DEFAULTERS' LIST.

THERE is displayed in the Post Office just now, a list of the ratepay. ers in the Upper District of the Parish of Newcastle who have failed to pay their Poor and County Rates for the year just passed. The items in this list amount to over four hundred dollars. We notice among the defaulters the names of persons who we have no doubt will pay up without being put to legal trouble, but should those who can pay refuse to do so. they ought to be compelled to bear their share of taxation in common with others who pay their tribute willingly. There may be cases, however, where the defaulter may be poor and unable to pay, in which case we feel assured the verdict of the ratepayers would be in favor of cancelling the claim. But in the interests of the town, we trust that nothing will be left undone to compel the payment of taxes, where it can be done without distressing the individual, especially as regardthose who have the ability but who lack the disposition to pay.

The Westmorland Election.


