Judge Johnson's Decision

AS TO PROHIBITION RECOUNT COSTS

AWARDED AG NST APPLICANT (IN CHAMBERS)

In the Prohibition Plebiscite Act, 1915, and the Election thereunder on November 4th.

Section 5 of the said Act applies to this question, the Election Act of 1913, mutatis mutandis. Section 109 (f) of the latter act reads: "In case the recount or addition does not so alter the result of the poll as to effect the return, the Judge shall order the costs of the candidate appearing to be elected to be paid by the applicant, and said deposit shall be paid out of the said candidate on receipt thereof so far as necessary, and the Judge shall tax the costs on giving his decision; and if the deposit is insufficient the party in whose favor costs are allowed shall have his action for the balance."

That sub-section would appear to be applicable in an election of candidates, but in any opinion it would have been better if it had been left to the Judge to say what costs, if any, should be payable in such a case or plebiscite vote as the present.

The recent case before me does not alter the result of the poll as to affect the return upon the question submitted at the said election.

Mr. Vinnicombe's affidavit, upon which his application for recount was based, correctly alleged that at the counting of the votes of the district of St. John's East, of which he is an elector, the Returning Officer mistakenly received votes, and that the adding of the votes was therefore, incorrect. At the recount I rejected nineteen ballots which had been accepted and counted. I am satisfied that the Returning Officer exercised his bona fide judgment when he accepted these votes (some of which were in the negative).

On every citizen lies the moral duty, if he has good cause to believe that the return has been taken arrived at, of expediting a recount, where results of such magnitude are involved as in this plebiscite.

But the imperative words of this Statute render the applicant for this recount liable for costs, in the circumstances. If I had an option, I should not have awarded costs against him.

On Saturday, the 4th inst. at 10 a.m. in my Chambers, I shall tax the costs of Messrs. Hunt and Dunfield, who represented the Hon. Mr. Watson and others during the recount.

The Duties of Representatives

And Other Matters

"The will of the people of Newfoundland is expressed by the members whom they elect every four years to represent them in the Parliament or House of Assembly."

One wonders if this is understood by some of those members. Of course, a representative of the people cannot be expected to follow all the whims and fancies of his constituents, but there are many public services which should never be neglected by him. Yet, why are so many important things left sometimes half-finished and in some cases not attempted at all? What is the reason of this?

Perhaps it is because the representatives do not know the needs of the districts for which they stand. If they do not know, then why are they representatives of those districts? Why should St. John's be drawn upon so largely for representatives for other districts? Often they have very little knowledge of those districts, and the worst feature of it is they are not over-anxious to find out. Did we ever hear or know of an outgoing man seeking election in St. John's? There is one thing they are always anxious to find out (and they generally succeed) that is, to find out where the voters are and who they are going to vote for at election time. One is amused to see how they "soap" the electorate at such time.

It is well known in Newfoundland how the minds of voters fluctuate under the "glib" tongue of a politician, or what magic can be wrought with a dollar bill or two. But who sees them after voting day? Oh, no, there are no longer two or three lectures a day to deliver on what they will do and what they won't do, if elected in. The electors can "gang their own gait" for all the members care.

Of course, this is not true in all cases, but it occurs too often. St. John's men, as representatives of the outports, are in most cases, it seems, more interested in the welfare of their own city than they are of their constituents far away, and one cannot blame them to a certain extent for being chiefly interested in their home town. It is those that put them in power who are to blame.

How are we treated in Bay Roberts? Well, it seems a case of "paddle your own canoe." But if the electors are satisfied with the treatment they get, all right. Wake up, Bay Roberts, and demand your rights. "Equal rights for all and special privileges for none" is the heritage of you as British subjects. Why should we be satisfied for St. John's to get all the "cream" and the outports the "skimmed milk"?

Newfoundland needs a big overhauling as far as politics is concerned. Where can we look for a political party that will work for the good of the country and not for private ends? We acknowledge the good done by the party in power now in some cases, but apparently they have got "weary in well doing."

We fail to see at the present time any one party that is qualified to meet the needs of the country. Organizations are very good if they pursue a sane policy with good motives. But when they are solely for private aims and ruled by a few individuals, we fail to see the good they are.

Solomon speaks of being "wise in their own conceits," and it is true that when the cranium gets overloaded with puffed up notions, these amusing things are sure to follow.

