

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES,-I congratulate my dear brethren upon the occasion of so many meeting again in Annual Session ; and I pray that those whom I find assembled once more through God's merciful goodness may be enlightened to devise means to lighten the load of human suffering -to lessen that great bane of life, Intemperance, with all its terrible con-sequences; for I have found that to many our noble Institution has been directly and indirectly of vast benefit, and has indeed proved "a rest in the desert" to many a weary soul. We have now met to learn somewhat of our past successes, and to consider and mature plans for future effort. It will not, I hope, be considered merely complimentary if I venture an opinion which I have long formed, that, of all the organizations for the extirpation of intemperance, there is none that can surpass, none that equals the Order of the Sons of Temperance in the magnitude of its importance, its operations, and glorious results. Every Representative who has reflected upon its operations as set forth in the able documentary reports of the National Division at its Annual Session will agree with me that every year gives it greater value, character, position, and influence as a thorough stable temperance organization ; and I feel more than ever impressed with the utility of such an organization, especially during the past year, in which I have had the honor to preside over this excellent Grand Division; and I feel happy to report that the Order in Canada West was never in a more promising condition. It is true we may not be so many in numbers as we were a few years past, but I believe the Order never appeared so settled, so permanent, or in its regular and constitutional working, harmonious in its operations, as at the present time. It is particularly gratifying to me to be able thus to report this Grand Division jurisdiction in a healthy state.

You are aware that the past short summer term was not the best period for the most active operations of the Divisions, either in procuring new members or for opening new Divisions. The unusual excitement and preparation for the progress of the Heir Apparent to the British Crown through the Province had engrossed much attention. Notwithstanding all this, and the efforts of kindred societies, we find, in the language of a zealous Deputy Grand Worthy Patriarch, " that the prosperity of the Divisions for the past quarter is equal, if not superior, to any previous quarter; we may not be so numerically strong as formerly, but never before did the Divisions appear so permanent, so settled in position, so satisfactory to all the members, and so easy in money matters as at the present time." This in substance is the tenor of a majority of the reports which I have received from Deputies. On the other hand, a few report a great want of interest, irregular in attendance, and a culpable neglect in payment of dues. In many instances where Lady Visitors have been admitted I find that a revival has taken place, and increased interest is at once manifested at the weekly meetings. I do trust that the brethren will do all in their power to encourage the frequent attendance of Lady Visitors, to whom we are so much indebted for their cheering support, helping hand, and voice. Kind, warm-hearted

woman has been always forward in every philanthropic work of mercy; and we learn to appreciate more and more the assistance of Lady Visitors, who in their appropriate sphere are to the Divisions our Grace Darlings,

The principal cause for our decline in members may be attributed to the our Florence Nightingales. frequent practice of the Divisions expelling their members for non-payment This is a serious matter, for which some remedy must be found. Many Divisions, I fear, are too lax in enforcing their rules for the regular collection of dues. This matter of collecting dues should be systematically attended to. Neither should the members think lightly of their obligations in respect to the prompt payment of dues each quarter. A neglect of this duty tends to sap the very vitality and efficiency of the Divisions. It appears to me as much a violation of obligation not to pay my dues as to drink intoxicating liquors. But whilst referring to the chief cause of our decrease in members, we must not lose sight of the increase of new members who have been induced to join our ranks, which enables us, as heretofore, to present an unbroken front. While we regret and mourn over the defection of those from whom we expected better things, we have to rejoice that instead of having drones and dead weights, which encumbered and gave a fictitious strength to the organization, we have now real, live, active, and vigorous membership and moral available power, which, if directed in a proper channel, will push forward the great work we have in hand to still more glorious results, bringing in new members, building up Divisions, and

opening new ones.

The great objects we have in view are worthy of a Howard or a Garibaldi. Let us brace ourselves anew for the warfare ; be up and doing, to induce individuals to join our ranks. To adopt our principles, and abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors, are most important objects; but we have another object in view, equally, if not more, important to accomplish-the procuring of a Legislative enactment for the suppression of the liquor traffic; and whenever a favorable time arrives, either near or remote, when we shall be called upon to exercise the franchise, I trust that the Order will be then prepared to use its influence to place those in power on whose Legislative conduct the procuring so great a measure depends. If we are ever to procure a Prohibitory Law, we must elect those who have the will to grant it. We must beware of trusting to fair promises from those who have no sympathy with our movement, and of those who would frustrate our dearest hopes by contemptible trickery, I would say again, beware.

