sympathy of the world if she hastily created a state of war in the far east at this juncture on account of a comparatively trivial incident and a mistake made by a minor official at Canton.

CONDUCTOR TELLS HIS SIDE OF IT

Wm. MacNeill Charged With Theft from St. John Railway Co. in the Police Court This Morning.

Charged with appropriating \$20 of his employer's money William J. MacNeill, formerly a conductor in the employ of the St. John Railway Company, who was arrested yesterday, was arraigned before Judge Ritchie this morning when he virtually admitted his guilt. MacNeill's company owed him about two dollars. He also stated that during the first three months he was in the plaintiff company's employ he had made change out of his own money, but had subsequently received from them \$20 to be used for that purpose. MacNeill had been on hand to take charge of his car on two or three mornings, he had been laid off for thirteen days, during which time he received no pay. He had taken the money because he really needed it and had spent half on clothing and the other half on board and other things.

STILL MAKING THEM

LONDON, March 6.—(Tommy) Burns, the heavyweight prize-fighter, today withdrew the deposit he had put up with a local sportsman as a forfeit to bind a match with "Jack" Johnson, the American negro pugilist.

THE MOORING OF THE BEAVER

C. P. R. Object to Harbor Master's Disposal of the Mayes Dredge.

The C. P. R. is up in arms against Acting Harbor Master Frank Alward for allowing the dredge Beaver to be moored in Nelson's slip on the west side. They claim that the work of loading and unloading freight there is being interfered with. Mr. Alward claims that the Beaver does not interfere with the C. P. R. and that there is no other place suitable for tying up the dredge at present.

RACE TROUBLE IN VANCOUVER

Asiatic Exclusion League is Making Things Lively—Hindus in Police Court.

VANCOUVER, B.C., March 7.—(Special.)—At present there is no intention to hold a parade here tomorrow, all arrangements to that end by the Asiatic Exclusion League having been abandoned. On Monday evening the annual meeting of the league promises an exciting time, for one or more members are to be expelled for insubordination and for endeavoring to bring about a parade or a riot without consulting other members. A very lively meeting is expected. In the event of membership being expelled, the possibility is that a new branch of the North American Asiatic Exclusion League will be formed here.

GEORGIAN BAY CANAL WILL DO BIG THINGS

M. J. Butler, Deputy Minister of Railways, Says Its Construction Will Solve Canada's Transportation Problem.

OTTAWA, March 7.—(Special.)—M. J. Butler, deputy minister of railways and discussing the Maycourt Club, said that Canada's transportation problem would be solved in the construction of the Ottawa and Georgian Bay canal.

GALES ON BRITISH COAST

LONDON, March 6.—A violent gale has swept the coast of the British Isles today. There have been numerous reports of small craft, most of them off the coast of Ireland. Altogether about 20 lives have been lost.

TRAINING OUR OFFICERS

OTTAWA, Mar. 6.—(Special.)—The report of the militia committee for the six months ending March 31st, was issued today. It says, correspondence has taken place between the Canadian and imperial governments relative to a proposal emanating from the latter that the officers of the Imperial yeomanry regiments in Great Britain when visiting or temporarily residing in the colonies should be attached to colonial mounted forces for training purposes and similarly that members of colonial mounted forces visiting the British Isles should be attached for a like purpose to Imperial yeomanry regiments.

FRANK GOTCH WINS

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 6.—Frank Gotch, the champion American wrestler, tonight lost a handicap match to Joe Rogers, being able to throw Rogers but twice, the rules governing the contest requiring that he should down Rogers five times within an hour. The men wrestled catch-as-catch-can style. Gotch secured the first fall in 20 minutes and the second in 36 minutes. Rogers throughout the match was entirely on the defensive and often crawled on the mat to prevent being pinned down.

G. B. Coombe, who has resigned his position as C. P. R. steamship ticket agent here, to go to Winnipeg, may not leave Quebec until Monday. From here he goes to Montreal, where he will remain a few days, and then he goes west. G. P. Burpee, of St. John, has been appointed to succeed Mr. Coombe in his position here for the present and he may be permanently appointed later on.—Halifax Herald.

