It Passed Congress Late Yesterday by Majority of 142 Votes — Exuberant Democrats Made Passage Subject of Demonstration — Republicans Will Continue Opposition in Senate.

Washington, May 8.—The Underwood Tariff Bill, proclaimed by the Democratic party as the answer to its platform pledge to revise the tariff flownward, was passed by the house late today. The vote was 281 to 138, five Democrats voting against the bill, and two Republicans voting for it. Four Progressives supported the measure and fourteen opposed it, while one independent Progressive joinedthe majority.

When Speaker Clark announced the vote in loud tones that revealed his satisfaction in the arrival of the day he long had sought, exuberant Democrats hoisted a stuffed Democratic donkey over the heads of their collectures in the rear of the chamber, a faint ripple of applains and the gavel fell on the first chapter in the history of President Wilson's extra assion of Congress with the bill after a month's consideration on its way to the Senate, there was a rush of representatives for their homes tonight.

In the house, adjournment was announced for three days at a time, beginning next week, until June 1. In the meantime the Senate Finance Committee will study the bill while the House Waws and Means Committee will organize committees preparatory to the transaction of further business next month.

Republicans and Progressives led, respectively by Representatives Mann and Murdock, protested to the last against the measure, as the lowest tariff bill ever written, and proclaiming, as the Democratic avalanche howled them over, the virtues of differing tariff commission plans.

Republicans who voted for the bill were Cary and Stafford, of Wisconsin. Democratic who opposed it were Broussard, Dupre, Lazero and Morgan of Louisiana, on account of the schedule reducing sugar twenty-five per cent and sending it to the free list in three years, and C. B. Smith, of New York. Progressives who voted for the bill were Kelly and Rupley, of Pennsylvania, Nolan of California and Bryan of Washington, Kent of California, formerly a Republican, but now an independent Progressive, also voted for the bill. Ottawa, May 8.—At one o'clock this morning Premier Borden gave formal

notice of the closure for the purpose of passing the clauses of the Naval Aid Bill in committee. The motion will be made tomorrow in accordance with this notice that further consideration of the clauses be not further post-

There was no row, no demonstration. Nothing could have feen more tame. The naval bill comes back tomorrow in committee as the first order of business and will be before the house until two o'clock Saturday morning when the discussion terminates automatically and the clauses are adopted. The application of the closure tonight affects all but the first clause of the bill, which was adopted by the committee of the whole. It covers five clauses, including a new one added tonight by the Prime Minister, providing for a statement of the year's expenditure within fifteen days of the opening of each session.

F. B. Carvell sought to have this new clause amended to require the letting of all contracts by tender. Mr. Borden stated that much of the work would probably be done by tender but that some of it might be done in His Majesty's dockyard. Mr. Carvell, after a little further discussion, suggested that the committee "glide" over this clause, whereupon the Prime Minister moved that further consideration be postponed. This was adopted on a standing vote, by 85 to 45.

Premier Borden, in dealing with the last objections of the opposition, again declared the determination of the Dominion to stand by the Mother Country and aid in the defence of the Empire, a declaration which was received by the ministerial members with a storm of applause and by the Liberals in silence.






