





(Montreal Witness.) The Presbyterian General Assembly will open in Erskine Church on June 5. The retiring moderator is the Rev The retiring moderator is the Rev. Alexander Falconer, D.D., of Pictou, Nova Scotia, and he will open the Assembly with a sermon, and constitute the Assem-

It is impossible to predict who is likely to be the moderator for next year. Many names have been mentioned for the office, but the so-called nominations by presby-teries have no legal effect, being merely

recognized leaders, and this year the church is sending up a very large number of new names both of ministers and elders.