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GERMANY LAUNCHES AN IMMENSE NEW WARSHIP; THREE CORE BUILDING

The Nassau Launched Today is by All Odds the Most Powerful Battleship in the Kaiser's Navy.

WILHELMSHAVEN, Mar. 7.—The first mammoth warship of the German navy was successfully launched here today and christened Nassau by the Grand Duchess of Baden, Empress William, the Grand Duke of Baden, Prince Henry of Prussia, and Prince Henry of the Netherlands, as well as a brilliant assemblage of prominent officials were present. Wilhelm Von Henningberg, lord lieutenant of Hesse-Nassau, made a speech in which he greeted the new vessel as a welcome addition to Germany's sea power and a defender of the interests of the empire.

SUGGESTS BURNS FOR HIGH PLACE

London Spectator Suggests That British Labor Leader be Made Chancellor of Exchequer.

LONDON, March 7.—The high place that John Burns, president of the local government has assumed in the estimation of the public, is illustrated by the fact that the Spectator, a most conservative weekly newspaper, today seriously suggests him for the highest post in the cabinet, namely the chancellorship of the exchequer, in the event of Mr. Asquith becoming premier and finding it necessary to resign the chancellorship.

ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING

PORTLAND, Me., Mar. 6.—Thomas DeLan, 32 years of age, who for several years has followed the sea, in fact having just returned from a voyage to Australia, died almost instantly this evening as a result of an accidental shooting. DeLan was at the home of his father, where he has been stopping since his return home. He was in the best of health and good spirits and during the evening was engaged in examining a 20-caliber revolver that he had just bought. His parents were in an adjoining room and heard him light a match as if to light his pipe and in a minute or so afterwards heard the shot.

MONTREAL, Que., March 7.—(Special.)—Stocks were strong today. Canadian Pacific, which advanced from 144 yesterday to 145 1/4, further advanced to 146 1/2; and Power rose from 88 1/4 to 89 1/2; Detroit United sold at 33; Twin City at 33 and Slaughtings at 64.

HAD A TURKEY SUPPER

George A. Blair, who was chairman for the opposition party in Wellington ward, Q. 2, entertained the active workers in that division at a turkey supper at his home last evening. About a dozen were present, and greatly enjoyed the evening. There were congratulatory speeches. John E. Wilson, who was present, was given a great reception, and responded in a happy vein.

WAR INEVITABLE

BERLIN, March 7.—(Special.)—Emperor William says that Lord Tweedmouth is a flannel-mouth. Hoch der Kaiser! LONDON, March 7.—(Special.)—The gross insult offered by the Emperor of Germany to Lord Tweedmouth, in calling him a flannel-mouth, has aroused the greatest indignation here. A cabby, who was offered a frankfurter at a restaurant this morning, refused to pay his bill, and called the waiter a Dutch bloke. Further outbreaks of popular wrath are expected.

