Great Triumph for New Brunswick.—Though last year Mr. Furlong's horse did honor to New Brunswick on American race tracks, it is reserved for "Crown Prince," Mr. T. B. Barker's, to add another laurel to the laurel of France.

New Brunswick built is good, for with about the same length of gal and proportions, a New Brunswick biped trotted as clearly and calmly past a foreign importation, as did "Crown Prince" at Saratoga yesterday, making 2:36 in the third mile heat, the last quarter at 2:30 gait. The third heat the judges thought one horse was pulled, and decided it should be trotted over again, but dark coming, it was not trotted until yesterday, when "Crown Prince" took the race in 2:36. Mr. L. C. Chase, of Montreal, owns a small interest in the horse, the most of him is owned by T. B. Barker, Esq., who feels as much interest in him as Bonner does in "Dexter." "Crown Prince" is now 9 years old, and Mr. Barker paid \$180 for him. About \$30,000 is the price he will command now.

Spain is expecting Carlist prisoners to Canary Islands.

The new Ministry is considering measures for the abolition of slavery in Spanish possessions.

New York, Aug. 8. A destructive fire occurred at Portsmouth, Michigan, Wednesday; loss \$300,000. A National Labor Reform Convention is called to re-assemble at Columbus, O., 21st inst.

It is announced that Louisville Convention will make Charles O'Connor their Presidential candidate.

No further disturbance is reported at Quebec.

Continental Sugar House and Refinery at Boston, Mass., was burned last night; loss \$400,000.

The municipal returns of Ontario for 1869 and 1870 have been published. The total number of acres assessed in the Province was 10,755,237. The total number of rate-payers was 315,863, of which 41,660 were citizens in separate towns and cities. The total value of assessed real estate, including the towns and cities, was \$76,983,259, showing an increase of value of the confederation amounting to \$31,824,336, showing an increase of \$7,761,875 since Confederation. The total assessed value of real estate and personal property in this Province for the years 1869 and 1870 was \$322,817,354. This shows a very fair amount of assets. On the other hand the liabilities were thus as follows: Corporation Debentures, \$11,084,033; principal amount due the Municipal Loan Fund, \$4,761,487; interest overdue \$1,066,701; other liabilities, \$247,758; total, \$17,899,979. The total assets being \$322,817,354, leaves a balance clear of \$404,987,378. The property of the country must have largely increased since that time, so that if more recent statistics were available, a still more flattering exhibit could be made. As it is, it gives \$250 to each man, woman and child in the Province, or about \$356 to each ratepayer.
