FOR MEN OF COURTESY BAY
Fine Hall With Baths, Gymnasium, Reading Rooms and Moving Pictures to Be Opened Tomorrow
The work on the new hall at East St. John is now nearing completion and it will be in readiness for the official opening on Friday afternoon and evening...
The building presents a very neat appearance both outside and in. It is painted green and white on the outside and is finished inside with natural Douglas fir and pine...
The principal room of the building takes in the whole height of the building in front and is thirty feet long and twenty feet wide, and will be used for a gymnasium, class purpose and for moving pictures. The room for the picture machine is on the porch at the front entrance, and is separated from the main body of the building by asbestos and sheet metal. Immediately behind the gymnasium, downstairs, are the bathroom and dressing rooms. The bathroom is fitted with the shower bath, connected with hot and cold water. The dressing room opens off the bathroom and is furnished with sixty lockers...
Upstairs over the bathroom and dressing rooms are two social and reading rooms, between which are folding doors which can be thrown open, thus converting the two rooms into one. Off one of these rooms a library has been built with accommodation for more than 200 volumes, and on the walls are series of racks in which will be kept the principal magazines and periodicals. Two reading tables and one writing table supplied with all the requisites for correspondence will be furnished. There is an office for the attendant in charge of the building...
The heating is accomplished by a large hot air furnace in the basement, and the water supply is taken from a 200 gallon tank placed under the roof in the rear of the building. This tank will be filled from an artesian well nearby...
The chief purpose of the hall are to afford a means of recreation, entertainment and general benefit for the large number of men who are employed on the harbor by Courtenay Bay, and the St. John Presbytery, which has built the hall, is to be complimented on the excellent start made towards that end. The committee who favored the scheme and carried it into execution are especially deserving of praise. The committee consisted of Rev. Gordon Deane, chairman, Judge Forbes, Rev. James Ross and George E. Knight. Mr. Knight will be in charge for the ensuing year...
No membership fee will be charged for the privileges of the building with the exception of the baths and the motion picture shows, for which a nominal charge will be made to cover the expense. The rooms will be open to all the men on the works, and will be non-sectarian, and the committee are fully convinced that the project which they have taken will be greatly appreciated by the workmen.

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ENJOY SPEECH BY SIR CHARLES TUPPER

Canadian Club Members Have Unexpected Pleasure

SEES BRIGHT FUTURE

Veteran Statesman Pays Tribute to New Brunswickers—Interesting Address by Professor Kyle on Canada East and West

Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., the only living member of the first government of the Canadian confederation and ex-premier of Canada, arrived in St. John yesterday and will sail today on the S. S. Empress of Ireland for England, where he will visit his daughter, the wife of Major Cameron at Bentley Heath, near London. He was accompanied to St. John by his nephew, C. T. Hillson of Amherst, and Mrs. Hillson, and Mr. and Mrs. D. Pottinger.

Although in his 82nd year, Sir Charles is still hale and hearty and retains much of his former vigor. He is very optimistic regarding St. John and the province of New Brunswick and, in an interview, predicted great growth and prosperity for both.

Sir Charles in opening said that he had been obliged to refuse to speak before other Canadian Clubs on account of the state of his health, as it was against the advice of his medical adviser. He paid a tribute to Professor Kyle and expressed his sorrow that he would not be able to remain to hear his address. "I will not, however," Sir Charles said, "myself pleasure, as frequently enjoyed before, of speaking before the ladies and other citizens of St. John. I may say that in considering the great position which Canada occupies today the people of the Dominion owe a deep debt of gratitude to the city of St. John which produced Sir Leonard Tilley, one of the most distinguished and able men of his time. I first had the pleasure of hearing Sir Leonard Tilley at a temperance address in Amherst. The transcontinental railway which covers these provinces from ocean to ocean would not have been built but for the protective policy of Sir Leonard Tilley."

Sir Charles then paid a tribute to the men of this province. "Canada knows, and we all know, how much the men of New Brunswick have done to carry out the destiny of Canada. I may say," Sir Charles went on, "that all the great work that has made Canada what she is, is due in no little measure to the fact that St. John has sent such men to the parliament of Canada." The extension of the Canadian Pacific railway to the Rockies and the "sincere but mistaken opposition of Blake to prevent the country spending a single dollar beyond the Rockies, which they thought would bring the country to utter ruin," Sir Charles told of. He then referred to the development of British Columbia, due to the extension of the railway. "When I saw the city of Vancouver in 1871," he said, "there was only one house. Where Vancouver now stands was covered by dense forests. It is now a city with a population of some 150,000, and the province with its coal fields, its many minerals, rich soil, great fisheries, and its timber, has become one of the most important cities of the great Dominion."

Concluding, Sir Charles said: "Canada has become the right arm of the British Empire. You will think me extravagant, perhaps, but in looking at the resources of this magnificent country, I believe that the day will come when British North America will dominate the entire North American continent."