The wail of the orphan, the wild cry of the widow, the burning anguish of the bereaved, the terror Brothers, let us see to it that we work not in vain. and trembling of the ruined, the despair of the lost, all that makes the fruit of the traffic infernal, should be made to gather around the hearts and the consciences of the men that go to the polls with the destiny of our fair Pro-

It affords me the greatest pleasure to advert to the willing and very able vince in their trust. assistance rendered to me by those beloved brothers who have acted as my Deputies, a chosen band nearly three hundred strong, devoted to this blessed cause. Some, however, are not so active as they might be, and changes in some districts would appear desirable. An intelligent, faithful, and efficient

The want of an Age diction, but to some en by many devoted, sel personates the G.W.P., and is commissioned by him. As it is impossible for the head of the Order to visit all the Subordinate Divisions in his jurisdiction and attend to the multifarious duties incident to his position, the office of D.G.W.P. exists from necessity.

For the purpose of enabling the G.W.P. to make judicious selections, it is customary in some jurisdictions to ask the Subordinate Divisions to recommend a suitable person. This is but a recommendation, as the G.W.P. has the independent appointing power. The duties of the D.G.W.P. may be more specifically stated as follows :--

"First. Visit the Division or Divisions under his charge, and see that the forms and ceremonies, as well as the Constitutions and By-Laws, are properly observed.

"Second. Instal the Officers elect, and see that they perform their duties according to form.

"Third. See that the Returns to the Grand Division and the per capita tax are promptly forwarded to the Grand Scribe.

"Fourth. Give the passwords and whatever else the G.W.P. or Grand Scribe may choose to communicate through him to the Division.

"Fifth. Give permission to appear in public in Regalia.

"Sixth. Correct errors in the workings, and see that innovations are not allowed.

"Seventh. Give decisions on doubtful or disputed questions involving the laws or the usages of the Order, subject of course to the approval or disapproval of the G.W.P.

"Eighth. It is his duty to make a full report quarterly, or oftener if necessary, not only of the condition of the Divisions under his charge, but of all decisions by him made or official acts by him performed.

"Ninth. He should obey promptly and efficiently decisions of the G.W.P. given from time to time. The relation is strictly a confidential one, and it should be the great effort of the D.G.W.P. to make the administration of the G.W.P. an eminently successful one.

"Lastly. The Deputy should be urbane and polite in his manners, and while he is decided and firm, should be kind and conciliating. He has no right to vote in any but his own Division, and has no right to speak on any question under discussion, except to give decisions when officially appealed to, or correct errors in working when committed in his presence. Of course in his own Division he has the same right as other members, and none superior, except when acting as the representative head of the Order."

It will be evident that the office of D.G.W.P. is not only an honorable but highly responsible one; and I have thought proper to introduce those regulations into my report, as the rules for the Deputies are very indifferently and ill understood.

I should have esteemed it a great pleasure to have met with my brethren in their Divisions, but this was impossible from the wide extent of the jurisdiction. I have, however, availed myself of the pleasure where practicable, and in those Divisions visited I found brotherly love prevailing, an ardent attachment for our beloved Order, and an active spirit manifested to live up to its principles, "not slothful in business."

The want of an Agent or Lecturer perhaps has been a loss to this jurisdiction, but to some extent this want has been supplied in certain localities by many devoted, self-sacrificing brothers and members of this Grand Division, who have given several lectures during the recess, and I have been informed that great good to the cause and the Order has resulted, of which there can be no doubt. It will be of great benefit to the Order and to the cause of temperance if those brethren could be induced to lecture more frequently, for I believe a lecture from gentlemen who are known will be far more efficacious than from gentlemen who are entire strangers.

In following the instructions of the Grand Division, I attended the Convention at Toronto. At the first meeting of Delegates nothing of importance was determined upon. Subsequently it was decided that an united Address from all the temperance organizations in Canada West should be presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales at Toronto, and a deputation was named for that purpose. It was also arranged that there should be a demonstration of the various temperance bodies, in full regalia, in the city, but in consequence of unfavorable weather the latter was but thinly attended. In company with our esteemed Grand Scribe I had the honor of attending the deputation at the Prince's Levee, when the Address was presented to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who received it, and forwarded to the Hon. Brother ROBERT SPENCE a gracious reply, conveying the thanks of His Royal Highness to the various temperance organizations of Canada West for the Address.

