

NEW YORK, June 11th, 1886 .- The accordance with instructions from the Royal Board of tariffs, ordered that on and after 1st of April that year, live fish imported into the Island should pay a duty of 3\(^2\) cents per kilogramme. This was done partly to protect the Cuban fishermen and partly as a set-off to the manifestly frivolous policy of the United States Senate with regard to the then pending commercial treaty between Spain and the United States.
