





"We have begun all wrong in ice hockey in the United States," Geiger declared. "The bringing of Canadian stars to American teams, has under-mined our whole system. Giving men-jobs and inducing them to come to the states to make up hockey teams, is all wrong. The proper method is to teach the youngsters."
