

# YANKEE SCREW DRIVERS ACCIDENT IN INTERCOLONIAL RY. YARD AT MONCTON

Five Cars Derailed Early This Force Changes

MONCTON, N. B., March 19.—A bad run off occurred in the I. C. R. yard this morning, by which five box cars were derailed and one badly smashed up. Freight train No. 16, in charge of Conductor Crockett, was pulling out about five o'clock when some undergear of one of the cars got across the rails and threw a loaded Illinois Central car from the tracks. The car jumped along several hundred yards, tearing up sleepers, smashing bolts, and breaking rails before toppling over on its side, and dragging four other cars from the rails.

# MURDERER SEES HIS VICTIM'S BODY FOUND

Hole He Ordered Man to Dig Three Years Ago Intended for Grave

> MUNICH, March 18.-A sensation MUNICH, March 18.—A sensational murder mystery was partially solved this afternoon, when the body of a wealthy young man named Hentchel, who disappeared from home at Munich three years ago, was dug up on a piece of waste land outside the Bavarian caption.

Hentchel was the son of one of the wealthiest businers men in Munich. He spent money lavishly, attended the pleasure resorts regularly, belonged to the fashionable clubs gambled and kept race horses and motor cars.

He was very friendly with another young man named David Neidherhofer, son of the proprietor of a stationary circus at Munich. Hentchel and Neiderhofer were nearly always together, Hentchel finding the money for their amusements.

Hentchel suddenly disappeared on May 24, 1904, and not the least trace of him could be found. Crime was suspected, but the police abandoned their investigations without finding the

A few days ago Niederhofer attempted to sell to a jeweler several articles of value which formerly belonged to the total as it happened to the Hentchel, and, as it happened, the jeweler remembered that they corresponded with particulars circulated by the police describing articles of jewelry, which Hentchel commonly wore. These included diamond rings and an extremely expensive bracelet. The jeweler immediately communicated with the police, and detained young Niederhofer until they arrived to ar-