This Order will, I hope, act as it ever has done, from principle and for principles. However, I conceive for the future there will be no necessity for delegating such matters to other hands, or of giving up our individuality as a Sons of Temperance organization; besides, it being the only association for the promotion of temperance incorporated by Act of Parliament, and one of the most influential and capable of acting upon its own responsibility on most and every occasion.

The state of the exchequer of your Grand Division is in a satisfactory The receipts of the past year show an excess over the former year, and sufficient funds in hand to meet liabilities, besides a balance in our favor to pass to the credit of the next year. To the constant attention of your Grand Scribe to the financial affairs with the Divisions must be attributed in a great measure the present good state of the finances. The business habits of that officer ably fit him for this and the other manifold duties of his office ; and I am justified in asserting that I feel perfectly satisfied with the rigid economy exercised in every department of the work.

The orders which I have drawn upon our faithful Grand Treasurer for the necessary expenses will be laid before you; the Grand Scribe in his Report will give you the statistics and present condition of the Order; and the Grand Treasurer will give you a report of the state of the funds.

I have recently been somewhat pained at a circumstance which must cause regret even to the perpetrators of that thoughtless act. I allude to the circular from Invincible Division, which breathes a spirit of discontent highly detrimental to the interests of the Grand Division and injurious to the Order at large. It is well known that the business of the Grand Division has been conducted openly and fairly by the Representatives of the Subordinate Divisions at each Session, and the strictest economy by them observed in the expenditure of its funds exclusively for the legitimate expenses, and that our hard-working Grand Scribe has merely received a compensation for his services. I cannot enter upon a description of all the business connected with his office; but to conduct the correspondence of three hundred Divisions, as many Deputy Grands and others who have occasion to seek information or advice, to say nothing of the routine of business, Commissions issued and changes made, Passwo registered in full and warded, the several ad many other important that such an office is must be very ignorant show its disapprobati above alluded to.

to promote the virtue and happiness to new feature, no great advance or signal Although my Report presents no new feature, no great advance or signal success during the past term, still there is nothing to discourage us in our noble enterprise or onward march. It is something cheering that the Order has maintained its position under many adverse circumstances which have transpired of late years to retard our more rapid progress. We believe that there is a brighter prospect before us of unsurpassed and increased pros-

perity. Several G.D. jurisdictions, after suffering from untoward circumstances, are again surprisingly prosperous. Maine G.D. has added 9,500 to her male membership, and 10,000 female visitors during the past year. New York and other G.D.'s have also received large accessions. Massachusetts, composed of a highly intelligent population, has now in connection with its G.D. no less than 37,000 members, whilst our sister G.D. of Canada East has also received a cheering increase, and shows substantial progress; but we cannot expect similar blessed results to follow in this field of labor unless we also make corresponding efforts. Something, I trust, will be devised at this Session to bring about a consummation so desirable. We require more of a missionary spirit in the Order, the ready and material aid of each brother, not so much in means as in the bodily presence of the members. Let every brother be at his place at each weekly meeting in the Division room, " and bring in others," and bring thither the poor inebriate, who would be thus rescued and persuaded to dash down the intoxicating cup at once and forever, and enter this happy circle, where they would be safe from the " all pervading destroyer" of our race.

In compliance with a resolution of the G.D. at its last Session, the Journal of Proceedings was prepared and printed, and forwarded to each R.S., D.G.W.P., and the Representative in attendance. A synopsis was also issued; also the N.D. Journal of Proceedings.