At the conclusion of his address the audience cheered and cheered again, and the venerable statesman took his leave after a suitable acknowledgment of the ovation.

Professor Kyle's Address

The joint meeting of the Canadian Club and the Women's Canadian Club was held for the purpose of hearing Professor Kyle of Toronto University, who spoke on "Canada, East and West." The lecturer dealt with some of the differences between the two sections of the Dominion, treating of economic and other conditions which had threatened the unity of the country. He showed how these conditions were being met, bringing the east and the west closer together and he made an eloquent appeal for the combined efforts of all the citizens towards building up Canada along national lines.

Professor Kyle said that the difference between the two sections of the country had arisen first from the conditions which made the east the manufacturing section and the banker for the rest of the Dominion, while the west was largely agricultural. The east had supplied the money to develop the west, and furnished the manufacturing province for the settlers and had built the railways. As the immigrants increased more rapidly the east was not able to keep pace with the demands of the west and a controversy had arisen. It partook of the following characteristics:

- (1) It resembled the quarrel between the countryman and the citizen.
(2) It resembled the former feeling between England and Canada.
(3) Much of it was made up of inadequate statements which did not give sufficient weight to the facts of the case.
One result of the development of the west had been the demand for free trade in that section. Industrial development in the west, however, was beginning to build up a western sentiment in favor of protection.

The large percentage of foreigners among the immigrants was an important feature of western life, but the great inflow of settlers from Great Britain and the east was contributing towards welding the people into harmonious citizenship. Although the immigration from the United States has made its influence felt in the west the lecturer did not believe there was any danger of the west separating from the east or joining the United States. In concluding the lecture he said: "The economic differences between the east and the west will disappear; the social differences will also gradually die away. The eastern people already in the west will play a powerful part in turning the foreigners to the ways of the Canadian people. If we are to do good work among the aliens, we must strengthen the eastern influences already in the west. In that way we shall do more to effectively hold the country together."

They said he had probably come to his death by coming in contact with a bare wire. Dr. Inches testified that death was due to electricity. Adjournment was made to next Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock.

Senator Cloran in the senate in Ottawa yesterday brought up the matter of the bogus Knights of Columbus oath. The document, he said, was blasphemous, and he would urge the government to take action to put the people of Canada on their guard against belief in it.

Pope Pius is greatly improved in health and was able yesterday to descend to his apartment where he usually holds audiences.

Four controllers were elected in Halifax yesterday in the first elections under the new civic system providing for a board of control. They are W. F. O'Connor, R. V. Harris, M. Scanlon and C. R. Hobbs. E. P. High was re-elected mayor by acclamation.

Ernest Guileaux, a French aviator, won a prize of \$10,000 and the Pommeroy cup for his flight of Sunday last when he went nearly a thousand miles from Barretts in France to Kollum, in Holland, between sunrise and sunset.

Already \$42,000 has been drawn for their services by Lynch, Staunton, K. C., Hamilton, and Fred Gutelius, of the engineering staff of the C. P. R. for their "investigations" into the cost of the National Transcontinental Railway. The investigation is proving a costly affair for the government at Ottawa but still it is unable to say when their report will be presented.

Louis Francis and Stanislaus Francis, two Indians, are missing from their home near St. George and many believe them to have been drowned. They left Eastport on Saturday for St. George and have since not been heard from. It is possible that they are camped along the shore, but their doublets are missing.

Bathurst, N. B., April 30.—(Special)—Thaddeus Viennese was drowned and a man named Jamieson seriously injured at Middle Landing drive last evening, fourteen miles from here. The drives are continuing along nicely.

Moncton, N. B., April 30.—The Maritime Dental Association meets in Moncton July 8 to 10 when addresses are expected by prominent visitors from upper provinces and Nova Scotia. Local dentists are arranging for suitable reception.

IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, April 30.—Premier Borden and his ministers of railways, Hon. Frank Cochrane, today justified the criticism of Liberalism on the part of the opposition in the House of Commons. Today Premier Borden explained that the minister of railways to enter into contracts for the leasing of construction of any railway lines throughout the Dominion simply by order in council and without first consulting parliament.

The government promptly backed down from this untenable position today, withdrew the original resolution of Mr. Cochrane and substituted another making it plain that all that was sought was the requirement of the branch lines of the Intercolonial.

When the resolution was first brought down, the strenuous protest by Liberalism against the attempt to usurp authority of parliament and substitute government by order in council resulted in the bill being temporarily held up. Today Premier Borden explained that the resolution, as originally drafted, had been intended to include the restriction that parliament must be consulted before any new railway undertaking was finally put through. He blamed the "omission" on the law clerk.

