OUR ST. JOHN LETTER.

THE NEW MEN IN THE EXECUTIVE—THE LIBEL SUIT—CANDIDATES—BIRMINGHAM—VICTORIA HOTEL Gossip—A LOST LUMINARY—READING MATTERS.

St. John, Jan. 21.

This is the dull season in the city, so far as newspaper matter is concerned, yet the past week has been sufficiently lively in one way and another to furnish incidents whereof to make a letter.

MR. McQUEEN'S HAT.

Many of your readers knew as soon, no doubt, as we did here, that the Government had added your representative, Mr. McQueen, to its ranks, and that Mr. Crawford, of Kings, had been admitted to the Executive at the same time. The Telegraph published a brief sketch of the two new men placed at the helm of our little provincial ship, with which I have no fault to find, except that it is in error in stating that Mr. McQueen always wears a "fife" hat. If the pen photographs of the Telegraph had attended the last session of the Assembly in Fredericton, he would certainly have remembered that a style of felt hat of green or blue color was worn by some half a dozen members, who were recognized as strong adherents of the successful players in the little entire game of the short session. Mr. McQueen was supposed to be the shepherd of the flock of the peculiar hat and Messrs. Willis, Crawford, McQueen, Thériault and others, who expected the eighth or ninth vacant seat were distinguished by the article of dress; so Mr. McQueen has not always worn the "cavalry" style of "fife".

THE LIBEL SUIT.

Recently closed at the Circuit Court... the verdict in favor of Mr. Anglin, has been generally approved, not because that astute gentleman is a public pet, or because he did not deserve some punishment for prostituting the liberty of the Press in order to malign an opponent and serve a coalitionist, as against the Railway people, but because Mr. Forbes was believed to have carried his points through the Council in rather too high handed a manner, and then, when attacked by Mr. Anglin in the Tribune, to have refused to accept explanation and a sufficient apology which were proved to have been tendered.

THE CANDIDATES.

We have no little trouble here in keeping our stock of candidates sorted out. You must remember that, in the city, we feel almost as much interested in the elections for Kings, Charlotte, Westmorland, York, Cumberland and Carleton, as we do in the Province as a whole. Thus we play in the shadows of the pending contests for the vacant seat in the Assembly for Westmorland, the general race for parliamentary honors at Ottawa, and the struggle for the civic figureheadship of St. John. We wonder whether Mr. Anglin is going to run for Gloucester or for the new seat in the Commons, which is to be given to St. John County. Then we should like to know if it is true that Messrs. Birnie, Elder and Palmer will be on one ticket or whether Mr. Tilley is to link his destination with those of Mr. Palmer and sail again into Parliament, fanned along by the gentle puffs of the Tribune.

BIRMINGHAM AND REVOLVER.

A young Israelite from Montreal, named Isaacs, is to be tried at the present sitting of the Court for shooting at James Whitman, an English Agent. The affair, as you have doubtless already heard, took place at the Waverley House on the evening of last Friday. Whitman was drunk and grossly insulting to Isaacs, and deserved punishment, but the latter will find that we in New Brunswick are not yet educated up to the Western style of taking satisfaction for real or imaginary wrongs. Whitman and Isaacs are both men of a very undesirable class to have in any community.

VICTORIA HOTEL Gossip.

The nominal proprietor of the Victoria Hotel is absent from the city and it is said that he has not much to do now with running that pretentious establishment. The Directors have taken a big peep into the system under which it is managed, and as a consequence, there has been a reduction of the salaries paid to the whole staff of the institution, a considerable advance made on the prices charged to many regular and favored guests, and a general improvement in the affairs of the concern.

A SACKVILLE TROTTER.

On Wednesday next a trotting match is to come off on the Kennebec course between Mr. Golding's Bob and Mr. A. B. Barnes' Sackville pacer, Ping Egly, for \$100. The paces are now being trained, and Ping Egly has many backers. An attempt was made during last week to get on a match between Mr. T. B. Barker's Crown Prince and Mr. E. Furlong's Anly Johnston, which are considered the fastest horses in the Province, but Mr. B. though he will allow his horse to run in the summer on any good track, will not run the risk of injuring him by a hard trot or the ice—and Mr. B. is right. If the friends of Andy want a race they can have enough of it in the spring.

ANOTHER BOAT RACE.