BARNEY'S WIDOW GIVES UP ALL TO PAY HIS DEBTS

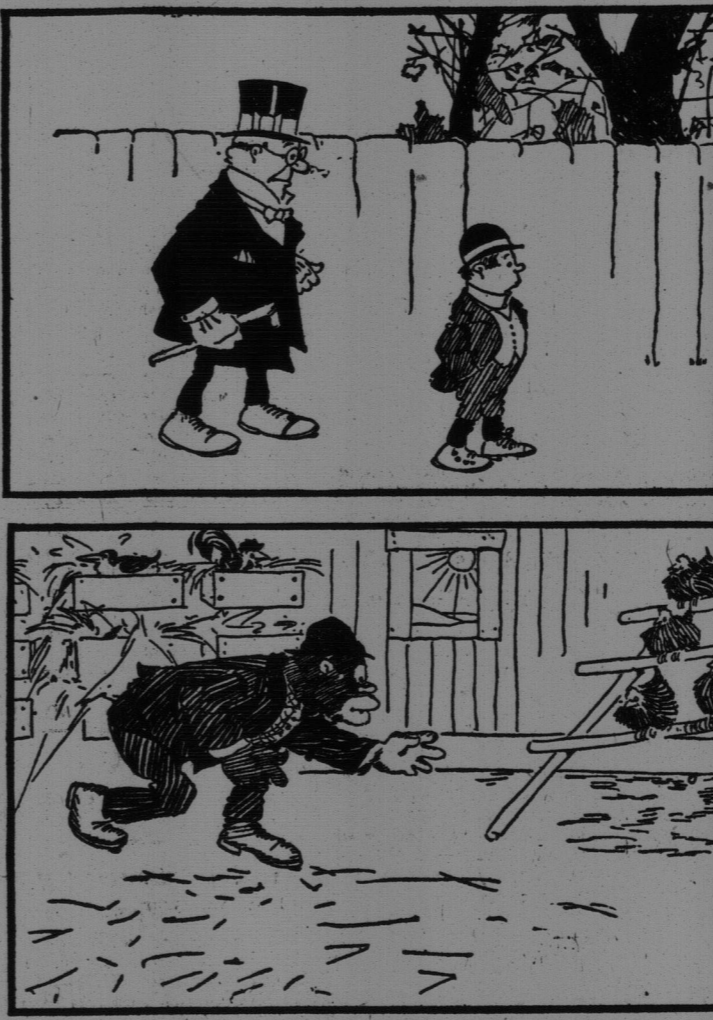
She Surrenders Dower Rights in \$9,600,000 Estate So that Her Husband's Creditors May Be Paid in Full.

LIVIC AFFAIRS

The citizens of St. John should follow up their recent declaration for better provincial government by effecting a change at City Hall.

It is true that there have been some changes in the civic outlook since last year. The waterworks extension has been completed and there only remains in connection with it the work of strengthening the distribution system.

But the negotiations with the federal government for taking over the harbor have not been carried on as they should have been, and they call for keen and careful consideration, that full justice may be done to the city in any agreement which may be made.

There is also the question of reorganization of the civic departments, which the present council has apparently been afraid to take up in real earnest.

It is perhaps hopeless to expect that any changes in the direction of commission government will be made, and there is therefore the more reason for the existence of a vigorous, progressive and independent set of men at City Hall.

The question of the city's finances is one that calls for a thorough enquiry and a clear statement of actual conditions.

There has been too much disposition to let things drift and adopt temporary expedients.

The citizens should therefore arouse themselves to a state of active interest in these matters, and prevail upon the most capable and energetic business men available to become candidates in the coming civic elections.

"AN AMUSIN' CUSS" The most amusing comment on the New Brunswick elections that has yet appeared is found in the editorial columns of the Charlottetown Patriot, which gravely says:

"The result of the provincial elections throughout New Brunswick yesterday, will be a surprise to the whole Dominion. That province has certainly taken a retrograde move, and set back the hands of the clock of time, at least for years to come.

A province that is so distinctly and directly interested in the progress of the Liberal government, to cast its vote for a policy of retrogression and one that is pledged to retard the great works being constructed throughout New Brunswick, must have been blinded by the snow storm which prevailed all day.

Although the contest had been a hot one, the people generally have shown a remarkable apathy and indifference during the whole campaign until the last few days. The opposition has resorted to a most disgraceful kind of slander to carry the country, and although their statements have been disproved beyond the shadow of a doubt, still they have no doubt had a certain effect on the electorate.

It has always been held that promises not performed win elections, and it would appear as if this were correct. The Liberal government has been carrying on great railroad works throughout New Brunswick and it is the intention to make Moncton one of the greatest railway centres on the continent. Notwithstanding all this, the people have decided against a return to the days of starvation, hard times and general stagnation.

It will be news to the people that Mr. Hazen is pledged to retard great works that are being constructed throughout

New Brunswick, or that "the Liberal government has been carrying on great railroad works throughout New Brunswick." The editor of the Patriot makes large drafts on the credulity of his readers.

FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Ontario will take vigorous action to stop the ravages of tuberculosis. At a conference in Toronto on Wednesday, at which Earl Grey presided, and which was called by the National Sanitarium Association, delegates were present from 44 municipalities and 17 counties.

The conference passed a resolution asking that the provincial government materially increase the grants toward stamping out tuberculosis in the province. Next morning the delegates formed a deputation and met up on Premier Whitney and his cabinet and presented the views embodied in the resolution. The Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, assured the conference that the government was very much disposed to assist.

Discussing the subject the Toronto News said: "Municipal representatives everywhere are beginning to realize what a burden on the community this disease is imposing, and how necessary it is that something should be done to stay its ravages. Undoubtedly, the sanitarium treatment is the only effective remedy, not only for the cure of individual cases, but to prevent infection. There is a general feeling that the provincial government might well be asked to aid the movement by increasing the contribution towards the maintenance of patients in sanitariums. Under the act of 1901 this contribution was fixed at \$1.50 per week per patient. The actual cost of maintenance at Muskoka in 1902 was \$6.02, and last year \$9.86. The increase is mainly due to the advance in the cost of living. It seems plain, therefore, that \$1.50 in 1901 is not as much as \$1.50 in 1908.

In Portland, Me., an interesting experiment is being made with sanitarium treatment of consumptives. The question is one that must soon be taken up and dealt with in an enlightened manner in the province of New Brunswick.

THE DRY DOCK

The Sun complains that Dr. Pugsley has been slandered by the assertion that he promised the construction of a dry dock as an inducement to the election of Carleton on the eve of the elections. Here is the Sun's own report, on March 3rd, of what Dr. Pugsley said:

"The minister also fully explained the new dry dock legislation and referred very fully to the provisions of the new act now before parliament, which he felt sure would bring about the early commencement of the work of construction. The provincial government was, he urged, entitled to great credit for the very liberal aid to this important work. With a large modern dry dock, such as this would be, well equipped with a ship repairing plant, employment would be given to a great many people."

This of course is not a direct promise of a dry dock. It is a promise of the Pugsley order, akin to those concerning the Central, and the sale of the St. John Valley Railway, the sale of the Central, and the reference was made to influence the voters of the west side on the eve of a provincial election.

"Political independence is an admirable thing. But when it is used as a cloak for partisan attack — when it is proclaimed with intent to mislead the public into the belief that subsidized partisan yawn is honest and independent opinion—it becomes a despicable thing."—St. John Sun.

These, brethren, be the words of wisdom and experience. When the Sun was taken over by the present owner it declared itself to have become a fearless and an independent journal. Wherefore, brethren, hearken unto this testimony, in which there is no guile.

Premier Robinson had ample time to fill the vacant offices which are now the subject of discussion, but he did not do so because he feared the support of disappointed aspirants would be alienated. He evidently considered that there was no urgent need to fill them. Has anything occurred to create a more urgent necessity? This is a question his opponents at least will be likely to ask.

MONEY IN WHEAT

WINNIPEG, Man., March 6.—The chief grain inspector of the Manitoba division has issued a statement embodying the amount of grain inspected by his department during the six months, September to February inclusive.

The report clearly sets forth the fact that though the standard of the wheat has not been the equal of past years, the amount of grain inspected has at least raised a large quantity of grain, and with the splendid prices realized, are in an eminently prosperous condition.

The total wheat inspected was considerably more than for the same period last year, but of course, there was a big falling off of the high grade grain. There is great scarcity in the higher grades of oats, while the number of cars rejected is 3,353, against only 148 for the same period of last year, a very discouraging condition.

