To the Toronto Public School Board :

GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with a Resolution of your honorable Board, I respectfully submit the twenty-ninth Annual Report of the Schools under your charge.

Appended to the Report will be found Statistical Tables which give in detail all important particulars relating to teachers, pupils, attendance, absenteeism, tardiness, studies pursued, cost of maintenance, &c.

#### ATTENDANCE.

The total number of pupils registered during the year was 25,066. Last year it was 22,080.

The average daily attendance was 16,567. Last year it was 14,640.

These Certificates are of two grades, and named respectively First Honor Certificates, and Second Honor Certificates.

The First Honor Certificates are awarded to such pupils as have fulfilled the above-named conditions for two consecutive sessions.

The Second Honor Certificates are awarded to such pupils as have conformed to the said rules for one session during the year.

#### THE KINDERGARTENS.

This department has continued to grow in extent and interest. The most important step of the year was the appointment of Miss Currie, as Assistant Supervisor. The training classes have been conducted by Mrs. Hughes. The class of 1888-89 contains 28 new students, making in all a class of 64 members. The appreciation of the Kindergartens by the parents is shown by the fact that they reluctantly consent to the removal of their children from the Kindergartens to the primary classes when advised to do do.

#### NIGHT SCHOOLS.

Thirty-one Night School classes were conducted during the year. The attendance was, on the whole, very satisfactory. The conduct was excellent, and the diligence shown by the students was very commendable. The retention of the dollar, deposited as a guarantee of good conduct till the end of the term, has produced very beneficial results.

I am of opinion that two advanced Night Schools might be established with great advantage to the students, one in the eastern and another in the western part of the city. Admission to these schools should be granted to those students who pass the best examinations in the regular classes.



### REPORT OF THE EXAMINERS.

ING.

School.

The Examiners have the honor to report that on June 18th and 19th they examined the pupils selected for the purpose from the four highest classes of the City Public Schools. The Examinations were held in the Dufferin and Ryerson Schools, written answers being given in every subject, with the exception of Reading. The results of the Examiners' reading and judgment on these answers as handed in, are given above. The names of the pupils entitled to receive Scholarships, Medals, and Prizes, are given as heretofore, and also a Tabular Statement of the aggregate number of marks obtained by each class examined, from which the comparative standing of the Schools may be readily ascertained, in so far as the result of the efforts of these selected pupils is in accordance with the actual state of the Schools thus examined.

In forming an estimate of the relative rank of the different Schools, the element of local advantage or disadvantage must not be forgotten.

Unmistakable evidence has been given to the Examiners in reading the answers of the pupils, of diligence and industry on their part, and of active and conscientious discharge of duty on the part of the teachers. Good work has been shown in all the subjects found on the Public School programme, especially so in penmanship, in spelling, and in neatness of writing answers to the questions proposed.

The special prize presented by the Rev. Septimus Jones, to the best reader in the City Public Schools, was won by Christina McGregor, of the Wellesley School.

It affords the Examiners much satisfaction to state that the Public Schools of the city are doing worthily a noble work. The Examiners, in the performance of their duty, received very effective aid from the Inspector and the staff of teachers in the Schools named