Fulton has as yet received no answer to his challenge to Brown, of Halifax for a single skull match, though, from what we see the Halifax papers, it is probable the match will be made. One thing is certain—Fulton will not row on Bedford Basin as proposed by the Halifaxians. He had quite enough of Halifax and its vicinity last September. He offered to row Brown at Digby or Annapolis, and if the latter refuses to row there, he will have a chance to go to some course in the United States. SACKVILLE, N. B., JAN. 25, 1872.

That the question of separate or sectarian schools will greatly influence if not determine the approaching election in this County cannot be blinked out of sight. Some of our politicians are delicate in approaching the subject, but the party in favor of separate schools are too well organized and understand their position too thoroughly to be misled by any specious pledge. The refusal of the Catholics in Dorchester, and we believe elsewhere in this County, to act under the school law, is unmistakable as to their opinion. The whole country, even its Catholic element, is in favor of the assessment principle, and there is no possibility of a return to the old system, so that those who are dissatisfied with the law, will not obtain a repeal by voting for Sectarian Schools, but will simply create a state of affairs which will intensify the contest to which the Catholics are forcing the protestants.

The Circuit Court continues its sittings at Dorchester, but will probably adjourn to-morrow night, Judge Wetmore leaving to attend Equity sittings at Fredericton next week. In Milner vs. Grant and Boxall, a verdict for the Plff. \$122 damage. A. L. Palmer, Counsel, and W. C. Milner for Plff. A. J. Smith and A. J. Hickman for Defendant. Bowser vs. Outton has since occupied the court. Other business will stand over.

Ocean Ferry.

One of the projects of the day is a Steam Ferry from Dover to a new harbor to be built a mile north-east of Cadiz pierhead. The ferry boats are to be 450 feet long, 50 feet beam and 32 depth of hold. The speed will be eighteen knots, and the time occupied in crossing will be from one hour and ten minutes to one hour and thirty minutes according to the weather. Six passages each way daily will be made carrying yearly a million of passengers and a million tons of freight in trains of cars carried bodily from one port to the other. The harbor built in deep water will be a quadrant in shape and have a sea wall of 1000 yards long, and will be connected with the shore by an iron bridge. The Government of both countries favor the scheme. If it is successfully accomplished, it will not interfere with the tunnel under the Straits which in all events will be carried into effect, as there is likely to be no deficiency in trade and travel between the two countries.

We have not the slightest objection to the editor of the Moncton Times copying, or quoting from, our local and leading articles. They benefit his readers and help his paper. We have however, most decided objection to the Times mistating us, as he did last week, making his misstatement the ground of a violent attack upon us. The Editor of the Times either understood what we wrote, or he did not; if he did not, he exhibits a stupidity pitiable even if he did; if he has perpetrated his position—not as a plagiarist—but editor, by misquoting us in a manner so gross, no respectable editor would be guilty of. We have neither time nor space to devote to a controversy with the Times, in which we would be sure to be defeated with the scurrility peculiar to its editor.

Oxford Items.

New Iron Foundry.—A Company has been organized and commenced preparations for the erection of a Foundry. The Capital stock is \$25,000. Twenty Thousand is taken by four of the Thompson Bros., viz: Wesley, George, Rufus and James. They are the right men in the right place. It probably will be in operation early in the season.

The Oxford Village Community are doing a good business. The furniture is ordered faster than it can be made, and gives general satisfaction. They are laying in a large stock of Hardwood Plugs and making other preparations for a large trade the coming season.

The Woolen Mfg. Co. are in full operation. Every department thronged with orders. One firm in Montreal has ordered 80,000 yards of Oxford Gray. Their goods are now sent to England, Scotland and United States. Although they have recently made large additions they will still have to increase their facilities to supply the Dominion.

At the meeting of the Dominion Board of Trade at Ottawa on the 18th we learn that the Bay Verte Canal question was brought up by Mr. Berton, who advocated the work, as it would reduce the freight on flour 20 cents per barrel between the Upper Provinces and the Bay of Fundy. He moved, seconded by Mr. Lindsay, that the Board look forward with much interest to the report of the survey now in progress for the construction of the Bay Verte Canal, and look upon the undertaking as one of great importance to the Dominion, and they urge upon the Government the prosecution of the work should the survey be found favourable as soon as practicable.

SURPRISE PARTY.