DEMANDS FAIR PLAY FOR THE SCHOONERS (Charlottetown Patriot). We have received a letter from A. G. Baillie of Port Hastings, N. S., demanding equal rights for the schooner owners of the maritime provinces. It appears that coal companies, discriminating against sailing vessels. This is a long standing complaint. The effect of such treatment is disastrous to the trade, to the owners, to the charterers of vessels and in many cases consignees of cargoes. Very often it has been necessary for small schooners to wait for weeks to get a chance to load, although in some instances cargoes have been booked. The only excuse offered was the desire to load the steamers which were in port, some of which had come in long after the schooners. It would appear that equal rights for rich and poor is not observed by these coal companies, and unless the Dominion Government takes the matter up, the schooners will ultimately be driven out of the trade to the great loss of the owners, and the people of the province. Hundreds of hard working seamen are being unjustly treated and the only appeal they have is to the government. This is a matter that the boards of trade should take into consideration and we trust that at the mass meeting to be held in Halifax on March 12th, inst., when the board of trade of the maritime provinces will be represented, as well as various business organizations, that this matter will be liberally upon with a view to having the schooners get fair play.

THE PURITY MOVEMENT (Montreal Star). It would be interesting to know just what part the purity movement played in the result of the New Brunswick elections. If it succeeded in preventing the corrupt use of money to any considerable extent, it probably weakened the efforts of the party with the most money. If we can get given details of their work, now that the fight is over, the rest of us may learn something from this New Brunswick experiment. There will be a feeling, too, that the result here, as in Ontario, establishes the reputation of the "quiet vote" for independence when the occasion comes. A change of government always means a change of opinion; and a change of opinion means, at least, that the people have been thinking, and are not debarr'd by party ties or political cowardice from acting upon the conclusions they have reached.

KAISER'S MEDITING AROUSES GREAT BRITAIN'S RESENTMENT
William of Germany Foolishly Interferes With England's Naval Programme — Old Bitterness Revived.

London, March 6—An outburst of anger against Emperor William by the British public, equaling that caused by the German emperor's famous message to President Kruger, some years ago, has followed the announcement made this morning by the Times that Emperor William attempted to influence the British naval policy by a secret correspondence with Lord Tweedmouth, first lord of the admiralty.

The Germanophile party, which never was stronger than now, immediately jumped to the conclusion that Emperor William was trying to meddle in the most vital matter in Great Britain's national interests by underhand methods. The public is so angry that they had enjoyed for many days. The matter is considered so serious that Lord Tweedmouth broke his customary reticence and hastened to say:

"The letter from the German emperor is purely a personal communication and there is no reference in it to British naval estimates."

Lord Tweedmouth visited the house of commons this afternoon and conferred with the Liberal leaders. The cabinet met afterward. It had been announced at first that Herbert Henry Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, would make a statement concerning the matter Monday; but the public was so excited and so many members of parliament had given notice that they would speak on the subject that the cabinet decided that something must be done at once. Mr. Asquith appeared, therefore, in the house of commons at the close of his sitting and made a brief statement to a crowded house, elaborating and profound silence.

"It is a fact," declared the chancellor, "that on February 18 Lord Tweedmouth received a letter from the German emperor. It was a purely personal and private communication, conceived in an entirely friendly spirit. My noble friend's answer was equally private and informal, and neither the letter nor its answer was known or communicated to the cabinet. I may add, in view of certain suggestions which have been made, that the letter never arrived at the cabinet and that the final decision with regard to the naval estimates for this year."

These explanations only stimulate curiosity and criticism, instead of appeasing them, and a strong demand is heard everywhere that the emperor's letter be published. Nothing else will satisfy the British public, and probably this will be done eventually.

The only inkling regarding Emperor William's letter which has leaked from the inner circle is that it was an attempt to reduce the British fleet to a leading English newspaper that the German naval programme was animated wholly by hostile intentions. If this prove to be the true version of the incident, the whole sensation may collapse as quickly as it grew, but the letter, if it were of the nature suggested by the Times it will be equally as damaging to the government to publish it as withhold it unless Lord Tweedmouth should be re-elected and thrown overboard.

The present position of the affair embarrasses the government immensely and brings a shower of criticism upon Lord Tweedmouth. It would be a delicate matter to ask Emperor William's permission to publish a private letter and he may voluntarily authorize that it be done.