When parties choose to work together in mutual harmony, then and only then can good results be expected. Corrupt politicians cannot be expected to produce good laws. Newfoundland will be truly blessed when we get politicians that are gentlemen in the truest sense of the word; men who will work, not for private aims, but for the well-being of the country. But it appears that that time is distant yet. We do hope it is nearer than it seems.

Yes, we would be delighted to say good-bye to the present condition of politics. We do not altogether blame the representatives, but we do blame the voters. Men of Bay Roberts and of all Newfoundland, don't vote for the sake of some trivial gain or advantage to yourselves. Sink private gain and vote in representatives who are truly worthy to be such.

Violent Fighting With French Gains

Paris, March 9.—Further progress for the French in Corbeaux Wood was reported in an official statement issued by the War Office to-night as well as a German message from Donaumont to Vaux. The text of the communication follows:—

In Champagne we effectively bombarded the defensive organizations of the enemy to the west of Navarin, east of Butte du Mesnil, and the region of Massiges, to the west of the Meuse. Our troops continued to make progress during the course of the day in Bois des Corbeaux, almost the whole of which we hold. East of the Meuse the Germans directed several attacks against our front, from Donaumont as far as Vaux. At the outskirts of the village of Donaumont the attack was broken by our infantry and artillery fire. Furious assaults against the village of Vaux were repulsed with heavy losses for the enemy. Finally the Germans launched against our trenches bordering at the foot of the slopes and ridge dominating the fort of Vaux, violent attacks in solid formations which were driven back, the Germans suffering from our certain fire enormous losses. Artillery activity west and east of the Meuse has been very violent on both sides. The bombardment of Woivreux has been intermittent. In Upper Alsace we carried after grenade fighting, one section of the enemy's trench in the region of Entrelargues, east of Seppois.

One of the delegates asserted that during the competition for trade between Great Britain and Germany preceding the war 44 British Consuls were Germans.

British Official

London, Mar. 13.—At Verdun, fighting, frequent, desperate, is continued. The enemy attacked west of the Meuse from the north, and in Woivreux is making some progress at certain points. His losses are very heavy. There is nothing special on the British front.

British Official

In Asia Minor the Russians are advancing to the coast, and are within thirty miles of Trebizond. They have also occupied Colch, thirty miles west of Kermanshab.

The British destroyer Coquette, torpedo boat 11, and the fleet auxiliary Fauvette, struck mines and sunk on the east coast. Six officers and fifty-three men were lost.

After preliminary successes, General Smuts' forces have, after obstinate fighting, driven the enemy's forces from prepared positions on Kivoto Hills. The pursuit continues southwards towards Usambarah railway.

The enemy's position was attacked at Fasuin, seven miles east of Kut-el-Amara, but the enemy were not dislodged, though they suffered severe losses.

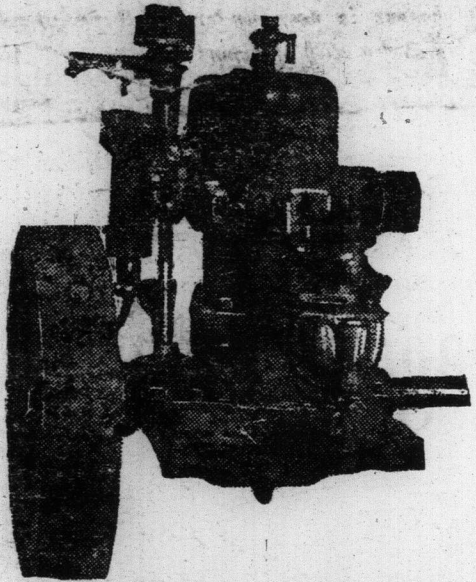

 Church Union has been carried in the Presbyterian Church. The majority for union with the Methodist and Congregational churches was 53,088. The minority, however, is so large that it is considered doubtful if the General Assembly, which meets in Winnipeg next June, will force union on the 93,156 members who voted against it. The total vote was 230,368. The majority given by this vote on the Church Union question is considerably lower than that given in 1911. The majority then was 80,251, and 14,200 more votes were recorded.

They expect to be in touch shortly with the British troops at Kut-el Amara, who are hemmed in by the Turks. The Russians are also nearing Trebizond. The Italians are very active on the Austrian front, while British troops have captured Somalia in Western Egypt. In East Africa General Smuts is actively pressing the Germans, and no doubt the last remaining bit of German territory outside of Germany will soon be captured.