SURRENDER—FESTIVE BOARD—BEARS WEDDING—FILTHY LUCKE AND OTHER MATTERS.

On Monday evening last we had the pleasure of joining a fair and gallant band from Sackville, West-cock, and Woodpoint, numbering about 70, in a very successful assault upon Westcock Parsonage. The garison, being taken by surprise, had barely time to clear for action, and therefore speedily surrendered the fortress to the invaders, who were heavily armed with large baskets and similar weapons the contents of which they proceeded to discharge with irresistible effect. No pocket pistols were used in the attack.

To drop the metaphor, which is becoming complicated, we would simply relate that fair hands speedily spread the festive board with a profusion both of fainty and substantial fair, to which all did ample justice. After tea, the Rector having to marry a happy couple at St. Ann's Church, several of us, leaving the rest of the company in the enjoyment of vocal and instrumental music, took the opportunity of being present at the ceremony and found it a pleasant and instructive episode. As a faithful chronicler of the evening's occurrences we must not omit to mention that, as we were returning to the Parsonage after the wedding, an animal, which some of our party confidently pronounced to be a bear, slowly crossed the road before us and made tracks into the woods. We ourselves examined the said tracks, which by the struggling moonbeams' misty light certainly looked quite large. The animal itself however was by no means imposing dimensions, and as it inspired no terror in the horses, and had a very dogged look about it, several of us declared it to be a bare-faced impostor.

The other extremity was certainly not bear, being adorned with a long and bushy tail.

But we must hasten to record the chief event of this very enjoyable evening, viz, the presentation to the Rector, by the Hon. A. E. Botsford, in the name of the assembled company, of a purse of upwards of \$100, as a token of the respect and genuine affection felt by not only the people of the parish, but by a large part of the community toward the Rector.

Mr. Roberts replied in a feeling manner being evidently both surprised and gratified. Several hymns were then sung with much heartiness, and after the reading of God's word, and prayer by the Rector, the large company gradually departed to their several homes, leaving behind them, in the shape of hams, beef, poultry &c., &c., many substantial mementoes of their pleasant invasion.

Heroes in real life are no doubt plenty, if their acts could be made public. The following from the St. John Telegraph, is a case in point, and the gallant fellow certainly deserves a niche in the temple of fame: On Tuesday evening at Oldtown, about seven years of age walked into the centre of the track, unconscious of the approaching engine. Just as the engine had almost reached him a young man rushed from the crowd, seized the boy as the pilot of the locomotive was within a few feet of the spot, threw him by main force to the platform beside the rails, and by a mighty effort sprang, track, apparently grazing the front part of the engine as it thundered by.

GLT-EDGED MURDER.—The development of assassination as one of the fine arts has made a practical advance, through the recent tragedy in New York, such as DeQuincy never dreamed of except almost at the moment of the inevitable bustling which Stokes must have received when first grappled by the porters in the corridor of the Grand Central—and it is more than probable that even in their excitement they treated so well-dressed assassin with all the tenderness possible—the murderer has enjoyed the most distinguished consideration from all the officials with whom he has come in contact. The coroner's jury hesitates and finally refuses to shuck his sensibilities by declaring that he "feloniously" shot his victim. The Grand Jury has orders that he may not be kept waiting and suffer at bayance in the ante-room; and, when in the Tombs, the keeper comes with bland apology

and deprecatory manner to announce that it is the custom of the institution to lock the doors at night, and to request the compliance of the distinguished guest with that usage.

Stokes himself proves, with John Banyan, that for him "stone walls do not a prison make," and that the esthetic assassin may transform his cell into a boudoir wherein to enjoy his scented baths, drink his fine wine and receive his fashionable friends as comfortably as at home. There is something highly attractive in the picture of Stokes, rising from slumber upon an embroidered, lace-edged pillow, writing the order for a delicately-arranged breakfast, while an attendant valet curls his hair and draws on silk socks; then slipping on a velvet breakfast jacket and issuing to hold a lover, to which his friend, deck with gifts and sympathy, one bringing the morning papers and another a bottle of bergamot. The influence of this picture upon the building minds of New York cannot fail to be effective; more especially as Stokes has every good reason for maintaining the equality which enables him to enjoy the good things of his life while under the charge of murder. Only a few doors from his luxuriously-furnished cell is that of Foster, the ear-look muller, who is a poor man compared with Stokes; and if Foster can escape the gallows for an indefinite period, Stokes's prospect may be thought good of cheating it entirely. Nor is it to be doubted that this show of purple and fine linen, of delicate appetite and refined tastes will aid the murderer in his escape. Where few men are sufficiently useless to hang, such as Stokes must be considered altogether too valuable; and the cowardly assassin may, without bravado, boast that he is "not ready to poison himself yet."—N. York paper.