Shortly after the Semi-Annual Session a serious difficulty occurred with the Post Office Department respecting the free transmission of temperance eirculars and documents from this office. For the last five years a privilege has been allowed of mailing all temperance printed matter free of postage. The Postmaster of Kingston, however, informed me that the privilege must be discontinued, that only "Temperance Periodicals" were exempt from postage, and that there had been a miscenception of the Act. I therefore advised with the G.W.P., and wrote to the Postmaster General to continue the exemption, who informed me "that the law exempts from postage any periodical printed and published in the Province (not being a newspaper) when specially devoted to temperance," and "cannot undertake to give any necessary to prepare and issue a circular at once, setting forth the new arrangement for the information of the Divisions. The G.D. will observe that all parcels have to be pre-paid, and this involves booking and an apparent additional expense for postage. I must be permitted also to refer to the postage on letters, which, if not pre-paid, will be subject to an impost of two cents. two cents. When such unpaid letters are received the postage is charged to the Division account. It is right that this matter should be distinctly understood, and receive the careful attention of the G.D., for few Societies in the Province do a greater business with the Post Office Department than this G.D. The average number of letters, including P.W. circulars, received and issued each year from this office is about five thousand, and certainly not less than from 6,000 to 7,000 parcels, which consist of Charters, Ode Cards, Officers' Cards, Rituals, Blank Returns, By-Laws and Constitutions, G.D. and N.D. Journals of Proceedings, Female Rituals, Cadet requisites, and various other documents on which postage has to be pre-paid at the rate of one cent per oz. Since the new arrangement \$14 34 has been paid out for parcel postage, besides the postage account for letters.

I have so frequently complained of the negligence in sending in Returns that I feel grieved to state that the same trouble has been experienced this quarter, although there is a slight improvement perceptible, which I trust will be fully up to the mark next quarter.

For the quarter ending March, 207 Returns have been received, from which the following figures have been gathered :-- Number of Contributing Members, 8,729; number of Female Visitors, 3,717; number suspended, 655; and new Members admitted, 671. There are indications observable in some Divisions that, if the Benefit system had been retained, a greater interest would have been manifested. If the Order has been too ready to imitate other systems, and has in common been disappointed in the results, it is not too late to retrace our steps. The Constitution is wisely framed, so that it is optional with Divisions whether they retain or reject the Benefit

I am afraid that there is a tendency to go to extremes in adopting a minifeature. mum amount for the "initiation fees" and "weekly dues". Of course these affairs are in the hands of the Order, but in general it will be found that "men value little that which costs little"; and I have noticed in some Divisions that where the dues are the smallest that the interest displayed appears to be in the same proportion. In preparing the Circulars containing the Quarterly Passwords, I have endeavored to convey information respecting the time of the meetings of this body and other particulars, thus obviating the expense of advertisements in the leading newspapers. However, the Kingston Daily News, Herald and Advertiser, the Life-Boat, and Canada Temperance Advocate, have each inserted a notice of the Sessions gratuitously. The only objection to this mode is this, that the Order is not so prominently brought before the eye of the general public; but in this and other matters of expenditure I have been governed by the judicious advice of our esteemed Grand Worthy Patriarch, who has been studious that the efficiency of the Grand Division should be kept up at the least possible expense, and I have no doubt that the Grand Division will, upon an examnation of the disbursements, agree that the strictest economy has been exercised.

It should be borne in mind that the greater part of the expenses incurred are for Blank Returns, By-Laws, and other requisites, which are supplied to the Subordinate Divisions at merely cost prices; therefore the cash advanced for printing and stationery returns again to the treasury, and is merely an accommodation between the Grand Division and the Subordinate Divisions, and saving a great expense to the latter in being able to procure small quantities of such articles at cost prices. It should also be understood that the Semi-Annual Journals of the Grand Division, the National Division Journals, the Quarterly Password Circulars, the Deputy Grand Worthy Patriarchs' Commissions, Blank Petitions, the various Circulars and documents issued, are supplied gratis to the Subordinate Divisions out of the funds of this Grand Division. These articles are thus supplied, and the amount so returned to the Divisions each year is equivalent to the whole of one quarter's Capitation Tax.

I regret that these necessary bills of expense have recently been erroneously represented "as the expenses of the Grand Scribe's office". Nothing could be more wandering or a deviation from the truth. The expenses of the Grand Scribe's office are not charged to the Grand Division at all, for the 'Grand Scribe cheerfully furnishes an office, hight and fuel, and pays an assistant when necessary without any charge to the Grand Division whatever.

I have great satisfaction to report that the financial affairs of this Grand Division are in a capital condition; and after liquidating the present liabilities there will remain a balance in favor of the Grand Division, as will appear in the Report of the estimable Grand Treasurer, which surplus, at your disposal, I would respectfully recommend to be appropriated towards diffusing the principles of our beloved and beneficent Order.

I rejoice that there are no cases of appeal to be submitted at this Session. Surely this happy circumstance is indicative that peace reigns within your borders; and I can bear testimony to the harmony which prevails in general in the Divisions.