If the relations between Great Britain and Germany were not so strained, the action in writing the letter would be considered nearly a technical mistake, or an informality, but in the present state of a large proportion of the British people, who firmly believe she is deliberately planning war and is trying to excite British suspicions until she is ready. Nothing could be more inflammatory than to charge the emperor with trying to undermine the British strength by seducing her naval minister from the policy of a big navy.

Emperor William has intended lately to gain English friendship by paying a visit to England and other advances, but the Germanophobes refuse to believe these overtures were made in good faith. He is a profuse and impulsive letter writer and is said to have written to other British ministers previously. It is said that Lord Tweedmouth. Sober second thought may convince Englishmen that they have done him an injury. In the meantime, the newspapers are saying that he should make any statements regarding the British navy that he desires to make, through the regular diplomatic channels, and are criticizing Lord Tweedmouth because he did not immediately place the letter before the cabinet.

The government is in an awkward position now to handle any critical international question, because Sir Edward Grey on the continent and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the prime minister, is too ill to be considered an official minister. As a result of the official explanations already given here and at Berlin on the Emperor William-Tweedmouth correspondence, the opinion is expressed by the majority of the morning newspapers that the Times has discovered a "rare's nest" or at least has quite unnecessarily magnified the importance of the affair, but pending Lord Tweedmouth's promised statement next Monday, decided comments are withheld.

The Daily Telegraph, in a statement claiming to be a true explanation of the affair, describes the emperor's letter as an innocent and hastily penned after-dinner note of colloquial character, unsuited for publication in its verbatim form. While all the newspapers agree to the advisability of publishing the correspondence if the emperor's consent is obtained, to clear up all suspicions, it is considered impossible that either house of parliament could call for its publication, because such action would amount to an insult to the emperor.

That both Emperor William and Lord Tweedmouth have been guilty of a serious indiscretion there is but one opinion and even newspapers friendly to the government remain Lord Tweedmouth's duty was his duty to submit such communication to the cabinet. Lord Tweedmouth is seriously taken to task for allowing the contents of the letter to become known.

The Chronicle editorially hopes that the unfortunate series of indiscretions may lead to a real effort by Germany and England to arrest new naval construction, in which case both countries would have an equal reason to rejoice.

WHITE'S KILLING AT CITY BOND SALE
Morgan Bid Signalled to Him from Comptroller's Office Window by His Man.

(N. Y. American.)

Abraham White, the postage-stamp bond bidder, blew in to the comptroller's office yesterday to visit Comptroller Metz, and he incidentally dropped the cheerful news that he has cleaned up something more than \$100,000 recently in a few turns he has made in New York city bonds. If things turn out as White expects, he will be a wealthy man.

According to his breezy narrative he not only sold the bonds but he also got Metz in getting away with nearly \$4,000,000 of the bonds disposed of at the recent sale, but he put a large crimp into the bank roll of a number of Wall street firms who have been accustomed to speak of him as "the postage-stamp man."

White was on the job every minute when the last bond sale occurred, and though the comptroller and Wall Street believed that he had been effectively squelched by the rejection of his bid at the September bond sale, he says he had his senses posted right in the comptroller's office, watching every move that was made.

SIGNAL FROM A WINDOW.

"I had a signal given me right out of that window the minute the Morgan bid was read on Sept. 14," he said. "I saw the man also signalled me the price offered. Five minutes later I was buying all the bonds that were left in the market. I knew that the men who had bid through that syndicate and expected to get bonds were going to get into the open market to get them. Consequently I bought."

"There was a scheme on to depress the price of the city's bonds before the sale that I had seen in Wall street and I got the \$500,000 issue for nothing. The price was deliberately run down through some thin wigs not genuine sales men at all—and it was made to appear that the city's credit was at low ebb."

"The big bankers in Wall street who wanted to bid on the bonds tried their best to find out what I was going to do. They called me up on the phone and kept asking me, 'What are your figures? What are you going to do?' I was not tipping my hand about them and I told them I would let them know half an hour before the bids were opened. Some of the questioners are friends of mine, and I told them that I had sold them the bonds at 104 1/4. My bid went in for \$8,400,000 through other men."