Mr. Forster, in his life of Charles Dickens, repeats Carlyle's story of a certain English nobleman, an Ardenrean with his own venerable lips repeated to us the other night a strange profane story of a solemn clergyman who had been administering ghostly consolation to a sick person, having finished satisfactorily, as he thought, and got out of the room he heard the sick person ejaculate: "Well, thank God, Prebick will be out in ten days any way."

FISK'S ESTATE.—The New York "Sun" learns on apparently good authority that after all his debts are settled Col. Fisk's property will not net more than \$100,000. Mr. John H. Conner, Col. Fisk's private secretary, is the administrator of the estate. The vast bulk of the Colonel's property has gone into the pockets of the lawyers. His life was insured for \$20,000 in the Equitable Insurance Company.

Capt. Thurnott, of bark "M. Wood," of St. John from Liverpool, reports that on the 25th of November, Joseph Murray, 21, able seaman, a native of Oxford, Eng., fell overboard and was drowned. The "M. Wood" was 48 days on the passage.

Marriage is come to be looked upon as such a temporary arrangement in Indiana that Justices' fees for the ceremony have been reduced to 25 cents for steady customers.

An agricultural exhibition, open to the whole Province, is to be held at Truro in October next. At a public meeting held on the 10 inst., a committee was appointed to manage the affair.

It is now said that the Dominion Parliament will not be convened until March next.

Presidency of the Republic.

Paris, Jan. 20. Thiers, in accordance with previous intimations, sent to the Assembly to-day his formal resignation, as president of the republic.

It was accompanied with an announcement that all the Ministers also tendered their resignations. Great excitement prevailed in the Chamber on reading these communications. A vote was adopted, almost unanimously, only six members dissenting, appealing of the patriotism of the President, refusing to accept the resignation, and passing to the consideration of the Orders of the Day.

LONDON, Jan. 22—5 a. m. The Prince progresses satisfactorily. The Queen will shortly visit him.

Dease, the liberal member of Parliament from Kerry, Ireland, was mobbed on Saturday. The Czar of Russia has issued an imperial decree subjecting all male citizens to military service. The difficulties between Germany and Brazil have been amicably settled.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. Gold 109 1/8. Exchange 9 3/8. Hale of Maine presented a bill in Congress to-day to admit ship-building material free of duty. A bill was also introduced authorizing the construction of ten new steam sloops of war.

Leading Democrats appear to have selected as their nominees in the coming contest, Gen. Hancock for President and B. Gratz Brown of Missouri for Vice-President.

LONDON, Jan. 22. The Queen of Greece has been safely delivered of a son.

The German war office is about to establish a military school at Metz. It is reported that the German government refuses to join a movement for the suppression of the International Society.

It is understood that Thiers abstains hereafter from debating in the Assembly except on important occasions.

The trial Communists for the murder of hostages in Paris is concluded. Goussin is sentenced to death.

LONDON, Jan. 23. In a recent storm on the Mediterranean, the deck of the steamship Vitis was swept of 35 passengers, all drowned, bound for Alexandria, Egypt. The African mail steamer McGreep Laird, on her passage to England, was lost on the coast of Guinea, passengers and specie saved. The Tichborne case continues to attract a large share of public attention. The claimant's chances are evidently growing weaker. The one hundred pound Tichborne bonds have declined to eighteen pence.

TORONTO, Jan. 23, p. m. In the Legislative Assembly this afternoon, Hon. Mr. Blake moved, "That this House feels bound to express its regret that no effectual steps have been taken to bring to justice the murderers of Thomas Scott."

Mr. Mackenzie last night laid on the table the Public Accounts for the year 1871, showing an actual revenue for the year, of \$2,333,179; Expenditure, \$1,816,867; Surplus, \$516,312; and available cash assets of the Province on the 1st January, 1872, amounting to \$3,810,943.