The authority conferred on the minister by the legislation passed today will enable him to now go ahead without further excuse or delay in acquiring the branch lines. The whole question has been kept steadily before the house and the government for some years, past by Hon. Henry Emerson and other maritime Liberals and a policy of intercolonial expansion is now possible. It is due largely to the perseverance of the member for Westmorland.

Ottawa, April 30.—The senate adjourned today until Tuesday evening, May 6.

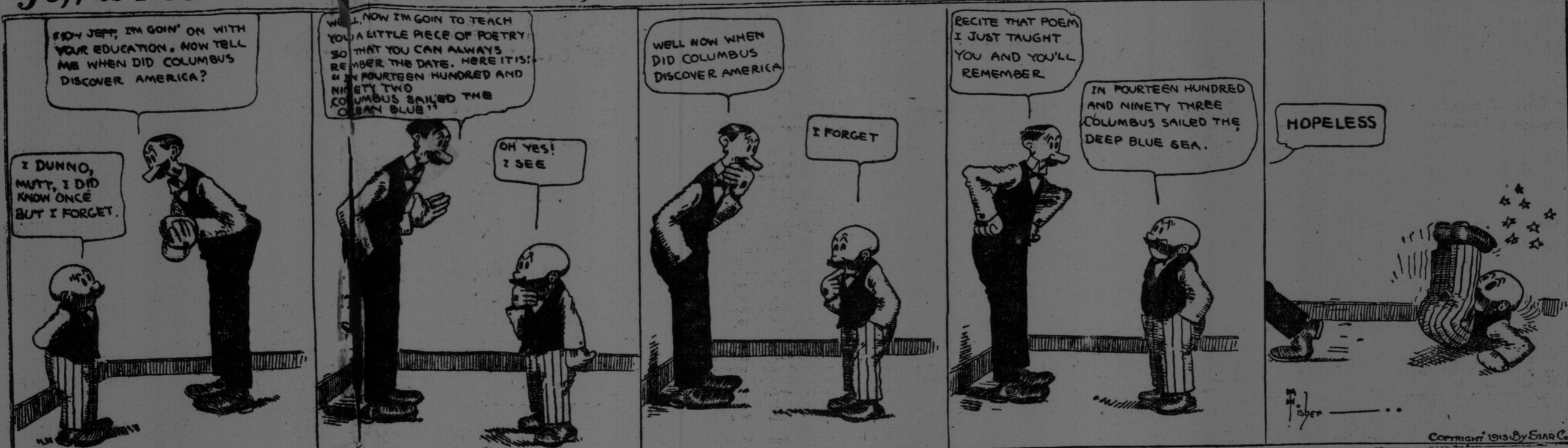

**FATHER MEAHEN  
TO ST. ANDREWS?**

This is Unconfirmed Rumor To-day—Father Duke May Return to City From Moncton

Rumors of further changes in connection with the stationing of priests in the St. John diocese were current today. There are a number of friends in St. John who are reported that Rev. Dr. A. W. Meahen would probably be stationed at St. Andrews, succeeding Rev. Father Flaherty of that place as parish priest. The rumor is that Father Flaherty will become pastor in St. Stephen, succeeding the late Father Lavery. Rumor also says that Rev. Wm. He has been chancellor of the diocese, chaplain of the Holy Name Society, a brilliant speaker, and an energetic worker.

Rev. Father Howland who has been transferred to St. John was last evening the recipient of farewell addresses from the A. O. H. and C. M. B. A. of Fredericton. The A. O. H. also gave him \$100 and from the other society he received a traveling bag and other gifts.

**ESTATE OF JUDGE  
TUCK \$54,500**

Will Makes Bequests to Children and Grand Children; Balance to Wife and Daughters

The will of Hon. William H. Tuck, ex-Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, was probated today. There are two codicils. He gives to his son Frank Herbert Tuck \$2,000; to his daughter Alice Parker Freeman-Lake, \$2,000, the income for the benefit of his son Charles Tuck; and on his death the principal to be divided equally between his son Frank Herbert and his daughters, Emma Peavey Robinson and Alice Parker Freeman-Lake; to his daughter Emma \$1,000 for the benefit of his grandson Henry McMillan Tuck; to his grand-daughter Alice Eleanor St. John Freeman-Lake, \$1,000, the rest of his estate real and personal he gives to his wife and two daughters in equal shares, and he nominated his friend, Henry A. Powell of St. John, barrister-at-law, and his two daughters executors, with power to any two of them to convey his real estate. They were accordingly sworn in as such. The real estate consists of a lot of land on the road leading from Main street to Marble Cove valued at \$500. Personal property includes the dwelling house in which he resided at the time of his death, which is leasehold, and also life insurance \$34,500. W. H. Harrison is proctor.

The matter of the estate of Mrs. George Estabrook, wife of William G. Estabrook, was taken up. She died intestate. There are no children. On the petition of the husband he was appointed administrator. There is no real estate; personal estate \$4,000. L. P. D. Tilley is proctor.