"Several days before this sale I was right in the market. The city's bonds were selling at 108, and I knew that these fellows were going to beat the price down, I had sold at 108 at right, and better. I had foreseen happened. They did run the price down."

QUICK CURB WORK.

Just before the sale a little fellow down on the curb called out New York city bonds for 104 1/4. My man said '104 for 100,000.' 'Wait till I go on the 'phone,' he said. 'All right, how many do you want?' My man said, 'I'll take 1,000,000.' He had been to the 'phone, too, and talked to me. So I covered on the bonds that I had sold at 108 at right, and better. On all these sales I averaged about a 2 1/2 per cent gain. I kept right on buying after the sale and the market has justified my price."

"When a big block of bonds came out directly after the city's sale all these fellows thought they were mine. White, I guess you are in bad, and they offered to buy the bonds over at a low price, say 102, of course, they were mine. 'Buy what I had sold at that figure,' said I and gave them the laugh."

White is forming a big bond syndicate to buy up all the New York city bonds now on the open market. He says the price must go to 117, and that there are profits of 25 per cent. for any one who goes into his syndicate. He says he has always been a booster of the price of New York city bonds.

"Metz owes me a lot for making the market for New York city bonds. I may be a postage stamp bidder, but I'm no pirate. I've always consistently refused to enter into any game to repress the price of any government security."

CHANCE FOR THE CANADIAN CLUB
Judge Ben. B. Lindsey, of Denver, Speaks in Bangor Next Month.

(Bangor Commercial)

Judge Ben B. Lindsey, of Denver, Col., the most noted of juvenile court reformers gives an account of his stewardship which deserves attention beyond the circle interested in methods of reforming boys arrested for violations of the law. The thought he stimulates goes into all dealing with boys.

Judge Lindsey reports that a proportion of six out of seven of the boys who have come under his care have become average good citizens, while in another large city, which preserves the old system of putting boys prisoners with adult convicts, 75 per cent. of those arrested go back to jail.

Boy nature has no variations so wide that philosophy good for those who happen to fall into the hands of the law is not good for you all. Judge Lindsey's report supports the doctrine adopted long ago by most people of insight. If a child is judged as a criminal, treated as a criminal and driven to criminal companionship, he will acquire the criminal habit and the criminal point of view. The doctrine goes further. If a child is treated as a fool, an evil thing or an undesirable citizen, he will tend to that habit and that point of view.

Charity, appreciation, optimism and patience are necessary as teaching and discipline to the making of a good man; and it takes almost omniscience to analyze the qualities of any boy of ten years and say whether he is to be a good man or a bad one.

Judge Lindsey tries to increase the growth of good qualities by fertilizing the underlying boyish motives. Everybody has not his gift of understanding these motives, but it is every adult's duty to make sympathetic efforts to puzzle them out. After all, they may not be obscure if the search is made thoughtfully.

Judge Lindsey is to lecture in this city next month and there will surely be a large audience of our best citizens to welcome him to city hall and listen to his discussion of that weighty social problem now engaging so large a share of public attention for philanthropic citizens and social reformers: How to save the boys and give them another chance.

CANADA'S REVENUE LARGELY INCREASED
Returns from Canals Were \$88,000,000 in Eleven Months.

Ottawa, March 6—The financial statement of the dominion for the eleven months of the current fiscal year, as entered on the books of the finance department on February 29, shows a total revenue of \$87,077,299, an increase of \$8,629,749, as compared with the corresponding eleven months of 1906-7.

The total expenditure on consolidated fund account for the eleven months was \$60,720,333, an increase of \$10,735,686.

The capital expenditure for the period was \$29,758,488, of which \$20,183,850 was for public works, railways and canals, including construction of the National Transcontinental Railway. The surplus of the total revenue over the total expenditure for eleven months is \$11,118,458.

For the month of February the total revenue was \$6,577,927, a decrease of \$740,783 as compared with February last year. For the eleven months the total post office revenue has been \$3,307,250, an increase of \$602,097. Customs revenue has increased by \$7,040,878 and excise by \$545,384.
