

BR: M'GLYNN AND HIS TEACHINGS:

The McGlynn case is still somewhat puzzlng. After his restoration to the priesthood Dr. McGlynn declared that he had in no wise changed his views on the land question. In an interview in the New York World he repeats his assertion. He says that he is still an advocate of the single-tax doctrine, and that he will soon deliver addresses in which he will discuss the subject. He asserts that Done Delegate Satolli and four learned theologians have carefully considered his single-tax teachings and have declared that these teachings contain nothing contrary to Catholic truth.

Speaking of the single-tax proposition Dr. McGlynn now goes so far as to say : It is pure religion, is the single tax. It is the very essence of religion, because it teaches the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man.