A petition from Fidelity Division No. 44, S. of T., "praying that this Grand Division will use its influence with the National Division to induce that august body to make such laws as will admit the Females to full membership and allow them to hold office", is respectfully presented.

The following changes were made in our Constitutions, which I append in detail. A Committee was also appointed by the National Division in June last to report a Constitution with a code of laws for Subordinate Divisions, to embrace the Revised Rules, to be reported at the next Annual Session.

TO THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND DIVISION OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE OF CANADA WEST ASSEMBLED:

We, the Committee appointed to examine the Report of the Grand Scribe, beg leave to report--

lst, That it is a matter of congratulation to this Order to hear of the welfare and prosperity of Grand Divisions in the United States and Canada East, and hope that it may be the incentive to renewed action and new life in this Grand Division, and that every Subordinate Division in the jurisdiction, and every individual member thereof, do use their utmost endeavors to add to our numbers, until the Grand Division of Canada West may again rank first among her sister Grand Divisions; and would more particularly desire to have it deeply impressed upon the members of this Grand Division to bring more prominently before the Subordinate Divisions which they represent, the necessity of the personal attendance of the members at the weekly meetings of their Divisions, as this is the very life of the Order.

2d, We your Committee would also recommend that members admitted to our Order who previous to their initiation had been addicted to intemperance, should have more attention and brotherly kindness extended to them than those who require no such aid. We believe that if this watchfulness and care were more exercised, we should not have to regret the expulsion of so many members for violation of the pledge.

It is with deep regret that we observe the great number who are annually expelled for non-payment of dues, and are under the impression that if Financial Scribes of Subordinate Divisions were more attentive to their duties in notifying members who are in arrears at the proper times, and seeing that the dues are regularly paid, or the By-Laws enforced at the expiration of the constitutional period, that the total number of expulsions for this reason will be greatly reduced.

3rd, Your Committee would also recommend that the members of this Grand Division, as well as members of all Subordinate Divisions of this jurisdiction, do use their best endeavors to organize and sustain, in active working order, Sections of Cadets as well as Bands of Hope, and would also recommend that the Ritual of the Cadets be shortened. The training of youth in temperance principles is of the most vital importance, and the best source from which to obtain recruits to our ranks who will remain staunch and true to our cause.

4th, Your Committee would congratulate this Grand Division upon the very efficient and encouraging state of the financial department, which is greatly indebted to the persevering and arduous labors of our esteemed and respected Grand Scribe, Brother E. STACEY; and would further recommend that a portion of the surplus funds in the hands of the Grand Treasurer be appropriated to the diffusion of temperance principles throughout the land, either by lecturing or the press.

TO THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH, OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES ASSEMBLED:

Your Committee to whom was referred the Grand Worthy Patriarch's Report, feel that this Grand Division has cause for deep gratitude to that Being "without whose aid we labor in vain and spend our strength for nought," for the healthy condition and continued prosperity of our beloved Order, notwithstanding the many opposing influences with which it has had to contend. That non-payment of dues on the part of members should to so considerable an extent have resulted in loss to Divisions and the Order, is matter of much regret, and calls for prompt remedial measures. Your Committee would therefore urge upon Divisions the importance of greater vigilance in looking after absentees and in collecting dues from all members promptly as they mature, feeling convinced that much of the evil complained of is the result of negligence in these respects. Financial Scribes should never be permitted to neglect the important duty of promptly notifying members in arrears; and where such notices fail of their object, personal visitation on his part or by special committee, is earnestly recommended.

Your Committee fully concur in the expressed advantages to Subordinate Divisions arising from the admission of Female Visitors, and would recommend that, as an additional inducement to Females to become visitors, our Representatives to the National Division be instructed to ask that the same Password may be communicated to Female Visitors as to actual members, knowing, as we do, from personal acquaintance with facts, that many ladies regarded as implied distrust of them to withhold the regular Password, and therefore withhold from us their names and influence.

While fully convinced that the passage of a stringent Prohibitory Liquor Law is the only effectual means for the total suppression of the liquor traffic and the removal of its enormous evils, your committee feel that upon this Grand Division devolves an even more important duty than obtaining the passage of such law, namely, the leavening of the public mind with temperance principles and preparing it for the enforcement of the law when obtained. How herculean the task ! Yet shall we shrink in dismay from conflict, brethren ? Never, never ! By God's help we shall ultimately triumph.
