REIGN OF TERROR EXISTS IN RUSSIA---STRIKES ARE SPREADING.

Owing to the lack of direct telegraphic communication with many places in the Caucasus, verification of the count-ess rumors is impossible, but it is positively known that almost a reign of terror exists in the territory between the Caspian and Black Seas.

WARSAW, Feb. 25.—Contrary to expectations the Vienna railway strike has not ended. The engineers and firemen and the mechanics employed in the machine shops at Warsaw and Lubow are dissatisfied with the terms offered and are refusing to accept them.

MOSCOW, Feb. 25.—The employees of the municipal council are threatening to strike in order to show their sympathy with Prince Galatin, prefect of Moscow, whom the imperial government has censured for having sanctioned resolutions adopted by the municipal council and provincial zemstvo, demanding liberal constitutional reforms.

STILL IN BLOCKADE; FEARS OF STARVATION.

Such Conditions Were Never Before Known in Nova Scotia--Rumors of Distress

---Maritime Snowed Under.

HALIFAX, Feb. 24. The blockade on the D. A. R. and other railways Nova Scotia is assuming an aspect of more than merely business inconvenience.

WORD FROM TRURO.

TRURO, N. S., Feb. 24.--A heavy hail storm began early this morning, lasting with more or less violence till about noon, and it has caused more serious damage on the I. C. R. No. 26 than has been reported elsewhere.

Chief Justice Weatherbe, who has a place at Kentville, fears that there may be great privation if not actual starvation. Today he telegraphed the mayor of Kentville, the headquarters of the D. A. R., asking whether the coal and fuel supplies would last and what would be the result if the ice blockade continued.

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.--The Allan Steamship Company has signed a three years' contract with the Dominion Trade and Commerce Department for a service between Canada and France.
