CONVICTS TO BE FLOGGED.

OTTAWA.—Geo. L. Foster, acting warden of St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, who is here, has asked the sanction of the Minister of Justice to the flogging of six or perhaps ten of the ringleaders among the convicts who persist in subordination by continued shouting and hideous noises. Mr. Foster gave his sanction. The warden do it under the rules, but as such wholesale flogging for the purposes of discipline would be unusual it was advisable to obtain the minister's permission. Six or ten of the worst behaved convicts will therefore be taken and flogged with the cat of nine tails in the presence of all the other convicts, and thus it is hoped to deter the subordinates from continuing their misguided course, in which it is believed they are encouraged by discontented and rebellious spirits outside the walls.

The Halifax Mail has the following record to date of our gad-about ministry:

Laurier—Three months of travel in Great Britain and on the continent of Europe, taking in Paris and Rome. And a trip to Washington.

Davies—Two trips to Washington, and one each to British Columbia and Great Britain.

Blair—Six weeks sojourn in private car with Donville and Pugsley all over and about the States of Washington, British Columbia and Northwest, a trip to Europe and a jaunt to New York to see the presidential election.

Dobell—Three trips to Great Britain, Fielding—Several months of travel in private car with Cartwright and Patterson from Winnipeg to Halifax; a trip to New York to watch the presidential election, and a two months' tour of England and France.

Trotter—Several months of almost continuous travel in private car all over the Dominion, including a trip to British Columbia, with a tour of inspection of all the principal harbors of Europe, in prospect.

July—Trip to British Columbia with Li Hung Chang.

Cartwright—A trip to Washington.

Fitzpatrick—A trip to London and Rome.

Sifton—A trip to Alaska just to see Major Walsh set out for the Klondike.

Borden—Prolonged visit to the United States and a trip to London.

THE QUEEN'S NEW YEAR GIFTS.

London, Jan. 1.—The Queen's New Year gifts to the poor of Windsor were distributed to day at the Reading school at the castle. There were nearly 1,000 recipients and about 4,000 pounds of beef and 100 tons of coal were distributed.

The Prince and Princess of Wales and Princess Victoria of Wales start on Monday to pay a week's visit to the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire at Chatsworth. The Prince and Princess will occupy the royal apartments in the west wing and the mansion fountains and fountains will be illuminated nightly.

There will be theatrically, in which Lady Churchill will take part, and other entertainments.

It is reported that the population of Hayti is becoming more excited, and the Government is prepared to take drastic measures to prevent an outbreak.

of quarterly dividends of four per cent will be resumed.

In Halifax, while there are complaints in many quarters that during the last year trade has been unusually dull and very much out of step, it seems to be the general opinion that in most branches there has been a gradual improvement during the last months of the year and prospects for 1898 are regarded as fair.

Farmers have had good crops. Fishermen have done fairly well. Gold mining is becoming increased and the coal mines are producing largely. On the whole, there is believed to be a slight improvement over this time last year.

In the Dominion generally the prosperity of the agricultural community was the base of improvement in trade for 1897. The increased prices of nearly all Canadian agricultural products and the enlarged demand for export, particularly in the last half of 1897, helped distribute trade throughout Canada.

Business failures of the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland of the calendar 1897 amounted to 1,927 with total liabilities of \$13,219,000, a falling off of 13 per cent in number and 19 per cent in liabilities from a year ago.

Canadian bank clearings for the year, on week estimated, were the largest on record, aggregating \$1,148,000,000, a gain of 11 per cent over 1896.

QUEBEC.—A sensation was caused the other night along the water front by the frantic cries of two men, Victor Lefranco and Guillaume Longchamps, passing down the river towards the gulf on a small ice floe. It was impossible for the crowd which gathered to launch the boat on account of the ice along the shore, only a channel being open. The men were finally rescued by the ferry steamer Queen. They suffered intensely from the frost.

Fire destroyed the roof and upper flat of the east wing of the Ottawa Roman Catholic University last week. It was under control by eleven o'clock. It was only owing to the skill of the chief and brigade that the main building was saved. It is of stone.

NEW HOTELS.

It is learned on good authority that a large English syndicate proposes to erect a number of hotels at various points in Canada, and that sites have already been secured in a number of localities for the erection of palatial hotels, which will be under one management and control and creditable to the company and the country.

The syndicate will, in the first instance erect hotels at the following places: Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Niagara Falls (Canadian side), the capacity of the hotels to be arranged with reference to the requirements of such places and class of patronage to be secured. The view of the syndicate is that the economy in administration, purchasing of supplies, etc., will enable a lucrative business to be done, which will have the effect of largely increasing the tourist and business travel at the various places covered by the scheme.

The firm of McGibbon, Casgrain & Co. are solicitors for the syndicate, whose movements are well advanced. A reporter of the Star called on Mr. McGibbon, Q. C., of that firm, who stated that the above were the preliminary features of the syndicate's proposal, but that further extensions of it would probably be made, including the establishment in London, England of a hotel which would be a resort for visitors from the various colonies of the empire and the United States. The hotels are all to be fire-proof and the plans have been prepared by Mr. Bruce Price, of New York, the architect of the Chateau Frontenac.

Asked what site had been selected in Montreal, Mr. McGibbon stated that a magnificent site for a first class downtown hotel had been secured, and that a feature of the Montreal building would be the establishment of a first class cafe and restaurant. The syndicate represented a strong party of London financiers and gentlemen connected with the colonies and a local board of much strength. He was not in a position just yet to give any further information.
